pecially by one member of the faculty, who quite distinguished himself in that line.

At five o'clock, our host called us to another part of the grounds where bountifully spread tables awaited us; on each plate being a dainty souvenir and a spray of flowers. Toasts appropriate to the occasion were given and responded to, and a very pleasant hour was spent. Soon after ten o'clock, all took their departure, feeling, as someone expressed it, that, "It pays to be a Senior A, doesn't it?"

AST, but by no means least among the prominent educators who have lately visited us, is General S. C. Armstrong, who recently spent the morning with us, and gave us a most interesting talk about the work he is doing in his school at Hampton. He first spoke of slavery and though looking upon it as a great evil, does not hesitate to say that it did more to civilize and educate the black race than all the missionary work that has ever been done. Had it not been for slavery in America, the negro of to-day, Christianized, educated, and continually advancing toward a higher type of being, would be in the same degraded condition as his African brother.

In the school at Hampton, there are, at present, about five hundred negro and Indian students, three hundred of whom are boys and two hundred, girls. The great majority of these pupils enter the school with little, if any money, and work out all expenses during the five year's course, without, at any time, accepting aid from charity. Industrial education is a prominent feature in the work of the school, and the pupils, when graduated, seldom have difficulty in finding plenty of work in whatever trade they are most skilled. Many of the graduates have returned to their people and founded schools where the same kind of work is done as at Hampton.

All in all, the school is a great success and the pupils, anxious to improve themselves, are not afraid to work, and work hard, to attain the desired end. General Armstrong is evidently an earnest believer in work, one of his expressions being, "Labor, next to the Grace of God, is the most important moral factor in civilization."
