Oxnard College Dual Tuition Fee

On Monday, January 4, 1991, at the 1:30 p.m. Board of Directors meeting, the Board reversed its decision (re its November 1992 approval of The Education/Recreation Committee to maintain equal tuition for all residents taking Oxnard College classes) and approved the request of a group of residents to continue the Oxnard College classes based on the 1993 dual tuition sched-

For the past three years Leisure Village participated in an academic program with Oxnard College. The tuition schedule was \$25.50 for three units per semester.

These academic classes were not to be confused with previous instructional programs (ie Adult Education, Community Services) offered at Leisure Village in past vears.

In September of 1992 the Sacramento State Legislature passed SB766. This bill raised Community College fees from \$6 per unit to \$10 per unit. However, it included a differential fee that required any person who held a Bachelor of Arts Degree to pay \$50 per unit. Thus the tuition including a \$10 health fee became \$40 per three unit class for students who did not hold a Bachelor's Degree and \$160 per three unit class for students holding a Bachelor's Degree.



Learning Workshop For Seniors

Probably the only person who can say he never has an argument is a recluse who lives alone on a mountain top and is committed to silence. Even then some day a mountain climber is likely to provoke him to anger to make him forget his vows.

It is not surprising that sometimes controversies arise in a Village such as ours. The present one about Oxnard Community College classes should be easy to resolve. We are now committed to continuing classes for villagers and other Ventura County registrants in the Recreation Center until May.

The concensus of opinion (and the editors of ILV have spoken with many residents on the subject) seems to be that college classes for credit are not necessary for people who are retired. Lifelong learning is desirable, but the pressures from definite assignments and competition for grades are no longer a priority.

There is another way. Leisure Village is teeming with talented, trained people in almost any subject

we might want to pursue.

Workshop and support groups are already being used in many instances in the Village. Workshops actually may be better suited for people like us because their structure allows a wider range of input than does instruction and lectures by one person only. Kids going to a community college may need this kind of beginning formal instruction, but we are beyond that in most instances.

The two courses currently being offered by O.C.C. are Readers' Theatre and Economics 101. Surely. here in LV there are several competent people in each of these disciplines who would be happy to

chair, or co-chair a workshop group.

Workshops cost almost nothing and they have the added advantage of no need to admit outsiders, which have sometimes been an embarrassment to Security.

Potential leaders of such a workshop may hesitate because of a desire not to be tied down for a long period of time and thus prevented from travelling or other personal pursuits. This need not be a problem.

ILV has long used the policy of co-editorship. This has worked well because it has allowed each of us to "beg off" when needed, with two or three people left to help reduce the work load each month for the coordinating editor.

Perhaps such a plan might also serve other organizations.

In the February 28, 1992 ILV, an analysis of the legislative priorities of the California Senior Legislature (CLS) was published together with a brief summary of how the CSL functions. L.V. Education sub committee discussed this with The Education/Recreation Committee, various political officials, and Oxnard College Administrators. Our request was simple--we asked that the dual tuition fee be waived for Leisure Village residents--allowing all residents to pay the same (\$40) tuition fee. The college would not grant our request.

It became obvious that FAIR.....From Pg 1 the original intent of this Leisure Village program had become flawed. We consulted lawyers who assured us that Oxnard College could grant our residents equal tuition without "breaking the state law"/endangering their funding.

We decided to contact two universities (UCSB and CSUN) who offered satellite programs in Ventura.

This entire discussion became moot when a group of our residents decided they wanted to continue this flawed Oxnard College program in Leisure Village. The inequity of the 1993 dual tuition fee schedule did not concern them.

With the approval of The LV Board, this group of residents requested a program that was based on the premise that if they could get 15 students in a class (at \$40 per student) then the students holding Bachelor's Degrees could sign up to audit the class at \$55 per semester. NEI-THER THE BOARD NOR THIS RESIDENT COM-SPECIFIED MITTEE WHETHER THESE FIF-STUDENTS TEEN WOULD BE LEISURE VILLAGE RESIDENTS, NON-RESIDENTS, OR OXNARD COLLEGE REGULAR STUDENTS USING OUR FACILITIES.

