Planning Commission OKs LV fitness center

By unanimous vote last month, the Camarillo Planning Commission approved the plans and architectural drawings for LV's new fitness center, a major step toward a construction start date in the fall.

The July 16 decision was cheered by most of the 75 Leisure Village residents who attended the City Hall meeting.

The commission staff called the proposed project "appropriately designed for the site" and said it "doesn't interfere with access, parking or activities in the common area of the Rec Center."

The 2,000-square-foot building will nearly double the space available for residents' exercise. All new equipment will be designed specifically for seniors; more floor space is planned for mat and yoga work, and cable machines will be installed specifically for people in wheelchairs.

Eleven people spoke to the commissioners about the project, most in support of approval, calling the new center a much-needed addition, long overdue. an improvement that will enhance property values and something that will give residents pride in our facilities. Three objectors raised questions about funding for the project. LV Board members responded by explaining to the panel that the money is already in an operating fund earmarked only for fitness center construction.



• Remove empty flowerpots and flowerpots with dried-out or dead plants.


• Does your doorbell, mailbox, doormat or exterior light fixture need to be replaced? A handyman can easily and inexpensively do that work.



Sign language classes start soon

Two new sign language classes will be offered in September after Labor Day. Glenn Whitlock, who taught a beginner's class last spring, will once again be the instructor for these classes.

A new Beginner's Class will start Sept. 9 at 5 p.m. in the MPR. This class will focus on the basics of sign language through group activities, including games, conversation and direct instruction. Students will have the opportunity to learn the basics of fingerspelling, build approximately 200 signs — including some

emergency signs — and learn about the origins of sign language in America.

An Intermediate Class will be offered to those with a mastery of the spring class or those with a functional level of basic sign language. Students will expand their sign language vocabulary through direct instruction and various activities, including songs and The Pledge of Allegiance and situational dialogue. This class will begin Sept. 9 in the Lanai Room at noon on Mondays.

Tired of airport security? Here's a shortcut

Many Leisure Village residents travel extensively, and that experience has become much less rewarding since the government was forced to implement new security procedures after 9/11. Recently the same agencies that implemented the burdensome procedures have developed a new program, available to all U.S. citizens and legal residents, that lessens the burdens.

The Transportation Security
Administration (TSA) has
implemented TSA Pre-Check, which,
when coupled with the Customs and
Border Protection (GBP) Global Entry
(GE) program, allows selected frequent
flyers of participating airlines to
receive expedited screening benefits.

Approved participants use dedicated screening lanes for screening benefits, which include leaving on shoes, light outerwear and belts as well as leaving laptops and 3-1-1 compliant liquids in carry-on bags.

On returning to the country, GE program participants skip customs lines and check-in at specially designed kiosks, which verify your identity using both fingerprint and facial recognition software (and of course, your passport information). You then declare your imported goods, if any, and go on your way.

To be eligible for these programs there are a number of steps that must be taken.

First, you must be a participant in the frequent flyer program of one of the following airlines: Alaska Airlines, American Airlines, Delta Air Lines, United Airlines and US Airways. Other airlines, such as Southwest and Jet Blue are not participating. This requirement is in place because your boarding pass must include your PASS ID number.

Next, you must individually apply to U.S. Customs and Border Protection for participation in the program. This is done by completing an extensive questionnaire online at www. globalentry.gov. Submit the form with a non-refundable credit card payment of \$100. Based on the information you provide, CBP does a thorough background check and notifies you of your eligibility (or not) in the program. If approved, you are invited to the nearest CBP office, in our case, LAX, for a face-to-face interview, fingerprinting and photographing. Shortly thereafter you will receive your PASS ID number as well as an identification card for use when entering the country by car or ship.

There is no minimum number of trips a year that you need take to qualify for the program.

Whether the trade-off of the upfront application and cost versus the simpler traveling experience is worth it is a decision that you will have to make.






LOOKING BACK





Staying safe in the summer sun

During these hot summer days, it is vitally important that we understand symptoms of heat-related illnesses and what seniors should do to protect themselves. Excessive heat forces our body to work harder than normal, which often is the root cause of heat-related illness. For seniors, this can be a dangerous, and even deadly, problem. With awareness and preventive measures, seniors can enjoy a healthy, active summer.

You can help to prevent dehydration, heat exhaustion, and stroke by following these tips:

• Drink plenty of fluids, especially water, but also popular sports drinks, throughout the day, even if you don't feel thirsty. Avoid caffeine and alcoholic beverages as much as possible as they accelerate dehydration.

