MEDIA INFORMATION

This guide is published by the Sports Information Office at Cal State Fullerton for the convenience of the media in coverage of the 1994 Titan baseball team. Should additional information be required, please contact:

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located at the will call/player pass table located on the third base concourse.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted via the right-field stairway. Due to the limited foul territory behind home plate, all photographers must remain to the outfield side of the coaching boxes at first and third bases.

PRESS BOX: A temporary facility is located on the walkway behind the seats directly behind home plate. It seats five people comfortably, more not so comfortably.

TELEPHONES: The press box phone number is (714) 449-5327. Additional phones are available in the Sports Information Office, located about 200 yards to the south. A public pay phone is located directly behind the electrical house behind the press box.

RADIO LINES: Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team(s). The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Tim Murphy well in advance.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

- a) Using lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Ave. and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit, or:
- b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

Parking regulations are enforced 24 hours a day, 7 days per week

Fullerton's codes are 1240 for the complete release, 1241 for the notes only, 1242 for the statistics only and 1243 for the most recent box score.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing. The main campus is located in Fullerton and a Mission Viejo campus was opened in August, 1989. The latter offers only upper-division and graduate courses.

Classes were offered at Fullerton for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 25,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes, although nearly 400 now live on campus in residence halls opened in

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University is fully accredited and enjoys national recognition for both its array of traditional academic programs and a growing list of independently accredited professional programs, including art, athletics training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing and theater.



Dr. Milton A. Gordon, **President**

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his

duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as a mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied

Sciences.

He is a member of the board of the California Coalition for Mathematics and a member of the Orange County Community Foundation, the California State University Growth Plan Commission, the CSU Commission on the Older, Part-Time Student, the California Admissions Advisory Council, the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

All told, there are 87 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, but also open to community members, is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups, including the Titan Athletic Foundation.

Further examples of community outreach are the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of aging and a meeting place for the Continuing Learning Experience support group.

Through a series of joint ventures started in 1979 with the establishment of the Fullerton Arboretum and continuing with the 1989 opening of the Marriott Hotel, the University and the city of Fullerton are working to complete an on-campus sports complex in 1992. Already in use are two lighted softball fields. When the main part of the sports complex is finished, it will include a stadium for football, soccer and other activities plus a pavilion for baseball.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State conducts comprehensive fund raising. Its purpose is to raise the necessary nonstate funding to make a very good university a great institution.



Bill Shumard, Dir. of Athletics

Bill Shumard is in his third year of an eventful tenure as Director of Athletics at Cal State Fullerton. He had to hire key new personnel and initiate his vision of the role of the athletic department on the

campus and in the community while working under drastic budget constrictions handed down by the state and State University system.

Shumard, 43, assumed his post on Aug. 1, 1991. He immediately had to replace two of his associate athletic directors. Brad Holland was appointed men's basketball coach in April and Deborah Ayres (women's basketball) and Mary Ellen Murchison (volleyball) were hired in June.

Shumard instituted a new 10-year gender equity plan for CSUF athletics and helped prepare an accelerated marketing plan to showcase the new Titan Sports Complex that features football/soccer, baseball and track facilities. Generated revenue from marketing, corporate sponsorships, advertising, radio and home event gate more than doubled in his first year. Fiscal integrity has been established as a cornerstone in the department in order to achieve much-needed credibility in the campus community.

"The challenge before us is immense as we seek to set realistic goals and parameters for our program," said Shumard. "But despite the obstacles, CSUF never has been in a better position to realize its true athletic potential as we enter this new era and take advantage of our new facilities."

Shumard called his Fullerton appointment the achievement of a "lifelong personal goal. Because of where we live (Brea), and having children in the process of growing up, this is where I set my sights. I'm a graduate of the Cal State system (Long Beach State, 1972) and my desire was to get back to this level.

"An athletic department run with ethical and financial responsibility can mirror a successful university. It can bring people to the university in a myriad of ways. There are 80,000 Cal State Fullerton graduates living in the Los Angeles area. We've got the opportunity to use our program to bring them back to campus.

We see our student-athletes as ambassaadors and role models to our campus and community. We want to give them the tools to be successful in

society after graduation."

