



MACHINE GOVERNMENT

The controversy with the Economic Opportunity Commission of Santa Clara Co. can be fairly evaluated and clearly explained with a comment which I will try to repeat as I recall it said: "The Bureaucrats that are riding this Gravy Train are using Scoop Shovels while the poor for whom the program is intended are using chop sticks."

Contrary to the press releases from the office of the Executive Director, Mister Arthur Potts, this is not solely a demand for a "Mexican American" to be hired for the position of Deputy Director of the program. However to place the efforts of the Commission or the Executive Director in good faith it is a necessity. Every effort to relate the program to the people of the community has failed. In no incident has there been a sincere gesture toward fulfillment of the wording of the Act to maximize involvement of the community. Oh, there has been the traditional pat on the head and a flutter of paper patronage by the power structure. Ask yourself, or better yet, ask Mr. Potts how many Mexican-Americans are in Policy Making positions, or whether they have been hired for show. Ask also how many policy-making positions have gone to any resident of Santa Clara County; or are we so impoverished that all but two in this level of administration have had to be imported from some other state? In due consideration of how many Americans of Mexican heritage should be participants in this program of community advancement it is difficult to follow the line of thinking which ignores the leaders and members of the Mexican American community and in their place quotes from an Anthropology book.

A rather interesting expose of EOC thinking took place last week in an effort to rebut the concientious concerns of the established organizations in community. The persons responsible for the flow of business during their "Open House" brought forth a group from an outlying area to testify that They felt the program was really Theirs.

These poor souls, well intended as they were, in their naivete exuberently explained that they only heard of the program seven days prior. Were they aware that they had no voice? Were they aware they were "used" to defeat their own desires for strong leadership in the total community by the participation of Mexican-Americans of stature and capabilities equal to any imported bureaucrat. THINK.

THE VIEW FROM HERE

In future articles we shall be writing about the WAR ON POVERTY. What it is, how it is supposed to work and who pays the tab. We shall deal in this article with the confrontation between an alliance of Mexican American organizations and the local War on Poverty Commission and its Executive Direcotr Arthur Potts.

The War On Poverty became law when the Congress of the United States passed Public Law 88-452 officially known as the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. It is commonly referred to as "THE WAR ON POVERTY."

It is perhaps strange that this alliance of Mexican American organizations is trying to put the skids on a program that is supposed to help the people....in great part the Spanish speaking people of our area. Stranger perhaps is the fact that the Mexican American organizations have indeed formed a strong alliance not likely to buckle under any kind of pressure.

Many have asked, "When is the Mexican American going to get together and accomplish something?"

The answer to that question is:

N O W !!!!

It is a reality much too late in coming but it has caused quite a stir.

The organizations that have placed their full power and influence on the block are:



POVERTY PROGRAM The Economic Opportunity Commission American Legion Clifford Rodriguez

In undertaking this fight against the local War on Poverty Commission the organizations fully realize that it can lead to a loss if the Mexican American people do not understand what the fight is all about. The purpose of this article then is to let the people know why the organizations are doing this and why, if they fail, the War on Poverty will become another one of those things that have historically occurred where the Mexican American's place is only at the bottom.

If we are to share equitably in the American way of life we have to make a stand....right here and right now. We have preserved the freedom of this country during wartime by fighting at the front. If there is



a place for us in the War on Poverty it should be at the front.

We have been placed in the back seat for much too long....socially, economically and politically.

If there is anything that we are experts in, IT IS POVERTY. By actual experience and not by reading about it in books!!

1.7 MILLION DOLLARS FOR LOCAL ANTI-

of Santa Clara County is the governing body of the local War on Poverty Program. For short it is known as the EOC. There are 18 members on this Commission representing various agencies and organizations in our County. The EOC has been granted 1.7 million dollars to fight poverty in this county. The money will be spent to create 9 area

service centers where the poor live and where they can receive expanded and coordinated social treatment thru various programs including legal, health, and counseling services. Each area will devise their own programs to meet the needs of the people. \$300,000 will provide a corps of specially trained semi-professionals recruited from each poverty area to work in their own areas. Half a million dollars is going to strengthen basic school skills through a program of compensatory remedial education for 4,000 youngsters. A small business center for business loans is now in operation and another 1/2 million dollars is pending approval for the Neighborhood Youth Corps which will provide employment for youngsters in and out of school.

A program called PREP - "Prepara-

ar on Poverty a - American Organizations Pighting Back

tion for Living" is also in operation teaching English and driver's training and homemaking to the needy.

WHY THEN BRING THIS TO A HALT?

The fact is that the M-A organizations DO NOT want to destroy the War on Poverty program. They never wanted anything more than a program specially aimed at helping our people. The aim is to bring a temporary halt to the program till such time as the grievances and demands of the M-A organizations can be met and satisfactorily answer-

LAW SAYS POOR MUST PARTICIPATE IN INFLUENCING POLICY

The Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 says that poverty programs have to be "developed, conducted and administered with the maximum feasible participation of residents of the areas and members of groups to be served."

In other words, the war on poverty is a program specially designed for the people who are to be served not only in receiving the benefits but in influencing the policy of how the program is to be conducted, developed and administered.

The M-A organizations submit that this has not happened here in our County. A look at the make-up of the EOC will reveal that representatives of the people to be served are very much in the minority.

