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


Exhibit Curators Statement

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" represents ongoing research in SJSU Special Collections & Archives identifying documentation of Black experiences throughout SJSU history. This exhibit is the first of several installments.

Much of the information we have comes from the Spartan Daily student newspaper and the La Torre yearbooks. With too few exceptions, Black Spartans' stories are not told in their own words but from the perspectives of their majority white classmates. This is reflected in the language and focus of the articles. We invite you to read critically.

The Black Spartans featured in this exhibit pursued their educational goals while contending with institutionalized racism and other major crises of the 20th century: two World Wars, the influenza pandemic of 1918, and polio. Locally, "the deed to virtually every home in San Jose" included restrictions against Black and Asian residents known as "restrictive covenants" (Spartan Daily, February 16, 1948, page 2). On campus, blackface and minstrel shows were a regular part of student events.

Artist Statement

The "Black Spartans (1907-1948)" exhibition is a homage to Black culture and history at San José State University and the Bay Area at large. Until recently, the significance of Black bodies in Bay Area history (as well as U.S. history) was overlooked. Unless it was associated with the struggles of civil rights leaders, athletes, or celebrity-personas, the story of a graduate from a state school wasn't valued because we weren't part of the mainstream culture. As a Black Spartan myself, I was deeply connected to these individuals that started out just like me. I saw a reflection of myself and my community throughout the process of making these mixed media portraits and came to realize how important it is to know your history because it becomes a catalyst for knowing who you are.

My work explores the intricacy of identity and the role culture, tradition, and history play. These portraits are embodiments of our Black Spartans, they are visual representations of the colorful and captivating lives they led. Through this work, I hope to influence other artists and individuals to take part in researching and finding out the infinite layers of what it means to be Black. Our history is beyond our struggle. We are the blueprint.

Originally from Los Angeles, **Hal Capers** attended San Jose State College in 1943. He was a member of the track team and specialized in the broad and high jump. As a high jumper, Capers was one of only two first place winners from San Jose State during a Spring 1943 meet against U.C. Berkeley, and the sole first place high jump winner at the 1943 Stanford Invitational. At the end of Spring quarter 1943, Capers withdrew from school and returned home to Los Angeles, his reasoning being that he was bound to be drafted into World War II.

San Jose's practically untried, untested track men get their first taste of outdoor competition for the 1943 season Saturday afternoon at Angell Field in Palo Alto, and while some of the thinclads have already seen action this year-in the Olympic Club indoor meet—the April 10 outing will be the initial one for most of the boys.

The meet will be sponsored by Stanford University, and is an invitational, with entries expected from most of the nearby colleges and service teams. Originally, the Spartans were in-

SPARTAN THINCLADS TRAVEL TO BERKELEY TOMORROW FOR FIRST DUAL MEET OF SEASON WITH CAL

With their chances for a victory extremely on the "doubtful" side. San Jose's trackmen, under the direction of coach "Tiny" Hartranft, travel to Berkeley tomorrow afternoon for their first dual meet of the season against just about the toughest opponent on the west coast, namely, the University of California.

Having already bowed to the Bears in a track meet this year, although it was in a rather indirect manner, tSate will be the very far under underdog for the clash. The defeat at the hands of Cal came in the Stanford Invitational meet two weeks ago, U. C. placing first and San Jose fourth in a group of seven

A glance at the form chart on this page will show you very graphically why the Berkeley outfit is so highly favored to make the Spartan's dual debut an unsuccessful one. All the listings on this chart were made according to the best times, heights, and distances of the different contestants, and it is not hard to recognize Cal's superiority.

The twenty-nine point margin of victory for the Bears may be either too optimistic of State's chances or too much in awe by the brilliance of the city team, but in either case it is a pretty safe advantage.

The Spartans are going to have to turn on all the heat they can generate to keep from being snowed under in the track events, where the big weakness exists. As figured in the form chart, Cal is going to pick up approximately 51 points in the running contests as against about 21 for San Jose.

State's strength is in the field, where they can be expected to hold their own against the opponent, or even do a little better.

First place winners for San Jose will be few and far between, most of them in the field events. Hal Capers will probably be able to win the high jump, Cooley — if everything goes right — can win the pole vault, and Elwood Clark—who hasn't had much practice yet his season—can walk off with the javelin throw, if he can recapture some of mid-season ability.

Only two blue-ribbon boys can be seen in the track side of the picture, and they are by no means cinch winners. Ken Horn has a chance to beat Dunn, of California, who beat him by only a couple of steps at the Stanford Invitational, and if the Cal coach doesn't enter Dewey in the two-mile, Jack Breslin may be the fastest man of the day over that distance.

Litte Jimmy Johnson may be able to give a boost to the Spartans' score if he can extend his 22-foot broad jump mark a bit. Jim Jurkovich, who is doped as a winner, does just about 22 feet, and Johnson might be able to go out far enough to beat him.

The starting time for the meet is 2:00 p.m., the place is Edwards Field on the U. C. campus in Berkeley.

In the field events the margin of superiority for Stanford should be only about 10 points, with 30 points for them and 20 points for San Jose. The results of this part of the meet are likely to be more fluid than the ones in the track events, and for this reason the Spartans might show up a little better, or a little worse than figured.


Looking at the meet from the individual's standpoint, all evidence points to Bud Veregge as being the shining knight in armor for San Jose tomorrow afternoon. If everything goes right, Veregge should take first place in both hurdle races—the 120 highs and the 220 lows, and thus establish himself as the high scorer for the Gold and White in the meet.

