

VOX POPULI

Congratulations to the LVA Board for finally coming around to appointing an Ombudsmen Committee — almost two years after ILV broached the subject in the issue of May 24, 1986.

Of course, present Board members were not in office two years ago; so they should be commended for taking this important step to insure better responsiveness to Village needs.

It has been said that Village government is an example of "participatory democracy."

The various committees, composed of resident volunteers who give freely of their time and energy to advise the Board on matters of safety, building and grounds maintenance, flood control, insurance, community relations, emergency services, education and recreation, finance, and those who operate our very important Channel 12 facility — these and others constitute the Leisure village cadre.

Sometimes our Board takes an unpopular action — such as changing the hours of operation of the East and West Gates, so as to save about \$13,000 annually. A commendable objective, but this caused great inconvenience (not to mention additional driving expense) to many residents.

As a consequence, a protest was lodged with the Security & Safety Committee, which voted unanimously to recommend that the Board rescind its action. This was accompanied by the presentation to the Board of petititions bearing almost one thousand signatures.

Although it had first voted to table the matter for further study, the Board reconsidered and agreed to re-open the gates. Conclusion: When villagers speak out, the Board listens.

Some time ago we asked on this page, "Who pays?" That is, who pays the deductibles on our insurance policies, each homeowner - or the Association?

We still don't have an answer. The insurance committee is supposed to be wrestling with the problem, but the committee has not yet reported its findings at the monthly open Board meeting.

Again we ask: Why must homeowners sustain an insured loss before learning what the Association insurance policy provides?

If neither the Insurance Committee nor the Board comes up with an answer, maybe we should ask our Ombudsmen to tackle this question.

Thus, for example, Villagers who have sustained property losses through water damage arising from breaks in the plumbing — and who have been forced to pay the \$1,000 deductible — should not hesitate to file a grievance with the committee of Ombudsmen.

Maybe — just maybe — somebody will pay attention and clarify the insurance provisions.

SENIOR CONCERNS

By Joe Gaynes

One of the most important facts I have learned about the legislative process is that laws, whether to protect people or apprehend violators, are subject to change by amendments that may strengthen the process or dilute its effectiveness, depending to a large measure on the direction that the majority of our legislators take.

Two years ago, after ten years of preparation and bipartisan support, major laws went into effect correcting abuses, including wrongful death of long-term care patients. Lieutenant Governor Leo McCarthy shepherded these bills year after year until passage. Governor George Deukmejian signed them into law and appointed a highly qualified staff to enforce them. Action moved swiftly and very effectively against the violators with heavy penalties for serious violations

Over the last few weeks, a bill has been moving through the legislative committees of the Assembly that will water down the penalties and change the complaint and charge procedures. All this will dilute the actions taken against the violators in whose care we pay heavily to place our frail parents and grandparents, for the final period of their lives.

You can be sure that we are actively looking into this matter and gaining the support of Senior organizations and Service Groups to oppose this action.

This, being an election year, will also place upon us the responsibility of making it widely known to our voters how we are being represented on issues such as this.

a Panel of three persons, with two alternates.

The appointments will be renewable for one-year terms and appointees will serve at the pleasure of the Board.

The Board shall annually appoint the Coordinating Member of the Panel.

3. Qualifications of Panel Members — Be a member of the Association and reside in Leisure Village. Be knowledgeable of the Conditions, Covenants and Restrictions, the By-Laws and the Association Rules and Regulations.

Have credibility in the Village.

Be fair and impartial. **Procedures**

1. The Panel shall have a coordinator and a secre-

2. The Coordinator will assign committee members to grievances as they arise.

3. No member shall participate as a member in the settlement of any grievance to which said

member is a party.

4. Grievances between owner/residents shall be heard by the Panel and only after parties involved have attempted to resolve the grievance themselves but without satisfactory results.

5. Grievances directed toward maintenance, rules and regulations, or committee decisions shall be forwarded to the Committee involved. The Panel will be involved only at the point where the person bringing the grievance is not satisfied.

6. In processing a grievance, the Panel shall:

A) Remain neutral and objective, refusing to become involved in subjective discussions or use of unsubstantiated information. The Panel shall endeavor to ascertain all pertinent facts.

B) Insist that parties involved commit themselves to working out a solution and to abide by the solution agreed upon.

C) Keep all discussions confidential.

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
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


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CURRENT ISSUES FORUM

The Current Issues Forum, Friday, April 4, presented a very exciting and informative discussion on the Sanctuary Movement by Gloria Kinsler who spent 13 years in Guatemala.

Ms. Kinsler brought Arturo, a refugee from Guatemala, with her, and served as his interpreter. Arturo is in the U.S. with his wife and youngest of six children since January of this year. His other five children are in hiding in Guatemala.

According to Arturo, if workers dare ask for even a minimum increase in their meager wages, or beg for the barest of decent working conditions (2% control 70% of the land), or recognition of a few basic civil rights, they are set upon, persecuted, harassed, and many are tortured and murdered.

Gloria Kinsler briefly de-uphold the law. scribed the early forma-

tion of the Sanctuary Movement. In the Geneva Convention of 1951, the U.S. played a formative role in declaring that people fleeing countries where life is endangered because of war, un-controlled violence, loss of judicial process, and other human rights are ipso facto political refugees and should be given refugee status.

The U.S. is the only signer of the protocol that has refused to grant refugee status to Guatemalans and Salvadorans.

In Kinsler's opinion, it is the INS (Immigration and Naturalization Service), directed by the highest authorities in the Justice and State departments, that is volating U.S. and international law. It is the purpose of the sanctuary workers formed by a coalition of many churches and congregations (Catholic, Protestant, Synagogues and others), to uphold the law.



there are about 300 ministries of sanctuaries throughout the U.S., and about 30 are in California. They operate with a very small budget and have four full time lawyers to work for the refugees.

An important trial in Arizona is soon to be deliberated by jury. Eleven sanctuary workers are on trial for transporting or harboring illegal aliens. Gloria stated that the INS had four informants who infiltrated the churches. Gross examination proved that these paid informants were persons with criminal records.

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
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

Harry, who was born in Chicago, worked at a Chevrolet dealer's shop while attending high school. Later he started building both engines and racing cars.

1932 Indy Winner

The winner of the 1932 Indianapolis race was Fred Frame and Harry was in the pit as mechanic. That front-wheel drive racer exceeded 100mph that day, an all-time speed

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
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
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SALUTE TO THE **MAGIC LADIES**

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


