Campaign Kickoff Meeting

Losing little time following the recent announcement of his candidacy for Senior Senator for the 1993-95 term of the California Senior Legislature (CSL), Joseph Ellenbogen of Camarillo met on January 12 with leaders from several county communities to plan his campaign.

To stress the importance of getting out a large vote for the March 9 election, Ellenbogen told his followers of the crisis atmosphere in the recently convened California legislature. Concerned with calls for budget cuts in entitlement and social service programs, Ellenbogen said, "It is critical that seniors unite behind a get-out-the-vote effort to insure a continuation of funding for senior programs, and to gain the enactment of priority proposals adopted at the October 1992 senior legislature session."

Joe Gaynes, who is retiring after ten years of service in the CSL, the past four years as Senior Senator, has identified some of the priority proposals as statewide and universal access to health care, public transit, and adult day care. In endorsing Ellenbogen as his successor, Gaynes agreed that by turning out in large numbers on election day, a strong message would be sent to Sacramento to pay

Current Issues Forum Meets

The next meeting of the Current Issues Forum will be held on Friday, March 5, in the AR at 7:30 p.m. A Meet Your Candidates Night will be held to present eight candidates for the California Senior Legislature.

In a March 9 election, senior voters will choose among the eight candidates to replace the county's one senior senator and two senior assembly representatives, who are all stepping down at the end of their terms this spring.

In the Senate race, the local candidates are Edward Shuck of Thousand Oaks and Joseph Ellenbogen of Leisure Village. The candidates for the two assembly seats are: Jean Dewey of Simi Valley; Jesse Dunlap of Camarillo; Oscar Karrin of Oxnard; Samuel Rosen of Newbury Park; Robert

Unruhe of Ojai; and Eugenie Wheeler of Ventura.

The California State Legislature created the California Senior Legislature (CSL) in 1980.

Patterned after the state Legislature, the CSL also has 120 members; 40 senior senators, and 80 assembly members.

The Senior Legislature holds an annual five-day legislative session during October in the State Capitol at Sacramento.

Prior to the Sacramento session, Senior Legislators prepare drafts of their legislative proposals, the CSL members advocate with the State Legislature for the passage of the CSL priorities.

Since its inception in 1980, many of the priority bills sponsored by the Senior Legislature have been signed into law.

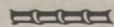

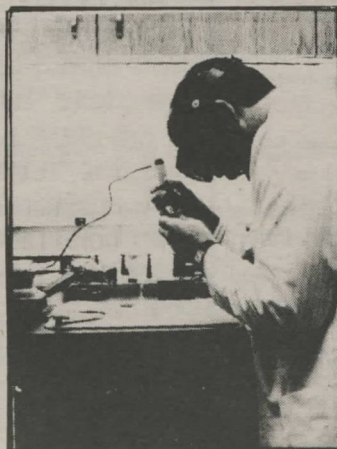
stretching exercises before going in for a swim. After which he dove in, got out to do ten push-ups and a head stand for a count of ten.

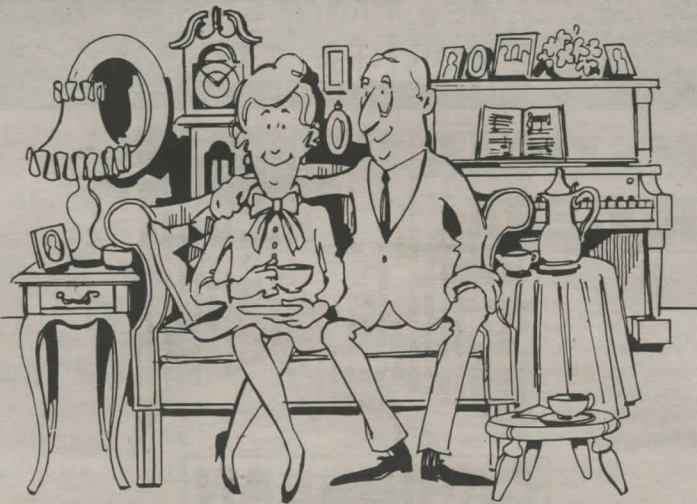

DON'T GET READY WAIT FOR THE QUAKE

The Emergency Services Organization sponsored an American Red Cross First Aid and CPR class. Three ARC instructors conducted the training. Chief Moses' Security Department provided two of the instructors: Lt. Jim Moore and Officer Sean Russell. Tom LaFrance was the third man. Now we have an additional eleven certified for our First Aid Unit of ESO. To those, I give heartfelt thanks and congratulations. Several have said how inadequate they feel in view of all they tried to assimilate. As the instructors said: REVIEW! To any who have ever taken a first-aid course

and have a booklet yet, get it out and go through it. I do!

Many others have asked for the Red Cross training. Even medical professionals can take it. However, the medical pros cannot be on the ESC/ESO roster. Many medical pros took the ARC course in April '91. Their first aid certificate is good for 3 years. But, their CPR certificate was only good for 1 year. I renewed my CPR through the Advantage program at Pleasant Valley Hospital. I urge those of you in that category to call PVH.

We have had to re-design our Emergency Plan for LV; our medical pros can no longer be on our roster. So, we only have a First Aid Unit. I hope to have our new manual in a very few months.

