DISASTER AND EARTHQUAKE **PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM**

(To Be Sponsored By The Emergency Services Committee)

The Leisure Village **Emergency Services Or**ganization will conduct an evening program at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 23 in the A.R. to update L.V. residents on preparedness and planning for survival in the event of a major earthquake or disaster. The City of Camarillo through their consultants in disaster planning and the Southern California Earthquake Preparedness Project will participate in the program.

Films and slides depicting the earthquake threat to this area will be shown along with graphic examples of earthquake destruction and what you can do to increase your ability to survive such an event. There will be demonstrations as to how to improve the safety in your home, to decrease injuries and to survive in the aftermath of a major di-

All residents are invited to attend this informative meeting. All volunteer emergency service workers of the LVESO and especially the Village Coordinators are requested to attend.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL VILLAGERS

A new manual covering Disaster Survival and Earthquake Preparedness designed for Leisure Village residents will be delivered to your home during the month of February. Your Village Coordinator or an Alternate will deliver the manual to your door. This is the time to become acquainted with the person who has volunteered to be of service to your Village in the event of a disaster or similar emergen-

You will be supplied with a new Emergency Notification form which every resident should complete and return to the Association office. The new information that you supply will permit Security to update the emergency notification files. If you are unable to complete the form, request your Village Coordinator to assist you. If the status of disabled persons or persons needing special handling in the event of an emergency changes in your household, advise your Village Coordinator.

It Bears Repeating...

We have published guidelines many times, but many of you who write for us repeatedly do not follow ALL of the requirements which makes it much harder on the staff and the Camarillo Daily News' typist to avoid errors.

Newspaper Requirements...

The Camarillo Daily News, as does every professional publisher, requires that your copy be typewritten on standard 8½ x 11" white paper, doublespaced indented for paragraphs, use of upper and lower case as is appropriate. (Please: Clean your typewriter keys. Get a new ribbon!) Please: no typewriter script and no carbon copies.

Additional requirements for ILV

In addition to the above, include your telephone number and preferably your Village number with your name. Drop two inches for title and observe 1½" side and lower margins. (This helps us to make a quick estimate as to the space requirement.) Include the Name of your Organization or Group in the first sentence of your story.

We are Lenient.

We have always been lenient in accepting hand-written, hand-printed and even sloppy copy, and we will continue to accept handwritten letters from the ill or the bereaved. We believe, however, that in this community there must be at least one person in each group who can type and follow instructions. It is the responsibility of the group leader and the publicity person to see that these guidelines are followed. One of our editors can always be reached for help if needed. Be concise. Please do not include instructions or other notations on your copy. We love logos (we initiated them), and we always use them where space permits. No need to remind us. Bear with us when we have to "cut". Please realize

that your editors will not know how much space will be available until after the final deadline. The number of pages varies from month to month depending upon the advertising sold.

We reserve the right to edit your copy, to refuse any material that is not presentable, not received by deadline, or not appropriate for ILV. We do not accept anonymous material.

Your editors fully appreciate all who submit material and who cooperate so beautifully with us. We enjoy and appreciate the employees of the Camarillo Daily News who cooperate so pleasantly with us. WHO PAYS?

At the January meeting of the LVA Board, I asked the question: Who pays for the various insurance deductibles, the Villagers affected by insured losses or the Association?

The deductibles are \$1,000 per occurrence for fire and extended coverage, 10% of replacement cost per structure for earthquake, and from \$250 to \$500 per unit for flood insurance.

On January 20, 1980 the Association issued an "Insurance Information Sheet" describing the fire insurance then in effect, which provided coverage against "All Risks of Direct Physical Loss" subject to certain exclusions and policy conditions.

At that time a \$1,000 deductible applied to each occurrence, and "each homeowner" shared "equally in making up the \$1,000 deductible ..."

Since 1980 LVA insurance bulletins have been completely silent on the subject of responsibility for payment of the deductible.

I was told at the Board meeting and in private conversation with a former Board member that this question is resolved each time on the basis of liability, that is, if the homeowner was responsible for the loss, he/she pays the deductible, while the insurance company takes care of the amount that exceeds the deductible.

This seems like a fair way of handling the situation, since it would tend to encourage each homeowner to be careful (for example, in shutting off the water flow to the clothes washer at the completion of the wash cycle). On the other hand, determination of liability by Village employees or even by LVA Board mem-

tive and inconsistent.

This is a tough question, and the insurance Committee and the board help. are wrestling with it. The issue should be resolved either by a definitive Rule or by amendment to the C.C. & R.'s, whichever is appropriate.

The point I am stressing is that Village residents should know in advance their responsibilities not after a loss has occurred.

In case you missed the article in the Voice, or misplaced it, regarding Handicap Placards, here's a bit more information.

One phone number of the DMV is 986-3701. Ask for Application for Disabled Person Parking Card to be mailed to you.

This application covers not only bodily handicap but also certain lung diseases; specific cardiovascular diseases; and visual acuity.

