• OPINION • One Vote For **Each Vacancy**

California Law states that communities such as ours shall have the stipulation in their Rules and Regulations that cumulative voting shall be used in electing Directors as long as the original builder has an interest in the community. This provision is stated in our By-Laws Article VI, Section 2 "Directors shall be elected or removed by cumulative vote of the members.'

This means that voters may cast all their votes, two in one year, three in alternating years, for one candidate, if they choose. Leisure Technology, our developer has been long gone, but the provision remains.

More and more people in L.V. have the opinion that cumulative voting is not a democratic way to elect our directors. By banding together, a relatively small group of politically aggressive people might be able to elect a favorite candidate, who might not be the person preferred by a majority of voters who voted "one vote for each vacancy.'

One person is not entitled to have a larger vote than another. "Stacking" votes is manipulative. It does not give credit for other people's opinions. An election such as this can be managed--"cronyism" comes to mind.

One vote for each vacancy gives each candidate a fair evaluation of the feeling of the community and as each member of the Board of Directors, when elected. has an equal vote, every member should feel that he/ she has been elected by the majority of citizens.

By-Laws may be amended at a regular or special meeting of the members, by a vote of a majority of the total number of members of the association, except in certain articles when a greater majority is required. Deletion of the one sentence relating to "cumulative" voting would amend our By-Laws, and give each L.V. A. member one vote for each vacancy, and would also conform to general election provisions.

Cumulative Voting Explained

Owners of units in condominiums and planned developments, such as Leisure Village, are familiar with cumulative voting. That method of voting for directors permits a unit owner to give all of the owners' voting entitlement to a single candidate or divide the voting entitlement as desired; that is, if there are three offices to be filled, each owner is entitled to cast three votes: 1 vote for each of three candidates, 3 votes for a single candidate or 2 votes for 1 candidate and 1 vote for another candidate. If the provision requiring cumulative voting were to be repealed, each owner would be entitled to cast one vote for each candidate up to the number of offices to be filled.

Provision for cumulative voting has long been required by the California Department of Real Estate to be included in the governing documents of each common interest development with the goal of assuring the developer adequate control of the Board of Directors while the developer is still completing construction. Once the developer has completed the project and turned administration over to the homeowners, the owners have a right to amend the governing documents to delete the requirement for cumulative voting if they so desire. Section 2 of Article VI of the Leisure Village By-Laws provides in part that ". . . Directors shall be elected or removed by cumulative vote of the members

If the homeowners of Leisure Village were to choose to eliminate cumulative voting, they could do so by simply amending Section 2 of Article VI of the By-Laws to delete the underlined provision above. Amendments to the By-Laws require the approval of 1069 homeowners -- 50 percent of the total homeowners. The easiest way to present the issue to the homeowners is for the Board to present the issue to the homeowners for a vote at the Annual Meeting in June. An alternative is to call a Special Meeting of the homeowners, which can be called by the President, the Board, or upon written request of 109 homeowners representing 5 percent of the voting power of the Association. At the meeting, it would take the vote of 1069 homeowners, in person or by proxy, to adopt the amendment.

The advantages and disadvantages of cumulative voting need to be discussed thoroughly before any vote on the issue.

Shall" has been construed as mandatory in California law since 1850. It appears to be obvious that it is intended that the only appointments to be made to the Nominating Committee must be made at the Annual Meeting, and at no other time.

I submit that the additions to the Nominating Committee and the removal of Lou Okun for speaking out should be treated as nothing more than errors of judgment, which may be corrected. Boards in the past have graciously seen fit to correct their errors, and have been praised for doing so. Peaceful co-existence has been the norm in Leisure Village for many long years. Why not think in terms of the greatest good of the greatest number?
