# Hayakawa lifts siege -- "no need"

Yesterday, in a hastily called press conference Acting President Hayakawa announced the rescission of all emergency regulations.

The announcement, addressed to the "Faculty, Staff and Students of San Francisco State College" thanked all for the "peaceful and studious atmosphere on this campus after the months of turmoil." "Under the circumstances, there seems to be no further need for the emergency regulations which I announced on January 6, 1969. These regulations are here-

by rescinded. Outdoor rallies," the Acting Prexy continued, "may again be held in the central campus area."

Concerning rallies, Hayakawa exclaimed that "Freedom of Speech does not mean freedom to incite riot."

"Freedom of speech is for the exchange of ideas, which means that advocates of differing views about all sorts of public issues are equally entitled to a fair hearing," he said with a satisfied smile.

With a warning he said "Any

attempt to use the rights of freedom of speech to limit the freedom of speech of others will be viewed with the utmost gravity."

"Police have been absent from the campus for some time," he announced and said he hoped that "There is no further need for their assistance."

"I have given them a free hand to judge the situation and I don't know exactly what they are doing," he said tugging nervously at his four button blazer.

REVIEW

Concerning the long awaited an-

nouncement on amnesty Hayakawa said that of the cases that have been concluded "the results seem to indicate a high degree of compassion for the people who violated campus rules."

When questioned on the disciplinary review and whether he has the final say he said "In this particular case, YES."

SUPPORT

"We have opportunities to make SF State unique its approach to ethnic and urban problems. I earnestly solicit the support of each of you in this effort," Hayakawa

said as he finished his prepared statement.

Through the heavy flak and a barrage of questions sent up by reporters at the press conference two themes prevailed: his political aspirations and the presidency of SF State.

Hayakawa claims to have run into problems in the State because "I happen to be a liberal."

EVASIVE

But concerning the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Governors chair he said "I haven't decided."

# Welfare profs deny split

(In an exclusive interview with the Gater, a group of frustrated Social Welfare faculty members expressed their dissatisfaction with that department's leadership. -GATER.)

A group accuses department chairman Patrick Purcell of poor administrative practices which are destructive to the department. They have called for his immediate resignation.

In a fact sheet put out by the resident faculty, represented by Morgan Yamahaka, these statements were made:

\* The request for change in leadership has nothing to do with ideological differences.

\* The total faculty, not just Purcell, has promoted increased admission of third world students.

\* 20 of the 25 full time faculty, including all six of the minority (non-white) faculty, support the demand for Purcell's immediate res-

ignation.

\* Over two-thirds of the graduate students concur that Purcell should resign.

\* Those opposing Purcell are a leaderless coalition representing a wide range of opinions including some AFT members and all minority teachers.

Regarding the specific charges, the teachers said that it would be unprofessional to divulge any information. The charges are currently being investigated by a six member committee appointed by the dean of the School of Behavioral and Social Sciences. The investigation is confidential.

CONTINUE TEACHING

"We are not requesting his dismissal from the college. As a full time faculty professor with tenure, he will have the right to continue teaching in that department if he wishes to do so," they said in a letter to Social Welfare students.

Purcell's immediate resignation as chairman, the teachers said, would constitute the first essential

step toward resolving a major problem. "The search for a new director is something that must be accomplished this semester in order for the new director to resume his duties not later than August, 1969," they added.

"Important decision pertaining to new personnel and curriculum review must be made as quickly as possible. We had only one faculty meeting which took place at the beginning of the semester, and that was poorly attended due to very short notice.

"UNITY"

"Purcell's resignation would open the way for achieving unity among the department's faculty and thus facilitate collaborative action toward bringing about a quality educational program," the teachers concluded.

In another memo sent to students, faculty, and other interested parties, the teachers clarified their position on both student and faculty roles. "We believe a strong, viable student body that

participates fully in the life of the program is essential to the continuing growth of the department."

"The basic model we use to conceptualize the educational process we are all engaged in is an academically oriented graduate school. This model is based upon a value system that protects the free exchange of ideas and prohibits any single idea, method, or point of view from dominating through force of numbers, political influence, or ridicule," the memo said.

1 NOTING DEGREES

"In one sense, the faculty are advanced students and the students are incipient faculty and they have similar roles. But when the relative position of faculty and stu-

dents in the academic professional social work world are assessed and made explicit through noting degrees earned, study, and research completed, experience undergone, and material published, the faculty of course is farther along the continuum," the teachers added.

## Militant moustache Marries organizer

The worker-student alliance was consummated when the editor of the Daily Gater married a militant labor union leader last Friday.

Greg deGiere was wed to Janice Burgess by Rev. John Jones in a brief evening ceremony at the Ecumenical House. Witnessing the nuptials were Albert Duro, AS janitor and pragmatic leader of the militant Organization of Student Employees, and Merna Rosenberg, a co-worker of the new Mrs. deGiere.