A check or money order for \$6.00 is required for a 2-year placard. Be sure the application is signed by your Physician, Chiropractor, Opthalmologist, or Optometrist before submitting it to DMV with your money. The application must also specify Temporary Disability or Permanently Disabled.

Remember residents, and visitors, these placards MUST be used in our Village parking spaces as well as all other handicap parking areas.

Considered at this time are exercycles, rowing machines, etc. Several have been promised.



Another important need tient visits - more than for many home care patients who have no one at home to care for them is nutritious food. To answer that need, the LMVNA has contracted to have hot meals delivered daily to the patient's home.

> Transportation to and from medical appointments presents a major problem for large numbers of homebound patients. Through grants from CalTrans and The James Irvine Foundation, the LMVNA conducts a Patient Transportation Program to serve the homebound throughout the county.

> An especially poignant and sensitive form of care is the LMVNA's Home Hospice Program for terminally ill persons who choose to spend their remaining days at home, in peace and comfort. The agency also strives to keep the general community informed of good health practices and medical developments through its Community Health Education services (several presentations have been made at Leisure Village in recent months).

> This year, more than ever, home health care is an important aspect of medical cost saving efforts. The LMVNA expects to continue to grow in services and caseloads as it meets the burgeoning demand for comprehensive home care as an economical alternative to institutional care.

Leisure Villager George Goldstein, a former deputy controller in the office of the Secretary of Defense and a 33-year U.S. Government veteran, was critical of the Administration and Congressional tax reform plans and offered his own plan in a talk delivered to the Current Issues Forum on Dec. 27.

Goldstein's tax reform plan would be more progressive and remove many tax loopholes that are retained under the Treasury Dept. plan and the House bill just passed.

His plan would put limits on deductions for charitable contributions and mortgage interest payments. Sales taxes would not be deductible. Tax exempt bonds would be eliminated (the federal government would reimburse state and local governments for higher interest costs). He would eliminate as many real estate shelters as possible.

As for the corporate federal income tax system, Goldstein would retain the present 46% rate. He would also retain the investment tax credit, but would eliminate accelerated depreciation. However, he would provide that investment tax credits be used for purchases of needed equipment rather than for corporate takeovers. He enlarged upon the tax reform situation in response to numerous questions.

Rankin and Gilda

Due to space limitations last month, we were only able to print the first half of the Rankin Gilda McIntyre profile.

We told how Rankin traced his interest in animal pathology to his dad's profession as a pharmacist in the early 1900's. Stricken with polio while in college, Rankin was treated at Warm Springs, GA., met and played chess with F.D.R., completed his education and in 1947 came west as lab supervisor in the L.A. County Livestock Department

Gilda, although born with severe limited vision of just 4%, worked her way through schools and colleges in the L.A. area, earned her Masters Degree through a scholarship from the American Foundation for the Blind and in the early 1970's was working on rehabilitation programs for geriatric patients at L.A. County's Olive view Hospital in the San Fernando Valley.

Earthquake of 1971 "At 6:01 a.m. on February 9, 1971, a giant earthquake hit our area," recalls Gilda. "I was in a wooden building nearby,

was thrown several feet. but did not suffer any injury. However, our beautiful hospital, which took 9 years to build and was not yet fully completed, was reduced to rubble in less than a minute. Had it happened a few hours later. the loss of life would have been very high."

On that same day, staff members, patients and records were transferred to L.A. County's Rancho Los Amigos Hospital in Downey.

While Rankin and Gilda had not yet met, the day of the earthquake also found him directly involved. The loss of electricity that day created a crisis at the Sheriff's Honor Farm, also a location close to the epicenter. He was instructed to get to the farm as soon as possible. Not only were a number of animals injured, but with no electricity, the milking machines were inoperative!

"A good number of the inmates were drunks and

Rankin," and it was my task to instruct them in the fine art of manually milking a cow. It was quite a scene, but a good number were 'country boys' and they responded very

"The milk was urgently needed at a number of Los Angeles County facilities," he continued, "and this humorous sidelight missed the papers due to the magnitude of the earthquake."

It was at Rancho Los Amigos Rankin and Gilda met and they were married in 1972. She continued to work for a short period of time, getting involved with tuberculosis assistance to new patients and their families.

During the moon landing space projects of the early 1960's, Rankin was a special consultant to Aerojet-General, one of the prime contractors. His project of simulating conditions for the distillation when a mysterious disliquids

control. Not only were the Indians being deprived of food, but their primary livelihood, rug-making, was seriously threatened. He determined that a then little-known bacteria, anthrax, was causing the deaths and soon after a vaccine was supplied, saving the remaining sheep.

While on the subject of vaccine and drugs, he stated factually,"Did you know that every single new drug on the market today has been tested on animals before being approved?"

As one who was skilled in the treatment of animals, it was only natural that "show-biz" would occasionally look to Rankin. He enjoyed providing advice and care, on occasion, to Roy Rogers' "Trigger," and also spent time on the "Lassie" TV


He's the author of dozens of highly technical and highly respected papers covering diseases of many, many animals.
