An Ounce Of Prevention Is the Cure

Guest Editorial By Gertrude Kern

When you read of a major disaster, or see pictures of devastation caused by earthquake or other forms of Nature exhibiting her power, do you ask yourself what would happen in Leisure Village should the predicted earthquake strike? The LV Emergency Services Organization has been preparing us to live through such a probability, but what about damage to the grounds, the buildings, to our homes?

What is the Association insurance coverage for such a possibility? In the panic and chaos that would ensue following a major earthquake, what provisions have been made for the re-building and/or damage repair to structures? How would the market value of Leisure Village property be affected and restored?

Thanks to a concerned, forward-thinking Insurance Committee, and a very knowledgeable and capable former insurance executive, George Parker, V 17, these questions have been answered. The Board appointed an ad hoc committee that has been working for several months and they are now prepared to present the results of their investigation to the residents of Leisure Village.

The ad hoc committee includes George Parker, chairman; Gertrude Kern, John Lauten, Mike Sher-

man, Herb Stern and John Russo.

An extensive study was made to determine the best financial preparation that could be made to restore common areas and dwellings after a quake. This study included talks with heads of government agencies in San Francisco, and others involved with the responsibility of handling after-disaster problems. Armed with as much information as could be gathered, the committee concluded that serious planning and financial preparation was absolutely necessary.

SERIOUS PLANNING

A review of the present CC&R's by legal specialists, the Insurance Committee, and the Board of Directors concluded that the language of the present CC&R's is not specific enough to define clearly and recognize the authority of the Board to handle effectively the financial aspects of a catastrophic emergency. Personal discussions with financial institutions, Federal Government Agencies, Insurance Industry organizations and a qualified legal firm, made it obvious that the LV Board of Directors must have indisputable financial authority to act on behalf of the Villagers. Therefore, an amendment to the current CC&R's is essential to provide this au-

breakdown of communications. Immediate, vital decisions are called for. Contacts must be made with the insurance carrier to arrange for repair and rebuilding. This requires an overall authority — and, for Leisure Village, that authority is the Board of Directors. THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT ONLY GOES INTO EFFECT AFTER A DISASTER. It gives the Board the authority to meet the deductible requirement of the insurance policy by declaring a special assessment to cover the insurance deduct-

FINANCIAL PLANNING

Experts have estimated the reconstruction costs of Leisure Village to be \$176 million. This amount is reviewed annually based on the government's cost of construction index. The amount of coverage for earthquake damage is 75% of the \$176 million reconstruction cost of all structures, including dwelling units. This makes the earthquake coverage \$132 million, or \$13.2 million.

A proposed change in our current CC&Rs, certain to help us in the event of a major disaster, will be covered in a Channel 12 special to be shown tomorrow, Sat, Feb 1 at 10:00 a.m. and will be repeated Wed, Feb 12 at 10:00 a.m., the day before the Town Meeting.

Should the damage be less than \$13.2 million, such as \$1 or \$2 million, a smaller sum would have to be raised. The overwhelming odds are, that if an earthquake occurs, the damage will be less than the \$13.2 million, in which event the assessments would be substantially scaled down accordingly. EARTH-QUAKE DAMAGE ASSESSMENT WOULD BE MADE ONLY IN THE EVENT OF A DAMAGING EARTHQUAKE.

Closing the door after the horse escapes from the barn is no big deal. Anybody can do that. Anticipating a potential problem before it occurs and devising a solution is a unique talent.

George Parker (V. 17) and the ad hoc Insurance Committee know it is better to act than react and they plan ahead. Fortunately, all LV homeowners benefit from their problem-solving skills.

The problem that can occur is "How can LV homes and structures be rebuilt or repaired after a damaging major earthquake". As you have read in Gertrude Kern's guest editorial, the intensive study by the ad hoc insurance committee revealed that the present LV CC&R's do not empower the Board of Directors to effectively handle the financial aspects of a catastrophic emergency. Therefore, an amendment to the CC&R's is required to enable the board to exercise the necessary financial authority following a disastrous earthquake. Such an amendment requires approval of 75% of LV homeowners.

