## Water Rate Increase - A Correction

Guest Editor Karl Cannon's article "New LV Directors Face Critical Decisions" (ILV July 23) is a fine presentation, but one item needs correction: the water rate increase.

Karl wrote "We are now to be confronted with an enormous addition in sewer charges plus a raise in water costs of \$6.50 a month per home....The water costs alone would increase our annual budget by \$156,000."

The \$6.50 a month increase per home as reported in the local press is an incorrect statement for Leisure Village. The actual increase is 7.4 cents per hundred cubic feet. Based on LV's actual consumption from July, 1986 through March of this year (a very dry period when consumption was high), the increase per home for LV would be \$1.20 a month. Add a 40 cent additional increase in meter rental, the total cost would be \$1.60, or an annual increase to LV of \$41,200, not \$156,000.

Sewer rates have increased \$1.86 a month per home, or an annual increase to Leisure Village of \$48,000. This seems high, but considering that there have been no increases in the last four years while operating costs have increased, the increase is not unreasonable.

## Improvements Listed For August

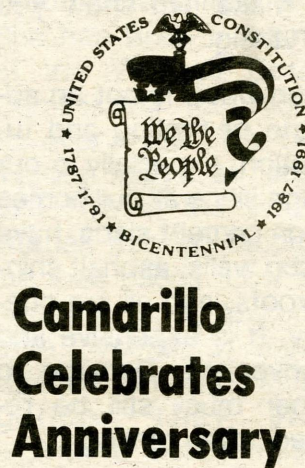

## Common Sense Approach To Termite Problems

In July, I.L.V. printed an article on termite problems based on information furnished by Dan Davis, a resident of V.31, who is a member of the Architectural Committee and a licensed contractor with forty years experience in the San Fernando Valley. He is the owner of the Davis Construction Co. and has wide experience in renovating older homes as a specialty.

The main thrust of the previous article was that the homeowner should not panic but should take his time, make a thorough study of the particular problems in his home, consult his neighbors, and ask for help from the Architectural Committee which is taking the termite situation very seriously indeed.

Termites are found in warm climates. They thrive where there is moisture, heat and contact of lumber with earth. Check for problems where there are water leaks in the kitchens, bathrooms, and around washing machines. Don't cover cabinet ventilation holes with plastic shelf-covering. Check under flower pots on porch rails and vegetation in contact with wood walls. (Termites may even use trees as ladders to reach fascia boards high up.)

You may want a second opinion but remember that pest control poisons

### Do Unto Others

We like to think that most Leisure Villagers were brought up by what might be considered strict standards of etiquette and courtesy.

Aggressive attitudes when we were younger and trying to make our way in the world may have been necessary then, but in L.V., aggressiveness is no longer necessary nor appropriate.

But have you looked at yourself lately?

Some who are the most considerate to friends may forget this in dealing with strangers, or those who serve us. A very few people are consistently discourteous at the least provocation to the gardeners, the check-out cashier, the salesperson who can't find exactly what we need, the waiter who serves our dinner, or our own security people and office staff. Arrogance from a few has given L.V. a bad name in Ventura County, even though most of us are not guilty of it.

In some countries elaborate and formal systems of manners have been traditionally considered mandatory. Some of these may seem ridiculous, yet they have seemed to serve well the purpose for which they were designed, that is, to help people live close together in harmony.

This is exactly what the CC&R's of L.V. are designed to do. Buffer zones in L.V. are not very large, and we are a dense population. Most of these rules were not devised until there was a demonstrated need for them. So, PLEASE take a good objective look at yourself.

Do you take the time and effort to be courteous?

Do you always shower before going into the jacuzzi or pool?

Do you give bicycle riders the right of way when you walk in the bike lanes?

Do you obey our speed limits?

Do you wait your turn?

Do you take only your fair share?

If your pet asks to be taken out in the middle of the night, do you disregard the leash law?...and leave the mess?

Do you accompany guests into the common areas?