Spartan Trackmen Wallop Fresno

RIBERA, VEREGGE, CAPERS DOUBLE VICTORS IN SAN JOSE'S FIRST TRIUMPH OF SEASON; TEN OF FIFTEEN EVENTS WON BY HARTRANFT'S LADS

Upsetting all of the dope charts, and surprising even their most ardent admirers. San Jose's trackmen jumped all over favored Fresno State in the Raisin City Saturday to score an unexpected 71 - 60 victory. Figured to lose by more than the eleven points they won by, the Spartans took undisputed first place honors in ten of the fifteen listed events, and gained a tie for the top spot in another event.

It was the first time this season that "Tiny" Hartranst's State outfit has met an opponent of its own class—judging from pre-war standards—and in scoring their first triumph of the campaign, the locals showed that they are still very much the class of their league.

Altogether, it was a very satsifactory afternoon, from the individual as well as the team

point of view. There were three two-time winners for the Spartans, Ernie Ribera in the mile and halfmile, Bud Veregge in the high and low hurdles, and Hal Capers in the high jump and broad jump.

Then these three boys teamed up with fleet Kenny Horn to score another victory for themselves in the mile relay, churning the distance in the good time of 3:29.7.

This victory for San Jose was the second in a row over the Bulldogs in dual competition. The locals have three meets remaining on their schedule with the Modesto Invitational slated for this weekend

SAN JOSE'S 'BIG FOUR' ACCOUNT FOR 41 POINTS IN VICTORY OVER FRESNO STATE'S TRACK TEAM

In San Jose's surprise track victory over Fresno State last Saturday, four of the Spartans accounted for no less than 41 of the 71 point total rung up by the team.

This "big four"—Bud Veregge, Kenny Horn, Ernie Ribera, and Hal Capers—was the main reason for San Jose's first conquest of the current campaign, winning eight of the fifteen listed events on the program.

Bud Veregge scored triumphs in both the high and low hurdle races. Horn won the 220, Ribera won the half-mile and mile, Capers won the high jump and the broad jump, and then they all four teamed together to win the relay.

Not enough credit can be given to these boys—who literally ran and jumped their hearts out to spark their mates into the victory over Fresno, but the rest of the team also merits a lot of praise for their improved showing in the meet.

Floyd Collier, Vern Cooley, Lowell Nash, Jim Johnson, Jack Breslin and the rest of the boys who made the Fresno trip are in line for some compliments, too.

They were the lads who gave their team the other 30 points necessary for the victory.

On the whole, Coach "Tiny" Hartranft has every reason to be proud of the showing his charges made. After their severe and convincing defeats at the hands of Cal and Stanford, they might have been expected to lose their drive and spirit.

But that wasn't the case at all—the team, encouraged by fiery little Ernie Ribera, was in the best all-around condition it has evidenced this year.

The times, distances, and heights turned in by the Spartans show this concretely. Kenny Horn, for instance, toured the 220 yard dash in his fastest time of the season

TRACK TEAM'S CHANCES IN MODESTO MEET HIT BY LOSS OF HAL CAPERS; RIBERA HAS COLD

Hal Capers, San Jose's ace high jumper, has withdrawn from school and returned to his home in Los Angeles. Destined to be called in the draft in the near future, he decided to drop out now instead of waiting until the end of the quarter.

His leaving is a body-blow to the chances of the Spartan track team in its remaining meets of the year, Capers being one of the best high jumpers on the west coast and a constant first-place winner for State's cindermen.

He was being counted on to give San Jose some very necessary points in the Modesto Invitational meet, which is coming up this weekend, and his departure along with Ernie Ribera's illness will put a serious crimp in the Spartans' chances for a good showing in the meet.

RIBERA WILL MISS MEET

Ribera is in the Health Cottage with a bad cold, and even if he should be dismissed from the Cottage before the week is over, his condition would not allow him to enter in the competition.

Capers and Ribera were among the scanty seven boys who were to have made the trip to Modesto for Saturday's contest—the former scheduled to participate in the high jump and relay, and the latter in the half-mile run and relay. Their inability to perform, narrows the Spartan list of entries down to five—unless Track Coach "Tiny" Hart-ranft decides to bolster the depleted ranks of his representatives at the meet.

FIVE LEFT ON ENTRY LIST

Still left on the list are Bud Veregge, who is to run both hurdle races and one lap of the relay—Kenny Horn in the 220, 440, and relay—Jim Johnson in the broad jump—Floyd Collier in the javelin and discus—and Vern Cooley in the pole vault.

All these boys will have to make the trip at their own expense, because war-time regulations will not allow the use of the school bus, and the college is not planning to pay their expenses for this particular meet.

With a meager five-man entry in the meet, San Jose will have little chance to cop the team title, because the opposing teams—St. Mary's Pre-flight, Fresno State, San Francisco's Olympic club—plus numerous unattached athletes will have an overwhelming superiority in numbers.



For the track team, 1943 was a year marked by disappointments, loss of valuable men, and valiant attempts of the remainder of the team and a new coach to carry on "as usual." Only one team victory was hung up by San Jose, a win in dual meet over Fresno State. In all the rest of their attempts, the team met with failure. Losses were handed the locals by Stanford and California, and the Spartans also had to take a back seat in the multi-team meets: the Stanford Invitational, the Fresno Relays, the Modesto Invitational, and the PAA Championships. "Tiny" Hartranft took over the mentorship reins at the start of the season when incumbent coach "Bud" Winter was called into the Navy.
