CAL STATE FULLERTON

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for

five students - took place in 1960.

The University's 23,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively

pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and five certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their

regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular

admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to the campus for residences as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theatre Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which has spearheaded the

fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields,

while a third yielded two lighted softball fields.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.





ED CARROLL, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 36, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my promises is to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, Florida, West Virginia and Tulsa have signed on to host the Titans over the next few years with several other major universities currently in negotiations to play Fullerton.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980 as an assistant athletic director. From October, 1981, to April, 1982, he was acting athletic director and also acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985 for a similar post at San Jose State.

HEAD COACH JUDI GARMAN

Beginning her eighth season at Cal State Fullerton, Judi Garman has led the Titans to no less than a ninth place national finish, an NCAA National Championship and 357 career victories in her seven-year tenure. A remarkable accomplishment for the only coach in the program's history.

Garman established the program in 1980 and finished third in the conference, second in the region and ninth place nationally. Since then, Garman's teams have won every conference, 3 including the 1986 PCAA Championship, and five out of six regional championships while finishing second in the College World Series in 1981, 1983 and 1985 and third in 1982.

Garman's tremendous success at Fullerton is only the latest in a remarkable string of accomplishments which stretch across the continent from Canada to Santa Barbara to Golden West College in Huntington Beach to Cal State Fullerton.

Garman earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1966 and then moved to California where she began working on her master's degree at UCSB. While at Santa Barbara, she started club softball. Upon completion of her studies, she took the women's athletic director position at Westmont College in Santa Barbara and coached the volleyball, basketball and tennis programs in addition to softball.

Garman then moved to Golden West College where, along with softball, she coached basketball (1973-76) and cross-country (1977-79). Twenty-one of her softball players received scholarships to four-year institutions, against whom she manufactured a 34-11-2 record over the years.

Fishing and snow skiing occupy Garman's time away from the softball field. She has also been published in many physical education journals and was a pioneer in the equality of sports movement when she played Little League baseball.

ASSOCIATE COACH KATHY VAN WYK

Kathy Van Wyk begins her fifth year as the Titans associate coach after a highly successful playing career at Cal State Fullerton and Texas Women's University.

Van Wyk, 26, had a sensational one year pitching career at Fullerton after transferring from Texas Women's University when its softball program was dropped. At Fullerton, she compiled a 35-1 record with an earned run average of 0.18 and 270 strikeouts in 278 innings pitched. She was named both NCAA and AIAW All-America while receiving the Broderick Award for the nation's top softball player. Van Wyk also received an NCAA post-graduate scholarship.

At TWU, she was a member of the 1979 AIAW National Championship team and was named Texas AIAW Player of the Year. In 1980 she was nominated for the Broderick Award after compilling a 40-6 record with three perfect games. In 1981 her record was 11-9 with a 0.63 ERA in 133 innings. She is currently an All-America pitcher for the Los Angeles Diamonds.

Van Wyk was born in Holland, Michigan on July 21, 1960 and attended Holland Christian High School. She was named to the all-conference team and she played two years of volleyball and three seasons of basketball. In basketball, she was once all-city and

twice all-conference.

After coming to Fullerton, she ran her pitching record to 33-0 before losing her first game in the College World Series and was named County Athlete of the Year by the Orange County Sportswriters Association for sports other than football, basketball or baseball.



ASSISTANT COACH LINDA SHAFOR

"One of the keys to our NCAA Championship was the vast improvement in our outfield," commented Head Coach Judi Garman shortly after the Titans claimed their first title last May. Linda Shafor is directly responsible for that improvement after returning to Fullerton as a part-time coach.

Shafor coached with Garman in the latter's rookie season in 1980 and returned in time to be an integral part of the Titans' championship season.

Coach Shafor possesses a wide and varied softball background from her playing days with the Sun City Saints (1966-67) to serving as the player-coach with the Huntington Park Blues in 1970. Shafor took over as head coach at LA Harbor College in 1971 and ran the program until 1979 when the program was suspended for two years. From there, she went to the University of Arizona as an assistant for one season followed by her one year stint with the Titans in 1980.

