## Hye Sharzhoom, Fresno Student Paper, Reaches 15th Year

Armenocide: Crime

FRESNO, CA - Whoever said the Armenian spirit is dying among the new gen-eration Armenians must not have known about **Hye Sharzhoom**.

For 15 years Hye Sharzhoom has been the voice of Armenian students at CSUF, expressing their interests and concerns to Armenian communities around the world. Since the academic year of 1978\79, Hye Sharzhoom has been the only continuously published Armenian student-operated newspaper on any campus in the U.S., with a mailing list of more than 4,000 names from every corner of the world.

"This mission was to teach the students how to own and run a newspaper. The paper provided both a vehicle of expression for Armenian students at Fresno State, and an instrument for developing communication skills. Hye Sharzhoom was theirs. They could make it flourish or they could let it die. Today it is still alive and still lively and still produced by CSUF students," wrote Dr. Dickran Kouymjian in a 1988 Hye Sharzhoom article entitled "Hye Sharzhoom -- A Decade Later."

The first issue's editors, Mark Malkasian and Mark Najarian, produced the four-page issue with a front-page article entitled "Armenocide: Crime Against Humanity."

Throughout the first few years of the paper, students wrote about various topics such as "Black Studies Prof. Sees Tie Between Hyes and Blacks," "Assimilation: Will Hyes Fall in the 'Melting Pot'?" and "Intermarriage in the Armenian Community."

In 1981 the paper doubled in size to 16 pages with a four-page section dedicated to a man whose writings have made Fresno famous throughout the world. The section was headlined "Impressions of William Saroyan."

During these 15 years, Hye Sharzhoom has received feed back through letters to the editor sent from countries such as Canada, Hungary, France, Poland, Spain, and even from our mother country...Armenia.

Although Hye Sharzhoom receives donations toward mailing costs, the paper has always relied on the Armenian Studies

Program to pay for more than half the expenses for a mailing list which once reached a high of 9,000 names.

Today the paper's mailing list is revised, yet the paper is still dedicated to educating and entertaining more than 4,000 readers with opinions and the skills of Armenian students at Fresno State.

As Dr. Kouymjian wrote five years ago... "Will the paper last another decade? Who knows?" We the editors and staff of Hye Sharzhoom 1993\94 are determined to produce a positive answer.

## ARMENIAN STUDIES PROGRAM IN FRESNO CSU, ANNUAL FUND DRIVE

Dear Friend

Last year with the help of the Advisory Board, we initiated the first Armenian Studies Program Annual Fund Drive. Which was a remarkable success.

The contributions enabled the Armenian Studies Program to maintain a second full-time professor during an academic year of faculty lay-offs, and to pay for office expenses (telephone, postage, including the mailing of Hye Sharzhoom), to buy a new computer used in type-setting and layout, to support our student assistants, to sponsor the Armenian Lecture Series, and to help our Yerevan exchange program.

The donations also allowed us to hire a part-time secretary, the Program's first since its inception in 1977. This has made a significant difference in the day to day operations of the Program and the Kalfayan Center during the University's most severe financial crisis.

The Program has grown dramatically since the last fund drive. In the spring semester we had 125, and this Fall we are teaching 170 students. More than ever we need to have the right support staff and proper funding to continue instruction at this level.

The Armenian Studies Program Annual Fund for 1994 will go toward:

- \*hiring a full-time secretary,
- \*most office expenses,
- \*library acquisitions,
- \*the Index of Armenian Art, a Program-sponsored research tool,

\*expansion of the exchange program with Yerevan State University.

In order to meet the needs of the Armenian Studies Program, we have set this year's Fund goal at \$31,500. Please renew your commitment to assure the academic excellence of the Armenian

### "The Art of Armenia"

"The Arts of Armenia" is the title of the most recent book by Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, who holds the Haig & Isabel Berverian Endowed Chair in Armenian Studies at California State University, Fresno. More than a decade in preparation, the volume was commissioned and published by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation of Lisbon, Portugal as a handbook in the arts to be used by teachers and in Armenian schools and colleges.

In addition to a text of 90 large format pages, the study is accompanied by 300 original color slides illustrating the history of Armenian art and the diverse media through which it was expressed. The photographs were taken by the world famous Armenian photographer of Istanbul-Ara Guler, and Professor Kouym-

jian, with additional views by Patrick Donabedian, French cultural Attache in Armenia, Claude Mutafian of Paris, and Photo Garo of Jerusalem.