Do you refrain from talking to friends during performances and meetings? This last certainly is not in the CC&R's. It shouldn't have to be mentioned, but it is especially important in our community where so many already have hearing difficulties. Failing ears even with hearing aids are not very good at sorting out sounds, thereby making whispering neighbors much more annoying than they would be to younger ears.

Perhaps the best definition for good manners is "That behavior which makes those around us be the most comfortable, and makes you to be comfortable with yourself."

or chemicals may exterminate existing insects but do not repair existing damage to wood. If you do call an inspector, make a point of being well-informed beforehand and accompany him on his tour--ask questions, get a detailed report in writing, and make him show you everything.

Dan Davis is not an advocate of tenting and fumigation, especially in our Village since all our homes are on cement slabs, have stucco walls, asphalt shingle roofs, and all are one-story. It is expensive and inconvenient. Damage to lumber must still be repaired after tenting.

After you are certain that termites are infesting your property, scrape away infected areas and apply treatment by brushing on creosote. Creosote is available in paint stores. (If you make this application yourself, be sure to wear gloves and safety glasses.) Structural members (weight-bearing) must be repaired or replaced if severely damaged. The best thing to do here is call an experienced builder or carpenter.

## Emergency Services Organization (ESO)

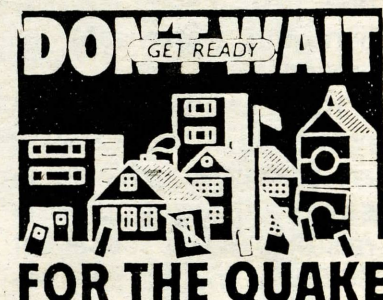

To those who have been "carrying the ball," we owe a big Thank You! They have been called upon in several instances in the past. And see! They've scared away any earthquake.

We're publicizing our ESO and hope we won't have to use it. So, much ado will prepare us for what we hope is nothing. That is, that we have no disaster in Leisure Village, Camarillo, or anywhere else. But, to be prepared makes for less fear should the big one "come down the Pike." Just look at each day's news. There's always a disaster striking somewhere in the world.

In preparing our update of the ESO Village Coordinators and Alternates, I've met with "I'm too busy." Then comes a recitation of all the activities in which that person is involved. And I do agree. Those who know the wife and me, wonder and remark at how much we're involved. However, comes the "biggie," all else will be dropped, put aside. There will then be only one priority: responding to the emergency. It is then

that our trained people will know how and where to respond. And then "everyone" will want to help. So, know your Village's Coordinator and Alternate(s). That should be in your Emergency folder, kept near your phone book, together with your L.V. Disaster Survival Guide. Basically, check your own home and contents for dangerous conditions. Correct them, if possible. Then put a white rag on the handle of your mail box. Check neighbors on each side and/or go to your Coordinator or



Alternate in charge of your section of your Village. They may need help for people with special problems in your Village.

I hope that by the time you read this, those who attended the three Red Cross sessions in April have received a card certifying each session you went to. If you have any questions or problems, phone me, or leave a note in the Emergency Services box in the Recreation office.

ommendation to install wind screens around the exercise and ping pong area south of the pool. The fencing is five feet high, with the upper area open for ventilation.

After public discussion the Board voted to add one hand railing to the northeast steps of the pool as a safety aid. This is expected to be added during August.

Installation of a 22" mirrored ball hanging from the ceiling of the AR will proceed with funds donated by the Live Dance Band group. The Saturday Night Ballroom Dance group is financing additional AR lighting over the refreshment table area near the kitchen.

The sidewalk at the entrance to the west parking lot is being modified by Village employees, under the direction of Terry Craig, Landscape and Maintenance Manager.

On either side of the parking lot entrance, wheelchair ramps are being cut into the curb corners and a short part of the sidewalk realigned and changed from blacktop to cement. The rest of the sidewalk along the north side of Village 8 will be done later, as part of the on-going project to replace existing blacktop sidewalks with cement.

