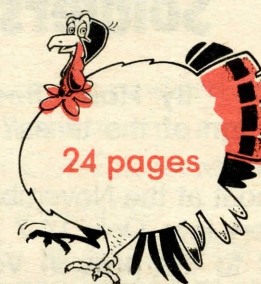
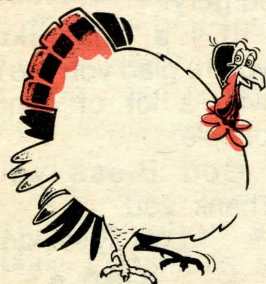

### Harvey Enchants Leisure Villagers

Past productions of the Village Players include such successes as *Plaza Suite*, *You Can't Take it With You*, and *The Man Who Came To Dinner*, but the 1985 production of *Harvey* on Nov. 8, 9 & 10, has been judged by enthusiastic audiences as "the Best Show of All".

As the slightly addled brother and sister whose lives become entangled with a 6½ foot rabbit named Harvey, both Eve Freeman and Irving Leeds delivered totally professional performances that could have proudly graced a Broadway stage. Typical John Zoller touches creatively enhance the



play. Because we have difficulty finding young performers, John cut the Gordian knot by casting Blanche Follen, who as "Myrtle May" becomes Eve Freeman's sister, not daughter as in the original

play. Other distinctive John Zoller touches were the inclusion of several especially created bit parts that gave various players a chance to participate. These include Margaret (I'm Just a Little Buttercup) Nayfack; Sylvia (My Husband Has Arthritis So Bad) Altes; Marcie (I'd Like to See the Kitchen) Robbins; and Irwin (Are You For Real ... Estate), Steinhart.

All of the Harvey roles were played with skill and authority. Phil Aaronson lived the part of the imperious D. Chumley; Ginny Cordell was delightful as his charming wife; Manny Hersch narrowly avoided a medical malpractice suit as Dr. Sanderson; whose nurse (Grace Back), has been smitten by the lovebug, and for that there is no medical cure. On call for a continuous series of chuckles was Jules Nayfack as the oafish medical orderly, Wilson.

Jack Fosdick of (Man Who Came to Dinner) fame brought Judge Omar Bradley to vivid life when he roars, "I'll run him out of the state". Two newcomers to our group earned spontaneous applause in brilliantly executed cameo roles ... Bernice, (I thought you

### Some "Aging Of The Brain" Research Findings — More Volunteers Needed!

The first phase of the research done on "Aging of the Brain", in conjunction with Y.N.C.G. and U.C.L.A. is complete.

After studying the neuropsychological testing of cognitive (understanding or knowing) functions by computer and by written and oral exams, the most striking finding was the high intellectual ability, which remained across the five different age groups tested — under 65, 66-70, 71-75, 76-80, and 80-plus.

The second most striking finding was that memory functions remained surprisingly intact across the different age groups, even until the late '80's. Likewise, naming functions and problem solving functions remained intact. Slight changes were found, but they fell within normal limits.

Our population was chosen for this study because basically we are a healthy, active and bright sample of normal elderly individuals. By studying cognitive processes in elderly individuals who are not culturally, intellectually or economically disadvantaged, one is able more clearly to understand

changes in aging that can become the gold standard for comparison with accelerated aging — namely, dementia. In fact, one of the long range goals is to try to identify early signs of accelerated cognitive change that could signal a possible organic dementia — such as Alzheimer's Disease.

The greatest benefit for us to be in this study is that, at anytime in the future, if we indeed do develop a dementia, we will have available to us a complete individual neuropsychological testing of cognitive functions report upon ourselves. This would be a valuable tool for early comparison, detection and treatment of many mental illnesses.

The U.C.L.A. team doing this research are very elated in these early findings and consider this a "first" in Aging of the Brain research. They are so thrilled, they asked me to get more volunteers for the research to broaden the base and validity. For your own benefit and that of mankind in general, call me, Sandy Okum, 482-8125, for an appointment. In the future, a Cardiovascular study will be combined with this research project.