After a general introduction on Armenian art, the book is divided into seven chapters: I Architecture, II, Manuscript Painting, III, Sculpture, IV. Painting in Media: Frescoes, Mosaics, and Ceramics, V, Metalwork and Engraving, VI, Textiles, and VII Music & the Art of the Book. Three Armenian scholars were invited by Dr. Kouymjian to participate with essays on "Coins" by the late Khatchig Musheghyan, "Musical Notations and Instruments" by Robert Atayan, and "Early Printing and Graphic Art" by Ninel Voskan-

Because the Gulbenkian Foun-

dation wished to produce a guide in simple yet intelligent language, the text explains terms as they are introduced and always assumes that the reader is new to art history and to Armenian art. An extensive bibliography provides resources for a more profound study of any of the different domains of Armenian art.

The entire project was completed with the dedicated work of Zaven Yegavian, Director of the Department of Armenian Affairs of the Gulbenkian Foundation, and before him by the late Vahram Mavian. The Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation will be distributing the volume with its 300 slides to Armenian schools throughout the world.

## Spring 1994 Courses in Armenian Studies

FRESNO – A full and varied schedule of courses in Armenian Studies is being offered by the Armenian Studies Program of California State University, Fresno for the Spring 1994 semester.

Three sections of "Introduction to Armenian Studies" are being offered. The courses deal with a first look for the student at the discipline of Armenian Studies with an emphasis on current events and culture. The Armenian community of the San Joaquin Valley is examined as one of the first Armenian communities in the United States.

## A Useful Armenian Dictionary in Transliteration

Armenian Dictionary in Transliteration. By Thomas J. Samuelian, Armenian National Education Committee. New York. 1993. 139 pp.

The Armenian Dictionary Transliteration by Thomas J. Samuelian is an ambitious undertaking. It is ambitious because the compilation of a dictionary is an arduous task, requiring a firm grasp of the subtleties of both Armenian and English. A dictionary of transliteration will probably be a new phenomenon for speakers of Armenian whose native language is English. Its aim, as articulated by the author in the preface, is to provide both a dictionary in transliteration for Armenian speakers unfamiliar with Armenian script, and a speller's dictionary - that is, to provide an easily accessible work which enables an Armenian speaker who can pronounce a word in Armenian, to be also able to spell it.

Samuelian has chosen to utilize the Western dialect of modern Armenian, since it is the dialect most familiar to Armenians living in America. The 139 page dictionary has three sections: An English-Armenian Dictionary, an Armenian-English Dictionary, and a Phrasebook.

The first section, the English-Armenian Dictionary, is comprised of the entry in English in bold text, followed by its Armenian translation in English transliteration, and then the entry in Armenian. At the bottom of each page, a brief pronunciation guide is provided for non-native speakers, with special emphasis on pronunciation of vowels. A more complete transliteration table is provided at the beginning of the book. Grammatical usage notes accompany each entry, explaining the grammatical case which should be used with the entry, which makes the dictionary particularly useful for

Section two, the Armenian-English Dictionary, is composed of the Armenian entry in English transliteration in bold text, followed by the Armenian entry, and then the English transliteration. The value of this section is in its usefulness as a spelling guide. For the many Armenians who can speak the language but can only write it fairly well, the Armenian word can be found by its pronunciation, and then the correct spelling can be found. The problems of spelling, commonly encountered in modern Western Armenian (e.g. p/p' or k/k'), are clarified in this section.

The third section is a phrasebook, filled with greetings, words and phrases for simple conversation, numbers, time, familial terms, and activities. The entries are arranged according to Armenian, English transliteration in bold, and then English translation. This section is especially useful for the novice and gives one a familiarity with the language.

The over 4,000 entries included in the dictionary provide a basic lexicon for conversation. An added plus is the Armenian script used for the book, which, created by the author, is clear and easy to read.

