Some "Aging Of The Brain" Research Findings — More Volunteers Needed!

By Sandy Okum The first phase of the research done on "Aging of the Brain", in conjunction with Y.N.C.G. and U.C.L.A. is complete.

After studying the neuropsychological testing of cognitive (understanding or knowing) functions by computer and by written and oral exams, the most striking finding was the high intellectual ability, which remained across the five different age groups tested - under 65, 66-70, 71-75, 76-80, and 80-plus.

The second most striking finding was that memory functions remained surprisingly intact across the different age groups, even until the late '80's. Likewise, naming functions and problem solving functions remained intact. Slight changes were found, but they fell within normal limits.

Our population was chosen for this study because basically we are a healthy, active and bright sample of normal elderly individuals. By studying cognitive processes in elderly individuals who are not culturally, intellectually or economically disadvantaged, one is able more clearly to understand

changes in aging that can become the gold standard for comparison with accelerated aging - namely, dementia. In fact, one of the long range goals is to try to identify early signs of accelerated cognitive change that could signal a possible organic dementia - such as Alzheimer's Disease.

The greatest benefit for us to be in this study is that, at anytime in the future, if we indeed do develop a dementia, we will have available to us a complete individual neuropsychological testing of cognitive functions report upon ourselves. This would be a valuable tool for early comparison, detection and treatment of many mental illnesses.

The U.C.L.A. team doing this research are very elated in these early findings and consider this a "first" in Aging of the Brain research. They are so thrilled, they asked me to get more volunteers for the research to broaden the base and validity. For your own benefit and that of mankind in general, call me, Sandy Okum, 482-8125, for an appointment. In the future, a Cardiovascular study will be combined with this research project.



Summer **Soldiers**

Was it a sign of the times? The times "that try men's souls"?

Voter turnout at the November school board elections was very low. Only 14.7 percent of registered voters went to the polls in Ventura county.

In the City of Camarillo there was a 17.6 percent vote in the Pleasant Valley School District election, and only 8 to 9 percent voted for high school district candidates.

Leisure Village residents did slightly better: 25.2 percent voted, according to the Board of Elections. This percentage means that, of 3,386 registered voters in LV, a mere 852 cast ballots.

Not only was the turnout in Leisure Village much lower than the 80.3 percent who voted in 1984, but the number of registered voters was but 98.1 percent of the number in 1984; that is 3,386 compared to 3,450 just one year ago.

Question: Does this reflect a smaller population, or are new residents failing to register, even though they are given registration forms and encouraged to register by the Meet Your Neighbor Committee?

Granted that school board elections do not arouse as much interest among grandparents, who don't have children attending Pleasant Valley Elementary schools or even high school. Granted that the absence of the excitement of a general election, in which controversial political issues are on the ballot, tends to keep the average voter on the sidelines.

But we senior adults have a responsibility to young children, whether or not we are related to them, especially to guarantee that they have the education that our tax monies can buy. It's bad enough that we have foisted on them the highest national debt in history, not to mention the everpresent fear of ending their lives in a nuclear holocaust.

The least we can do is to vote for school board members who will provide educational opportunities for the future leaders of our country.

To put it simply: Non-voting is a vice, not a virtue in a democracy.

With Tom Paine, pamphleteer of the American Revolution, we should characterize the non-voter as a "summer soldier and sunshine patriot."

Buildings And Grounds Committee

The Buildings and Grounds Committee is pleased with the response of the homeowners in trimming and removal of prohibited vines; however, much work still needs to be done in the removal from common grounds of plants for which no permits have been granted.

There continues to be some confusion as to the division of responsibilities of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Landscape portion of the Architectural Comit-

The Buildings and **Grounds Committee deals** with the upkeep of the landscape, shrubs and lawn areas around the homeowner's units; and as the committee members make their monthly walk-through's, or inspections, they are supplementing the homeowner's reports by green sheets on the upkeep of the areas. The Buildings and Grounds Committee is alert to the general conditions within the villages, including the conditions of the shrubs and trees, and trees and sidewalks along the streets, as well as the golf course and common grounds.

The Landscape Committee is specifically involved with the design of the landscaping in L.V. Members deal with the selection of type of plant material, including trees and shrubs, within the entire village. They consider the location, design, need, and design ecology whenever a change in the landplantings requested. In other words, if the homeowner desires a change in the shrubs or trees around his unit, this must be done with a landscape permit and through the Landscape Committee.

Senior Concerns



The California Senior Legislature set a very unusual record of performance having done such detailed assessment of local and State needs, and gaining the advocacy support of their local Seniors, to have passed into record 80% of their proposals. Governor Deukmejian and Lt. Governor McCarthy both complimented the Seniors in the Opening Session Ceremonies for their energy, dedication, and performance in and out of the Capitol.

More than half of the 118 proposals deal with Health Problems and Services. Bills covering the following services and protections have been and are being signed into law every week since November 1: Community Care Facilities, Mobile Park Housing; Elder Abuse Protection and Shelters, Crime Enhancement, Medical Stroke victims, Medical Assistance Program, Adult Day Health Care, Increased Penalties for Nursing Home violations, Task Force for Long-Term Care and Quality, Alzheimer's Study Commission, Taxation Postponement, Rural Transportation, Granny and Senior Housing, etc.

In the meantime, we (Tony Lamb, Lee Strohbehn and I) met Nov. 12 in the City Hall with all of our state legislators, namely Senators Hart and Davis and Assemblypersons Wright, O'Connell, and McClintock, and went over all the proposals the Senior Legislature set up is on a priority list. We are anxious to have our legislators study these proposals for sponsorship and introduction into the regular legislative process.

We will ask all of you fine Seniors to write letters of support and petitions when these bills cess this coming year.




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

Profile: The Vanderhavens

A LOVE AFFAIR WITH NATURE FILMS By Jack Whalen

Deep in the heart of Village 1 is a talented couple whose skills blend nicely into the making of films that feature the natural beauty and wildlife of America's west.

Let's meet Bob and Elaine Vanderhaven. He's an educator, musician and cinematographer while she, with a business-oriented background, is an avid photographer with a keen interest in wild animals, birds and the great outdoors.

Bob spent his young life in Omaha, Nebraska and at an early age showed a natural talent for music, especially at the piano and cello. He and his band gained local fame playing the sweet sounds of the '30's on radio stations and at county fairs, social events and local clubs.

"His band was in great demand those days,' says Elaine, "and that's where we met while both of us were attending Omaha University.'

"As a matter of fact," she continued, "while a freshman, I hired him and his band to play for my sorority. I was 'smitten' by him then and it continues to this day."

World War li brought a halt to Bob's education during his second year and he volunteered for pilot training with the U.S. Army Air Force, winning his silver wings in late 1943.

Months later he was off to England and on D-Day he flew C-47's, with gliders attached, dropping our men into enemy territory. Once landing strips were established in France, he piloted aircraft from there, dropping paratroopers behind enemy

Later his squadron moved to Italy and from there they dropped glider planes with fighting men into Southern France, successfully completing that invasion.