Shafor returned to Harbor College in 1981 as the head coach when the program was reinstated. The sport was dropped last year but Shafor remains as a physical education and math professor.

Shafor is a 1966 graduate of The Ohio State University with a degree in physical education. She went on to receive her master's degree in PE at California State University. Long Beach.

TITANS SHOOT FOR SECOND STRAIGHT NCAA TITLE

The crowning achievement of any collegiate team has always been the winning of a national championship. For Cal State Fullerton's softball team it had been a long time in coming but that failed to detract from the achievement. Now that the accomplishment is behind them, the most obvious question is what have you done for me lately?

The 1987 Titans will be the target for every member of this year's opposition who feel that they have an opportunity to knock off the NCAA Champs. But despite the loss of four key seniors, the young Titans will be tough to beat.

Pitching is still the name of the game in softball, despite a new rule that moves the circle three feet back. In 1986, there were not very many that were better than **CONNIE CLARK**. Despite missing one-third of the season due to a back injury, the All-America candidate posted a 20-2 record with a collegiate low 0.18 ERA. As a junior last season, she became a star at the College World Series after pitching a no-hitter against Texas A & M and failing to allow a single run in the tournament.

"Connie is definitely one of the nation's premier pitchers," notes Head Coach Judi Garman. "We feel very secure with her on the mound this year but I am also confident in the abilities of the two new kids we have brought in."

Clark will be joined in the pitching rotation this year by two freshmen. **JANIS OKERLUND** and **CHRIS GAGE** will fill out the rotation spot left by the graduation of two-time All-America and Broderick Award recipient Susan LeFebvre.

The other half of the battery is set with the return of senior catcher MICHELLE GROMACKI. The ever improving backstop has developed into a strong candidate for post-season honors after batting .200 with four triples last year. Backing up Gromacki will be JC transfer DEBBIE SCHNEIDER.

Graduation cost Fullerton two of the best infielders in the country. 1985 All-America third-baseman JoAnn Ferrieri and All-PCAA first baseman Robin Goodin will be sorely missed. But Garman feels very strongly about their replacements. JC transfer CATHI HALL, who has been starting on the basketball team most recently, is a very powerful left-handed hitter who should give the Titans plenty of extra base hits at first base. Third base should be filled by either

three-year veteran LISA BAKER, who sat out last season, or JC transfer VALERIE DOUGLAS. Baker is another fine hitter as she hit .262 with a team high 18 doubles in 1985.

The middle infield is set for at least two more years. Second baseman VALERIE VAN KIRK developed into one of the finest defensive players in the country and earned All-PCAA (Honorable Mention) honors last year. She enters her junior year after missing only seven games in two years. Sophomore shortstop CHARIS MONROE was an outstanding addition to last year's team after stepping in to a critical position and doing an outstanding job with great defense and a .271 batting average. Valuable utility infielder CHERYL DAZALLA can fill in anywhere including the outfield.

Three returning starters, including a 1986 All-America, give Fullerton one of the nation's finest outfields. Left fielder CHENITA ROGERS returns for her senior season after an All-America campaign in which she totaled a conference high .330 batting average. Rogers also is recognized as the fastest player in collegiate softball after setting a Fullerton single season stolen base record with 14. Center field should be held down by junior RINA FOSTER, another Titan who earned All-College World Series honors last year. The hustling outfielder hit .333 in the tournament and scored the winning run against Texas A & M in the championship game. Incumbent right fielder ALANI SILVA should be heading for an All-America season after batting .253 with 10 doubles and 22 RBI's. Several newcomers should see action including heralded freshmen CAREY HESS, MICH DeBREE, MELISSA COOMBES and KRISTINE GLOMBOSKE. Senior YVONNE SOLIS and sophomore KRISTIN GOODALL will also add experience to the position.

At last May's College World Series in Omaha, the Titans motto was "The goal of some was just to get here, our goal is to win here." Fullerton did just that as it swept the tournament in five straight games to pick up their first national title.

