### Volunteer For A Committee Now

Summer months may seem warm and lazy, with some Village groups not meeting. But for the LVA Board of Directors, July is a very busy time. The newly elected members join the experienced holdovers and reorganize themselves, then designate liaisons to the many standing committees.

Those committees, all staffed by Village volunteers, carry on their activities through August for continuity. The committees are reformed for the new Volunteer year, which starts September 1. Some residents resign and new people join.

Are you familiar with the functions of the Village committees? Have you attended any meeting of these important committees to observe?

Without the present committee system, the Village would be a very different place—and much more costly. Dedicated volunteers contribute a great amount of service to the Village, in order to preserve pleasant Village life.

Here are brief descriptions of the committees: Emergency Services organizes to prepare to cope if such disasters such as an earthquake or a toxic spill occur. Channel 12 runs the Village calendar of events, tapes and shows Village plays, musical and dance events, speakers, interviews. Architecture and landscape processes permits to change landscaping or housing additions. Education and Recreation oversees many sub-committees—educational classes, pool, woodshop, library, interest, sports and hobby groups. Building and Grounds checks landscape maintenance, both in green belt area and owner-cared-for red stake areas. Insurance committee seeks competitive bids for the best insurance coverage for Village needs. Finance oversees the budget making process and checks current income/spending. Safety and Security deals with gate and visitor passes, traffic patrols, emergency responses, annual decaling of cars. Travel plans trips, handling lodging and transportation arrangements, sells tickets. The Purchase Research committee advises the Board on large expenditures. Bingo committee runs weekly games in the Assembly Room.

About 160 Village volunteers make the wheels go around for all of us. These generous people deserve our deep appreciation for their efforts as this volunteer year draws to a close. Many of them will continue their work to keep Village life functioning smoothly. They also welcome new blood, especially newcomers to the Village. Training is available.

Pick a committee whose work interests you and submit your application to join the ranks of willing and eager volunteers. Applications are available on the lobby table in the Recreation Center. Donate a few hours a week to help YOUR Village. July is the month of decision—volunteer now!

## New Barbecue Ready For Summer Cooking



## Profile: Bernard & Doris Goldman

Bernie and Doris Goldman were among the early pioneers of Leisure Village in 1975 when there were just open fields beyond Mountain View Drive and when everybody in the village knew each other. Like many other residents they came from the mid-west. They were both born in Detroit. Doris graduated from the University of Michigan with a degree in Sociology. Bernie attended Wayne State and majored in German. After working in a small department store and various playgrounds nights, and during the summer, he was able to enter the Wayne State College of Medicine from which he graduated in 1940 and completed his internship in June, 1941.

He was a house physician at Mt. Clemens, a suburb of Detroit, and after a stint of practicing in a big city and making house calls clear across town, he was determined never to practice in a large metropolis. He decided to settle in Mt. Clemens, a town of 23,000, which had a friendly small-town atmosphere.

But then came Pearl Harbor and Bernie applied for his commission. After several assignments with fighter groups in the Air Force, he became a Flight Surgeon at Randolph Field in Texas and was attached to the 13th Air Force, 12th Fighter Squadron in the South Pacific Theater.

He was overseas from October, 1943 to August 14, 1945 in New Caledonia, New Guinea, Guadalcanal, the Dutch East Indies and the Philippines. When the first A-bomb was dropped, Bernie was in an oxygen tent in a hospital suffering from a collapsed lung. But he brought out a bottle of Canadian Club he

had saved for such an occasion and he and his buddies celebrated the end of the war. He returned to the U.S. by ship and was discharged in February, 1946.

He spent 2 1/2 years as a resident in Internal Medicine and a one year fellowship in Hematology after which he returned to Mt. Clemens and practiced Internal Medicine.

Bernie had applied for a California license in 1947. By the 1970's he had tired of private practice and the mountains of paper work required by the government. He and Doris had explored California after attending a seminar in San Francisco and they were taken by Camarillo.

In 1973 he joined the staff of Camarillo State Hospital. He was Chief of Staff from 1976 to 1977 and stayed there till he

retired in 1980. At first they lived in Oxnard Shores but the climate of Camarillo lured them and they came to the village in 1975.

Bernie and Doris met at a birthday party given by a relative. They were married in 1947 after Doris graduated from the University of Michigan. She worked for a year in the Welfare Department but then devoted herself to raising three daughters and a son.

She did volunteer work in the St. Joseph's hospital in Mt. Clemens and served on the Girl Scout Council, in ORT, and in the medical auxiliary. Now she and Bernie, whose home is on the 9th tee, like to spend their time golfing.

Bernie's accomplishments are many. He was awarded seven battle stars and a presidential unit citation. He practiced internal medicine from 1949 to 1973, and was a medical consultant at a

psychiatric hospital in Warren, Michigan from 1950 to 1968, and became a Certified Diplomate of the Board of Internal Medicine in 1951.