Armenian Dictionary The Transliteration is a welcome sequel to Samuelian's earlier two-volume Course in Modern Western Armenian. The Dictionary fulfills the two-fold promise "... That it will restore the rich linguistic legacy of the Armenian language to some of its heirs, and the other is that many who have been put off by its inscrutable signs will one day venture to explore this wonderful language in its native garb." The Dictionary is ideally suited for speakers of Armenian at any level. Armenian speakers and those learning the language will find it to be a constant and indispensable companion. \*

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

### Teach for Armenia Program Open to Applicants for Fall 1994 and Spring 1995 Semesters

FRESNO, CA - Applications are now being accepted for the second year of the Teach for Armenia program. The Teach for Armenia program, which is administered by the Armenian Studies Program of California State University, Fresno, has been designed to facilitate Armenia's development as a technologically advanced, democratic society. The new generation of leaders in Armenia has been quick to recognize that the country's fate rests with its ability to actively participate in the information revolution sweeping over the planet. To achieve the goals set by Armenia's leadership, Armenia needs to enter the global community of knowledge as quickly as possible.

Among the chief objectives of the Teach for Armenia program are the following:

- 1) Expose students and scholars in Armenia to American research methods and techniques;
- 2) Introduce American-style teaching methods and curricula into the Armenian educational
- 3) Raise the level of Englishlanguage instruction in Arme-
- 4) Acquaint American participants with the problems and potential of Armenia.

Teach for Armenia is open to Americans holding at least a bachelor of arts degree or equivalent. Up to ten applicants per year for the first two years will be accepted for placement in Armenia. The Armenian Studies Program will select candidates based on their qualifications and experience. The most suitable applicants will be interviewed by Program faculty.

their Depending on backgound, participants in the program will be placed in one of three educational settings:

- 1. Participants with background in education will serve as instructors in their respective subject areas at one of the English-language schools within Yerevan, or at a school where students receive intensive instruction in English.
- 2. Participants with training and/or experience in the teaching of English, particularly English as a second language, will teach English at Yerevan State University, the State Engineering Institute, or the Pedagogical Institute.
- 3. Paticipants not fitting into the above categories will serve as English-lanuage instructors in their specialties at Yerevan State University or the State Engineering Institute. They will work with college-aged students seeking to strengthen their English-language skills and gain a broader understanding of their field In conjunction with their taching duties, participants will also assist Armenian graduate students and scholars in editing academic articles for publication in English-language journals. Under the auspices of the Ministry of Education of the Republic of Armenia and the Ministry of Higher Education and Science of the Republic of Armenia. Americans will receive a salary comparable to their Armenian counterparts. While serving in the Teach for Armenia program, participants will be housed in Yerevan and receive

free health care. American participants may serve one or two academic semesters. Service for longer periods may be arranged with educational officials in Armenia.

In the past three years, as Armenia has moved toward democracy and independence, a handful of Americans have shared their teaching skills with schools in Armenia. Both as educators and as models of American standards, their expertise has been highly valued. Armenian educational officials have reported that teachers and professors, as well as students, have benefitted from the interaction. With Armenia seeking to greatly expand ties to the West, interest in involving university-educated Americans in the country's development has dramatically grown.

Teach for Armenia represents the first concerted effort to facilitate the placement and preparation of American teaching candidates in Armenia. The program is supported by the Ministry of Education of the Republic of Armenia, the Ministry of Higher Education and Science of the Republic of Armenia, and the Armenian Studies Program of California State University, Fresno.

## Student from Yerevan Studies at CSU

FRESNO — For 26 year-old Yerevan lawyer Artak Darbinian, the fall 1993 semester at California State University, Fresno was a busy and productive one. Darbinian, a graduate of the law program at Yerevan State University, enrolled in two business courses, Business and the Legal Environment and the Law of Business Organizations and two Armenian Studies Program classes, Introduction to Armenian Studies and Armenian Architecture.

In the Spring 1994 semester he has enrolled in Business and Society and Real Estate Law and two more Armenian Studies courses, Armenian Painting and William Saroyan. Darbinian's main area of interest is in real estate law especially relating to the privatization of housing in Armenia.

In addition to his class schedule, Darbinian has found the time to become an active member of the Armenian Students Organization on campus, and a staff member of the *Hye Sharzhoom* newspaper, where he is in charge of circulation and is a writer for the Armenian page.







# **New Book Describes Three Generations of Armenians**

Rise the Euphrates. By Carol Edgarian. Random House, 416 pp. \$22.00. Publishing date, April 1994.

