


PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located in the main ticket booth behind third base.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times.

PRESS ROW: Is located in the top row of the central section of grand-stands located directly behind home plate. It is an "open air" facility -cooled, heated and ventilated by Mother Nature. Seating at the working counter is limited to approximately seven persons.

**TELEPHONES:** The press row number is (714) 773-2400. A second line or use of phones in the sports information office is available after games.

RADIO: Arrangements for broadcasts should be made at least one week in advance. One telephone line is available upon request at a fee of \$15 to visiting broadcasters.

**ELECTRICAL POWER:** Is limited in press row. Special needs should be requested well in advance.

PARKING: Is FREE on Friday nights (after 6 p.m.) and all day Saturday and Sunday in Lot A, accessible from either State College Boulevard or Yorba Linda Boulevard. For other games, a fee of 50 cents (two quarters) is required upon entry for a daily permit.

### CAL STATE FULLERTON CAMPUS

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing. Having first offered classes in 1959, the university has grown to 23,000 students and achieved national distinction.

In 1984, the university hosted team handball competition at the Summer Olympics. It also will begin its 25th

anniversary observance with the theme "Honoring the Past-Creating the Future."

The university's students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes: many come to classes only in the evening. Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching

and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, communications, music, nursing, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 82 degree programs—40 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is the largest university level internship and cooperative education program on the West Coast. The program allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their

regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours on a year-round basis. Extended education offerings are open to the community without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the 7,000-person network of community support organizations. The Titan Athletic Foundation is

one of these support groups.

Further examples of community outreach are the Fullerton Arboretum and Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary. Opened in 1979, the Arboretum is a 25-acre on-campus preserve that was established jointly by the university and the City of Fullerton. Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary is a half-hour from campus in a canyon of the Santa Ana Mountains.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on an ambitious campaign called "Commitment to Mindpower." Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

### Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980 to replace Dr. L. Donald Shields, who had resigned after a ten-year term to accept the presidency of Southern Methodist University.

Dr. Cobb had served as Dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of Professor of Biological Sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was Dean of Connecticut College and Professor of Zoology for seven years. Previously, she was Professor of Biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black women to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree in 1944 from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University in 1947 and 1950, respectively. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a student in the Cornell University Medical School.



### AUGIE GARRIDO

The story is getting old, but its age only enhances the message.

Augie Garrido was in the home of a recruit, visiting with his parents. The player's father was concerned about Fullerton's prospects for gaining the NCAA post-season playoffs.

"Tell me, coach," the father asked. "In your conference, what happens when you finish second?"

Garrido paused for thought, but only briefly.

"I don't know," he answered with sincerity. "We've never finished second."

Indeed, since the year after his arrival in Fullerton in 1973, Garrido's Titan teams have won or shared the conference championship every season -- a current string of 11 titles in a row. The Titans have been competing at the Division I (highest) level for 10 years and for 10 years they have participated in the playoffs -- the third longest streak ever and an unprecedented success ratio of 100 per cent.

Garrido has won with pitching and defense; with power hitters and base stealers; and, most recently, with a little bit of everything. Graduation and pro signing losses occur annually but every year, Garrido has fielded a winner.

In 12 seasons at Fullerton, Garrido has compiled a 551-222-5 (.711) record. In his 16-year career, the totals are 661-298-6 (.688). Along with the 11 conference championships are four regional crowns and two national titles. All this at an institution that just celebrated its 25th anniversary and has been playing baseball for only 20 seasons.

Garrido, 45, grew up in the northern California port town of Vallejo. He attended Fresno State University (1961) and was an all-star player for the Bulldogs. He signed with the Cleveland Indians' organization and played six years in the Indians' minor league system before retiring in 1966 to accept a coaching position at Sierra High School in Tollhouse, California.

Garrido moved up to the collegiate level in 1969 as head coach at San Francisco State and then spent three seasons at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. The Mustangs' basketball coach at 4/TITANS

that time was Neale Stoner, who moved to Cal State Fullerton as athletic director and brought Garrido with him to launch the University's most consistently successful men's program.

Situated in the heart of baseball rich Southern California, Garrido wasted little time asserting his program's prowess. In 1975, their first year of Div. I play, the Titans strolled onto Dedeaux Field and ended USC's five-year reign as national champions by knocking them out of their own regional tournament.

The Titans didn't last long in their first College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska but the impressive regional

championship was enough to earn Garrido the first of his three national Coach of the Year trophies. The others came in 1979 and 1984 when he led the Titans to national championships.

Garrido has long been an outspoken and articulate voice in the promotion of collegiate and amateur baseball. He has taken his team to Taiwan on a goodwill mission, managed in the Alaskan summer leagues, operated a successful instructional camp for youth (Angel Country) and now is involved in a Baseball Academy and Grand Slam training facility franchise in Anaheim.