Interior finishing of the two new rooms recently enclosed at the north end of the pool area is stalled. The construction contract was originally let for \$10,500, but costs escalated when the City required that insulation be added to the walls. Cost of the "bare bones" contract therefore ate into funds available for finishing the rooms. They need paint, counter tops, and window and floor coverings. Funds may not be available until the new fiscal year, which starts next spring.

## Village Briefs

Lillian Goldman, V.41, active in Village affairs: past co-chairman of the Current Issues Forum, member of Education and Recreation Committee, Drama workshop, bridge group, still has time for important volunteer work. She has been a member of the Ventura County Commission for Women for over a year. The Commission plays an important role in the lives of women through recognizing their needs. Low cost housing, family law, child care, women in agriculture are areas of investigation. They study legislative action relating to women's rights, and currently Lillian is also monitoring the Battered Women's Shelter in Simi Valley for the Commission.

Through her work as president of the National

Council of Jewish Women, Mrs. Goldman became interested in the Commission. Fifteen women volunteers devoted thousands of hours last year on the Commission and keep busy following up on areas on interest to a range of women from homemakers to widows to grandmothers. They communicate with county supervisors, legislators, and other women's groups to ease problems facing women in the County.

Dr. Bernard Goldman, V.8, member of the Camarillo Health Care District since its inception in 1983, announced his resignation in June. Goldman helped the District develop the Adult Day Center, the Care-A-Van, nail clipping clinics, Lifeline and Cardio-pulmonary resuscitation classes--services the hospital cannot provide.

Dr. Goldman is retired from his medical practice

which began in Michigan. He was sent to the South Pacific during World War II with the Army Air Corps, but returned to Michigan after the War and specialized in internal medicine. He practiced in a rural county where his patients benefited from his kind and caring personality. He still reads the medical journals and keeps up with his profession.

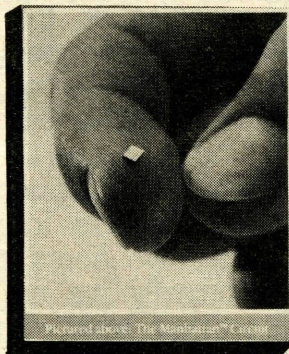
He and Doris can now play more golf, and Bernard is also active with the Woodworkers Club.

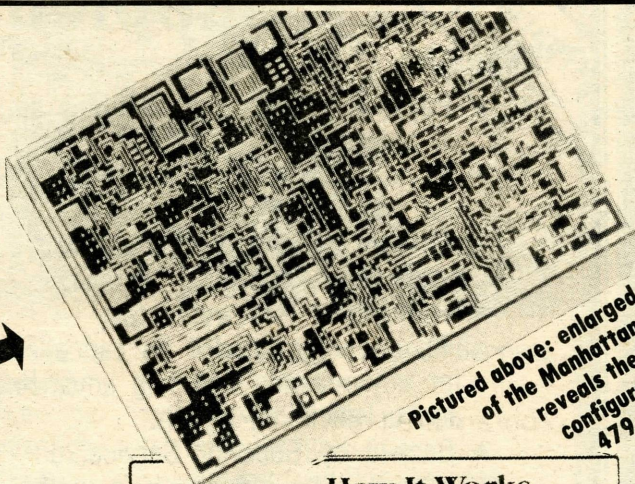

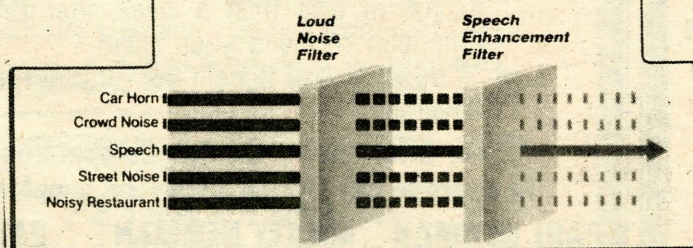


**PICTURED ABOVE: The Manhattan Circuit.**

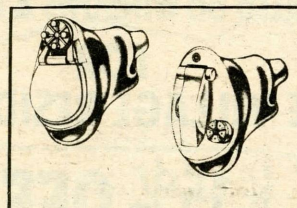


Pictured above: enlarged photo of the Manhattan circuit reveals the intricate configuration of its 479 components

