

After 20 years of having the fair in the evenings, YNCG was able to coordinate this event to accommodate those LV residents who fast for the blood test and those who don't come out at night.

The following will be featured at the fair:

hours.

Future of Camarillo topic of Feb. 28 talk



other city officials will be
here in the Assembly Room
on Friday, Feb. 28, discussing the direction the
city of Camarillo will take in
the year 2003.

City Manager Jerry Bankston and Bob Burrow, Director of Community Development, complete the group, which will have much to say as Villagers are certain to ask many questions following our guests' presentations.

The city may well lose nearly \$1 million in state funds if a proposal made recently by Gov. Gray Davis is enacted. Davis proposes to eliminate payments that have been made to cities to compensate for past reductions in vehicle license fees, one of the city's main funding sources. Camarillo receives around \$4 million, nearly 10 percent of the city's general fund.

According to City Manager Bankston, the proposed 2003 cuts will not

present a crisis for city projects or services. Because of careful planning since the recession of the early 1990s, Bankston said, the city has allocated its funds so as not to start projects, or hire staff, until the money is received.

The city is pushing plans for a library that will quadruple the size of the current one, with dozens of outstanding attractions.

With the knowledge that traffic accidents increased by 18 percent last year, stricter enforcement and

s I recall, AHomeowners were told by the Board that new insurance coverages would be negotiated as soon as the CC&R Insurance Amendment passed and that our premiums would be reduced immediately. Many Homeowners relied on that promise and therefore voted yes to the amendment.

Now a Board member tells us that even with the increase in our insurance rates, our cost has only been increased a total of 15 percent. The Social Security Cost of Living was increased by 1.4 percent, which leaves us 13.6 percent short, and we don't yet know how much our association dues will increase for this year?

Yet in our approved budget, a new patrol car with all the trimmings (siren, red light bar, radios, scanner, etc., etc.) is included. We now have four patrol cars already in service. In fact, they can't get out of each other's way when they are patrolling now (about 1.5 square miles in area).

The patrol car that is being replaced is nearing 100,000 miles. That's when the first tune-up is recommended. Even if the car was needed, we could save some money by removing the equipment and placing it on their lives. It's a joy to

the new car (it fits, and we used to do it all the time). Why not save the Homeowners some money rather than burden them further?

Somebody seems to have forgotten that Leisure Village is not a for-profit corporation and that Homeowners on fixed incomes pay the bills.

Thortly after our DLeisure Village original construction began, the U.S. Health Department prohibited the use of asbestos in building materials. Because our original construction was spread over the early 1970s and the middle 1980s, we have asbestos in some of our buildings and probably little or none in other buildings.

We know that we had a lot of asbestos in the ceilings of our Recreation Center, but we have had it removed. I hope we removed all of it, because when asbestos gets into a person's lungs, it causes lesions which lead to asbestosis. I don't need to remind you where asbestosis leads to.

I know of only one Homeowner who attended to the removal of asbestos in his dwelling unit. He had all his ductwork replaced with asbestos-free ductwork. It is time for me and for you to have a qualified person check our ductwork and, if asbestos is present, it needs to be removed.

I recently located a contractor who does asbestos abatement work. I know he is trustworthy, and I will use him to check my dwelling unit ductwork.

Think of it this way: If there is asbestos within the walls of the ductwork, then each time we use the heater or the cooler, asbestos fibers are blown into our living quarters and we inhale those fibers into our lungs. There is something we can do about that, and we should for our health's sake.

Many of us have fallen victim to the unwanted telephone calls at odd hours from telemarketers, as well as myriad requests for contributions of money to organizations, many of which we have never heard of. Some time ago, when I realized what was going on, I began listing them as they came in. At present, I am on the mailing lists of 82 such organizations, trying desperately to get off them.

Recently, I learned of the Fair Credit Reporting Act that has given rise to the Credit Reporting Industry Prescreening Opt Out. Their toll-free number is 1-888-567-8688. By following a simple menu on their response, they will get you out of the clutches of the four credit reporting companies — Experian, Equifax, Enova and Trans Union for two years. For a longer period you will need to contact each of the companies directly. This, at least, is a beginning.





awareness programs are moving forward.

With a new upcoming round of base realignments and closures, our city will become involved in helping our Naval bases and their 60-plus tenant activities from being negatively impacted.

The City Council must address the need for additional low-income housing, as well as finding a larger site for the Pleasant Valley Historical Society Museum.

Certainly, there are other subjects that will be covered, among them, the university. How are housing and traffic being solved?

Mayor Craven, a frequent

visitor to Leisure Village, has been a Camarillo City Council member for 17 years. This is the fourth time she is mayor.

Don Waunch was first elected to the City Council in November 2000 and is currently vice mayor.

Jerry Bankston has been city manager since 1989. He returned to the city after a 13-year break, having previously worked as assistant to the city manager.

Bob Burrow has worked for the city for 25 years and assumed his current title a year and a half ago.

Current Issues Forum member Marilyn Holthouse will moderate this program, which starts at 7:30 p.m.