Garrido is married (Tere) and lives in Yorba Linda.







### LARRY CORRIGAN

Larry Corrigan brings a broad and successful baseball background to Cal State Fullerton as he assumes his new post as Titans' pitching coach.

Corrigan, 33, spent seven seasons in professional baseball with the Los Angeles Dodgers and Minnesota Twins before returning to his alma mater, lowa State. He served three years as an assistant for the Cyclones before becoming head coach in 1982. He compiled a three-year mark of 82-75.

Corrigan was a pitcher and catcher for four years at lowa State and won numerous honors. He was the team's leading hitter all four years and was selected Most Valuable Player and

team captain three times (1970, 1971 and 1972). He twice won All-Big Eight honors and set a conference record for pitching victories in a season. He was selected to both The Sporting News and Coaches Association All-American teams. He led the Cyclones to the Big Eight championship in 1970 and 1971.

Corrigan climbed as high as Triple-A in the minor leagues and signed a major league contract with the Dodgers in 1975. His best season saw him compile a 5-2 mark for Toledo of the International League.

The Mendota, Illinois native is married to the former Lorie Hasse.

### BO HUGHES

Bo Hughes begins his second year at Fullerton as third base coach while working with the infielders and assisting head coach Augie Garrido with the offense.

Hughes, 29, is a 1978 graduate of LaVerne University where he was a four-year letterman and played on two NAIA College World Series teams. A two-time all-conference selection, he was drafted by the Minnesota Twins in June of 1974 out of Notre Dame High School in Sherman Oaks, where he won All-CIF honors.

Hughes was an assistant under Ben Hines at LaVerne for two years before taking the head job at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas. In three years he compiled a 40-44 record with his 1983 team winning the conference championship. He also coaches summer ball for the Hutchinson Broncs (1979-81) as well as serving as the public relations director and baseball camps director.

Hughes, who has worked with four National Coaches of the Year, is single and lives in Anaheim.

### RICK VANDERHOOK

Rick Vanderhook begins his first season as a full-time graduate assistant working with the pitchers and catchers as a bullpen coach for the Titans. Last year he served in the same capacity as a part-time assistant.

Vanderhook, 23, came to Fullerton in 1983 after completing his playing career at Cerritos College. He was team captain for the Falcons in 1982 when he batted .350.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood

High School under coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles. He was team captain as a senior when he batted .320 with two home runs and 19 runs batted in. He struck out only once in 80 plate appearances while playing first base and catching.

Vanderhook is finishing his degree at Cal State Fullerton and hopes to graduate in the coming year. He is single and lives in Lakewood.



From the original grading of Titan field by Beryl Kempton and the club team of Warren Beck to a second national championship on nationwide ESPN television, Titan baseball has provided thrills and excitement for two decades of Cal State Fullerton fans.

After the early struggles, success came fast and furious and now includes two national championships, four regional titles, 11 consecutive conference crowns and six graduates in the major leagues.

Kempton and Beck were the founding fathers, putting a Titan nine on the field back in 1964. The first intercollegiate coach was Bill Fulton, who guided the Titans into conference play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association. And then in 1973 was the

coming of Augie Garrido, who built the program to undreamable heights.

After just one year, Garrido turned the program around with junior college players as the Titans won the CCAA title in 1974 and advanced to the Far West Division II regional.

A hint of things to come developed in 1975, when the Titans began Division I play by winning the Pacific Coast Athletic Association title and then upsetting the reigning national champion USC Troians on their home field in the regionals. The Titans made the trip to the College World Series but lost their first two games and went home.

There was another PCAA title in 1976 and then the formation of the Southern California Baseball Association in 1977. Fullerton won the 1977

championship to begin total domination of what would be an eight-year existence for the SCBA.

After a "routine" league title in 1978. the Titans hit the jackpot in 1979. They came back from an openinggame loss to win the regional tournament at Fresno over UCLA and then they came back from an openinggame loss in Omaha to capture the NCAA championship. A 2-1 victory over Arkansas gave Fullerton its first Div. I men's NCAA national title.

The difficulty of winning the national championship was best illustrated by the efforts of the next two Garrido teams. The talented 1980 contingent went 49-18-1 but had to travel to a regional in Tucson, Arizona and the victorious Wildcats went on to win the

national crown. In 1981 the Titans went 47-18 but ran afoul of Arizona State in Tempe as the Sun Devils also went on to win a national crown.

Fullerton returned the favor in Tempe the following year with a dramatic pair of victories over ASU to earn a third-trip to Omaha. The Titans left their game in the desert, however, and didn't even score in two games in Rosenblatt Stadium.

In 1983 it was Arizona State's turn again as the Sun Devils hosted and won a regional tournament over a Fullerton team which needed an atlarge invitation to gain the playoffs after losing a one-game playoff for the automatic NCAA berth against co-SCBA champion UC Santa Barbara.