### Summer Soldiers

Was it a sign of the times? The times "that try men's souls"?

Voter turnout at the November school board elections was very low. Only 14.7 percent of registered voters went to the polls in Ventura county.

In the City of Camarillo there was a 17.6 percent vote in the Pleasant Valley School District election, and only 8 to 9 percent voted for high school district candidates.

Leisure Village residents did slightly better: 25.2 percent voted, according to the Board of Elections. This percentage means that, of 3,386 registered voters in LV, a mere 852 cast ballots.

Not only was the turnout in Leisure Village much lower than the 80.3 percent who voted in 1984, but the number of registered voters was but 98.1 percent of the number in 1984; that is 3,386 compared to 3,450 just one year ago.

Question: Does this reflect a smaller population, or are new residents failing to register, even though they are given registration forms and encouraged to register by the Meet Your Neighbor Committee?

Granted that school board elections do not arouse as much interest among grandparents, who don't have children attending Pleasant Valley Elementary schools or even high school. Granted that the absence of the excitement of a general election, in which controversial political issues are on the ballot, tends to keep the average voter on the sidelines.

But we senior adults have a responsibility to young children, whether or not we are related to them, especially to guarantee that they have the education that our tax monies can buy. It's bad enough that we have foisted on them the highest national debt in history, not to mention the ever-present fear of ending their lives in a nuclear holocaust.

The least we can do is to vote for school board members who will provide educational opportunities for the future leaders of our country.

To put it simply: Non-voting is a vice, not a virtue in a democracy.

With Tom Paine, pamphleteer of the American Revolution, we should characterize the non-voter as a "summer soldier and sunshine patriot."

### Report On Cable T.V.

Four cable satellite channels are available now to each home, in addition to one UHF channel. These are in addition to channels 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

The four cable satellite channels are:

1. ESPN (Entertainment and Sports Programming Network). This program is now on channel 8 and all TV's old or new should be receiving this sports program.

The following are available to all cable-ready, and to older sets if a block converter has been obtained.

2. C-SPAN (Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network). This is on cable satellite channel 20, and provides live coverage of U.S. House of Representative, Congressional hearings and other meetings and discussions.

3. CNN (Cable News Network). This is on cable satellite channel 21 and provides continuous reporting of hard news, with

live coverage of breaking stories.

4. WTBS (Turner Broadcasting System, Atlanta). This program is on cable satellite channel 22 and provides network reruns, sports, movies, news and some original programming.

The UHF channel now available is UHF channel 63 and is available to any set that has UHF channel capability.

The Board of Directors has now signed a contract with Communication Services of Oxnard to provide subscription — paid video services to members, at their individual option and expense. It is expected that this will be available by approximately December 15, 1985. Two movie channels have been authorized at the time of this writing. One or two additional movie channels no doubt will be added. The two now authorized are:

1. HBO - monthly charge \$12;
2. SELECT TV monthly charge \$14.95;
3. One and two above - monthly charge \$22.00.

A refundable deposit of no more than \$25.00 at time of installation of the paid service will be required and an installation charge not to exceed \$15.00 per residence may be charged.

## Buildings And Grounds Committee

The Buildings and Grounds Committee is pleased with the response of the homeowners in trimming and removal of prohibited vines; however, much work still needs to be done in the removal from common grounds of plants for which no permits have been granted.

There continues to be some confusion as to the division of responsibilities of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Landscape portion of the Architectural Committee.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee deals with the upkeep of the landscape, shrubs and lawn areas around the homeowner's units; and as the committee members make their monthly walk-through's, or inspections, they are supplementing the homeowner's reports by green sheets on the upkeep of the areas. The Buildings and Grounds Committee is alert to the general conditions within the villages, including the conditions of the shrubs and trees, and trees and sidewalks along the streets, as well as the golf course and common grounds.

