
The Current Issues Forum will present its second special election program on Friday, October 27, 2000, at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Room. This program will focus on the upcoming election of two members of the Camarillo City Council.

There are four candidates running for these two Positions. They are:
1) Carlos Cruz, retired California Highway Patrol officer; 2) Kevin Kildee, incumbent councilman;
3) Les Meredith, former Planning Commissioner; and 4) Don Waunch, Planning Commissioner.

The Camarillo City Council consists of five members who each serve a four year term. These terms are staggered so that at one time, two seats are vacant, as now; and the next time, three seats become vacant. Council members are elected at large, i.e. they do not represent any





particular district or area, but the city in general. They also select their own mayor and vicemayor from among their group.

The City Council is responsible for making the major decisions for Camarillo; of course, within the limits of state laws. This includes such tasks as: monitoring land usage, growth and development; approving building permits and requests for construction; appointing and supervising city employees; and making financial decisions regarding the use of city revenues.

In other words, these officials are responsible for local policies and plans that can directly

affect the quality of our lives in Leisure Village. Therefore, it is important to meet these candidates, hear what they have to say, and learn where they stand on various major issues.

This upcoming Current Issues program will provide just such an opportunity. At that meeting, each candidate will discuss his qualifications for office, and will also define his priorities, if elected. This will be followed by a question-andanswer period when members of the audience can directly ask about subjects of special concern to them. We urge you to be sure to attend this important and informative meeting.

When prospective buyers check out Leisure Village, two questions that are immediately asked are, "How much are the dues?", and "What do we get for that?". Residents of Leisure Village get a lot.

For a monthly assessment that is in the price of a night's stay in a four-star resort hotel, residents get a month of resort living. The sporty three-par golf course is well maintained and challenging in spite of its size. The tennis and the paddle tennis courts are newly resurfaced and in excellent condition. The table tennis area attracts a large following, especially in the hot summer afternoons, and later in the rainy season. Bocce ball is also popular. The bike lanes make cycling a delight. Unless a tournament is scheduled, one can play any sport any time at no extra cost. The tournaments are fun and reasonably priced.

Those who like competitive games, but don't want to get hot and bothered, can drop into the billiard room, where there is usually plenty of action. Shuffle board is another option. The serious exerciser will

find the work out room to their liking. The jacuzzi offers a great way to relax those tired muscles after all that work, and the refurbished swimming pool offers more exercise or just cooling off. And as one lies on the lounge, they must notice the gazebo area, the beautiful landscaping, and then look to the mountains in the background. (While Leisure Village CAN'T take credit for those, they are part of

the ambience.)

Numerous bridge and other card games are available at various levels at all hours of the day. Various art and dance classes are offered, as are self help groups. Dances are held on Saturday nights; those months which have five Saturdays feature a live band dance. The garden patches, and computer lab offer other options.

Leisure Villagers have an array of choices and live in a beautiful park like setting. That's what we

Ed is very concerned that the frequency and the amount of claims are causing potential financial hardship for the Village in the near future. He is particularly concerned that the rate of negligent claims are rising. The problem he feels, is caused by the fact that Leisure Village is considered the primary carrier and the homeowner is the secondary carrier. Ed strongly recommends a CC&R change to reverse that order.

Evans was on the Insurance Committee in 1994 when the Northridge earthquake struck. The Board appointed him as the adjuster for Leisure Village because they could not find an independent adjuster. Ed worked every household claim, with a net savings the Village of \$700,000.

Ed and his wife, Illene, have been residents of Leisure Village for 14 vears, and Ed has been a very involved homeowner most of that time. The Evans' come from Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, where Ed owned an Insurance Brokerage Agency for 37 years. He is proud for the fact that he never advertised and his clients were all referrals. 


