

As regards the poultry plant, we built the brooder house as wanted by Mr. Jones, and at about the price he thought it would be, but (as expected) he found it too much affected by changes of temperature, and a lining has been ordered for it. He is asking also for chicken runs, Mr. McClure says a considerable number of them.

Should not whatever goes in down there be on a revised carefully thought out plan, so that the place will not repeat old conditions? A certain amount of money, as in the case of the brooder house, goes in to give what the man thinks will answer; more money has to go in to make it effective, *usually*.