Shumard came to Fullerton after three years as an assistant athletic director at USC, where he was part of a five-person team that raised \$7 million per year. His projects included supervising 12 regional Trojan Club support groups and staging a dinner in the Los Angeles Coliseum for 3,000 persons to highlight the university's athletic centennial celebration.

Shumard's 13-year career with the Los Angeles Dodgers began in 1975 as an assistant in public relations and publicity. He became Director of the Speakers Bureau in 1977 and was appointed Director of Community Services in 1981. The title was enlarged in 1983 to include Special Events as he supervised a staff of 15 employees responsible for game and community promotions and all publications as well as coordinating the activities of the Dodger Alumni Association.

His first athletics position was as Sports Information Director at his alma mater in 1972 and 1973. He spent the next two years at Cal State Los Angeles where he was an assistant professor in journalism and physical education, was advisor to the campus pep groups and served as manager of the Athletic News Bureau.

Shumard recently was appointed to bhe Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Sports Council, which seeks to bring top-flight sporting events to Southern California. He also is on the Board of Victory Ministries and the executive committee of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Shumard's athletic career ended as a freshman quarterback at Compton Junior College, where he obtained his Associate Arts degree in 1970. Bill and his wife, Kim, live in Brea. He has three sons -- David, 22; Matt, 18; and Mike, 15.

HEAD COACH AUGIE GARRIDO

Head Coach Augie Garrido hasn't missed a beat since returning to the helm of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program. After three seasons at the University of Illinois interrupted what is now a 19-year tenure with the Titans, Garrido logged another conference championship in 1991, in 1992 led the Titans back to College World Series and a second-place finish and took his 1993 squad to the NCAA Central II Regional in Austin, Texas.

Garrido's return to Fullerton coincided with the beginning of

construction of a longawaited on-campus sta-The "Field of dium. Dreams" facility was used for the first time on Apr. 18, 1992, in a doubleheader victory over Loyola Marymount and was formally dedicated on May 4 as CSUF alumnus Kevin Costner threw out the first pitch before a crowd of 2,054 that overflowed the 1,520 theaterstyle chairs.

The tenth winningest coach in collegiate baseball, Garrido spent 1988 through 1990 as head coach at Illinois, where

he built the Illini into a national power and led them to their first Big Ten Championship in 26 years. He compiled a record of 111-57 and twice took the Illini into the NCAA playoffs (1989-90)

At Fullerton, Garrido has captured a pair of national championships, five regional titles and 13 conference crowns including 11 in a row from 1974 through 1984. These accomplishments only scratch the surface of the success story he has written at Cal State Fullerton.

Garrido, 55, has served with equal professionalism his student-athletes, his institution and his sport while developing a nationally prominent program at a university which has existed for just over 30 years. He has sent scores of players into the professional ranks (18 to the major leagues through 1992) while bringing CSF its first men's Division I national title and serving as an articulate and respected voice in the promotion of collegiate and amateur baseball.

Garrido ranks No. 10 among active Division I coaches with 1,003 victories in 25 seasons. He celebrated his 1,000th career win on May 7, 1993 in a 12-1 victory over San Jose State. His lifetime mark is 1,003-483-7 (.674) and his Fullerton record is 782-350-6 (.690). Three times (1975, 1979 and 1984) he has been selected National Coach of the Year. His average of more than 40 victories per season is the fourth highest in NCAA history, and in a survey of major league directors of player development, Coach Garrido was rated one of the nation's top three teachers.

The Titans have strung together 20 consecutive winning seasons while typically playing as difficult a schedule as anyone in the country. Eleven years in a row (1974-84), Fullerton won or shared its league championship and went on to post-season play. In 1985, Fullerton won the southern division championship of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association but lost a playoff series at Fresno State. In 1986 the Titans finished third and in 1987, Garrido's squad finished first in the PCAA but finished second at the South Regional in New Orleans.



A native of the San Francisco Bay town of Vallejo, Garrido attended Fresno State University (1959-61) and was an all-conference performer for Coach Pete Beiden and was inducted into the Fresno State Hall of Fame last fall. He signed a contract with the Cleveland Indians and played six years in their minor league system before retiring in 1966 to accept a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, California.

