

We accepted the challenge and voluntarily offered to return any profit (remaining after expenses) to the Recreation Department Special Events Fund. We intend to have the latter Musicians back for an encore. From these dances, a substantial sum was presented to the Recreation Department Fund. We were very happy with the results of our management of these band dances.


# The Leisure Village Gem and Mineral Club

"Blue Skies" sung by Mimi Kaufman introduced a funny episode portraying the "Lazy Crew" with Irv Leeds rendering a parody of "Lazy Bones". Berated, they hurriedly flee the stage with "Hi Ho, Off to Work We Go", when threatened. A motley crew indeed! The Barbershop Quartet effectively added a bit of harmony.

A highlight was the polished Happy Hoofers, in spectacular royal blue costumes, trimmed with fringes and glitter, in perfect precision tapping to "My Blue Heaven" and "Mollie and Me". A memorable presentation by the group who have unbelievable rhythm, figures, beauty and charm. Fantastic!

"You Made Me Love You" by charming Ruth Hart, led the Hi-Steppers tapping away to "A Train", followed by the Guild Singers, in formal gowns, taking you "Over the Rainbow" to "Young at Heart". What a feeling!

We soon find ourselves in a slim and trim Ballet class led by gifted Heidi Pommer with her slim, graceful, beautiful chicks in bright leotards, Heidi proclaiming the virtues of living in Leisure Village and staying "Young at Heart". Visitors come upon the scene viewing such joie de vivre in a Retirement Village with Grace Black singing "Alley Cat" and going into the dance steps with the Ballerina, with Murry Hertzberg, her escort, defiantly singing "I Won't Grow Old".

Pianists Artie Mae Beech, Freda Drezner, Bea Fallick and Pauline Shenkman as piano accompanists effectively played their parts.

This was a "Hit Parade" and truly a professional performance allowing the Guild to expand to a more ambitious horizon in planning a presentation of "Show Boat", with auditions and casting to be done in January.

With applause and curtain calls reserved for memory, a Cast Party was held, elegant Buffet handled by Mimi Chuntz with the Pièce de Résistance being the writers hamming it up, and a Heart of Gold presented to Joan Johnson for her strong and capable leadership.


Guess we better have this affair outdoors, he might put a hole thru the Assembly Room wall!