The happy couple's wedding reception was Sunday afternoon at the home of Miss Rosenberg. It was attended by a large crowd of Gater staffers, typical working people and other radicals.

The former Miss Burgess was an SF State student and part time telephone operator until quitting school in February to become a full time worker and trade unionist.

She and deGiere met last March when she was organizing students to support the Communications Workers of America strike against Pacific Telephone. She was then a CWA stewardess.

Both were active backers of the student and AFT strikes. The then Miss Burgess brought many of her colleagues to SF State to join December's massive demonstrations and January's picket lines.

The two were arrested together in last May's anti-Air Force ROTC, pro-third world sit-in in SF State's Administration building. deGiere's probation from the arrest was revoked after he was picked up in the January 23 mass arrest here, and he was returned to jail to serve his 30 day suspended sentence. Mrs. deGiere's probation will expire this month. (A Happy revolutionary marriage to you - The Staff)

# Trustees emasculate AS

Title 5, Revised, that infamous portion of student self-government, was at last passed by the Board of Trustees on April Fool's Day, and will go into effect this May 1.

Although several even harsher versions of the anti-Magna Carta document were said to be proposed along the way by punitive trustees, that which was finally approved differs only slightly from the originally proposed version, which itself is no bubble of joy. The major import of the code changes, which will govern "auxiliary" student organizations of state colleges, remains the same.

Auxiliary organizations include the Associated Students, among whose programs number the Gater, Open Process, Experimental College, Tutorials, and BSU, among others; the SF State Foundation; and the Frederick Burke Foundation.

Exempted from the code are student clubs, societies, fraternities, sororities, and so forth, not operating any commercial activity.

• The president of each college has the authority to eliminate any student organizations or programs -- such as the AS's Tutorials, EC, or BSU - which he feels disagree with Board of Trustees or college policy. (Section 42402).

No funds of an auxiliary or-

ganization may be used to support or oppose any political issue or candidate, nor to make personal loans for non-educationally related purposes. (Section 42403).

Translated, this means the Bail Fund is dead. And if enforced to the bitter end, it means student newspapers may no longer print editorials; student drama groups may no longer perform plays, nor film groups show films, nor tutorials purchase books, nor any group hire any guest speakers concerning topics of war, poverty, grapes, oil or unemployment, (all of which are political issues), if admission is charged or the group in any way conducts a "commercial activity."

Cabaret opens at eleven in the morning and stays open until midnight, serving lunch all day. They feature a "Bismark Burger with egg" for only 75¢.

# "Changes" - an oddyssey, a mood

"'Changes' is a part of me and a lot of other people I know. When nothing has meaning for me, both in my life and in the film, I hit the road. 'Changes' is a simple odyssey about a young man in search of himself.

The film is more of a mood or a feeling that uses visual effects, sound and poetry," Kent Lane, the leading character in the film, explained.

Lane, who is in town with "Changes" producer-director Hall Bartlett and his mother Ronda Fleming, said that the film, now at the Larkin, provokes something in everyone even if they don't like the film.

"I realized that I was living a lot of lies. I wasn't being truthful with myself and I was amazed when I saw myself on the screen. It really provoked thought because each person is so different and unique," Lane said.

Bartlett, a distinguished looking man slightly greying at the temples, said that he decided to pursue the making of "Changes" because, "I didn't believe that the films that exploited and prostituted the younger generation were in any way true."

"I wanted to convey some mood or feeling that would be truthful about what the young generation feels. For that reason it was de-

cided not to rap-up the end of the film because that would give it a phony touch," Bartlett said.

"Those people involved in 'Changes' spoke to many young people in order to make everything honest. There is nothing in the film that was placed there for the purpose of making money. There is no sex, violence, or intrigue," he said.

"With the goal of making a truthful film in mind I became educated by Kent and his friends. I learned about and liked the music of the younger generation so much that I can't stand your toothbrush next to mine type music anymore," Bartlett said.

"In 'Changes' we weren't thinking about the acting but the project itself. Everyone brought his own experiences and changes to the film," handsome Lane who looks younger than his 28 years, said.

Bartlett added, "The great body of young people have not had a shot at being represented on the screen. We wanted 'Changes' to have a feel and a mood, not just technology. For better or worse I've tried to bring something real into the film.

"The film has broken every record in the first theater we booked it in New York. It's out grossing all the rest of the

theaters in New York that we were unable to get it into. In fact Judith Crist gave 'Changes' rave reviews. However, that's how it is with most people who see the film. Either they love it or hate it, there is no middle ground."

"We're hoping 'Changes' will have a good effect. Our first hope of course will be enough success that Kent and other young people will help us promote more real free pictures that are different from those that I think stink.

"It has caused some small changes already. Several projects at William Morris Agency had been stopped dead, however, now there has been a reactivation of twenty

projects that were not pigeon holed or have sex or violence," Bartlett said.

On the subject of the film's music Lane continued, "The music is the third dimension -- the mind. The character in the film was confused so the music had to be his mind in certain scenes. 'Changes' combines sound with picture to create an emotion.