Three years ago the duly appointed Education-/Recreation Committee and The Education Sub-Committee agreed to bring an Oxnard College

academic program to Leisure Village for RESI-DENTS. We believed then, as we believe now, that all residents of LV are entitled to participate in all LV classes, clubs, and groups on an equal basis.

Budget Presentation

On January 14 the LVA budget for the period beginning April 1, 1993 was presented by the Board of Directors to approximately 75 residents in the AR.

The proposed budget of \$6,363,949 will be 2.6 percent greater than last budget year's \$5,733,122. Homeowners' fees will increase by 8.26%, however, as a result of folding the flood and earthquake insurance into the monthly assessment. (This change was described in detail in the October issue of ILV.)

Salient features of the new budget include rebuilding the shuffleboard building, replacing the roof on the Recreation Center and completing the cleanup of the fuel tank leakage at the Administration Building.

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SELLER'S AGENT

A Seller's agent under a listing agreement with Seller acts as the agent for the Seller only. A Seller's agent or a subagent of that agent has the following affirmative obligations:

To the Seller:

(a) A Fiduciary duty of utmost care, integrity, honesty, and loyalty in dealings with the Seller To the Buyer & the Seller

Diligent exercise of reasonable skill and care in performance of the agent's duties.

A duty of honest and fair dealing and good faith.

A duty to disclose all facts known to the agent materially affecting the value or desirability of property that are not known to, or within the diligent attention and observation of, the parties

An agent is not obligated to reveal to either party any confidential information obtained from the other party which does not involve the affirmative duties set forth above.

BUYER'S AGENT

A selling agent can, with a Buyer's consent, agree to act as agent for the Buyer only. In these situations, the agent is not the Seller's agent, even if by agreement the agent may receive compensation for services rendered, either in full or in part from the Seller. An agent acting only for a Buyer has the following affirmative obligations: To the Buyer

(a) A fiduciary duty of utmost care, integrity, honesty, and loyalty in dealings with the Buyer. To the Buyer & Seller:

Diligent exercise of reasonable skill and care in performance of the agent's duties.

A duty of honest and fair dealing and good faith.

A duty to disclose all facts known to the agent materially affecting the value or desirability of the property that are not known. to, or within the diligent attention and observation of, the parties

An agent is not obligated to reveal to either party any confidential information obtained from the other party which does not involve the affirmative duties set forth above

AGENT REPRESENTING BOTH SELLER & BUYER

A real estate agent, either acting directly or through one or more associate licensees, can legally be the agent of both the Seller and the Buyer in a transaction, but only with the knowledge and consent of both the Seller and the Buyer.

In a dual agency situation, the agent has the following affirmative obligations to both the Seller and the Buyer

(a) A fiduciary duty of utmost care, integrity, honesty and loyalty in the dealings with either Seller or the Buyer (b) Other duties to the Seller and the Buyer as stated above in their respective sections.

In representing both Seller and Buyer, the agent may not, without the express permission of the respective party, disclose to the other party that the Seller will accept a price less than the listing price or that the Buyer will pay a price greater than the price offered.

The above duties of the agent in a real estate transaction do not relieve a Seller or a Buyer from the responsibility to protect their own interests. You should carefully read all agreements to assure that they adequately express your understanding of the transaction. A real estate agent is a person qualified to advise about real estate. If legal or tax advice is desired, consult a competent professional.

Throughout your real property transaction you may receive more than one disclosure form, depending upon the number of agents assisting in the transaction. The law requires each agent with whom you have more than a casual relationship to present you with this disclosure form. You should read its contents each time it is presented to you, considering the relationship between you and the real estate agent in your specific transaction

This disclosure form includes the provisions of article 2.5 (commencing with Section 2373) of Chapter 2 of Title 9 of Part 4 of Division 3 of the Civil Code set forth on the reverse hereof. Read it carefully