• Avoid direct sun exposure, especially during peak hours of 10

a.m. to 3 p.m. To protect your skin from harmful UV rays, the American Cancer Society uses a catch phrase that can help everyone going out in the sun: "Slip! Slop! Slap! And Wrap!" It translates into: "Slip on a shirt, slop on sunscreen, slap on a hat, and wrap on sunglasses to protect the eyes and sensitive skin around them."

• Limit strenuous activity and exercise. Planning around the hottest time of the day can help to limit exposure to the heat.

• Take frequent breaks to cool down when you're outside in the hot sun.

• Make sure the home's cooling device is working properly.

One of my favorite spots on earth is San Luis Obispo. We were lucky enough to live there for 10 years before moving to wonderful Leisure Village. There are great restaurants in SLO, and one of my favorites is Big Sky Café. It's a California café with fresh, local fare.

Charles Myers, chef and owner of Big Sky, was kind enough to share with me his recipe for Gazpacho, a cold tomato soup. It is the best I've ever had and easy to make. This recipe makes 3 to 4 servings. I make it all summer! When company is coming, I double the recipe.

This "salad in a soup bowl" keeps in the fridge for a week. I use Hothouse (or English) cucumbers that I wash and dice, but I don't bother to peel or seed them.

Gazpacho is best when you make it the day before, giving all the flavors a chance to blend. So enjoy this treat to beat the heat as a great appetizer or main course!

Big Sky Gazpacho

1/2 cup fresh tomatoes, diced (you may use two or three kinds or colors of tomatoes)

1/2 cup cucumbers, seeded, peeled, and diced (or use seedless Hothouse cukes)

7 to 8 ounces of canned diced tomatoes with juice (you may substitute fresh tomatoes)

1/4 cup each red peppers, green peppers and red onions, all finely diced 1 cup tomato juice

Stir together and place one-third of the mixture into a food processor or blender and puree. Add the puree back to the mixture and season with:

3 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 1 Tablespoon any quality red wine vinegar

1/2 Tablespoon balsamic vinegar (optional)

1 Tablespoon Worcestershire sauce Salt, pepper, and Tabasco sauce to taste. Stir, chill, and serve topped with a couple of garlic croutons and some chunks of ripe avocado!

The Planning Commission told the audience that matters of funding are not relevant to its decision; architecture, safety codes, and city regulations are.

Twenty-four written comments were also submitted to the three commissioners — two opposing and the rest in favor of approval.

That approval is not the last necessary green light. FEMA, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, recently notified the architect and the Village that the

agency must sign off on plans because the new building will be in the flood plain. Craig Lopez, the architect of the project, says the request will take some reworking of plans. He has "no doubt that FEMA requirements will be met," but it will add as much as three months to the preparation time.

Even with the new FEMA application, it is estimated that final approvals could occur within a few months and construction could begin in October. LV residents might be using their new fitness center at the beginning of 2014.

LV Pet Club

July's Pet Club meeting was hot stuff! It was a festival of facts intended to keep your pets safe and healthy in steamy weather. Guest speaker Dr. Andy Miller warned of leaving an animal in the car. Even on a cool 70 degree day, the temperatures inside get dangerously high very quickly. Dr. Miller also noted that dogs can burn the pads of their feet on asphalt or concrete. Think about the last time you went barefoot on a very hot day—ouch!

Flea control is necessary year round in our climate, and Dr. Miller explained the topical or systemic (pill) options.

The vet also cautioned against common toxic substances, such as grapes, which can cause serious bladder infection in dogs. Dr. Miller told dog lovers to be wary of grapes, raisins, chocolate and Xylitol, the

ingredient found in sugarless gum and mints. Dr. Miller practices at Las Posas Veterinary Clinic, just outside the Village, near CVS.

There is currently a coyote alert in the Village. Due to the recent fire and drought, coyotes are trolling the Village in search of water and food. Residents report frequent sightings, especially in early morning, dusk and dark. Please do not allow your pets to be unattended on patios, as coyotes can jump the fences. Dog owners are also warned to keep dogs close to you on walks; extendable leashes are not a good idea when coyotes are on the prowl! Coyotes are not a danger to people, but they are a real threat to our small pets.

We have a special treat in store for our August Pet Club meeting. The Ventura County Sheriff's Department will stage a demonstration of the K9 Unit. These amazing dogs are specially trained to assist police in locating felons, missing adults and children, narcotics and evidence. This meeting will be held Monday, Aug. 12, at 7 p.m. in the Pavilion Area behind
