NISEI URGED TO EXERCISE VOTING POWER AT PRIMARY ELECTION
Speakers at last week's Forum have urged all Citizens to vote by absentee ballot at the coming elections, declaring that the exercise of the franchise is one of the highest privileges of American citizenship.

The point is well taken, for although the exigencies of the times have created difficulties for everyone, we still have the ballot box to express ourselves. No excuses are acceptable in the plain face of our duty to vote, if we are to claim our rights as citizens of this commonwealth.

After all, true Americanism consists, as many speakers have pointed out, not in ostentations of shallow display and pomposity, but rather in a living of the highest principles on which this country was founded; of unflinching courage in the face of difficulties; and in a deep sense of loyalty and justice. It follows that the opportunity for the expression of convictions at the ballot box is utilized each time, wisely and conscientiously.

Dare we to neglect this opportunity to live up to the highest principles of Americanism?