Carol Edgarian's tale of a displaced victim of the Armenian Genocide and the impact of her experience on her daughter and granddaughter in America makes for a deeply affecting story, told with a confidence and lyricism that belie its author's status as a beginner.

In 1915, nine-year-old Garod witnesses the deaths of her parents and brother as the Turks brutally murder a million Armenians, who they fear will otherwise fight with Russia against them.


Orphaned, starved, and so traumatized that she has forgotten her own name, the girl christens herself Cafard, after the French word for melancholy, but is inadvertently renamed Casard at Ellis Island when she immigrates to America.

There, Garod/Casard immediately marries a fellow Armenian refugee, settles into an immigrant enclave in Memorial, Connecticut, and gives birth to a daughter of her own.

Seventy years after her arrival in America, her favorite granddaughter, Seta Loon, tells haw Casard fought with her growing daughter, beautiful, rebellious Araxie, who wanted only to shed her mother's terrible legacy, live a glamorous life, and see the world. Nevertheless, as Seta herself would eventually learn, "the daughter assumes what is unfinished in her mother's life," middle-aged Araxie finds herself rejecting her non-Armenian husband while fighting to keep her own elder daughter at her side. But Seta flees to California as soon as possible, to escape Araxie's and Casard's pain.

Will her grandmother's friends be happy for her, a calmer 33-year-old Seta wonders as she returns to Memorial pregnant and unmarried, now that she has used her foremother's experience to create an independent existence?

This is a highly accomplished first novel spanning three very different generations on two continents - and an unusually intelligent look at the American immigrant experience.

Historical Documentary, "Journey From Ararat," to Air on **KNXT-TV Starting April 23** 

FRESNO, CA - Mr. Sarkis Avakian, a General Education Development Instructor at Avenal State Prison, recently returned from filming in Armenia and Nagorno-Karabagh, has produced a three-and-a-half-hour Armenian history documentary, Journey from Ararat, for KNXT-TV, Channel 49 here.

The documentary will be aired once a week at 8:30 p.m. for seven weeks in thirty-minute segments, starting April 23, 1994, as part of educational events commemorating Armenian Martyrs Day in remembrance of the genocide of 1.5 million Armenians by the Ottoman Turkish government in 1915.

Narrating the documentary are California Supreme Court Justice Marvin Baxter, Major General Ron H. Markarian, Congressman Richard Lehman, Archbishop Sumbat Lapajian, Fresno County Sheriff Steve Magarian, Fresno County Supervisor Deran Kolijian, Central Unified Superintendent George Kelejian, Western Diocesan Primate Abp. Vatche Hovsepian, Prof. Sarkis Atamian, Prof. Carl Waddle, Mr. Charles Pashayan, Prof. Barlow Der Mugrditchian and Mr. Richard Darmenian. Funds generated by the airing of the program are designated for the Nagorno-Karabagh/Artsakh relief.

Over thirty-two hours of raw footage was videotaped for the production. The project began under the auspices of Fresno City College in 1981 but grew beyond its confines. The post-production editing was done under the supervision of KNXT-TV. Work on the documentary, including preproduction, script develop-

ment and initial taping, continued for approximately twelve years. The videotaping of the narration, i.e. sync. sound and sound-over, was supervised by Dr. William Seaberg, Dean of the Audiovisual Department at Fresno City College.

In 1980 Mr. S. Avakian conceived of developing and producing Journey from Ararat to address the history of the Armenian nation. The work is predicated on Vahan Kurkjian's History of Armenia, Prof. Sarkis Atamian's The Armenian Community and Wilson Wallis' Fresno Armenians. Journey from Ararat by Mr. S. Avakian is an analytical recitation of three thousand years of Armenian history.

Journey from Ararat covers of the Central California area Armenian history from her patriarchal founder Haik to the current inhabitants of Nagorno-Karabagh. The story of Armenia specifically begins with its founding amidst the great nations of the day -- Egypt, China and the Harappan civilization of the Indus -- and recounts its repeated struggles for survival and independence through the centuries resulting from its strategic location between warring Western and Eastern civilizations.

