

Over 23 years ago, the newspaper ILV was created by me, Sandy Okum, The Writers Club and The Camarillo Daily News.

The LVA library contains our LVA
Architectural Standard
Specifications. Among
those spec sheets is
Sheet No. 235, dealing
with encroachment. It
was first initiated immediately after the revision
of 7.2(b) on March 23,
2000.

Said sheet graphically indicates where structures may be placed on common ground and specifically within the "exclusive right to use area." The authority for said sheet comes from the Architectural Committee with the approval of the Board and the Camarillo Planning Dept. It is a legal and lawful specification which is now under contention by a homeowner.

You may hear much about this issue in the days ahead, and in order to understand the issue you need to know something of procedures and the laws.

Article 6 and Article

7.2(b) are the two CC&R articles involved. Involved also is a copy of a letter from the Director of Planning of Camarillo to Leisure Tech concerning placement of buildings. Your Leisure Village Assoc. has complied with all applicable laws, including the anti-discrimination laws setforth by the Calif. Dept. of Real Estate. The Village has historically complied in the past and at the present.

These are the facts. You may hear counterarguments which may tend to confuse. But remember, until someone can produce evidence of a court decision which differs from the Village position, the Village position has and will prevail.

t the July Open ABoard Meeting, the Secretary of the Board said qualifications for LVA Committee Chairs were broader than skills or expertise alone. He said, hypothetically, that Employers would take into consideration the following when hiring an employee: if the applicant could not relate to others, if the applicant was dishonest, confrontational, an alcoholic, tardy, etc. He said skills actually take a backseat, and that's why he voted against the former Finance Committee

Chair's recommendation and that of the Assistant Chair in not appointing the person they recommended. The Chair (now a Director) and Assistant Chair worked with Donna Duke and viewed first-hand her ability to relate with co-workers. Donna DOES NOT possess ANY of the negatives that Director Miller pronounced. In fact, six members of the Finance Committee left a meeting to protest her nonappointment as **Temporary Committee** Chair. (Donna is also a past Board President and Director for four years.)

I have had the pleasure to work with Donna for several years on two different Insurance Committees, and I know about her qualifications and demeanor. Ben Miller's comments were derogatory and without merit. He blatantly attacked a volunteer who had already served two vears on the Finance Committee and who had proved her value on that Committee. By his comments made at the July Open Board Meeting, Ben Miller proved that he is not qualified to serve on the Board of Directors.

The following matters, which are continually scheduled for Executive Sessions, have no place in Executive

Sessions: Liaison Reports, Committee Reports and Recommendations, Board Recommendations, personalities of Homeowners, Insurance Matters, and Legal Bills. Litigation is a matter for Executive Session only until the litigation is resolved. Then that information should be released to Homeowners. Legal bills should be discussed in OPEN MEET-INGS. (Please refer to The Davis-Stirling Act.)

If the above-stated matters were discussed in Executive Session under The Brown Act, the penalty could be a prison sentence, along with a monetary fine of \$1,000 levied against each Board Member. Although LVA is not governed by The Brown Act, it is governed by the Common Interest Development Open Meeting Act (Calif. Civ. Code Section 1363.05) which also has penalties for unlawful conduct. Discussing matters in **Executive Sessions that** should be heard in Open Board Meetings are a clear violation for which penalties can be imposed.

This selective secrecy must stop. The Homeowners have a right to be kept informed. Not to do so is a breach of a fiduciary duty that Directors owe to each Homeowner.





The net (named after the manufacturer) operators are not required to be licensed by the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) as the HAM people are. The Village coordinators and a few specialized groups are those equipped with the Cobra radios. Naturally, this facilitates reporting of any situation requiring help from medical or fire, etc. The Coordinator does not have to physically run (or try to) to