"Tim Buckley taped what he felt as he watched the film for hours in a screening booth. I also got involved like that because the film was the beginning of a search for me. I had to be true to my feelings and communicate in order to do this film," Lane said.

## LDC national campaign

The legal defense of the 700 people arrested in the TWLF struggle for the fifteen demands will be raised to a national level, according to Roy Harrison of the SF State Legal Defense Committee.

"The press has familiarized the US with your struggle already, you have no curtain of silence to tear down," said Ralph Leavitt. "You have a ready-made group of supporters around the country just waiting for leadership."

Leavitt mentioned the other

strikes patterned after the SF State strike which occurred after we gained national prominence.

John Love of the LDC announced formation of on and off-campus committees to implement the plan.

"We must educate the community and the country about the racist nature of this system and how the educational system is being used to perpetuate racism," added Roy Harrison. "The strike is over but the struggle is very much alive."

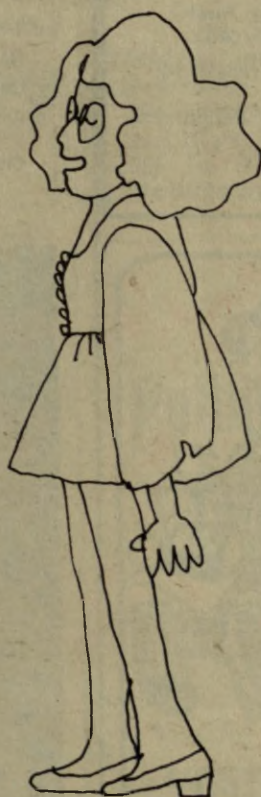

# Title V, Revised, revisited

One wonders if selling chocolates to buy books would fall into this category, and thus, for example, forbid a tutorial from purchasing history books (which could not help but contain "political issues", and by their reading, perhaps lead to support of them), with such money.

In one word, this section could probably be summed up, "Censorship."

● Ironically, like the cherry on top of the arsenic pudding, the Trustees did insert a statement for "Self-government" as the first of the objectives deemed fit for an auxiliary organization in their preliminary Declaration of Policy in the code. (Sec. 42401).

The three other objectives listed, however, all concern finding methods of establishing effective fiscal controls over student groups.

● The president may still presumably raise bookstore or food prices, or close these areas up until prices are raised, or make other changes if he deems that they are necessary to "comply with Trustee policy", as all operating expenses of the SF State

Foundation, now administered by the president. (Sec. 42601.)

● Any gifts or donations received by a student organization for whatever purpose also fall under Title 5 restrictions. (Sec. 42403, d.)

● A list of "organizations in good standing", will be kept by the Chancellor's office from now on. (Sec. 42406).

Those who do not operate under the Trustees rules were presumably to be simply blacklisted under the first proposed version. The final version, however, does give the governing board of an offending organization a chance to speak in its own behalf at an investigation conference which the Trustees will hold in such a case.

Then, if convicted, the organization will be blacklisted.

And so the show proceeds.

● No new organizations may be established after May 1 without recommendation by the president of the college, and subsequent approval by the Chancellor. (Sec. 42407).

● One of the few positive changes in the final code now makes it possible for organizations, such as the Tutorials, to continue to rent off-campus facilities, pro-

vided the president approves it in the yearly budget, and the facility's leases run under \$10,000 and no more than a year in length.

May we point out, the title "president" continuously mentioned in these regulations does not mean the president of the Associated Students, whose office once led the framework of student self-government, but means instead the president of the college administration.

This radical switch of power would seem to imply that college students are no longer deemed fit to govern themselves, but like children at a grammar school must once again have a principal imposed above them to govern the way in which they spend their own student funds.)

● Each organization must sign a written agreement with the Chancellor, listing the functions it intends to engage in. (Sec. 42501).

● Another possibly positive change here is the exemption of student association activities from this listing of functions.

This would seem to imply that organizations may engage somewhat less restrictively in areas of association activities such as cultural programs, recreation, support of college unions, tutorials, community service and

student publications -- as long as the president approves of such. I.e., one layer of red tape and possible censorship is removed. One remains.

● Last, but not least, if any organization manages to come up with a new function it would like to pursue, it will have no end of red tape in sight: both the president and the chancellor must approve

it, and it must by amendment then be added to a written agreement.

## AFT attacks Rafferty

The American Federation of Teachers (AFT) of the San Francisco city schools unanimously denounced a request by Max Rafferty that all school superintendents send him confidential information concerning contacts with the Black Panthers, SDS, and the TWLF.

In a letter to Superintendent Robert Jenkins, AFT President

James Ballard condemned the State Superintendent of Public Instruction's request as "an obvious attempt to turn the schools into informants and spies on organizations that are unpopular with Dr. Rafferty, and such espionage as Dr. Rafferty proposes is an open conflict with the concept of free schools."