In addition to the early history of the Armenian nation, more recent events are also explored. For instance, the story of the Armenian Republic which existed between 1918 and 1920 is told, along with a discussion of the Bolshevik invasion which triggered the downfall of the shortlived republic. The documentary also chronicles the participation of Armenian-Americans in

World War II on behalf of the Allies, as well as post-war events illustrating the struggles of Armenian-Americans in the diaspora, including California, to maintain their cultural identity.

Finally, the documentary covers the passage of the Genocide Treaty and the rise of Armenian demands in the Soviet Union. The closing sequences of the documentary illustrate Azerbaijan's threat to the lives, security and independence of the Armenian people who remain in their diminutive homeland today.

More than any other state in this nation, California is an example of how cultural diversity can enhance a community. By learning about the history of any particular group, its strengths and weaknesses can be better understood and integrated into the community as a whole.

Through Journey from Ararat, the general community

will have an opportunity to not only learn about one of the many groups which inhabit the region. but also to obtain some understanding of how this particular community has attempted to adapt to its new culture while still maintaining its ties to the traditional culture and original homeland.



Valley Armenians mark anniversary of genocide

Residents observe annual Martyrs Day with pledges of spiritual and political action.

About 600 Valley residents of Armenian descent marked the 79th commemoration of Armenian Martyrs Day on Sunday with pledges of spiritual and political action.

During what many consider a planned genocide of Armenians by the Turkish Ottoman government, 1.5 million Armenians died in the years 1915 to 1923.

It is believed to have started on April 24.

The Turkish government denies the "ethnic cleansing" of Armenians from their historical homeland in what is now eastern Turkey.

The U.S. government has not officially recognized the massacre as a genocide.

At Fresno's Pilgrim Armenian Congregational Church, several hundred people listened as a litany for Martyrs Day was recited, calling for Armenians to be a "compassionate, forgiving and loving people" and to remember that their forefathers died because of their religious faith so they could freely practice theirs.

Community Council of the San Joaquin Valley, which sponsored the event, said avenging past wrongs is not the goal.

"The Turkish government has been obscuring the historical records by spreading disinformation disguised as scholarly debate.

"The Turks won't even recognize the existence of the Armenian genocide. They are trying to erase the memory.

#### Politicians on hand

Several area politicians attended, bringing with them proclamations from the city, county, state legislature and Gov. Wilson officially recognizing the massacre as a genocide and commemorating April 24 as Martyrs Day.



# Samuelian's exhibit holds surprises

At 78, sculptor-painter Varaz Samuelian continues to demonstrate his capacity for creating on a monumental scale.

His latest work, which has been turning heads the past few weeks outside his one-man museum at Mariposa and R streets, is a blunt, rugged, convoluted 25foot sculpture.


The work will be featured in an open house next weekend along with a collection of paintings that will surprise those who think of Samuelian strictly as a contemporary sculptor.

The sculpture is built of shaped steel reinforcing bars wrapped in chicken wire and covered with stainless steel. The object is painted in vibrant red, with gestural marks in white and a mini-base in black.

The height of the object is ex-

ceeded in Samuelian's ouvre only by his "Tribute to Saroyan," a 30-foot high abstract tower of books, a bike and the author's bust that looms in another corner of the museum property.

"Has no name," said Samuelian, a sign-painter who has never been intimidated by climbing tall ladders. "I call it 'Peace,' or 'Dvorak Second Symphony,' or 'Self-Portrait.' People call it what they want."

Typically, viewers will look at Samuelian's new work and wonder "what it is." The artist is accustomed to such questions.

"People don't know what it is, is too bad," he said mildly. "Is like music. You don't see anything in it, you can't explain but you like it. You feel it. Don't mean anything, but is me.'

The paintings, about 20 of them, will be a revelation to those who aren't aware of the changes in style which have marked his work over the years.

The paintings date to the years right after World War II, 1947-52, and just before Samuelian arrived in Fresno. Fresh out of the French Resistance moveOpen house

ment, the artist was studying and painting in Paris. A number of the pieces never have been shown here.

"Is 'classical' [representationall style," Samuelian said, guiding a visitor through the gallery, crowded with paintings, sculp-tures and assemblages of a variety of media, mood and style.

A painting dating to 1945 depicts a ragged group of figures struggling through snow - Armenians, the artist explained fleeing the genocide.