After any disaster in the world, electrical power is off for days, weeks sometimes. It is

then HAM amateur radio operator's act. So our LV ARC (Leisure Village Amateur Radio Club) has asked for space in the remodeled Shuffleboard area to place a transceiver, antenna (erected during emergencies or an exercise only) and a 2200 Watt gas generator as a 110 volt power source. Bob Kumler originally proposed this. Many of our HAMs have urged and we have sent such a recommendation to the Board.

Another recommendation we sent to the Board was for an adequate pump to set in our swimming pool and have enough force to fight a fire that may or could break out in the Recreation Center, should an earthquake break our water mains and Station 52 be occupied elsewhere.

The ES committee has been approached by various companies desiring to make a presentation of their product of kits for EQ survival, or a device similar to lifeline.

Our R&Rs Sections 9.05 and 9.06 pg 22 of our phone book, prohibit these vendors from LV solicitations. However, that has been your Emergency Services Committee and Organization's message for about ten (10) years now; PREPARE!!

We cannot endorse any items but do urge you to watch the media, and 'Inside Leisure Village', where they advertise. I do have brochures from several companies, if anyone is interested.

Will some public spirited person out there please come on in to the committee as co-chairperson and be ready to take over when I must leave July 1st? All LVers and I will appreciate it.

Do you remember how to open your garage door when the electricity goes off?

Now that "How to Succeed in Business" is in preparation, some of our girls are in rehearsal for that too. You see they do not work with Hoofers exclusively.

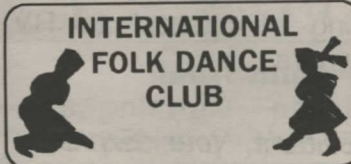

Profile:**Helen Phillips, Peace Corps Volunteer****By Bernice Epstein**

Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "Unless you try to do something beyond what you have already mastered, you will never grow." The subject of this month's profile, Helen Phillips, V39, has always been willing to try new experiences and adventures, learning from all of them and giving of herself in the process.

Even now, in retirement, with a busy schedule of bridge several times a week, golf at least once a week, bowling in two leagues, and knitting beautiful, intricate pieces of handiwork, she still finds time to volunteer at Pleasant Valley Hospital two days a week and can be found at the Admission Desk or the Reception Desk, enjoying being of service. She is also available for tasks needing to be done in the Village, such as putting labels on the Village Voice for mailing.

Helen was born in Shell Rock, Iowa, the youngest of four children — the first daughter. She remembers that her father, a heating engineer, travelled a great deal and only came home weekends. Most of her childhood was spent in Cedar Falls, Iowa, not leaving the state until she married a Navy man and went to Chicago.

After the war, they settled in the Philadelphia area. They had two children — a son, Steven, now living in Corvallis, Oregon; and a daughter, Carol, in Ann Arbor, Michigan. There are six grandchildren, four boys and two girls ranging in age from 5 years to 29.

Education is a very high priority in this family. Steven is a Ph.D. and conducts workshops and seminars in business interpersonal relations. Carol has her Master's Degree in Special Education, while Carol's hus-

band, also a Ph.D., teaches Economics at the University of Michigan.

Helen herself graduated from Iowa State Teachers' College, and initially taught math on the high school level. She then became a specialist in junior high school math. While working on her Master's Degree from Temple University, PA, majoring in guidance, Helen became a "cooperative teacher", instructing and advising student teachers.

After obtaining her degree in guidance, she became a school counselor for ten years, and then was chairman of the Guidance Department. Her ultimate goal was to receive her Ph.D., but after one year, had to discontinue her studies, as circumstances changed in her life, and she became a single parent with two children in college that needed her help.

In 1977, Helen became eligible for a year's sabbatical. She had become pretty independent by now, felt adventurous, and wanted to do something different, so she volunteered for the Peace Corps and was accepted. Her description in a nutshell of her two years and three months in the Kingdom of Tonga in the South Pacific, is a universal motto of the Peace Corps: "The hardest job you ever learned to love."

Tonga is a group of 150 islands, 35 of which are populated. After spending three months learning the culture and the language of the area, Helen became the Inservice Mathematics Teacher Trainer for the Middle Schools of the Free Wesleyan Church.

Teaching methods were very poor, schools looked like large storage sheds, and no desks or schoolbooks were available, so Helen made up copies of workbooks, observed the teachers at

work, then showed them how to teach the children and how to use the books, giving them encouragement and suggestions.

While there, Helen lived like the natives, with no basic, modern conveniences that we take for granted; e.g., refrigerator, washing machine, oven, vacuum cleaner, etc., but she did have running water and a bathroom.

In Tonga, she had to travel from school to school on the island, and then to other schools on six other islands in the

One of the bedrooms in Helen's home is filled with memories of her 27 months in Tonga. A beautiful, ornate Tapa Cloth covers an entire wall, and a Tapa Board, pictures of Tonga royalty, baskets and trays are proudly displayed. She even has some of the colorful Tonga clothing that she wore while there. This was an experience that will live in her heart and memory forever.

In 1980, when her time in the Peace Corps was over, Helen was at loose ends for a while, not

tioned previously, she keeps very busy in retirement, doing all the things she likes to do, while continuing and always expanding her community involvement. She comes forward, in her giving manner, to help out where needed, always ready to try something new and different.