The slight "crack" in the dynasty proved just that. Last year Fullerton sparred for two months before exploding down the stretch to cruise to another SCBA title and then roll to another national championship.

As in 1979, the road to Omaha went by way of Fresno. Again, it came down to one final game -- a one-run decision and, to make matters even more exciting, an extra-inning contest.

Fullerton outslugged USC, 10-6, in the opening round and then took the driver's seat with a lopsided 16-6 victory over San Diego State. The Aztecs were presented with the task of beating host Fresno State and the Titans twice in a matter of 28 hours in 100-degree plus heat. They almost did it.

San Diego State beat Fresno and then the Titans in the nightcap of the Sunday doubleheader to set up a onegame showdown. Fullerton bolted to a 7-0 lead but the Aztecs came back in the late innings to force overtime. Physical survival in the intense heat almost overshadowed the task at hand and everyone was spent by the bottom of the 11th inning when consecutive two-out hits by Bob Caffrey. Kirk Bates and John Bryant sent the Titans packing for Omaha by an 8-7 count.

### **CWS** in Review

Michigan survived a rain-delayed regional to earn the first-round assignment vs. Fullerton, which was thrilled to get out of the blazing Fresno heat. The Titans ended their scoreless string in Omaha at 20 innings with a run in the first but the game boiled down to the bottom of the eighth inning.

Fullerton was trailing, 4-3, to starter Gary Wayne when Jose Mota beat out a bunt. John Fishel double to left and Mota came all the way home when the left fielder bobbled the ball. After Bob Caffrey struck out, Fishel stole third as John Bryant walked. Mike Halasz, who had only three at bats in April and May, went up to hit for designated hitter Rick Campo. His "safety" squeeze bunt was strong and first baseman Ken Hayward had a play on Fishel at the plate. But Fishel slid around the tag of catcher Rich Bair for the goahead run. Blaine Larker's bases-loaded double brought in three more runs for the final 8-4 score.

Competing in the winner's bracket for the first time in four trips to Omaha, the Titans couldn't stand prosperity. Fullerton handed Texas three firstinning runs while scoring one run in each of the first four innings for a 4-3 advantage that became a 4-4 deadlock entering the bottom of the eighth. Dennis Cook, who had doubled in his

team's only two runs in a March 2 loss to Todd Simmons in Austin, did it again to hang a 6-4 loss on Simmons, snapping his win streak at an unlucky 13 games.

Back to the sudden-death formula that worked so well in 1979, the Titans began the long climb back against Miami. After spotting the Hurricanes early leads of 2-0 and 4-2, the Titans used "little ball" for some big innings. A couple of wild throws after bunts contributed to a five-run Fullerton fourth and the Titans did it again in the sixth, capped by a Caffrey home run. Eddie Delzer got the 13-5 victory in relief.

Now it was down to the "final four" of this record-setting offensive College World Series. The next obstacle: perennial nemesis Arizona State, which had earlier routed Oklahoma State 23-12. But success was to spoil the Sun Devils, as their aggressive batting style was no match for the crafty pitching of lefties Jack Reinholtz and Eddie Delzer, who combined for an eight-hit, 6-1 victory. John Bryant's single keyed a two-run Fullerton second and Kirk Bates had a bases-loaded single in the three-run fourth.

Another red-hot hitting aggregation loomed in Oklahoma State, but the Cowboys were no match for Todd Simmons, who won his 15th by a deceptive 10-2 count. It was the first pitchers duel of the World Series, with Simmons matching Dennis Livingston zero for zero until the fifth inning. That's when Tom Thomas doubled home Blaine Larker and John Fishel followed with a two-run home run for a 3-0 lead that would prove to be enough.

Thomas, however, added a bases-loaded triple and Fishel and Bob Caffrey drove in two runs a piece in the eighth to set the stage for the championship game with Texas.

Eddie Delzer got the rare starting call less than an hour before the game. In a World Series that had been dominated by hitters and aluminum bats,



the 133-pound lefthander took control. A couple of infield hits produced a Texas run in the first inning but that was it as Delzer pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps took him out of the game after seven innings. A wellrested Scott Wright came out of the bullpen to get the final six outs for his NCAA record 22nd save and complete the combined three-hitter. Offensively, John Bryant, who drove in the winning run in Fresno to get the Titans to Omaha, was the star. His stolen base set up the game-tying run in the third inning and his triple was the key hit in the two-run fourth.

John Fishel was selected the Most aluable Player of the World Series while Blaine Larker and Bob Caffrey also earned all World-Series berths along with Eddie Delzer.

The division champions will meet in a best two-out-of-three series in the home park of the team with the best overall conference record to determine the league champion and the automatic berth into the NCAA playoffs.