When the visitor remarks that certain paintings suggest the cubist style of Picasso, Samuelian responds that while he probably was influenced by the man recognized as the dominant figure in 20th century art, he never consciously imitated him.

"I don't understand too much when people say I painted like him," said Samuelian. "Mostly I liked the classical people. I paint like I feel. If somebody tells me, it looks like Picasso, I don't fight it. He was a great man.

Wet clay and expensive cameras don't mix. Rex Avakian, a strapping college student sitting in a small chair, faced a delicate

He wanted to put the squirming, art-enthused first-graders at the Armenian Community School of Fresno at ease by helping them sculpt scary-looking spiders. At the same time, he wanted to photograph them for a newspaper article.

"What are you making over there?" Avakian asked, grimy hands reaching for his camera.

Emily Derderian, 6, answered shyly, "A tarantula and a black widow." Click. Before she knew it, he captured her menagerie on

That image is one he is considering for the next issue of Hye Sharzhoom, the student-produced Armenian paper at Fresno State University. As editor this semester, he learned firsthand what it's like to work with a lean staff: He ended up assigning himself to write and photograph a couple of stories.

But more than that, Rex

Avakian learned something about Rex Avakian.

His childhood left him speaking only a smattering of Armenian. He didn't know much about his ancestors' history. As a great-grandchild of immigrants, he simmered in the melting pot until most of the

Armenian flavor was cooked out.

"I was sort of cheated out of my culture in a way, because of this notion in my family that we had to be assimilated," said Avakian, 23, a senior journalism

It wasn't until he took college classes in Armenian studies that he truly began to explore his ethnic background. (He is actually half Armenian but hasn't explored his mother's Scottish roots.)

That's one reason he accepted the editor's position this semester — although a bit reluctantly, because he was afraid of time demands and getting stuck doing all the work. And it's how he found himself in Julie Smart's classroom at the Armenian school, documenting how a non-Armenian like Smart fits into an environment steeped in ethnici-

"I'm interested in how accepting the students and teachers are," Avakian explained before spending a recent morning at the school, notebook in hand.

"Armenians have a strong identity behind them, but they're not closed to outside influences.

Smart's classroom, filled with sunlight, books and the gentle din of 14 highly motivated firstgraders let loose with clay, was dotted with ethnic reminders: a note on the board explaining that night's Armenian homework, a brightly colored map of the homeland, a T-shirt on a child proclaiming Armenian pride.

"Ohanesian and Arek, we need to clean up," Smart said.

Aside from that, it looked and sounded like any other classroom. That shouldn't be a surprise, principal Assadour Assadourian told Avakian during an interview in the school office downstairs. It doesn't matter whether you're Armenian, Hispanic or Greek. If teachers are qualified, they will be considered for a job.

"We're called an Armenian school, but that's because we teach the language," Assadourian said as Avakian took notes. "It's not that it's only Armenian. Our children have to keep in mind they're Armenian, and

they have to keep their heritage alive."

Although unintentional, Assadourian's words seemed aimed squarely at Avakian.

Avakian wanted to learn Armenian as a child. But he didn't. His grandmother, Lillian Avakian, helped raise him. He still lives with her. She often wishes things had worked out different-

"I feel guilty that I didn't speak Armenian and encourage him more," she said. It was a process that started with her own mother, who emigrated to Boston in the 1890s. When Lillian Avakian, now 78, started school as a little girl, she didn't

know a word of English. After she learned, her family mostly used English.

And when it came time to help raise her grandson, she contin-

ued the same pattern.

Her words are wistful. Hard choices — or was it just a gradual acceptance of the inevitable?

— were made.

"I wasn't strong enough," she said. "I just didn't follow through."

Not that she hasn't managed to pass along some of her heritage to her grandson. He sometimes tags along when she worships at Holy Trinity Church, where he was baptized. He can't resist one of her *kuftas*, a big Armenian meatball with filling inside.

Armenian recipes are planned for the next issue of Hye Sharzhoom, which will be published next week. Also part of the usual mix: news about the Armenian Studies Program, which distributes an additional 5,000 copies of the paper to a worldwide mailing list; a goofy person-on-the-street question; a feature on an Armenian technology group.

And, of course, mention of the anniversary of the Armenian massacre, which was marked April 24 in Fresno. To Avakian, that's a story that can never go away.