The Landscape Committee is specifically involved with the design of the landscaping in L.V. Members deal with the selection of type of plant material, including trees and shrubs, within the entire village. They consider the location, design, need, and design ecology whenever a change in the landscape plantings is requested. In other words, if the homeowner desires a change in the shrubs or trees around his unit, this must be done with a landscape permit and through the Landscape Committee.

All buildings at the recreation center are the concern of the Education and Recreation Committee.

## Senior Concerns

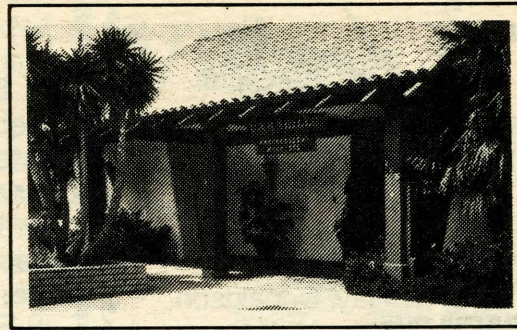

The California Senior Legislature set a very unusual record of performance having done such detailed assessment of local and State needs, and gaining the advocacy support of their local Seniors, to have passed into record 80% of their proposals. Governor Deukmejian and Lt. Governor McCarthy both complimented the Seniors in the Opening Session Ceremonies for their energy, dedication, and performance in and out of the Capitol.

More than half of the 118 proposals deal with Health Problems and Services. Bills covering the following services and protections have been and are being signed into law every week since November 1: Community Care Facilities, Mobile Park Housing; Elder Abuse Protection and Shelters, Crime Enhancement, Medical Stroke victims, Medical Assistance Program, Adult Day Health Care, Increased Penalties for Nursing Home violations, Task Force for Long-Term Care and Quality, Alzheimer's Study Commission, Taxation Postponement, Rural Transportation, Granny and Senior Housing, etc.

In the meantime, we (Tony Lamb, Lee Strohehn and I) met Nov. 12 in the City Hall with all of our state legislators, namely Senators Hart and Davis and Assemblypersons Wright, O'Connell, and McClintock, and went over all the proposals the Senior Legislature set up on a priority list. We are anxious to have our legislators study these proposals for sponsorship and introduction into the regular legislative process.

We will ask all of you fine Seniors to write letters of support and petitions when these bills start going through the committees. We will try for another 80% of success this coming year.

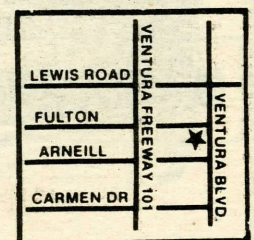
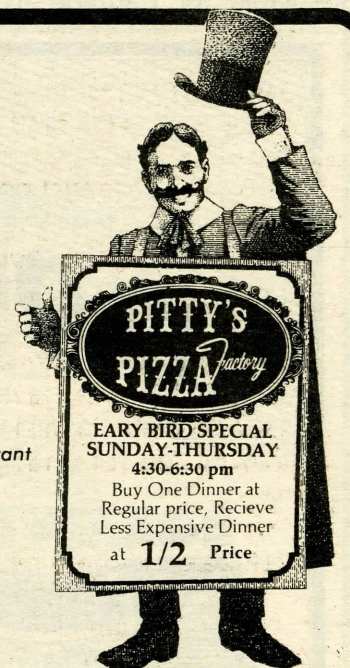

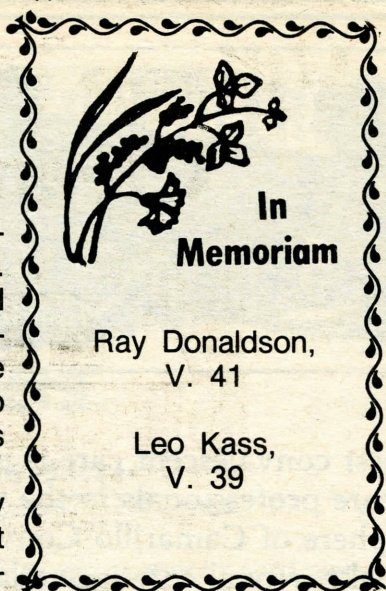




## Attention All Golfers!

# The Great Horned Owl

Have you ever been on an owl prowl, or heard the distinctive hoots of the great horned owl along the wash near Leisure Village? Because owls work the "night shift" you might consider taking a quiet stroll at dusk when the hunter and the hunted are searching for food.

