

University dedicates road system to former mayor Donald Hart

CSUB earlier this summer dedicated its front entry road system in honor of former Bakersfield Mayor Donald M. Hart.

Hart was a trustee of the California State Colleges at the time of the founding of CSUB and was board chairman in 1967/68, the year in which the first planning staff members established offices in Bakersfield.

Hart was very supportive and helpful during the early years in which the (then) college was struggling to get established and find its role in meeting the educational needs of the region, and maintained this interest over the intervening years, according to the Office of the President.

Attending the dedication were Bakersfield City Councilman Ken Peterson, Bruce Bunker, CSUB President Tomas Arciniega and several university administrators and community members.

The front entry project was used for graduation this past June and is still undergoing modifications in preparation for upcoming events in 1991-92.


Ex-Runner editors win awards

CSUB students and ex-editors for the university newspaper Danielle Elam and Charley Chiang were both recipients this summer of scholarships from the Kern Press Club.


More than \$2,700 was awarded to college and university students who are from Kern County.

They include counseling, registration assistance, and liaison with on-campus departments and off-campus agencies. 'A CRIME PREVENTION REMINDER' from Investigator Dave De Witt, University Police

With the start of the new academic year and new quarter here at Cal State, the University Police staff would like to extend a warm welcome to the new and returning students, faculty and staff. We would also like to offer a few suggestions and remind everyone of ways to protect their property.

WHEN DRIVING A MOTOR VEHICLE OR BICYCLE

- 1) Obey all traffic signs and rules.
- 2) Drive defensively and courteously at all times.
- 3) Watch out for pedestrians at all times, especially during hours of darkness.
- 4) Do not stop in roadway to visit with friends.
- 5) Obey the posted speed limits.

ON PROTECTING YOUR PROPERTY

- 1) Keep all personal property such as purses, wallets and backpacks within reach at all times, especially in the library or cafeteria.
- 2) Don't hang anything on the backs of chairs where they can be grabbed.
- 3) If you are working on campus and leave an area, lock it up so when you get back everything will be there.
- 4) When parking your car, close all windows, lock the doors, and place all valuables out of sight or in the trunk.
- 5) Don't assume anything! If you leave your textbooks or any personal property, unattended, anywhere, it is not protected.
- 6) DON'T BE VICTIMIZED! Buy a parking permit either at student registration or at the accounting office. These two areas are the only authorized locations to purchase parking permits. If any person offers to sell you a parking permit, refer them to the Department of Public Safety.
- 7) Report suspicious persons to the University Police at Ext. 2111.

VOLUNTEER FOR THE MULTI-CULTURAL/MULTI-GENERATIONAL TEAMING UP PROJECT

Students can volunteer for a special project any quarter this year that adds a new twist to the Human Corps community service experience. The Multi-Cultural/Multi-Generational Teaming Up Project will send pairs of volunteers into local schools, the homeless shelter, or a new latchkey program to tutor high-risk children. Instead of working alone, the CSUB Teaming Up partners will work together. Each Fall Quarter partnership of CSUB students will be multi-cultural, representing two different ethnic, racial or national groups. In the Winter and Spring Quarters, students could have a multi-cultural partnership or a multi-generational duo (60 Plus Club volunteers will join the project). The aim is to make volunteerism an even more rewarding experience by combining service to children with the opportunity to learn about people from different backgrounds. Students receive one unit of Psychology 396: Human Corps (upper division, credit/no credit) for thirty hours of service, participation in a workshop, keeping a journal, and answering a set of questions at the beginning and end of the quarter. 


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Soccer season kicks off with key injuries

The future is now for coach Simon Tobin and CSUB soccer.

Although it is the first tournament for CSUB this season, the Far West Classic at Chico State University this week could be a sign of things to come for Tobin and his squad.

Playing in the tournament are host Chico State University, Oregon State University and last year's Division II soccer runner-up Seattle-Pacific University. Seattle-Pacific recently defeated Cal State Fullerton and University of Nevada at Las Vegas, two top-20 Division I teams.

As much as he hates to think about it, junior goalkeeper Nathan Carey knows the going might get rough this week.

"We've got a tournament this week against very good teams. It could make or break us. We can come away 0-3 if we're not careful," he said.


