Their Roots Go Deep

It was not exactly a stampede back in 1977 when the Kaufman family began its move into the unique new community called Leisure Village... but it was close. First in that year was Kaufman sister Rosalie and her husband Ned Volan. And in just over two years, fifteen members of that family - yes, that's right, 15 Kaufmans were residents of what they all agreed was "a special place to live." Now nearly 50 years later, several members of that pioneer family are still enjoying life inside the gates.

"My parents led the way," says current Villager Jim Volan with a smile, "After living in the San Fernando Valley for decades, they were

drawn by the activities here like tennis and swimming, by the climate, and by the price tag of \$54,000 on a brand new El Dorado in Village 5." Jim bought a house two years later; it was a deal he couldn't resist. Because of his military service, the down payment was \$1! He and wife Marilyn didn't move into the Village until six years ago, but, "We were here all the time visiting my folks," he adds, "Or Marilyn's parents who also chose the Village several years later."

The next Kaufmans to be lured in after visiting sister Rosalie's Village home was Art Kaufman. It meant retiring from decades as a lighting director for Universal Studios and in television production. He and wife Miriam quickly became active

COMMUNITY NEWS By Dennis Doolittle

Paint Project – The original whole house stucco and trim paint project is now underway in Villages 6, 8 and 17.

The trim only paint project in Villages 4. 7, 9, 11, 13, 18, and 22 was sent out for bid. The bids were very high. At a Board meeting the decision was made to hire temporary employees to stucco and trim paint the six Villages in the original "trim" paint project. The project is being organized and schedules will be announced.

LV Web Site - Starting with the August issue, the Village Voice will be available on-line on the secure log-on portion of the web site. Another reason to sign-up on the secure web site.

The Communications Committee continues to work on new features for the LV web site.

There was a meeting of the chairs of all Village Committees held in late June. One decision made was to add a Committees section to the web site where each committee can provide information on its purpose (mission

and charter), meeting time/date/ place, and a summary of its activities.

Village Trees - The Level 1 inspection of the trees in the Village has been completed. During the inspection a few trees were identified as needing to be removed immediately, and this was done. The Level 1 report is now completed. The number one objective is to identify all trees that are threats to residences, and the prioritized need for removal or maintenance. Based on the report, the Board approved the removal of 44 additional trees, those with the highest priority for removal. An additional 106 trees will have to be removed over time. The report also lists recommendations for pruning and maintenance of the remaining trees.

Irrigation System – A problem was found (and fixed) with the Village's filtration system for the non-potable water used for irrigation. This was causing a reduction in the nonpotable water supply, which in turn has caused "browning" of the grass in areas of the Village. The filtering system is now operating at full capacity. It will take some time for the grass to recover.

Roofing – The roofing contract from last fiscal year is now complete. A new roofing contract is going out for a competitive bid.

Streets – The Phase 1 Engineering and Management contract for this year's street maintenance work has been issued. Bids for the paving contract will be opened at a future Board meeting. This year Leisure Village Drive from Villages 40/41 to Santa Rosa Road plus specific Village roads will be repaved.

Concrete – The Village maintains the concrete in the common areas, driveways, sidewalks, gutters, etc. The Village staff is in the process of inspecting the concrete areas within the Village in preparation for a contract bidding cycle.



ART IN THE VILLAGE By Nicole D'Amore

Kathy Whitesell Classes

Kathy Whitesell calls it a way to give back; artists here in Leisure Village call her watercolor classes an excuse to be creative.

Every month members of the Village Arts club have an opportunity to sign up for the hour-and-a-half workshop. It has gotten so popular, Whitesell has added another class on Monday in addition to two classes on the third Friday. The most recent classes were July 17th and 21st.

In a typical class, Whitesell brings a painting she has done, along with printouts and a line drawing to trace the design onto their own paper.

"We're not a drawing class," Whitesell said. "Everyone paints at their own skill level." She provides stepby-step instructions on colors and techniques, encouraging them when they get stuck. Some students plunge right in while others take their time, trying to get the perfect rendition.

Mary Ann Balcom, a longtime participant, praised Whitesell's help and patience. "I need directions; I wouldn't be able to do it on my own at home,"Balcom said.

The subject in the July classes was a bright yellow hibiscus on a varied green background of leaves and shadows.

Inspiration for the painting came from a flower on her neighbor's patio. "I try to rotate my subjects — if we've done a flower I'll try to do a bird or maybe a landscape next," Whitesell said.

She starts out instructing students to look for lemon yellow on

their palette.

"We're going to do one petal at a time, so you wet the petal and then paint your strokes to the center because that's how the veins in the flower grow," she explained, demonstrating by leaving a space between petals so the colors don't bleed together. She walked around the table, offering tips and answering questions. "While that's still wet, get a nice juicy amount of red and drop that in — the wetter it is, the more it will bleed out," she said to one student. "We're just trying to get a nice center."

Whitesell showed them how to use the sharp edge of a cut credit card to make lines and spread the paint. When it came time for the green,



THE HEALTHY VILLAGER By Jeannie Davis, PT, MPH

Our Ear Health and Hearing Challenges

Besides our eyes and eyesight, our ears and hearing are also one of our greatest assets. As we age, we can experience hearing loss, ringing in our ears (tinnitus), vertigo and dizziness, Eustachian Tube Dysfunction, and ear infections. When we have ear infections and/or upper respiratory infections and we fly in a plane, that can complicate and delay healing of our ears. Ear health is paramount to preserve our hearing that allows us to follow conversations and be social.