Leisure Village may have a new resident bird, the great horned owl. We have lost nearly all of our beautiful redtail hawks, and while an owl is not a hawk, it fills the same niche and serves the same purpose. Mated owls may even sub-let a former hawk's nest and refurbish it.

The Owl is a large-headed, short-necked bird

of prey. It is mostly nocturnal and best seen or heard at dusk and nightfall. In warmer climates it is a year-round resident because the living is easier. It seems to favor rabbits, with which Leisure Villagers are well acquainted. It also will eat any small animal, bird or amphibian it can catch.

The "cat owl" (one of its many names) has ear tufts, or "horns". Both male and female are feathered in dusky browns and greys. They are heavily barred beneath and have a white throat collar. The female is larger than the male. Breeding in this area is most likely to occur in December and January. Both parents incubate the four-to-five round white eggs for four weeks. The owlets are unable to fly for three months.

The great horned owl has all the tools needed for successful hunting and capturing. Its plumage is soft and the edges of the flight feathers are fashioned with fragile filaments for silent flight. The large sensitive eyes are able to see in very dim light, and its keen ears can pick up faint sounds of small scurrying animals. And, finally, it has strong legs and sharp, powerful curved talons. A perfect combination for a bird of prey.

I hope you hear or see this swivel-necked and much fabled bird.

## Current Issues Forum

By Herbert Swartz

Judge Steven Perrin discussed the "Role of a Judge in a Free Society" as the Current Issues Forum on Oct. 25. "People feel that the justice system has let us down," Judge Perrin said. "Dissatisfaction with the administration of justice is as old as law."

Judge Perrin explained how the justice system works and praised the criminal justice system in Ventura County. The role of a judge should not be dogmatic or bland but to be neutral, he said. The justice system is the concrete that holds us together. A judge should not be involved in changing the law, but must be bound by the law as determined by legislation and prior judicial decisions. A judge can't be capricious in handing down decisions and still maintain the confidence which is necessary to make the judicial

system work.

There is a common misconception that criminals are getting off too lightly, Judge Perrin said. However, last year the California courts tried more than 7500 felony cases with convictions resulting about 80% of the time. The prisons are overcrowded due to longer sentences being handed down by judges as a result of tougher state laws. The judicial system has been blamed, he said, for heavy damages awarded to individuals in personal injury cases. However, the limiting of damages is a legislative decision.

Judge Perrin said that he would not discuss Justice Bird's recall election, but he told the audience it was very important and they should be informed as to the issues involved. He is opposed to the federal system of appointment of judges for life, as it leads to arrogance and



irresponsibility.

## Profile: The Vanderhavens

### A LOVE AFFAIR WITH NATURE FILMS By Jack Whalen

Deep in the heart of Village 1 is a talented couple whose skills blend nicely into the making of films that feature the natural beauty and wildlife of America's west.

Let's meet Bob and Elaine Vanderhaven. He's an educator, musician and cinematographer while she, with a business-oriented background, is an avid photographer with a keen interest in wild animals, birds and the great outdoors.

Bob spent his young life in Omaha, Nebraska and at an early age showed a natural talent for music, especially at the piano and cello. He and his band gained local fame playing the sweet sounds of the '30's on radio stations

and at county fairs, social events and local clubs.

"His band was in great demand those days," says Elaine, "and that's where we met while both of us were attending Omaha University."

"As a matter of fact," she continued, "while a freshman, I hired him and his band to play for my sorority. I was 'smitten' by him then and it continues to this day."

World War II brought a halt to Bob's education during his second year and he volunteered for pilot training with the U.S. Army Air Force, winning his silver wings in late 1943.

