## Korean students get taste of American life

Students from Bucheon, South Korea, are learning about the American culture at CSUB.

Language, writing and national holidays are among some of the things that these children are learning and practicing during their stay here in the States.

There are thirty-four students, ages from 13-16 who are involved in the program at CSUB.

The students are currently staying with local families.

A month may not be enough time to learn about the American culture, but CSUB is hoping the children will have learned enough to encourage them to come back and enroll for a college education here. Susan Michaud is the Academic Coordinator of the program.

The children begin every morning with a two-hour orientation of language, speaking and writing skills at the Intensive English Language Center.

They have practiced the language by interviewing CSUB faculty, students and workers.

The students have also been taught how to use American money.

The children learned about survival skills, a term Michaud used to

## Volunteers needed

The California State University, Bakersfield School of Natural Science and Mathematics is seeking volunteers for the 16th annual Kern County Regional Science Bowl. The Science Bowl will be held at CSUB on Saturday, Feb. 9, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. This marks the ninth consecutive year the Science Bowl has been hosted by CSUB.

The event features 32 five-member teams from 15 Kern County high schools competing in a fast-paced, question-answer quiz format that covers physics, biology, chemistry, math, earth science, computer science and astronomy.

Matches consist of two eight-minute halves. Each match will have four officials in the room: a moderator, who will read the questions, rules judge, timekeeper and scorekeeper.

The top two teams advance to the finals and compete in a double-elimination round, with the winner advancing to the National Science Bowl sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy, which is held in Washington, D.C., May 1-6.

Thomas Meyer, physics and

computer science professor and Science Bowl coordinator, is looking for volunteers to help run the event and for local businesses that are interested in donating prizes for the students. All officials must attend a training session before the competition where they will be trained for the various positions and given the competition rules. All the volunteers will be provided a T-shirt, morning snack, and lunch, courtesy of event sponsors.

“The previous events were a great success because of the many campus and community volunteers and supporters,” Meyer said. “In return for their efforts, volunteers will get to watch Kern County’s top science students compete.”

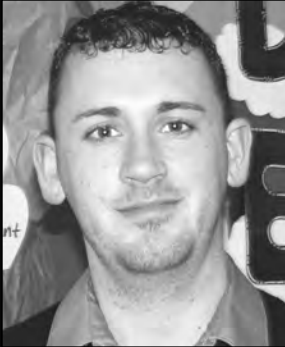


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# Runners fall short to Titans

Last Saturday night, Cal State Fullerton's Toni Thomas led the Titans with 21 points over the women's basketball team in a 77-75 thriller.

After a 94-78 rout over Utah Valley where they seemingly made everything they threw toward the rim, the Runners struggled from the field in their first after a three game winning streak and the first of their four-game home stand.

The Runners went into Saturday's game shooting better than 36 percent from the three-point arch, but missed all four attempts in the first half and it took six more attempts for their first three-pointer to fall through the net. They finished the game having shot just over 21 percent behind the arch.

The Titans also had a terrible shooting half behind the arch in the first, but made 6-11 in the second half.

Despite their shooting woes, the Runners were still able to open up a 13-point lead with 6:25 left to play in the first half and ended the half with a 10-point lead.

Junior guard Kelly Tarver had 11 points, 3 rebounds and 2 assists going into the half, spending most of the Runners offensive possessions on the lower block taking advantage of smaller defenders.

The Runners also went to the line 16 times and made 14 of them in the first half.

The second half was a completely different story. The Runners extended their lead to 14 with 17:15 left to play in the first. The lead was down to one

just four minutes later and the Titans had their first lead of the half with 11:10 left to play in the half.

The game's momentum started to shift when Runner forward Naomi Johnson got in foul trouble. With 19:05 left to play in the second half, Johnson picked up her first foul of the game. Five minutes and 19 seconds later, Johnson picked up her fourth foul. Obviously frustrated because of three calls against her in less than a minute, Johnson picked up a technical foul immediately after her fourth forcing her to the bench for the remainder of the game.

"It was just a bit frustrating, the way the game was being called and that obviously resulted in a couple of technicals," said head coach Tim La Kose who also picked up a technical foul after a Lyndsey Grove three-pointer. La Kose and fans alike felt like Grove traveled before she hit the

play, guard Krista Arase drove to the basket to tie the game back up after a pair of Thomas free throws.

"I knew we needed a basket so I just drove to the basket. They gave me the lane so I took it," said Arase.

At the other end of the floor Thomas would go on to make what would be the game winning lay-up with nine seconds left to play. The Runners had an opportunity to tie the game in the final seconds but a tough turn around jumper by Tarver fell short.