Hearing loss is common in individuals as we age, and the primary cause is loud noise. Age related hearing loss affects the ability to hear high frequency sounds such as speech. It is especially difficult to understand what others are saying when there is background noise. Many of us experience tinnitus, which can be the first sign of hearing loss. Tinnitus is a symptom and can be caused by earwax blocking the ear canal as well as age related hearing loss.

Some of us have experienced vertigo (sensation of whirling and dizziness) and it can be quite disturbing, frustrating, and even cause nausea. Vertigo is a symptom, not a condition and can have various causes. Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo (BPPV) is the most common cause of vertigo when the small crystals in the inner ear become dislodged and touch the tiny hairs in the inner ear. Labyrinthitis is inflammation of the most inner part of the ear usually caused by an ear infection. Another cause of vertigo is Meniere's disease which also affects the labyrinths with dizziness and hearing loss, usually in one ear. The exact cause of Meniere's disease is still unknown but may be linked to a change in fluid in the ear, infections, stress, or genetics.

The eustachian tubes equalize air pressure between the atmosphere and the middle ear. Sometimes the eustachian tubes can get blocked by inflammation, infection, structure, and/or allergies and there is fluid buildup. This can cause hearing loss, pressure in your ears, tinnitus, pain, dizziness and/or vertigo. Treatment can include steroid medication to reduce inflammation, an-

tibiotics if it's a bacterial infection and antiviral medications.


Ear infections can occur from colds and flu, bacterial infection, irritation from causes including allergies and trauma. Treatments include antibiotics (if bacterial), steroids, antihistamines, and decongestants. Ear infections should be diagnosed by a medical provider. Prevention of ear infections include staying away from smoke (irritant), clean and pat dry outer ears after shower/swimming, clean ears safely and don't put cotton swabs inside your ears and eat the right foods that don't build up phlegm. Dairy, for the use of this information.



bread, red meat, and eggs can be allergy triggers for some people.

So, let's appreciate our ears, hearing and their functions. Our powers to see and hear keep us alert and connected to others and the Village and the world. Wishing everyone ear health, but if you feel you are experiencing a hearing loss, contact your medical provider and request a hearing test.

she walked around giving everyone a little dab of indigo to mix with green to make it darker.

"I like the background dark so the subject really pops out," she explained.

Once she gave a workshop just on mixing greens, she said.

This class is more for them to get out for an afternoon and paint a picture — the more they do it the better they understand it, she said. Although all are painting the same image, results differ based on experience and technique. The resulting paintings are displayed in a case in the Recreation Center courtyard.

Many of the attendees take all of Whitesell's classes.

Joyce Rhoades said she hadn't been to the class for a while and really missed it. "I think it's really neat that I can actually do it, that something comes out that I like," she said.

Sue Bajari was a first-timer, but has painted before. Although she has lived in the village for a couple of years, other obligations prevented her from taking the class, she said. "I really like the teacher," she said.

Shirley Abbott commented that watercolor adapts to our lifestyle here.

"With these little houses you don't have room for a big easel, not a lot of room to paint," she said. "I can sit in the kitchen and paint. You think, I can't do it, but it's surprising," she added.

Whitesell said she always loved art, but studied business management in college because it was more practical.

"But I always took art as all my electives," she said. She started a career in banking, but her husband Gregg gave her half of the garage as an art studio, she said. "The sign over the door was 'Sunday Painter'," she said.

When members of the Westlake Village Art Guild exhibited paintings in the bank she worked at, she was inspired to join. She was active with the guild and started exhibiting her work at their shows. The first painting she sold was through an exhibit at the Thousand Oaks Civic Arts Plaza.

In 2012, she got involved with the Camarillo Art Center where she is currently president.







A WORD ON WINE

By Barbara

What's That Gunk in My Wine?

Almost always, when sediment, dregs or the little crystals, often known as "wine diamonds," appear in the bottom of a glass, they present no danger. It's often a sign that the wine was made with minimal intervention. Recently at a winery, we tasted a 2015 Malbec with a lot of sediment in the glass. Comment-

ing to the winemaker, she was unconcerned, simply saying, "I don't filter my wine and it's eight years old."

Sediment in wine is a by-product of the natural process of winemaking. It's more common in red wine but can also occur in white wines. It's tasteless and edible, consisting

mainly of tartrate crystals. There are no real differences in red and white wine sediments. Crystal sediments in white wine can be seen in the bottle, but in red wine, the dark color camouflages the crystals until the wine is poured. But if you don't see the sediment before it's on your little surprise.

To get rid of wine sediment, it's a simple process to decant the wine, leaving the crystals behind. If the bottle has been stored on its side, stand it up for a day or two. Pour the wine slowly into a carafe, keeping

an eye on the neck of the bottle so no sediment

flows into the carafe.

If there's a lot of sediment, such as the Malbec above, it's best to also have some kind of filter to catch the gunk. This is easily accomplished with a fine strainer, or you could use a Vinturi, which aerates the wine as well as catching any sediment.

The reality is that most wine has no sediment, especially wines served in restaurants. This is because most wine makers "stabilize" their wines, cooling the wine down for several days so that would-be sediments are formed and settle to the bottom of the tank. Then the "cleaned" wine leaving the sediments behind.

So don't be offended by wine sediment. It's a sign that the wine

where she worked for LV activities and for the sense of security in her new home, which she said she no longer had in Los Angeles.