Months later he was off to England and on D-Day he flew C-47's, with gliders attached, dropping our men into enemy territory. Once landing strips were established in

France, he piloted aircraft from there, dropping paratroopers behind enemy lines.

Later his squadron moved to Italy and from there they dropped glider planes with fighting men into Southern France, successfully completing that invasion. At war's end, the Vanderhavens, now several years married, moved to Southern California, where Bob completed his education at U.S.C.

With a degree in music and education his minor, he then taught in the L.A. City School system for several years. In 1951 he took a two-year leave of absence, and with his Masters' Degree, went on special assignment for the U.S. Army, helping raise the educational level of occupation troops in Munich, Germany.

"It was a great learning experience for us too," says Bob. "In addition to helping our military men, Elaine and I, with our seven-year old son, were able to enjoy many scenic trips in Europe."

Upon returning home, Bob resumed his teaching career, advancing to vice-principal, then principal, with most assignments in the San Fernando Valley.

With a lifelong interest in birds and animals,

Elaine plunged into support work for the Los Angeles Zoo. Her study and training enabled her to attain the level of a docent at the zoo, and she supervised weekly tours for teachers and students at all levels of learning.

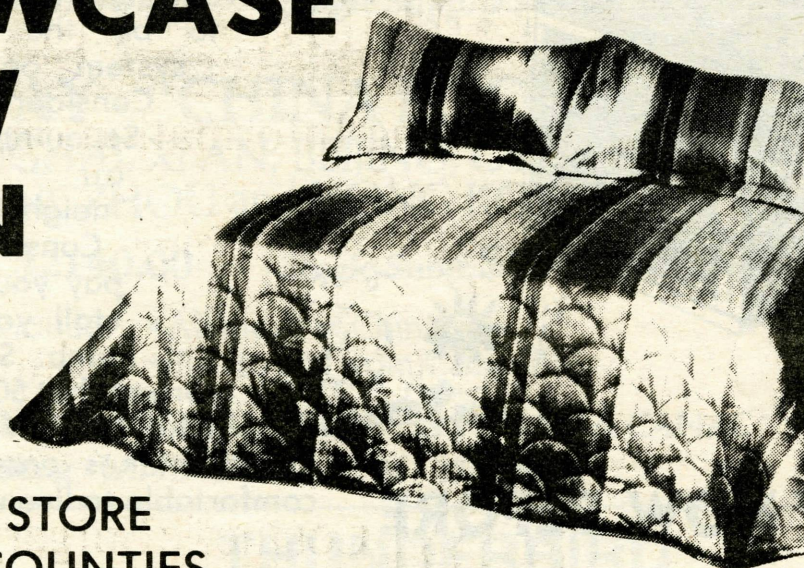
Moving to Leisure Village some 10 years ago, and finding this an ideal base of operations, they often traveled to the mountain, seashore and

desert areas, carrying lots of film equipment. Bob would do the film editing and put the natural sounds onto his films and within a few years they built a library of titles that have wide appeal for varied audiences.

A sampling of titles of these 16mm films, running from 25 to 45 minutes, includes John Muir's Yosemite, The Rockies, Desert Odyssey, Canada's Shining Mountains, and Prairie Spring.

Departing from the West Coast for one of their works, they produced, The Wild, Wild, East, a journey to wilderness areas along the Atlantic coast of Canada and the U.S. from Nova Scotia to the Okefenokee Swamp and the Florida Everglades.

L.V.'s Art Kaufman, whose Hollywood career included production work in dozens of feature films,

speaks highly of Bob's camera work.

"He achieves excellent color close-ups of both wildlife and plant life and his nature documentary, Desert Odyssey, is truly outstanding," says Art.

The Vanderhaven's nature film programs, personally narrated by Bob, have been seen by thousands of people, and fit well into many club, banquet and/or special event programs.

Bob and Elaine have one son and are blessed with two grandchildren, a boy and a girl, who are twins. And their daughter-in-law, mother of the twins, has a mother who also gave birth to twins and she, in turn, came from a family of twins.