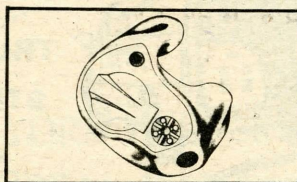

## SECURITY & SAFETY COMMITTEE

In August, the Security and Safety Committee made the following recommendations to the Board of Directors:

1. Change section 8.01 of Article VIII of the Rules and Regulations to permit small vans which have handicap license plates and are not equipped for camping, which are the only means of transportation for handicapped residents who can show proof of ownership of the vehicle, to be permitted to park on L.V. streets instead of the R.V. lot. (First reading)

2. A wheelchair ramp to be installed at the end of the existing concrete sidewalk leading into the West parking lot. (Approved by Board on Aug. 3, and construction is in progress.)

3. A second railing to be installed at the swimming

pool steps to assist handicapped persons when entering or leaving the pool. The railing to be installed about two feet from the existing rail at the northeast corner of the pool. (Approved by the Board)

4. Paint all TV pedestals which are less than 12" from the sidewalk a bright luminous color which can be seen in the dark. A survey made at the request of the Board by members of the S&S Comm. showed about 40 pedestals in this category. Denied by Board until further evaluation is made.

5. The Committee is recommending that a request from Chief Moses that windshield decals be issued to renters who have a lease of one year or more, be approved. Renters with leases of less than one year will continue to receive six-month guest passes.

At our second meeting this month, we viewed two films sent to us from Kodak Co., which were interesting and informative.

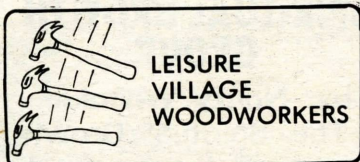

and Eastern Star, is a member of Channel Islands Embroiderers' Guild, and is an accomplished needlewoman.

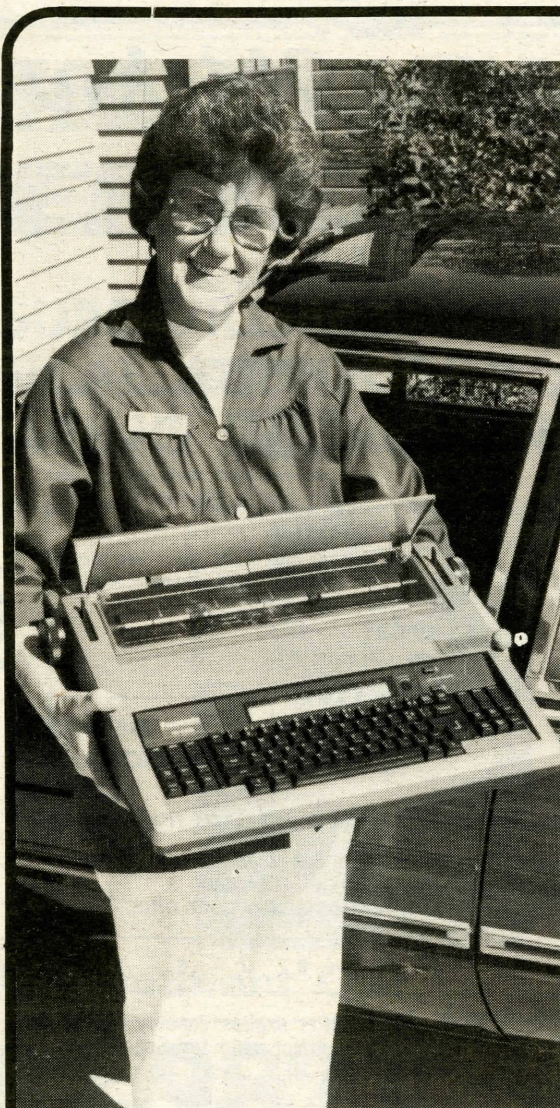
The Village lost Ray over a year ago but he will not be forgotten because of his helpfulness, energy, friendliness, and a special hobby--attending fairs wherever he could.