Garrido moved up to the collegiate ranks in 1969 as head coach at San Francisco State (25-14) and then spent three seasons at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo (85-62-1), where he earned

a master's degree in 1968.

Despite being situated in the heart of baseball-rich southern California, Fullerton had enjoyed only limited success in the infant years of its intercollegiate baseball program. But that began to change in 1973 when Garrido arrived. After one losing season (19-33-1), he began producing nothing but winners. And in 1975, the Titans asserted their new prowess by winning the NCAA regional tournament at USC and advancing to the College World Series in Omaha in their first year of Division I play.

It took until 1979 for a repeat Fullerton performance in the CWS, but the Titans didn't waste the second opportunity. The Titans came though the consolation bracket to beat Arkansas, 2-1, for the NCAA championship. They repeated as national champions in 1984, beating Texas, 3-1, in the title game.


Garrido's baseball interests carry beyond the college schedule. ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH GEORGE HORTON



Associate Head Coach George Horton has played a *major* role in the success of the Titans. He relinquished the offensive duties in 1993 to Garrido and concentrated on the development of the Fullerton pitchers.

Horton returned to Cal State Fullerton after coaching at Cerritos College where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years.

Horton, 40, compiled a 226-53 record at Cerritos and won the California state championship in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time So. Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).

He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin with the San Francisco Giants, Craig Worthington with the Baltimore Orioles, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Bret Barberie, Louis Medina and Jeff Hearron.

Horton was a member of the Cerritos College team in 1972 and '73. He was a member of the 1973 State Championship team. He won the most inspirational award in '72. In 1973 he was the Falcon team captain and won the Dallas Moon Award. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-SCBA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first team to ever go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College where he coached with Long Beach State coach Dave Snow, the following three seasons. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as: Shane Mack, Odibbe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

Horton and his wife Francie have three daughters -- Michele (14), Heather (10) and Rebecca (3). Horton and his family reside in Yorba Linda.


Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood HS under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.

Rick Stassi begins his third season as the pre-season and in-season conditioning advisor. He is also the 'dietician' for the team.




Mike Kirby Facilities/Equipment Manager




Mark Shimamoto Facilities/Equipment Manager

1994 CAL STATE FULLERTON BASEBALL OUTLOOK

Head baseball coach Augie Garrido is thrilled about his 1994 squad.

All the enthusiasm stems from the fact that six position players and all but one pitcher are returning from last season's 35-19 NCAA playoff team.

Among the returning position players are senior catchers **Bret Hemphill** and **Adam Millan**, senior right fielder **Jim Betzsold**, junior pre-season All-American center fielder **Dante Powell**, junior first baseman **D.C. Olsen** and junior second baseman **Jeff Ferguson**.

The pitching staff returns all but one player from a group that posted a team earned run average of 4.53. Among the pitchers returning are seniors Dan Ricabal, Chad Rolish and Kimson Hollibaugh, juniors Mike Parisi and Derek Fahs and sophomores Ted Silva and Jon Ward.

Add to the fact that the Titan coaching staff had one of its best recruiting years in recent history, and it's hard not to be excited for the Titans.

Among the newcomers are freshmen Jack Jones (SS/ (Thomas) Downey HS), Mark Kotsay (LHP-OF/Santa Fe HS) and Bobby Sunderland (RHP/Sunny Hills HS) and juniors Brett Thomas (INF/San Bernardino Valley College), Brian King (OF/American River JC), Tony Miranda (OF/Cerritos JC) and Robert Matos (OF/Cerritos JC).

The first month of play will see Fullerton start off with its traditionally tough schedule: three games at Stanford, three at home against Arizona and three at Texas. The Titans then host the inaugural 1994 Anaheim Hilton and Towers Baseball Classic at Titan Field which will include national powers such as Georgia Tech, Oklahoma and the University of San Diego. And, in late March, the Titans will host perennially prominent Wichita State.

Catcher

Hemphill (.268, 4 HR, 29 RBI) will start behind the plate but redshirt freshman **Brian Loyd** (El Dorado HS) will see time this season. Hemphill and Millan may swap catching and designated hitting duties from time to time as well.

