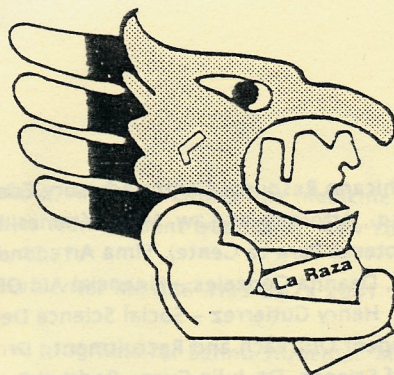

"REQUEST ITEM" STATUS - WHAT'S THAT?

All of the circulating materials in the Africana Center and the Chicano Library have "request item" status in the library's online catalog. This enables you to request items and have them paged and held for you at the Main Loan Desk in Clark Library.

You may request items in advance and check them out from the Main Loan Desk in Clark Library at times when the Africana Center/Asian American Center/Chicano Library is not open.

To request items click on the "request" button and enter your name, campus id number and library pin number. Items are paged from Monday through Friday at 1 p.m.

CHICANO RESOURCE CENTER ADVISORY COMMITTEE