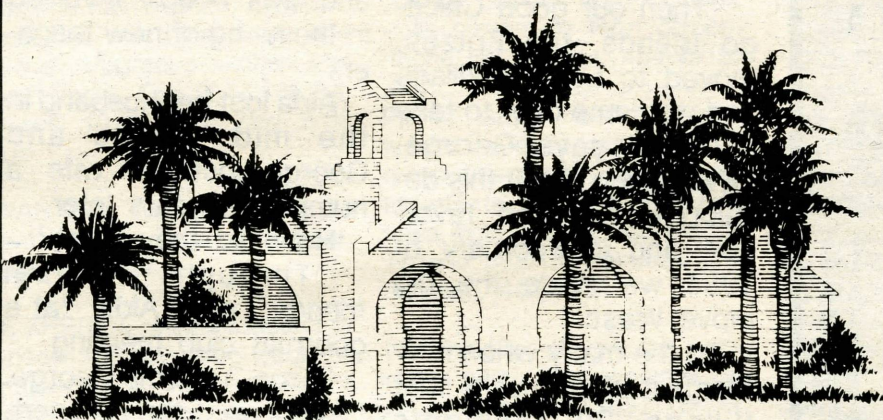



# Profile: George & Alda Kroll

They used to "escape" part of Chicago's snow and cold by spending the month of February in Palm Springs. From there the Krolls would "look-over" the general northern San Diego area in the hope of finding an ideal retirement community.

"Then our good Chicago friends, the Fritzes, moved to Leisure Village and we came over to take a look," says George. "Everything about this development looked favorable and in February of 1984 we made the big move West."

To the many who know them, it does seem that Village 20 residents George and Alda Kroll have lived here for more than 3½ years; they seem to keep so busy and happy.

At the time of her retirement in 1974 she was executive secretary in Personnel and was deeply involved in the hiring of new teachers.

Alda lost her husband in the mid 1960's and George lost his wife a number of years later.

How did they meet? "Through mutual friends," says Alda, "at a gourmet club meeting."

"True," affirms George, "Alda was the dessert. For months after that I chased and chased her 'till she finally caught me."

They were married in 1974. Alda did hospital volunteer work until George retired in 1979. The next few years found them enjoying gardening in the summer and not so enjoyable shoveling snow in the winter.

Once here, they quickly became involved in golf. Alda, a fine lady golfer although she's not been playing too long, moved through the ranks of the L.V. Women's Golf Association and just finished her term as President for the 1986-87 year.

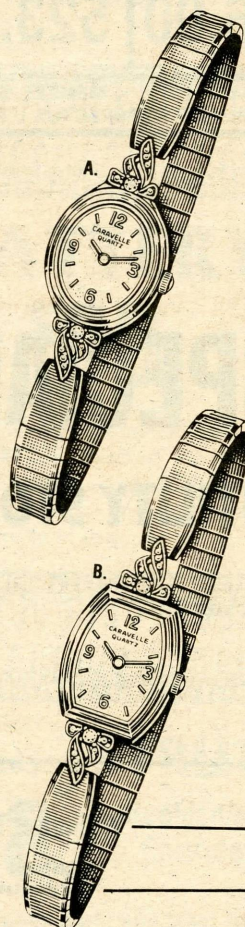

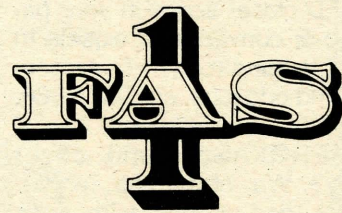