First Base

Olsen (.268, 7 HR, 35 RBI) has the lock on the job down at first, but Millan (.354, 7 HR, 57 RBI) may see time at the spot if he's not catching or the designated hitter. Newcomer **Sal Mancuso** (Lewis & Clark College) will most likely redshirt for Fullerton.

Second Base

Replacing a good-hitting/fielding Jeremy Carr from a year ago may be a major problem for most, but put a person in the spot who had to replace 1992's college player of the year at third and the task becomes a bit easier. Moving from third to second this year is Ferguson (.318, 2 HR, 36 RBI) and he will be backed up by freshman Chris Remala (El Dorado HS) and senior Jason Gill (CSU Dominguez Hills).

Shortstop

Like replacing Carr at second, it won't be easy replacing Nate Rodriquez at short. The Titans think they have found their man for the next three or four years with the freshman Jones. Thomas may also see time at short.

Third Base

Returning infielder Craig Skyberg (.200, 2 RBI) will be pencilled in to start the season at the hot corner. Skyberg backed up Ferguson at the position a year ago. Also fighting for the job will be redshirt junior Steve Rath (Golden West College). Betzsold could also see time at third this spring.

Left Field

Newcomer Brian King is slated to start the season in left and will serve as Powell's backup in center. Redshirt freshman **Jeremy Giambi** (South Hills HS), Matos and Miranda will all vie for playing time with King.

Center Field

Projected first round draft pick Powell (.335, 12 HR, 57 RBI) will again roam in center this season. Playing with some of the best players in the nation, and against some of the best players in the world, during the summer with Team USA helped boost his confidence.

Right Field

Betzsold (.310, 8 HR, 33 RBI) will start in right but will be pushed by Kotsay. Should this happen, Betzsold may fill the designated hitter's role. Again, Matos and Miranda will look for playing time in either right or left field.

Starting Pitcher

Fullerton is fortunate to return 11-game and 10-game winners in Ricabal (11-3, 3.48 ERA, 106 Ks) and Parisi (10-3, 4.71 ERA, 63 Ks). Rounding out the starting roles will be an experienced Fahs (3-3, 6.17 ERA, 41 Ks) and a young arm in Ward (1-3, 7.31 ERA, 21 Ks), who faced a number of ranked teams in his freshman season. Rolish (2-0, 2.74 ERA, 45 Ks) has impressed the Titan coaches, especially with a win in his first start as a Titan in the NCAA Central II Regional over McNeese State, and will see time as both a starter and a relief pitcher. Newcomers looking for time on the hill in the starter's role will be Kotsay, Sunderland and sophomore transfer Matt Wagner (Abilene Christian University).

Relief Pitcher

The most pleasant surprise of the '93 season was the emergence of a freshman stopper by the name of Ted Silva (4-2, 7 SVs, 3.79 ERA, 60 Ks). Senior Hollibaugh (3-5, 1 SV, 5.40 ERA, 36 Ks) is an experienced hurler who has the ability to be a starter, long relief or short relief pitcher. Also vying for time on the mound will be freshman **Jose Peraza** (Norwalk HS) and a senior returning from elbow surgery in **Tony Fetchel**, who, if he returns with the ability he had in '92 (2-1, 2 SVs, 2.87 ERA, 18 Ks), will add great depth to the Titan bullpen.



The 1994 season will be No. 10 for the Big West Conference under the current alignment which blended teams from the Southern and Northern California Baseball Associations. Two teams departed in last season, UC Irvine dropped the sport and Fresno State left for the Western Athletic Conference, and Nevada took the place of Fresno State. It resembles the football and basketball alignments of the institutions in what was called the Pacific Coast Athletic Association through the 1988 baseball season.

The end result is one of the most competitive baseball leagues in the nation. At least one team from the Big West Conference has represented the league in each of the last five College World Series tournaments. Since realignment, four different schools have won or shared conference titles: Fresno State in 1985, 1988, 1989 and 1991; Cal State Fullerton in 1987, 1990 and 1991; Long Beach State in 1989, 1992 and 1993; and UC Santa Barbara in







TITAN BASEBALL HISTORY

The Cal State Fullerton baseball tradition had a most humble beginning, starting out as a club team and playing on a field literally scratched out of an orange grove. Only the wildest dreamer would have foreseen a program that now features two national championships, seven regional titles, 13 conference crowns and 20 alumni with major league playing experience.

