#### **Exhibit Curators Statement**

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" represents ongoing research in SJSU Special Collections & Archives identifying documentation of Black experiences throughout SJSU history. This exhibit is the first of several installments.

Much of the information we have comes from the Spartan Daily student newspaper and the La Torre yearbooks. With too few exceptions, Black Spartans' stories are not told in their own words but from the perspectives of their majority white classmates. This is reflected in the language and focus of the articles. We invite you to read critically.

The Black Spartans featured in this exhibit pursued their educational goals while contending with institutionalized racism and other major crises of the 20th century: two World Wars, the influenza pandemic of 1918, and polio. Locally, "the deed to virtually every home in San Jose" included restrictions against Black and Asian residents known as "restrictive covenants" (Spartan Daily, February 16, 1948, page 2). On campus, blackface and minstrel shows were a regular part of student events.

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" is an invitation to the community to join us in surfacing these stories, ensuring these histories are preserved and presented in a way that honors these students' lives. Contact us at special.collections@sjsu.edu to participate.


#### **Artist Statement**


The "Black Spartans (1907-1948)" exhibition is a homage to Black culture and history at San José State University and the Bay Area at large. Until recently, the significance of Black bodies in Bay Area history (as well as U.S. history) was overlooked. Unless it was associated with the struggles of civil rights leaders, athletes, or celebrity-personas, the story of a graduate from a state school wasn't valued because we weren't part of the mainstream culture. As a Black Spartan myself, I was deeply connected to these individuals that started out just like me. I saw a reflection of myself and my community throughout the process of making these mixed media portraits and came to realize how important it is to know your history because it becomes a catalyst for knowing who you are.


My work explores the intricacy of identity and the role culture, tradition, and history play. These portraits are embodiments of our Black Spartans, they are visual representations of the colorful and captivating lives they led. Through this work, I hope to influence other artists and individuals to take part in researching and finding out the infinite layers of what it means to be Black. Our history is beyond our struggle. We are the blueprint.



Date for the Knight snow party has been set for March 1 and 2. tentative site of which is Badger Pass in Yosemite.






# TWO SPARTANS NAMED ON CAGE TEAM

# Alumni Drops Game To Varsity Grid Team, 7-0 PASS FROM MINTER TO

#### PASS FROM MINTER TO ALLEN SCORES TOUCHDOWN


Coach Winkelman's and Warner's varsity spring practice squad proved in too good condition for the alumni team yesterday afternoon winning a dull but humorous pre-season game, 7-0.

The varsity score came early in the first quarter, when an alumni pass from their own 15-yard line was intercepted by varsity safety man, Aubrey Minter. On the first play, a reverse from Tornell to Purcell totaled 20-yards to the alumni 20-yard line. Fullback Tornell cracked off left tackle for another 4 yards. Minter next on an end run to the right side of the line lost a yard. With third down and three yards to go, Minter dropped back to shoot a pass to Left End Johnny Allen to score. Captain Kenny Cook, still showing his last year's form in place kicking, dropped back to convert for the extra point.

Bob Titchenal, center and captain of last year's varsity, proved the outstanding man on defense for the alumni, showing his old form of backing up the line that made him one of the leading centers on the coast last year. Morris Manoogian and Carlton Peregoy, although lacking their old drive in carrying the ball, led the alumni in the backfield.

The alumni team, under the management of Bull Lewis, former Spartan fullback, was the fiercest team of the two. But even with the help of All-Coast Bill Anahu, Santa Clara end, and varsity players Hearn, Riddle and Smith, the alumni failed to have the punch to drive across a score.








#### Football

The 1959 season marked San Jose's debut into "big time" football . . . . As a team the Spartans gained widespread recognition by defeating U.S.F. and a strong intersectional opponent, Drake University . . . . An official intercollegiate football statistical summary released by the American Football Statistical Bureau ranked the Spartans as the leading defensive team and the third highest in the nation on the basis of total team performances. Another national gridiron publication called San Jose the "team of the year." . . . . Individual stars on the Spartan eleven also came in for their share of the glory. Fullback Leroy Zimmerman was accorded all-coast and "Little All-American" honors and was selected to play in the East-West Shrine game. His showing in this contest was heralded as the outstanding performance of the day . . . . Tackles Bob Bronzan and Duke Tornell, Halfbacks Morris Manoogian and Aubrey Minter, Center Bob Titchenal, Ends Chuck Johnson and Johnny Allen, and Guard Ken Cook were other Spartans honored on mythical elevens . . . . For the first time in San Jose football history San Jose was given serious consideration to play in one of the nation's post-season "bowl" games.
















## Basketball

A sensational whirlwind finish by the Spartans salvaged an otherwise dismal basketball season for Coach Bill Hubbard's team . . . . the late spurt by the San Joseans landed them in the runner-up position in the California Athletic Association pennant race. The team that "arrived," but too late, vindicated itself with two rousing victories over San Diego State college, rated as one of the strongest teams on the coast and runners-up in the National Collegiate basketball tournament in Kansas City . . . . . In conference play the Spartans won three and lost three and had a total season's record of nine wins and ten losses . . . . . Most consistent of the San Jose quintet was ballhawking Johnny Allen, whose brilliant play at guard earned him an all-conference position along with Captain Gus Kotta, forward. Other Spartans who contributed noteworthy performances were Duke Tornell, guard; Dick Uhrhammer, center; Captain-elect Hal Carruth, forward; and Stu Carter, forward. The only first string man playing his last year for the Spartans was Gus Kotta, giving newly-appointed Coach Walt McPherson veteran material to work with in 1941. "Swede" Smersfelt, a three-year veteran, was the only other senior completing his career.

#### Baseball

San Jose State's varsity baseball nine completed their schedule for the year by winning six of their twenty-one games and finished in last place in the California Collegiate Athletic Association. The Spartans, under their new mentor Walt McPherson, defeated San Diego State 8-2 and won a close 6 to 5 tilt from Fresno State for the only two conference wins of the season. They won four of their nine practice games, losing to USF, California, and Saint Mary's during the season . . . . Depending on Pitcher Tony Nasimento, veteran of three years, the Spartans looked impressive in early season games. Nasimento was forced out for the season when he dislocated his shoulder while umpiring a frosh game. With him went all hopes of a CCAA title, for the Spartans sadly needed a chucker who could go the entire nine innings . . . . Veterans Captain Harvey Rhodes, John Allen, Ben Frizzi, and Jack Fancher carried the Spartan's chances for a successful season. The rest of the team was comprised of sophomores and junior college transfers. Newly elected baseball captain Ben Frizzi and John Allen, along with Rhodes, were the batting and fielding power for San Jose. Frizzi led his teammates at the plate with a .329 average, followed by Rhodes with .519 and Allen with a .512 average . . . . Nasimento, when not pitching, was used as a pinch hitter and finished the season with a .363 average, but he only competed in half the games played. San Jose loses only one man from this year's team.



