She was born in Saginaw, Michigan, earned


a B.A. in Education from Eastern Michigan University in 1972 and worked as an Administrative Assistant for the City of Detroit until moving to Los Angeles in

Special Meeting To Question TV Contract In AR On April 2

The L.V. Board of Directors approved a contract between Leisure Village, Inc. and G.T.E. Media Ventures on February 18 to provide cable services throughout L.V.

On February 25, the General Manager received a petition calling for a special meeting to vote on canceling the contract. The petition was turned over to the president and secretary on the morning of February 26. The secretary did verify the number of signatures and their authenticity.

Association The By-laws, Article VIII, Section 2, state that special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the president or by the board, or upon written request of the members representing five percent (5%) of the voting power of the Association.

At the open board meeting on March 2, a motion was passed by the Board to hold a special meeting of the homeowners on April 2. The meeting will conven at 10:00 a.m. in the AR to vote on the cable contract with G.T.E. Media Ventures.

The Administration Staff has prepared a notice of the meeting, a proxy, a return proxy envelope and a cover letter. These items were to be mailed to all Association members by March 13.

Please be aware that if you wish to cancel the contract you must mark the ballot yes. If you desire to keep the contract, mark the ballot no.

The agreement upon starting the paper was that the ILV staff would be given 40% of the page space, and 60% would go to the paper for advertising. ILV many times has been given more than that, but the paper has never mentioned canceling the verbal agreement. (No written contract or other agreement has ever been consummated.) LV is fortunate.



The Board claims that the "new" GTE contract is substantially better than the previous one. If it were only so! The fact is that the alleged seven "improvements" in the contract are of secondary value, at best.

Matters that really count are unchanged, namely:

Irrevocable loss of our system with no remuneration. and no realistic chance of ever retrieving it; our total vulnerability to GTE.

Complete loss of programming control (and of C-Span 2 and AMC), and no protection from free channels becoming pay channels.

No protection from early change in ownership.

Even if the proposed contract were otherwise perfect, we still must be conover this pocerned tential change in ownership. Ample precedent exists for this eventuality! For one thing, if GTE does not sell a sufficient number of premium channels, its management may well decide to "sell out" - not in ten years, but in two or three years. The proposed contract offers us no protection from this; the new owners can easily prevail in the argument that the GTE contract provisions no longer apply! We shall be

misled into believing that the GTE offer is the only way we can have a modern TV Cable system here. Fortunately, a viable and a much cheaper alternative exists for improving our system, and still retaining ownership and full control. Proponents of this alternative must do a much better job of explaining it. Perhaps this is why the Board has not done justice in pursu-

Editors note: The TADS committee deemed the Village TV circuitry, some 23 years old now, was breaking down and in need of total replacement. Miles of worn out circuitry is hardly an asset that LV could sell.

The City Council signed a 10 year franchise contract with GTE to provide 64 TV channels for the entire city of Camarillo. LV is covered under the same franchise, unless LV votes to secede from the city.

According to James Gembala, General Manager, the LV staff was able to minimize water damage from the "El Nino" storms during the latter part of February by timely efforts prior to the onset of the heavy

Additional drains were installed around many of the residences, thereby preventing water seepage into the homes. Storm drains and sewer lines were thoroughly cleaned by the Landscape Department staff. Fifteen trees were also removed prior to the storms. These trees had been considered especially hazardous during a period of heavy rainfall. Contact was also maintained with county and State authorities to help ensure rapid flow of excess water out of the Village. Due to the foregoing preventive measures. Leisure Village was spared the extensive damage to other areas of the city of Camarillo.

Although apparently not due to the storm, the failure of the television transmission system during this period was attributed to a malfunctioning transformer which was replaced.

Gembala's report also included the eventual removal of all remaining tree stumps by the end of May by private contractors; a major replanting in the areas outside the Main and East gates; the re-coating or fogging of the stucco on about 400 residences, and the use of lighter colors on the stucco.

Water District To Start Rebate Program

Camrosa Water District will offer Leisure Village homeowners a \$60 rebate when they replace their present toilets with new ultra low-flush models.