It's been a memorable three decades since Beryl Kempton and Warren Beckbrought the program into the world. Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power. Larry Cochell kept the tradition alive with two College World Series appearances in his three-year tenure at Fullerton and Garrido hasn't missed a beat since he returned in 1991 after three seasons at Illinois.

Kempton was the university employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Football House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing residence in the city and has housed the Titans' football coaching staff.

The first-base line ran north and the thirdbase line went to the west, paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive. A splitrail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pick-up" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.


In 1965, the program became a full fledged intercollegiate sport with Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing a second field situated farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their successful tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans didn't miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional, depriving the Trojans of a shot at a sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief, to say the least. The Titans lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champions in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games over San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league. The 7-team Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' championship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title in 1977 with Cal State L.A. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row including a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began in 1980 a frustrating streak of post-season play. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regionals at Tempe to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the automatic NCAA tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth and another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. But a realignment of the infielders seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see the Titans win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA chamionship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a "Murderers' Row" field of USC, San Diego State and the host Bulldogs of Fresno State and won the regional

in 100+ degree heat.

At Omaha, venerable institutions Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State and, finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way of a second NCAA title. In a World Series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and record-setting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life and beat Texas, 3-1, in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel set a CWS record for hits and won the Most Valuable Player Trophy. Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single to help beat ASU. The Titans outslugged Oklahoma State behind a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns, where John Bryant stole a base to set up the tying run and tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer allowed a couple of infield hits in the first inning for a Texas run but that was to be all. He pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door for his 22nd

save.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league chamionship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.

TITAN BASEBALL HISTORY

By most school's standards, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoff berth as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2 lead in the ninth inning at home vs. UNLV on Apr. 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its first 13 games on its way to an 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over

surprise runnerup UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the NCAA playoffs with a berth in the South II Regionals in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker and all the other outs were via fly balls or strikeouts.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep pitching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, couldn't handle the Tigers and the Titans had to settle for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois where a lucrative financial offer and the challenge to build a winner in a cold weather location proved irresistible. Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 out of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an at-large NCAA bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit a 3-run home run with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice in their own stadium.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck couldn't repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.

Despite the presence of All-Americans Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titan team endured Fullerton's worst season since 1973. The Titans finished in the second division of the Big West at 10-11 and the overall record was 30-27.

The end of a dynasty? Rival coaches thought so and picked the Titans to finish fifth in the Big West in 1990. Instead, the team romped to its first conference title since 1987 and rode that momentum to an impressive sweep of the Central Regional at Austin, Texas. Twice the Titans beat the host Longhorns on their own turf to earn a sixth trip to Omaha.

They crashed at the CWS, literally. Outfielder Rich Gonzales collided with the left field wall and concern for his health distracted the Titans in losses to Oklahoma State and The Citadel.

Cochell accepted a lucrative offer to coach at Oklahoma and create an opening for Garrido's return in 1991, a year the Titans would use Amerige Park in downtown Fullerton for games and practice with construction

underway on a new stadium.

Fullerton started the year in its traditional fashion -- slowly. The latter part of the season looked grim as the Titans entered conference play with a 15-12 record. But in keeping with Titan tradition, Fullerton ended the season on a high note winning 10 of its final 12 games and clinching a share of the conference championship, the second title in as many years.

By virtue of head-to-head competition Fresno State gained the automatic berth to post-season play. The NCAA Selection Committee didn't look upon Fullerton's strong finish as being good enough to earn an at-large bid to tournament play. The snub left the Titans at home but provided motivation for the

1992 squad.

The Titans had a dream season in 1992, one that seemed destined to result in a third national title. They opened the long awaited Titan Stadium in April, saw Fullerton alumnus Kevin Costner throw out the first pitch at the inaugural game and blew through an NCAA Regional tournament at defending national champion LSU only to come up one run short to longtime rival Pepperdine in the national

title game televised by CBS.

