#### **KIDCARE**

Are you a concerned grandparent?

Do your grandchildren sometimes visit without their parents? If so, when the need arises, you should be prepared to authorize medical treatment.

According to Dean F. Miller, author of SAFETY: AN INTRODUCTION, "accidents in the home result in 22,000 fatalities annually," with a majority of home accidents befalling children of preschool age and senior citizens.

Each year, about four million injuries occur in the home, and over 50,000 persons die in automobile accidents. Accidents are the leading cause of death of school-age children.

So far as we know, there have been no significant numbers of children injured while visiting relatives in Leisure Village, but we are aware of a recent case where the injured grandchild was refused treatment at the local hospital, because the grandparents did not have the authorization to give consent for medical care. The child was treated at a hospital in Panorama City.

It is a fact of life that hospitals will refuse treatment of minors without authorization from parents or guardians. An adult may be a caring and loving grandparent, but that will not be a passkey to needed medical care.

It is important to remember that, if the parents of the injured minor are not present or cannot be reached, the grandparents—or other responsible adults—should have with them an authorization previously signed by the parents, reading substantially as follows:

"We, the undersigned parents, having legal custody of ....., a minor, do hereby authorize the following adults:----, as agents for consent for med- lets and locker rooms. Just ical treatment." (Also, it would be helpful to add a list of the showers. Residents medications to which the child may be allergic.)

We believe Leisure Villagers are not only caring neighbors, but caring grandparents, too. Let's keep it that way.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF COMMITTEE'S **ACCOMPLISHMENTS AS REPORTED** TO THE ASSOCIATION AT **ANNUAL MEETING**

#### ARCH. & LANDSCAPE

Jack Rogers, acting in absence of Bill Obenchain, Ch. The Committee has continued to service residents' needs while maintaining the aesthetic decor of the Village. Basically the committee has minimal problems as all are experts functioning to resolve problems, not to create them. Residents, however, should be aware of the Rules and Regulations (Article VI and Article VII) as they pertain to THEIR responsibilities, and the committee functions. Members are active, dedicated residents who put in their time to maintain the village in a manner acceptable to all residents.

#### **BLDG. & GROUNDS**

W.H. Huffman, Ch.: Monitored the progress of the newly formed yearround pruning crew; assisted homeowners when requested on matters relative to R. & R.'s governing red and yellow staking and responsibilities involved; inspected the results of the "Tall Tree" pruning contract in eight villages. (This type of pruning will result in healthier and more windresistant trees). Recommendations, etc. resulted in major replacement of riding and walking-type power mowers and other maintenance equipment which permitted the elimination of a full-time mechanic position. The committee participated in developing and implementing a program to replace trees along Leisure Village Drive. L.V. crews planted 117 trees. All members made monthly walking inspections and submitted reports to the landscape maintenance department.

#### **CHANNEL 12**

Joe Poliak, Ch. A brief history: first meeting in December, 1982, becoming a standing committee of the Assn. on July 1, 1983. The committee became familiar with the video camera recoerder loaned to the Assn. by Western Cable, solicited donations from organizations in the Village, and used about \$3,000 to buy video tape cassettes, an additional recorder, floodlights, color T.V. monitor and miscellaneous cables. adapters and fittings. Many village events have been taped and shown on Channel 12 and the group hopes to purchase additional recording/editing equipment which will improve and expand its operation. Members urge the Board to budget each year for its continued operation and improvement.

#### **COMMUNITY RELATIONS**

Bill Himstreet, Ch. The Committee monitored all agendas of the City Council, County Board of Supervisors, City and County Planning Commissions for items which could affect Leisure Village, and members attended several sessions. Programs of interest to Villagers were conducted: Operation Con Game: School Board Candidates Forum, County, State and Federal Candidates Forum; a Volunteer Fair in which 37 organizations participated designed to acqaint Villagers with volunteer service opportunities available in the area; introduction to Bottle Village, a State Historical Landmark in Simi Valley; and participation in Camarillo Academic Olympics. The Speakers' Bureau completed its second year with thirty villag-





participants when coverage runs out with Mass. Indemnity. THEY WILL WAIVE THE PRE-EXISTING LIMITATIONS PROVISION so that there will be no waiting period for those conditions for participants currently under the Mass. Indemnity Plan.