The District will mail a general announcement of the offer to homeowners in the next few weeks. Later. vouchers will be sent out on a predetermined schedule to the various areas of the community, starting with the older homes, and will reach everyone in Leisure Village over the next few years. Villages 1 through 6 will receive vouchers during the first phase. The District hopes to finish Villages 7-14 by the end of June

"We will give every homeowner the opportunity to take advantage of the rebate, "said Camrosa spokesperson Mary Jo Mitchell. To participate you must have pre-1992 toilets currently installed when you receive your pre-approved voucher," she said, adding that Camrosa qualifies for the rebate funds through a specific verification process.

Once homeowners obtheir numbered voucher, they then purchase their own 1.6 gallon low-flush toilet. Water District will feature recycling as part of the program.

Benefits for the Leisure Village Association and its members will not only be a savings in water cost for the

Status Of Electrical Deregulation Reviewed

As outlined in the January issue of Inside Leisure Village, the electric utility industry is undergoing significant changes. The immediate impact on Village residents is the 10% reduction given by the Edison Company which is the electric utility for the Village.

Additional savings in the cost of electricity may be obtained by purchasing power from any alternate electrical power producer who can generate electricity at a lower cost.

The Purchase Research Committee is evaluating proposals from some of these alternate electrical power producers to find a supplier best suited to the

cost for generating electricity represents about one third of the total electric bill for the Village.

The California Public **Utilities Commission has** given electric utilities permission to recover their "Stranded Assets" costs by charging domestic power users (Leisure Village residents) a monthly charge called "Competition Transaction Charge" or "CTC." These "Stranded Assets" represent utility investments and obligations that have lost money because of restructuring of the industry. Thus the Edison Company can adjust the "CTC" charge on monthly



Village Considers Use Of Defibrillator

A proposal for the use of "AED" in Leisure Village was presented at a recent working Board meeting by Caroline Pratt, resident of V24. Ms. Pratt is a retired government planner in the field of emergency and disaster services. She is also a member of "CAER," "Community Awareness for Emergency Response," a local organization which advocates medical and life-saving activities.

The Automatic External Defibrillator ("AED") is a computerized device designed to provide temporary emergency treatment in potentially fatal situations of ventricular fibrillation, i.e. cardiac arrest. The patient is unconscious at this time due to chaotic heart rhythm. The device automatically evaluates and interprets the heart beats, decides whether a "shock" is appropriate, and then in-

what to do. The defibrillator or "shock" basically delivers energy to "jump-start" the heart until CPR, hospitalization and professional medical care are available. Since time is of the essence in cardiac arrest. every minute of delay can reduce the chances of survival. The "AED" can "buy" critical life-saving time; statistics indicate that this intervention has been able to temporarily restore normal heart beat in approximately 30% of the cases.

Not every unconscious person is "shocked" by the defibrillator, because its computer will only allow this if the built-in automatic evaluation indicates that it is necessary. There are other situations -- external injury, medication effects, food reactions -- which do not require this treatment. Individuals who do not wish to be resuscitated at all in cases of cardiac arrest can structs the operator exactly make their request known

by obtaining a "DNR" bracelet from the American Heart Association.

The "AED" device can only be used by operators who are already CPR trained and who also complete 4-6 hours of special state standardized training plus on going supervision. In addition, each usage of the equipment, including printouts, audio and digital data must be reviewed by an MD who serves as medical consultant.

Costs for introducing "AED" into L.V. would include purchase and maintenance of the equipment, initial and on-going training for designated personnel. and a contract for services of a local MD to supervise the program.

'AED" has been recommended as a life saving device by the Medical Director of Emergency Medical Services of Ventura County. It is currently used by the Fire Department,

and is in the process of ing this device into L.V. exbeing put into use by the Ocean Hills Senior Community. However, there were no statistics or information available from any other senior communities that may have already used this system.

Proponents maintain that this device could save lives in Leisure Village. During the past 18 months, three residents of L.V. have died from cardiac arrest every single month. Given the success rate of approximately 30%, "AED" is projected to have been able to save one of these lives each month, i.e. the lives of 18 of our residents in 18 months.

Opponents of introduc-

press two concerns. One is that it would add another major burden and serious medical responsibility to our Security personnel. The other is that it could make Leisure Village vulnerable to possible expensive litigation relating to use, misuse or failure to use this equipment.

President Sylvia Wachter and Program Chairperson Judy Zeff, are open for suggestions for future programs.