The 1992 season also marked the end of one of the most remarkable athletic careers in Fullerton history. Phil Nevin, who was an outstanding kicker and punter for the football team for three years, was selected Baseball America's Player of the Year, the College World Series MVP (the first player from a nonchampionship team to win the award since Dave Winfield did so in 1973), Big West Conference Player of the Year, was the first player picked in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros, started at third base in the 1992 Olympics for Team USA and became the second Titan (Tim Wallach in 1979) to win collegiate baseball's most prestigious prize, the Golden Spikes Award, from the U.S. Baseball Federation.

After winning 14 games in a row during the regular season, Fullerton was ranked as high as second in the nation. The old cliche turned out to be true in the Titans' case – they peaked too early. The 1993 season marked the first time a Titan team had beaten USC twice in the regular season since 1987, but CSF went 0-2 against the Trojans in the Central II Regional in Austin, TX. After hitting .316 as a team during the regular season, the 35-19 Titan squad hit an anemic .193 during post-season play. Taking second place in the Big West Conference and the experience of post-season play will carry over with the 13 returning players for the 1994 season.

Coach Garrido and the 1994 squad are fired-up about this spring's season. With six returning position starters and the fact that the pitching staff returns all but one player from a gruop that posted a team earned run average of 4.53, it's hard not to be excited for the

litans.

Within the Big West Conference, Fullerton looks to be challenged primarily by perennial power Long Beach State.

FORMER TITANS IN THE MAJOR LEAGUE

Twenty products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into major league box scores with several more stars of recent Titan teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was left-handed pitcher Dan Boone, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping Fullerton into the 1975 College World Series and then made a dramatic comeback with Baltimore in 1990. He was followed by Dan Whitmer at Toronto (1976) and California.

The biggest name came next as **Tim Wallach**, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos. He has played in several All-Star Games for the National League including the 1989 Classic in Anaheim. He now holds down the "hot corner" for the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Arriving at the 'Show' in the mid-80s were right-handed pitcher Jeff Robinson with the San Francisco Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates, New York Yankees, California Angels and Chicago Cubs; outfielder Andre David, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder John Christensen with the New York Mets, Boston Red Sox, Seattle Mariners and the Twins.

Left-handed pitcher **Greg Mathews** burst upon the scene in St. Louis in 1986 to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He started in the Championship Series for the Cardinals. Recurring arm problems have plagued his career and he is now playing in triple A.

Getting his debut in 1987 was **Bill Moore** with Montreal before the Titan Alumni Club exploded in 1988 with five additions. The most heralded was pitcher **Mike Harkey**, who was starting at Wrigley Field for the Chicago Cubs 16 months after his last Titan appearance. He was selected *USA Today's* Minor League Player of the Year in 1988 but






suffered a knee injury during spring training and missed the Cubs' 1989 divisional title team. In 1990, he was the Cubs' No. 2 winner and placed fifth in Rookie of the Year balloting. He spent the 1991 season rehabilitating a shoulder injury and returned to the Chicago rotation in 1992. The Cubs released him before the 1994 season and was signed by the Colorado Rockies.

Earlier in the 1988 season, former Titan reliever Mike Schooler surfaced with the Mariners and was their top stopper and one of the best in baseball before being released and signed on with the Texas Rangers. In Philadelphia, Shane Turner was one of the players who tried to fill the shoes of Mike Schmidt at third base and now plays in the Seattle organization. In Houston, John Fishel, the MVP of the 1984 College World Series, was part of the Astros' futile run at the NL West flag before being traded to the Yankees. Kevin Reimer started in more than 100 games in right field for the Texas Rangers in 1991, DH in 1992 and signed with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1993.

Arrivals in 1990 were outfielder **Dann Howitt** with the Oakland A's, catcher **Brent Mayne**, who was Kansas City's first-round draft choice in 1988, and lefthander **Larry Casian**, a 1987 draft by Minnesota. Both made starting appearances in nearby Anaheim Stadium. Howitt will go down in history as being the last player to get a hit (a home run) off of future hall-of-famer Nolan Ryan.

Two other familiar names made their first appearances in 1991. Andy Mota was called up by the Astros and his brother Jose played in over 30 games at second base for the Padres.

Among former Titans jumping to the majors in 1993 were third baseman David Staton, a triple crown winner for the Padres in 1990 and left-handed pitcher Huck Flener who helped the Toronto Blue Jays pitching staff during the season-ending stretch before winning the 1993 World Series.


