An Open House/Modular Celebration took place on June 6th to welcome Modular residents to their new quarters. Interim Provost Lela Noble read the following statement regarding the history of the Chicano Library at that event.

"The Chicano Resource Center arose out of planning efforts in 1979 and early 1980 that involved faculty from the Mexican American Studies Department, the College of Social Work, the bilingual program in the College of Education, and the Library, as well as a student from the College of Education. Dedicated in November 1982, the Chicano Resource Center has provided a single locus for books, periodicals, reference tools, pamphlets and clippings relating to Mexican-American history, culture, and community. In addition, the Center serves as a community center. Since its inception, Librarian Jeff Paul has served both as the coordinator for the Center and the librarian for the Mexican-American Studies Department. The University appreciates his long, valuable service in these roles."


