

Recycling Begins In L.V.

The Leisure Village recycling program was launched during February. Handbills were distributed at all gates and at the Recreation and administration offices, giving pertinent details on home pick-up.

Besides the noteworthy goal of conserving our national resources, recycling programs have a second large aim. Landfill space is scarce and precious, so the Californa State Legislature passed a law in 1989 mandating that cities initiate recycling and waste reduction programs; cities must reduce the amount of waste they generate 25% by the year 1995, and 50% by the year 2000, or heavy fines can result.

For some time a handful of dedicated citizens in Leisure Village have been loading their cars with recyclables and then driving several miles to turn in the materials. Other residents had good intentions, but did not follow through. The City of Camarillo is instituting a recycling program which will take several months to phase in. The Leisure Village program is in place and operating NOW.

After several months of negotiations, the Village Board and General Manager Bob Cullati reached an agreement with Harrison & Sons, who already collect the usual Village trash on a weekly basis. Harrison will collect Village recyclables in special trucks, with convenient home pick-up occurring on alternate weeks, and separate from the regular trash days.

Are You Guilty Of Apathy?

Are you guilty?

What is happening in LV? Is our population losing interest in what is going on in the Village? In health, education or welfare?

Your Neighbors Care Group has operated for almost 15 years for the overall welfare of LV residents---be the need health, health education, or just neighbor helping neighbor. In the past few years it has become more difficult to perform our duties.

In January only 15 residents---out of approximately 3800---showed up for our monthly lecture. A while back we would take the blood pressure of 150-175 persons at our monthly clinic. The last few months the numbers are down to 35.

It takes about 20 LV volunteers to run the clinic--and 35 LV residents show up; that's ridiculous! For a lecture we arrange months ahead for our guest speakers, have the AR set up--- and 15 people show up. Our time and the lecturer's time can be spent more productively elsewhere!

The YNCG telephone girls now have to call as many as 12 neighbors to get someone to take a fellow neighbor to a doctor. It wasn't that way a few years ago. Aren't we interested in helping a neighbor anymore? You may be the next one needing help!

Are our lectures no longer interesting or educational? Is everyone's blood presssure normal now? Or is it that you just don't care what it is?

We get no response to the TV program "There Is a Doctor in the House," shown on our Channel 12. We take a doctor away from his busy schedule to produce this. We have to use Channel 12's camera and lighting crew to tape it, someone prepares the questions to ask. Is it worth it? Should we continue the program? Has YNCG outlived its usefulness in LV? All this is YNCG's problem, but the story doesn't end here.

Our LVA Board of directors has trouble getting an audience at its meetings; can't get volunteers to run for the Board or for the various committees to operate the Village. Your volunteering is necessary in order to keep our monthly fees down, keep our property values up and to give YOU a beautiful place to live.

The Current Issues Forum also takes a tremendous amount of work to produce and their attendance is down. The Channel 12 group performs a great service for LV, but how many of you watch it, or ever tell them what a fine job they do?

The editorial staff of Inside Leisure Village newspaper has worked for over 12 years producing a professional, informative paper that is a real asset to LV. How many of you have written a letter to the editor or stood up at the Board meeting to thank these hard working people? They aren't even an official organization of the LVA, but they perform a great service for the village.

We can go on---but should we? WHAT HAS HAPPENED IN LV?

Half the Village will be serviced one Friday, the second half the next Friday.

Village residents do not need a collection of special containers to store and then move to the curb on their recycling Friday. All glass, plastics and metals may be put out in ONE container---plastic or paper bags from the market are fine---and Harrison will do the sorting later. Also flattened cardboard and bagged newspapers may be put out, each in a separate bag.

The volume of low value materials such as newspapers, non-redemption glass and plastic is much greater than the "paying" materials, but in order to attain the greater goal of total waste reduction evervone must recycle materials of all values

Those residents who wish to continue hauling their recyclables to a redemption center can still do so, in order to collect small amounts of cash paid for certain glass and aluminium. However, most residents will figure that the time, effort and gasoline of the trips are not worth the bother.

Home pick-up of recyclables is a welcomed convenience to everyone concerned about our environment. So consult the information on the recycle date for your Village, available in the February Village Voice, received in the mail just this week, and join in the easy method to help save our environment.

Fridays are recycle days here in Leisure Village.

Her prayer was very simple As she stood beneath the sky-Her thoughts beyond the mountain tops, On soft clouds moving by.


Each tear mingled with a sob, And whispered words were soft-While hopes moved ever higher, Bringing all her prayers aloft.