Such stalwarts as the Chamber of Commerce and the Santa Clara County Taxpayers Association and public agencies dominate the commission.

In the 18 member commission there are only three people representing the poor.

THERE ARE NO MEXICAN AMERI-CANS, at this writing, ON THE TOP LEVEL STAFF OF THE PROGRAM.

One of the major demands of the M-A organizations is that the Commission must be restructured if we are going to have a War on Poverty Program that is effective. The people to be served must have majority representation on the commission.

The other major demand is that a Spanish speaking person who understands firsthand the language, the culture and the socio-economic problem of the people to be served must be appointed to the vacant post of second in command of the program. This post is the position of Deputy Director. The Executive Director of the EOC, Mr. Arthur Potts, at this writing still REFUSED TO MAKE THIS APPOINTMENT FOR HIS OWN ASSORTED REASONS.

The M-A organizations have met with the local commission and the Executive Director, Arthur Potts, to present grievances. The meetings have been fruitless.

In view of this, the M-A organizations asked the federal government to make an investigation of the local anti-poverty program and to freeze funds to the program till such an investigation is made.

The M-A organizations have presented to the federal government, thru the Regional Office of the War on Poverty, a list of 10 grievances and demands. After considering the grievances and demands of the M-A organizations the Regional Office of the War on Poverty in San Francisco has directed the Executive Director Arthur Potts to restruc-

ture the commission adding at least SIX more commissioners from the areas to be served. This must be done in the next 30 days in consultation with such organizations as civil rights groups, church groups, neighborhood councils and ethnic protective associations.

The Regional Office has further stated that it"regards it as critical that somewhere in your top staff group, there be persons who speak the language (literally and figuratively) of the groups you are serving and who understand their aspirations and the current difficulties they face in securing an equitable share of American influence." A report has been requested from Arthur Potts by the Regional Office within 30 days indicating the way in which the top staff reflects knowledge and capacity to work with those of Mexican-American ancestry in the county who constitute so large a percentage of those who live in impoverished circumstances.

SO, WHAT IS NEXT?

The position taken by the M-A organizations has generally been upheld by the federal government who puts out the money for the war on poverty programs. Things must change they say and they must change quickly.

There is evidence at this writing that the local commission may try to challenge the mandate of the federal government. This only reflects their attitude and why the M-A organizations have had to resort to such drastic steps.

The M-A organizations have held steadfast on their course that things must change if we are to have a war on poverty program as intended by the law. While the action taken by the organizations may be an unpopular one they don't exist to make themselves popular but rather to SERVE THE MEXICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY. And to this end they shall continue the fight.

If you too want the Mexican American to play an influencing role on how the war on poverty is to be administered in our area then you are asked to support the stand of the Mexican American organizations.

You are invited as an interested Mexican American to attend the next meeting of the Economic Opportunity Commission. It will be held at the County Welfare Auditorium, 55 W. Younger Street in San Jose at 7:30 PM on Thursday, November 18th.

The Commission will be considering

the grievances of the Mexican American organizations. If there was ever a time for the Mexican American to stand together this is it. Plan to attend and bring your friends. If we cannot stand together at this crucial time then we shall continue to receive "atole con el dedo."





E. O. C. CRISIS

Three weeks ago the heads of our Mexican American organizations including the GI Forum, sent a petition to Washington requesting suspension of the funds allocated to the San Jose area. They also urged that an inquiry be made as to the administrative practices of the Economic Opportunity Commission. It appears that for once the Mexican American in this locale has become bold and demanding. He was long overdue. Too often have we been content to stay on the sidelines and toss out threats with a showdown. But at last we have stood up for our rights.

When a government program designed to meet the needs of the unemployed and the poor fails to reach those people then something is drastically wrong. Communication is not present and will continue to be lacking so long as their trusted representatives are ignored by the governing authorities. A large portion of the people concerned are of Mexican descent. Yet, no one qualified Mexican-American who has applied has been placed in a PERMANENT SUPERVISORY POSITION although they are not frowned on as consultants. Who is better qualified to speak for the Mexican than the Mexican American? Who can instill trust in the Mexican with greater success than another Mexican? Mutual trust between government agents and minority peoples will not come about if they feel discrimination is still being practiced against them. Who knows what their wants are better than the unemployed and the poor? Survey after survey has been taken and ignored until the people feel that they are being surveyed to death. Yet continually they are told that the professionals know their needs better than they do. The so-called benefits are not reaching them through their own unwareness but worse through the Economic Opportunity Commission's failure to relay the availability and undertaking of programs

specifically designed to aid them and whose success is dependent upon their cooperation.

Our organizations, by means of the Mexican American Roundtable, have time after time protested the EOC's failures and lack of heed to the people but to no avail. The omission of a qualified Mexican American, moreover fluent and proficient in the Spanish language and Mexican customs, with the vaguest of reasons by the EOC is inexcusable. Meeting after meeting, both public and closed, have been held to protest these violations and to seek avenues of communication, again to no avail. Thus, the only recourse of action left other than picketing and meaningless conversations was redress from Washington, D. C.

Our organizations are to be applauded for taking a hand in awakening the Mexican American and giving him proper guidance.

Now let us not fear to follow through and take the next steps with determination and boldness. Let us not again shrink back and flee when confronted. Instead, let us give our full support to the actions of the Roundtable by letting them know of our feelings and willingness to stand alongside them.