"Nobody ever likes to lose, especially when you're playing against these teams and you're up by a lot in the second half," said Kepenekian. "We should have closed this team out. We just have to learn from it and move on."

On Saturday, February 9 the Runners will play UC Riverside in the Icardo Center at 7 pm.

With 1:29 Christine Kepenekian hit a big three-pointer to tie the game and with 36 seconds left to

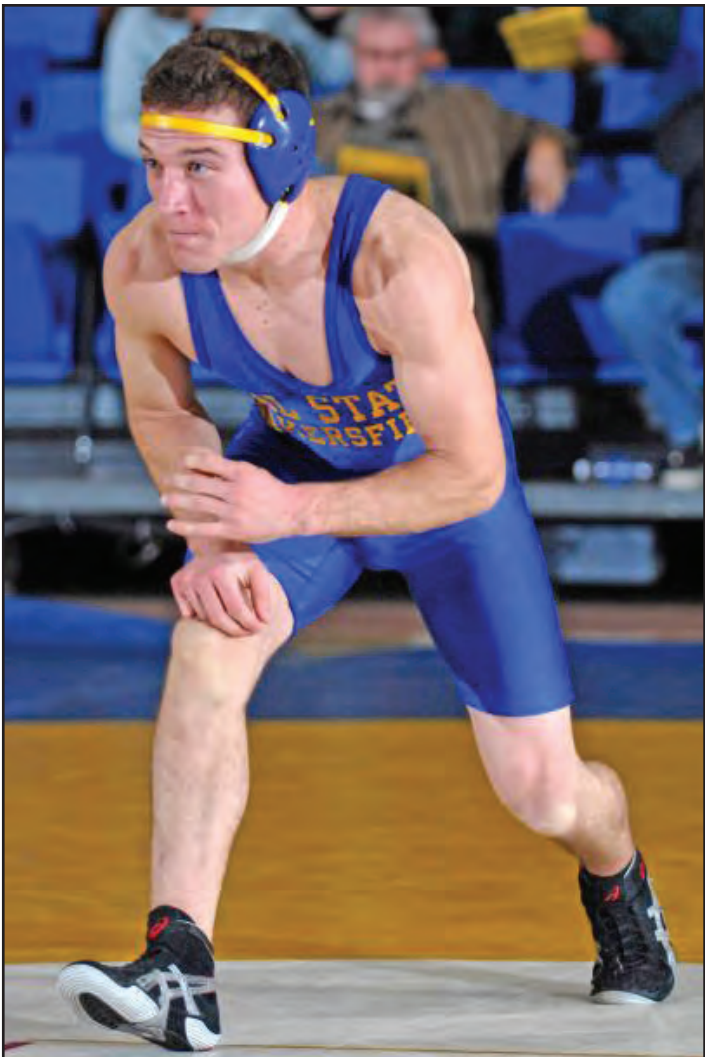
# Doyle earns Dr. Northrup Award

Veronica Campbell rounded out

the winners of the day with a time of 1:08 in the 100 yard Breaststroke.

Filip Zemier, Justin Burdine, Luka Leskur and Rene Hjorth all made up the team that finished the 200-yard freestyle with a first place time of 1:26

The Lady Roadrunners will now break for a month in order to prepare for the Conference USA Championships, which will be Feb 27- March 1 in Houston, Tex.

# One comeback not enough at Portland

PORTLAND, Ore. - The CSUB men's basketball team made one big rally, but couldn't finish a second, as the University of Portland pulled away late for a 73-63 win Friday night at the Chiles Center in Portland.

CSUB (7-14 overall) used a 15-2 run in the first half to turn an eight-point deficit into a 29-24 lead. Trailing 59-45 midway through the second half, the Roadrunners embarked on a 13-3 run that got them to within 62-58 with 3:39 to play before Portland managed to ease away for the

win.

Senior forward Demarcus Hall registered game-highs of 20 points and nine rebounds to lead CSUB while Trent Blakley chipped in 11 points and six boards. The forward tandem combined to shoot 10-of-15 from the field in the first half as the efficient Roadrunner offense made an effort to pound the ball inside.

When the second half began, however, the Roadrunners went away from their effective inside game as the guards settled for quick shots, mostly from the perimeter. While freshman point

guard Alex Johnson, poured in 11 second-half points on 4-of-6 shooting, the rest of the CSUB backcourt went 3-of-18 from the field in the second half.

Portland took full advantage of the ensuing CSUB dry spell, building its lead to 11 points early in the half and forcing the Roadrunners to play catch up for the duration.

Kramer Knutson and Taishi Ito led a balanced Portland offense with 11 points apiece. Robin Smeulders added 10 points and eight rebounds for the Pilots, who improved to 7-13 with the win.