"The main thing that ties us all together was the genocide," he said, relaxing in the sun on the Fresno State campus. "We don't want to forget that. Turkey doesn't want to admit that it happened. They're changing the history books."

He'd heard of the massacre before but had only a dim understanding of the depth of feeling in the Armenian community.

"I didn't hate Turks until I took an Armenian-studies class," he said.

The matter-of-fact phrase

seemed incongruous coming from this cheerful, outgoing man so able to charm a clay-fingered first-grader. He is dealing in the abstract, he explained. They aren't fighting words.

And yet, perhaps, those words offer a hint of how complex life can get. Knowledge can inform and enlighten, and it also can cast a shadow.

Would he feel differently if the reporter interviewing him was Turkish?

Avakian thought for a moment, then smiled and offered an answer tinged with hope.

"In that case," he said, "I might think in a different way."

He extends himself with each film, and the brilliantly accomplished Calendar is said to be his best work to date; emotionally direct, wryly amusing, formally inventive, intimate in scale, but in no way diminutive.

Appearing for the first time in one of his films, Egoyan has fashioned himself a character who is everything he is not-meanspirited, self-absorbed, destructive—and has played him to the hilt. He portrays a photographer hired to make twelve images of Armenian historic churches for a calendar. Because his character is not fluent in Armenian, he takes his wife (Arsinee Khanjian) along as a translator, and as they traverse the twelve sites chosen for the calendar with their Armenian guide (Ashot Adamian), their relationship begins to unravel. The photographer returns to Canada with his twelve images, but without his wife, who has gradually felt drawn to her ethnic roots and has fallen in love with the guide.

Cairo-born, Canadian-bred, and of Armenian descent, Egoyan has spent the last 12 years creating films which have been critically lauded for exploring the mediated image in contemporary society.

Egoyan's fourth feature, The Adjuster had its world premiere as part of the prestigious Directors' Fortnight at the Cannes Film Festival. The film was named best Canadian Film at the Sudbury Filmfest and was awarded the Special Prize of the Jury at the 17th Moscow International Film Festival.

The film had its world premiere at the Berlin International Film Festival (1993), and brought home the prize for best film in the Forum of New Cinema.

Hauntingly beautiful, extremely funny, and utterly devastating, Calendar will delight Egoyan's fans and win new converts to this formidable talent.



# A LEGACY OF TRAUMA

Author traces the effects of genocide on three generations of a family

arol Edgarian is pleased when people ask if "Rise the Euphrates" is her life story. She knows she has done her job, creating characters so real that readers believe they existed.

Perhaps the emotions and characteristics of Casard Essayan, Araxie Loon and Seta Loon *do* exist in generations of women affected by an atrocity that shaped all their lives.

At age 9, Casard is an Armenian girl living happily in the town of Harput, Turkey. Suddenly, during the summer of 1915, everyone and everything she knows perishes when a group of Young Ottoman Turks sweeps through the country, bent on killing every Armenian.

Orphaned and starving, she survives. In 1921, she comes to America, where she meets a young Armenian man and marries. She locks her horrible memories away, never speaking of what she's endured, except when her granddaughter, Seta, is born. She then whispers her story in her ear. Years later, it's Seta who tries to heal the family's wounds.

Edgarian will be in Fresno on Monday to talk about her novel and sign copies of it. Her appearance is part of the Armenian Studies Program Spring Lecture Series at Fresno State University.

#### **Horrors endured**

Her novel is one of the few to use the Armenian massacre as a focal point. The horrors endured by casualties and survivors are recalled — Casard's mother throws herself into the Euphrates River to drown rather than be murdered.

But the book deals with more than a tragic legacy. It explores prejudice and first love, what it's like to grow up in a small town and the bond between generations of women.

"I wrote the book for the hungry reader in me," Edgarian said by phone from a Miami hotel. "I love books that engage all my senses and stories that move me and compel me to read on."

Edgarian was born and raised in Connecticut, the daughter of an Armenian father and a Swedish mother. She has written since she was a child: "I was the kid who wrote poems under the covers at night with a flashlight."

While working as a Senate page in 1977, she did research at the Library of Congress and discovered the library's extensive holdings of primary documents on the Armenian genocide.

