Dear sister it is with pleasure that I take my pen in hand to answer your kinde letter. I was glad to hear from you and to hear that you was all wel. I am not tuff yet but am getting along verry wel. We have fine weather here have some rains. The mail boat came up here to day her name is R.K. Dunkerson it is a nice boat. I we had a small (unreadable) this after noon by a Chaplin from (end of page) a Kentucky Regiment. For the first time since I have bin here he is agoing to preech (unreadable) Sunday I hope. We will have preaching all the time now there is a great deal of wickedness a going on here swearing and playing cards almost all the time it is enough to mak a man shudder to hear such horrid oaths. I hope that I shall soon be able to go to my Regiment. You say you wanted to keep my single likenis if you think it will do you any good keep it, (end of page) it is in the family. I would like to be there and help you to eat your green sauce but I cannot and I say take all the comfort with them you can but whise you are eatin for your self take a mouthful for me . I have not heard from franklin in a week. I cant think of much more to write rite often and all the news no more at present So good By For This Time This From A Brother
