Last Tuesday, October 8, more than 10 clubs held membership and awareness drives at the Club Fair held in the Bell Tower courtyard. If you missed the fair, it's not too late. "There are a lot of opportunities for students to be involved", says Jenny Hartounian from the Office of Student Development, which organized the event. "At the beginning of the semester a lot of students were calling to ask about clubs on campus but none had been officially formed. Since then, several people have stepped forward."

Richie Garcia, acting President of the Business Student Association, feels club membership gives students unique leadership opportunities.

He says, "Everyone is a founding father here. This is a new school; a new club." He also views club activities as a way to enrich classroom education: "Right now we're looking for speakers to discuss professional issues. We're also hoping to network with community business leaders. It's great real world experience."

In addition, club membership looks impressive on resumes and may actually lead to employment, according to Ron Clough, who works with the campus Biology Society. He says, "We get a lot of calls from the U.S. Department of Fish and Game looking for students to fill positions. I often recommend our volunteers."

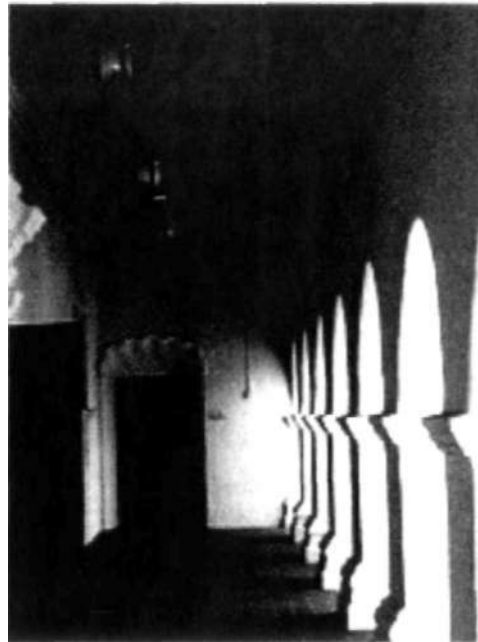

DR IRINA COSTACHE AND STUDENTS TOUR CAMPUS MURALS

Members of Irina Costache's *Art in Mass Media* course were recently treated to a tour of the hidden murals of the Cal State Channel Islands Campus. The group was escorted by the campus police chief, Jeff Young who acted as gatekeeper and tour guide. The murals are hidden in the catacombs of some of the unrenovated buildings on campus.

(Before you set out on your own to find these treasures please read the sidebar warning.)

Painted in the 70's and 80's by a local artist, the whimsical works were most likely intended to brighten the days of the patients interned here in the former Camarillo State Hospital. Now in the current incarnation of the site they continue to work their magic. Bringing comedy and cheer to the otherwise clinical and austere interiors.

The subjects range from a traditional still life rendered quite capably to a series of lifelike caricatures of Hollywood stars. Additionally there are landscapes representing Western California, jungle scapes with Bengal Tigers and Toucans and a series of giant-sized replicas of vintage postage stamps.

I'll refrain from describing the works to avoid spoiling the sense of wonder one realizes with personal discovery.

As we strolled the dark corridors, *electricity has yet to be restored*, the pale ambient light and the beam of the Chief's flashlight illuminated each mural. It was an eerie somewhat unsettling feeling to be walking these empty corridors. The abandoned buildings are somewhat reminiscent of a ghost ship, as if the residents simply vanished. The silence broken only by the

It was also a little spooky realizing that the majority of the Hollywood stars represented are no longer with us. The Hollywood passage is reminiscent of a wax museum; the images evoking that unsettling lifelike quality that makes the skin crawl. The timing of the tour seemed appropriate falling in October with All Hallows Eve forthcoming.

The Lifelike quality testifies to the talent of the artist and is reflected in both the landscapes and portraits. The sensitivity, depth of character and subtle interpellation were striking. At press time we had yet to contact the artist but as soon as we are able, we will interview and profile this local talent here in the pages of *The View*.

Viewing these murals we are reminded of the unique history and

legacy of the Camarillo State Hospital. A history that we must continue to seek out and preserve before it is lost. Toward this end Dr. Costache is working diligently to record, catalog and protect the artistic heritage of The Channel Islands Campus.

Touring The Hidden Murals of Cal State Channel Islands

Due to the inherent danger in exploring unrenovated buildings a police escort is required! Remember these buildings were designed to keep people in!
