This Sidewalk Is A Priority

At the November 6 Board meeting of Leisure Village Association there were several references made to the fact that the sidewalk renovation program is almost complete. Inside Leisure Village rejoices with the Village and congratulates the Board on this accomplishment.

However, we must not rest long on these laurels. By far the busiest street in the Village, both as to vehicular and pedestrian traffic, has never had a sidewalk! This is the corridor between the Recreation Center and the Main Gate on Santa Rosa Road.

This is a very dangerous area for pedestrians, especially since most people walk in the street with traffic, instead of facing it, which is the California law, thus increasing the risk to their safety.

This year in the July issue of ILV we discussed this problem in an editorial. At the very next Board meeting, in a report from the platform, there was the assurance that steps were being taken to incorporate this sidewalk into the master plan for the beautification of the entrance and the modification of the main gatehouse.

Although the last two are frequently mentioned, we have heard no further reference to a sidewalk to be constructed there.

ILV is aware of the difficulties posed in placing a sidewalk at this location, but we believe that the potential for accidents is so great that any delay should not be tolerated.

We must not make the mistake of thinking that all the sidewalks are finished!

Ann Levey's Comments Made At The End Of Nov 6 Board Meeting

I would like to inform all the residents that in reviewing and considering the coming year's budget, the Board is not doing it blind-folded. At the present time we are gathering as much statistical data from other condominiums and planned unit developments as we can for comparison, to compare fees and to see what other developments have and pay for compared to ours.

We have to recognize that we are living in a country club atmosphere. We have all the amenities you could want. Unfortunately, many do not take advantage of the amenities, but they have to pay the assessments fees to keep up the amenities.

The only alternative, I suppose, would be to sell their homes at a marketable profit, move into another, smaller development where they are not going to pay for services and amenities which they do not want or cannot use. That's a problem. Most of us who have moved here don't like the idea of having to move again, but for those who have the advantage of these amenities, we have to pay for them.

I am completely overwhelmed by the wealth of talent of the residents here, not only the talent they have, but the talent many give us free of charge. We have committee members who sometimes put in as much as 10 hours a day on Village business without pay. If we had to pay for their services, our assessments would increase five times over. (Loud applause from audience.)

I hope all of you here are performing and contributing. You other people who contribute nothing but only criticize, I wish you would remember that you should be productive and contribute something to the well being of the Village in order to be eligible to be critical. (More applause).

A second tournament will follow, divided into sexes and classed according to averages, so be there!



Senior Legislature Focuses On Issues

The California Senior Legislature met in Sacramento in October to consider pressing senior issues. Representing Ventura County were Lee Strohbehn of Ojai, Maxine Culp of Ventura, and Joe Gaynes of Camarillo.

About 130 bills for seniors were presented and discussed. The 80 assemblymen and 40 senators finally selected 10 bills for priority attention this year by senior activists.

Topics chosen were a state health program for all, appropriation limitations on the state budget, funding for the operation of multi-purpose senior centers, amending the Gann initiative which limits governmental spending, labeling of prescription drugs with possible side effects, reform of the Medicare Catastrophic Act of 1988, legislation concerning mobile homes, liability insurance and rural alternatives for Adult Day Health Care.

The Senior Legislature also passed four bills for federal priorities: National Health Care Plan, reform of the Medicare Catastrophic Act, repeal of earned income limitations on Social Security benefits and the intra-state funding formula.

"We gave a lot during the session in terms of our time and energy," says Joe Gaynes, "but for the knowledge and experience we gained in the legislative process, I feel it was worth all the hard work. Now we have a more difficult task ahead of us, and that is to shepherd our priorities through the state legislative process and into law."







Children who have been placed in foster homes often need extra help in many areas. Abuse and neglect are frequent reasons for being placed away from their parents. As many as 600 children are cared for in Ventura County alone.

vice, it is up to us to dispose of the newspapers. The recycle center on Calle San Pablo will unload your car. They will accept newspapers, cardboard, glass and plastic bottles, and aluminum cans. Calle San Pablo is located one block west of Dawson Drive and can be reached only from Pleasant Valley Road. Turn right on Calle San Pablo and drive all the way to the end as far as is possible. The pickup is in the rear of the building marked CA Redemption Center.

We were devastated this summer to see the slaughter of the Santa Fe National Forest in New Mexico where our cabin is located. The clear cutting of the forest was as brutal as the huge fire in 1971 that burned 16,000 acres. This year upon our return from New Mexico we decided not to take the LA Times but to share it with my father in V 9 and sister in V 7. When we are urged to start the paper again we will tell them we will take it again when they use recycled paper. We must urge all newspapers to use recycled paper.

I want to leave the forests for my grandchildren to enjoy. I want to leave them a world that is clean. At the present rate of growth of the world's trash, if we don't take action, our grandchildren will live in one huge landfill. Talk to your neighbors and help with taking recyclable items to these places. Yes, we in LV can help.