THE HARTFORD currently writes a similar program for Leisure World at Seal Beach and Leisure World at Laguna Hills so that they have adequate experience with this type of coverage. The benefits under the Plan will be almost identical with that of Mass. Indemnity. Two areas will be reduced (1) the special flat \$150 ambulance benefit will be reduced to Medicare plus the 20% feature of the Plan; and (2) coverage for the first 3 pints of blood may not be covered:

HOWEVER, there will be some limited coverage for travel outside of the country; mental and nervous disorders; broader coverage for extended hospital stays; and coverage may be continued if you leave Leisure Village so long as you remain a member of YNCG. There will be a vigorous enrollment for new participants within the very near future. Remember, that you must be a member of YNCG with dues paid up.

## CURRENT ISSUES FORUM By Sol Robin

A panel of 4 speakers discussed the subject of "Local Issues and Concerns" at the Current Issues Forum on June 29. Participating were Camarillo Mayor Bill Esty, Council Member Sandi Bush, State Assemblyman Tom McClintock and Tom Jolicoeur, former Ventura County Community College District Trustee and Candidate for the 36th Assembly District.

Sandi Bush announced the publication of the first issue of The Camarillo Communicator, a newsletter of the City of Camarillo, which is designed to promote better communication with the people of Camarillo and to provide increased citizen understanding and awareness of municipal and community operations and encourage maximum citizen participation in available city services, activities and programs. The next issues are scheduled for the fourth Thursdays of August and October.

She described the water system operated by the City of Camarillo and emphasized the importance of conservation.

Mayor Esty talked about Camarillo's participation in the Ventura County system. Camarillo is unique among California cities in that it finances its general government activities without the use of property tax revenue, and has no responsibility for fire protection and park and recreation services. The City does operate its own water utility, bus system, and waste water disposal system which is a special district governed by the City Council. Law enforcement is provided through contract with the Ventura County Sheriff's

Mayor Esty stated that the three most important problems facing the City are:

Flood Control - the work on the Conejo Creek is being completed and the work on the Conejo Creek second Monday.

Esty, Bush and McClintock all pointed out the possibility that the Calif. Air National Guard will shift its base of operations from Van Nuys to Point Mugu in the near future threatening the Camarillo area with the certainty of ever-increasing plane noise.

Assemblyman McClintock discussed the work of the State Assembly and its progress in enacting legislation to protect the concept of retirement communities by defining the age requirements.

Tom Jolicoeur spoke on the status of community education in Ventura County and the importance of strengthening our Community College system by eliminating tuition fees as a means of affording full and free access for all who seek quality education.

#### RACKETEERS SEEK RULE CHANGE

A change in the rules and regulations was sought by the LV Racquet Club to allow inviting the Costa Del Sol Paddle Tennis Association of Mission Viejo to a return paddle tennis tournament later this year.

A group from the local paddle tennis club were guests of the Costa Del Sol Club last fall. The members of the club met with the new LV Board at a closed session July 9, 1984. The purpose of the meeting was to suggest that rule 9.22 having to do with use of recreational facilities by outside organizations be amended.

At present the rule prohibits any L.V. organization from inviting an


generous contributions so that we might purchase much needed supplies.

The proposed amendment would add "except when pre-scheduled recreational events have been arranged in which other residents would normally not be participating."

George Lompkin, President of the local Racquet Club, explained that the change could affect all LV organizations. It would permit LV clubs to have outside clubs participate in joint events and yet not deprive other residents of the use of the recreational facilities. The proposed amendment would only be effective when activities such as square dance sessions, bocce tournaments, etc., had been previously reserved on the recreational calendar anyway for use by the club sponsoring the activity. He said, "there are no exclusive clubs in Leisure Village. Any resident can join any club and participate in that club's activities."

# Meet "NewAmericans" Esther and Marcel Lerner!

atching Esther and Marcel Lerner strolling the safe and pleasant streets of Leisure Village, one would have trouble visualizing Vienna-born Marcel as a decorated veteran of the U.S. Army, a survivor of the infamous "Battle of the Bulge."

But it's true. "When I came to America in 1939, I was very fortunate," he says. "You see, I was...and am...an actor, and at the time of the German invasion of Austria, my troupe was playing in Switzerland, and later in Paris and London. So I was able to make my way to America, rather than

> to my home in Nazioccupied Austria."

Later, he was drafted into the U.S. Army, earning U.S. citizenship. Because of his acting ability and his knowledge of German, he was assigned as a Field Interrogator with the U.S. 10th Armored Division. It was then he found himself entrapped in what is perhaps the most wellknown and grueling

battle involving American forces in World War II, The Battle of The Bulge, at Bastogne, Belgium. Fortunately, he emerged with only minor wounds, a Purple Heart and The Bronze Star.