#### It came to her in a dream

Such a brutal past and the effect it would have on generations of a family intrigued her. The idea stayed with her until a couple of years later, when she dreamed of an old woman.

"I heard her voice, and it was very compelling," Edgarian said. "I wrote the story around that voice, and she became Casard."

It took 10 years to write the book. Ed-

garian supported herself as a free-lance copywriter.

"The characters kept me going," she said. "I wanted to see the story through, to see how Seta healed the ghosts of the past."

#### Hearing back

Response has been positive.

"Every meeting I've been to, there have been one or two survivors there," Edgarian said. "They are so pleased their story is being told, and it's heartening to hear my book was moving to them.

"For every individual's family, there was a different story. One of the reasons this genocide hasn't received the attention the Holocaust has is there was no Nuremberg for the Armenians. The Turks deny it ever happened and haven't been held accountable."

Edgarian lives in San Francisco with her writer husband. She is at work on a second novel, a story different from "Rise the Euphrates." She may one day return to Seta and continue her story.

Touring has taken her from writing, but she is enjoying meeting her readers: "Talking to people who have been touched by your book is the ultimate fulfillment for a writer."

## Picture-perfect look at a man's isolation

"Calendar" looks like moving series of picture postcards, and there's a reason for that. In the film, one of the main characters, a photographer (writer/director Atom Egoyan), has been sent to Armenia to shoot pictures of local churches for a calendar.

Some of these churches are in ruins, and within these ruins, something else is falling apart as well: the photographer's marriage. It's an artfully crafted visual irony that the ugly end of a life together should take place in such beautiful surroundings.

It's not the only thing about "Calendar" that is artfully crafted. From the first shot to the last, this film knows exactly where it is going. The whole affair is so realistically shot and presented that I kept having the awful feeling I was watching a documentary. Fortunately it is not, or Egoyan would go down as one of the most masochistic filmmakers in history.

The photographer is never shown in Armenia (his eyes are the camera's point of view); the only time we see him is when he has returned to Canada, the country in which he is based.

Though he was born in Armenia, he seems to know nothing about the language or the culture of the place. To address this, he has brought along his wife (Arsinee Khanjian), who speaks Armenian, and has enlisted a local driver (Ashot Adamian) to take him from one church to another.

The driver, who does not speak English, knows a fantastic amount of information about the various locales and, through the wife (none of the characters has a name), proceeds to expound at length about them.

This has opposing effects on the photographer and his wife.

The photographer frankly could not care less; he's there to get his photos. But for the wife, who also is from Armenia, the tour has the effect of reinvigorating her sense of self by casting through the lens of her homeland. Predictably, the husband and wife find themselves drifting further apart.

This tale, told in flashback, is interspersed with scenes of the photographer having one failed date after another in Canada. Each date ends with the woman going off to use the phone, then speaking with the other person in another language.

The initial reaction to the photographer is that it is understandable that his wife has left him and that his dates fail: The man is a pompous twit. But Egoyan says more about the photographer with what the man doesn't do than what he does.

The photographer is the only one in the film who speaks only English. He's cut off from the rest of the characters in this way, which mirrors the man's isolation from his Armenian heritage and also his own emotions.

"Calendar's" photographer is a tragedy, painfully brought to life in Egoyan's writing, directing and acting (though the last of these is somewhat wooden).



She then entered the Yerevan Conservatory where she studied under Professor Yuri Hairapetian,

specializing in piano. She received her diploma with honors, qualifying as concert soloist instructor and accompanist. She went on to postgraduate studies Professor Levon under Mamikonian, specializing in piano and chamber ensemble. She also studied organ with Professor Vahagn Stamboltsian, again receiving her diploma with honors. After graduation she served as piano instructor (professor) at both the Yerevan State Conservatory and the Yerevan College of Music.

Naira Shahsouvarian played her first concert at the age of six. At fourteen she was awarded a diploma for her performance in the National Festival Competition. During studies at the Conservatory she continued giving solo recitals and performed with a number of violinists, cellists, and vocalists. In her repertory is a wide range of classical and modern music by European, Russian, and Armenian composers. In addition to performing at the Yerevan Conservatory, she has played at the Aram Khachaturian Recital Hall, the Recital Hall for Chamber Music, and the State Philharmonic Theatre. She has appeared throughout Armenia and on national radio and television.