The 1987 Titans possess the ability to do it all again with a fine balance of established veterans and young talent, very similar to last year's squad. One Fullerton coach commented in fall practice that "we are definitely a more talented team than last year but the team's success will be based on how well they all come together."


Centerfield 5-4 Junior Las Vegas, NV

The most prestigious award given to a collegiate female athlete, the Broderick Award, honors the top athlete from the top ten women's sports in the nation. Cal State Fullerton captured their second softball award this past January when pitcher Susan LeFebvre was given the coveted plate.

The two-time All-America posted an outstanding senior campaign with a record of 31-6 and an earned run average of 0.27. In four years with the Titans, the Bellflower native eclipsed nearly every Titan career pitching record.

As well as earning first-time All-America in 1986, LeFebvre was named All-NCAA West Region and All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association. As a freshman, LeFebvre earned second-team All-America honors as well as being named to the 1983 College World Series All-Tournament team.

The award was presented at the US Grant Hotel in San Diego during the week of the NCAA Convention.

1986 COLLEGE WORLD SERIES: TITANS BRING IT HOME

Game I - Fullerton travels 1,500 miles to Omaha, Nebraska to play a school that sits 25 miles away from the Titan campus. Cal State Long Beach, who had split with the Titans in their four regular season meetings, came into the CWS on top of the world after sweeping Fresno State in the NCAA North Regionals and finishing behind Fullerton in second place in the PCAA. The game proved to be the toughest of the series for CSF. Connie Clark and CSULB star Sandy Winchester squared off in a pitchers duel that lasted until the top of the ninth. Alani Silva led off the inning with a double to left center and Goodin sacrifices her to third. Rina Foster drills a single up the middle to score the winning run.

GAME II - At-Large regional champs California is Fullerton's second opponent at the Seymour Smith Softball Complex. The Titans send All-American Susan LeFebvre against Cal's Erin Cassidy. Fullerton got on the scoreboard a little earlier than the previous evening when Robin Goodin scored on a wild pitch in the top of the third after she had doubled. The damn burst on Cassidy in the fourth when Titans got two more to close out the scoring. LeFebvre allows one hit in shutting out the Bears.

GAME III - One of softball's top rivalries came together in game three with the Titans versus former NCAA Champ Texas A & M. Fullerton scored the game winning run in the third when Michelle Gromacki scored from third on an infield single by Chenita Rogers. The Titans got two more off of Julie Carpenter in the fifth. Rogers and Charis Monroe pick up RBl's driving in Goodin and Gromacki respectively. But the star of the night is All-College World Series bound Connie Clark who no-hits the Aggies, her second Texas A & M no-hitter of the season, while striking out seven. The Titans are 3-0.

FINAL SCORE: CS Fullerton 3 Texas A & M 0

GAME IV - Riding a streak, the Titans face Indiana in one semi-final game. The game pits a battle of All-America pitchers, LeFebvre versus Indy's Amy Unterbrink. And for the first and only time in the series, the Titans are scored on. The Hoosiers' Karleen Moore scores on a sacrifice fly by Tammy Connor and the Titans are down 1-0 after the first. In the second, a Fullerton foul ball breaks the plexiglass behind home plate and the game is delayed for a few minutes. With an opportunity to regroup a little, the Titans come back strong. Terri Oberg triples to lead off the second and scores on a JoAnn Ferrieri ground out. The game remains tied until the eighth when Gromacki leads off with a triple. Rogers bunts an infield single and goes to second on a throwing error. Gromacki scores on the error. Rogers is sacrificed to third and scores on an Silva single.

FINAL SCORE: CS Fullerton 3 Indiana 1

GAME V - This was not an unfamiliar spot for the Titans. The program has three second place finishes to its credit but today the Titans were not going to be denied. Fullerton sent Connie Clark against Aggie ace Shawn Andaya. The game remained scoreless until the fifth when Rina Foster tripled. She came home with the winning run on fielder's choice as she slid under the tag. The Titans get single runs in the sixth and seventh while Clark allows just one hit. The Titans tie a CWS record by going undefeated in the tournament and in doing so pick up their first NCAA Championship.