A Town Hall Meeting is scheduled for Thurs, Feb. 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the AR. The ad hoc insurance committee will be present and explain the proposed amendment at that time. Inside Leisure Village urges all homeowners to attend the Town Hall meeting.

During the past two years California has experienced three major catastrophes ... the San Francisco earthquake, the Santa Barbara fire, and the recent Oakland fire. It is hoped that Leisure Village will continue to be spared any such horrors.



You should not treat a red, scratchy-feeling for more than a day or two, as these symptoms could indicate a more serious problem for which delay in seeing a doctor may result in permanent

loss of vision.

There are many eyedrops and eye remedies available over-the-counter in drug stores and supermarkets. Though most are soothing, they are rarely necessary, since the normal eye takes pretty good care of itself. Yet at times they can be helpful for assorted mild irritations and allergies.

In buying eyedrops, you might be confused as to the different types. Over-the-counter eyedrops fall primarily into two categories: decongestants and lubricating drops, with eyewashes as a lesser known third group. Within groups, most brands have the same basic ingredients. Thus, the most expensive product offers no advantage over the least expensive.

Decongestant Eyedrops

Decongestants whiten the eyeball. Eyes become "bloodshot" when the blood vessels in the conjunctiva (outer membrane) dilate. There are many non-serious causes of bloodshot eyes: allergies to substances in the air such as pollens and dust, irritation from cigarette smoke and atmospheric pollutants, tiredness after prolonged reading, and so on.

If the cause of bloodshot eyes is not serious, they will look and feel better after using decongestant eyedrops. The main active ingredient temporarily shrinks the blood vessels and cause the conjunctiva to shed excess fluid. The effect may last two to four hours. Some decongestant drops include an additional ingredient, such as zinc sulfate or an antihistamine, that relieves itching.

Decongestant eyedrops should not be used more than three or four times a day. Excessive use sometimes causes "rebound" - the eyes may become even more red and irritated when the drops are stopped.

Lubricating Eyedrops

These are known as "artificial tears." They provide moisture and soothing lubrication to the eye's membranes, relieving feelings of dryness and irritation. They are especially useful when the eye produces too little moisture on its own or is exposed to dry, windy, or dusty environments. Almost all brands include methyl-cellulose as a major ingredient. These drops do not decongest blood vessel, and they may be used as often as desired without complications, unless you are - or become - allergic to one of the preservatives in the solution.

Eye washes, sometimes called "collyrium" drops (an old-fashioned word for eye wash) do not decongest or lubricate. They contain various compounds such as boric acid or very dilute percentages of menthol, and can give a soothing feeling to the eye. Having no decongestant, they cannot make a bloodshot eye look whiter. These drops have no real usefulness and are not recommended.

VISION LIMITED

Sheri Main was the main speaker at the Vision Limited meeting on Monday, Jan 6. Ms. Main, who represents the State Department of Rehabilitation, discussed services that are available to those who are blind or partially sighted.

Ms. Main, who is blind herself specializes in training the blind to adjust to their circumstances and teaching them to be selfreliant. Included in her services are methods for the low vision people to perform household duties such as cooking and washing. She demonstrated methods of labeling measuring devices, washing machine dials, cooking utensils, and other common home items.

She also spoke of counseling for such services as shopping and 'getting around" with suggestions for walking and using buses. Added to these are the services of the Braille Institute and the use of their equipment and supplies.

Also mentioned was a long list of services that are available at no cost to clients of the Department of Rehabilitation. These include such items as talking clocks and alarm clocks and several types of white canes. There are also free consultation with optometrists that specialize in low vision work and arranging appointments with the Center of the Partially Sighted in Santa Monica.

The Department of Rehabilitation offers many other services, supplies and consultations at no cost to the blind or partially sighted. Those that are interested can contact Ms. Sheri Main at 805-385-2400.