Coming off of a record-setting 18-3-2 season and winning the school's first ever conference championship in soccer, CSUB will be hard pressed to repeat as conference champion this year.

Tobin has always emphasized offense, but defense, now more than ever, is his main concern. No longer can he depend on

the reliable play of sweeper Arturo Jaurequi, who anchored the CSUB defense for the last four seasons.

Senior Dave Blakey and a host of others, including 1990 California Collegiate Athletic Association MVP senior Leslie O'Connor, will be asked to fill the hole left by Jaurequi's departure.

"He [Blakey] played that position in high school, but he's never played it for us," said Tobin, who is in his fifth year as head coach. "We've made a few changes and we have to adapt a little bit to the personnel. We don't really know until after

this tournament to see if we have to make any more adjustments," he said.

The run-and-gun style employed by Tobin required constant pressure on the opposition's defense. Jaurequi's skills and dependability allowed Tobin the luxury of moving an extra player into the attacking zone without being defenseless. Without Jaurequi, the defense becomes much more vulnerable.

"We're very unusual in that we only play three defenders while most teams play four or even five," Tobin explained. "We only

play three because we're an attack-oriented team."

Unfortunately for Tobin, the two returning sweepers from last year's team, senior Brian Hall and sophomore Jeff Vaughn, are both sidelined with knee injuries. Vaughn underwent reconstructive knee surgery in the spring and will be lost for the season.

Junior Cooper Handley, who had knee surgery last season and did not play, O'Connor and Blakey will be asked to resurrect the stingy defense that gave up only 22 goals in 23 games last season.

"Our three defenders were Arturo, who's graduated, Jeff Vaughn, who just had knee reconstruction, and Brian Hall, who's also in the training room for his knee ligaments. All three are out," said Tobin. "Without them, it's a whole new defense. That's where we're going to be tested," he added.

Training in the sometimes desert-like climate twice a day for a total of six hours has taken its toll on the players' bodies. To put it into perspective, there are more injured players than there are healthy players. They are the walking wounded.

"We have a lot of injury problems right now," said Carey. "We have like 11 injured last week out of 20 players. We're not looking in that good of a shape at the moment," he commented.

Although the team was also plagued by injuries at the start of last season, Tobin had enough quality players to come off the bench. This season, however, bench strength is not nearly as strong. Gone last year's squad are mid-fielders Craig Enge, James Roberts and Edwin Smith.

"We've probably been depleted by inju-

ries this year more than any other. The biggest difference this year is I don't think we're quite as solid as a squad," Tobin explained. "Last year we had a very solid bench. We had plenty of players on the bench that could come in. I don't think we've quite got the depth we had last year," he said.

Pressure will be on the other returning starters to play more minutes and score more goals. Junior super-sniper Jeremy Gunn, who set a school record of 16 goals in a season and added 12 assists, will once again be called upon to lead the all-out attack.

The biggest goal for the team, according to Tobin, will be getting automatic bid to the play-offs by winning the conference championship. Although CSUB is the defending champions, Tobin feels Cal Poly San Luis Obispo is the team to beat this year.

"[Cal Poly] SLO has the strongest team they've ever had and they just beat Cal State LA, a Division I team, 4-0. They'll be the favorite to win the conference," he concluded.

CSUB's home season opener is this Saturday against Humboldt State University at 5 p.m. Conference play will start Oct. 2 against Chapman.

CSUB wins tourney over Division I foes

While most of people were enjoying the last days of summer vacation, the CSUB volleyball team was fine tuning for the upcoming season. CSUB travelled to Arizona to compete in the Double Tree Wildcat Classic against Division I schools, including host University of Arizona, University of Wyoming, and University of Montana.

Senior Rachel Morton was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player and senior Tami Jurgensen was voted to the All-Tournament team, but the talent isn't just with those players alone. As coach David Rubio tells it, "At one point, we had three freshmen, two sophomores, and one senior on the court, and they beat the team from University of Montana." It was no small achievement because that victory would become the deciding factor in CSUB's tournament championship. CSUB and Montana were tied with 2-1 records, but since CSUB beat Montana, the championship was awarded to CSUB. Rubio adds, "There's so much talent on the team, it's incredible."

CSUB, the third-ranked team in the nation according to the American Volleyball Coaches Association's latest poll, will open its home schedule tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. in the Activities Center against sixth-ranked UC Davis.