Staff at St. Joseph's hospital in Mt. Clemens, president of the Macomb County Medical Association in 1960 and President of the Michigan So-



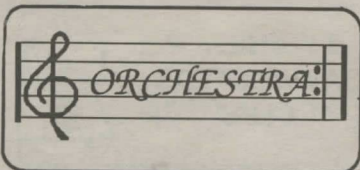

The orchestra size varies with illnesses and travel plans, and we could but wish that the Open Board Meetings would have the same large turnout the "Candidates" did.

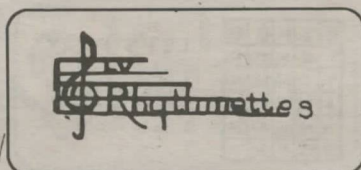

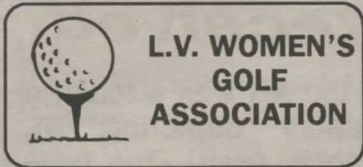
## L.V. Chorale

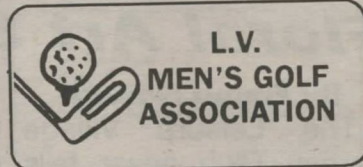

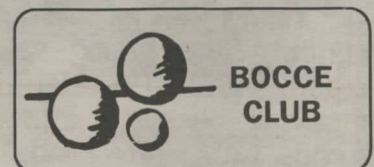

## Elderhostels Attract Village Singles

Elderhostels, the weekly educational adventures for seniors, have attracted many single ladies in LV and all are delighted to recount their experiences.

Ginny Leffingwell, V.19, who truly enjoys outdoor activities, has been on four programs lately, usually with several LV friends.

Her favorite was at Southern Utah University, Cedar City. Highlighting the program was the Utah Shakespearean Festival, which included two plays plus seminars on acting, costume, production, music and special effects. Trips to Zion National Park and Glen Canyon were rewarding, and included the study of geology.

Simpson College in Redding also included geology plus geography and

history of northern California lakes, rivers and volcanoes. Side trips to Mt. Lassen and Mt. Shasta were included. "Israel: The Land of Milk and Honey" was the second subject at Simpson, and a musical program featuring the romantic music of the 1800's was the third.

Wonder Valley, a ranch setting 35 miles east of Fresno, was covered in an earlier ILV issue, but Ginny's subjects were quite different. Sponsored by Fresno State University,

the class studied the Basque people, and the history of Russia from 1914 to the present.

Ginny went to San Diego for a program sponsored by Nazarene College in Point Loma. Courses included early history of San Diego, study of tidepools plus exercise classes.

Lottie Bauch of V. 20 chose four programs close by. Classes at Cal Lutheran University in T.O. offered history of both Egypt and India, plus

some mathematics, and art impressionists. Her favorite was the Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts. As an artist herself, she loved the painting class, plus music and dancing. The study of ancient Greece rounded out a great week. Whittier College proved to have some ups and downs. Her instructor for Russian-American relations was excellent and she also enjoyed a tour of the Nixon library. There were classes in bird watching, but no birds.

Lottie found the University of Judaism in the Santa Monica Mountains an interesting experience, although some of the biblical classes required deep study. Still, there were dancing and exercise classes which she really enjoyed.

Every Elderhosteler agrees that the instructors have all been delightful, informative people and are the chief reason--beside the fantastic range

of subject matter available--to be boosters of the Elderhostel programs.

# Once Upon A Memory

## Can You Spare A Sandwich?

For the first time in years I was staying at home in the daytime. My doctor had insisted that I quit work and rest a great deal. I could find things to do, of course, but I was bored and it felt strange to be alone so much. I missed being with people.

We had recently moved into a house that would accommodate a nursery and I had met only a few of the neighbors. Under those circumstances I was delighted one morning to hear a knock on my back door. To my surprise a strange man stood there, politely holding his hat in his hand. He was hungry, he said and asked if I could give him something

to eat. I pointed to a chair on my screened porch and brought him a glass of milk while I made a generous sandwich and put it in a bag with a large apple. He thanked me and left, but I was cheered by this small adventure.

In a couple of days I had another such visitor whom I also fed. Before the week was over there were five more; things were getting out of hand. Besides interfering with the rest that the doctor had ordered, those sandwiches were beginning to make a dent in the budget that was, of course, greatly reduced by the loss of my salary. Something clearly had to be done for I could not bear to turn away a hungry man.

By this time I was becoming acquainted with some of the neighbors, but not one of them had had a beggar!

Our house was on a short cross street which meant that one side of it was almost upon a wide paved alley used mostly by residents whose garages, in the midwestern style of those times, opened on it. One day I decided to start my morning walk through it to the next block. On the very first of the garage doors was a small curious graffiti. It looked like a small child's drawing of a smiling woman.

In 1939 even most small children knew better than to deface buildings. Graffiti of that day was usually confined to large rocks along highways, bridges and public toilets. This was unusual enough to make me remember it, but I finished my walk another way home.

The next day I had an-

other beggar. I gave him a sandwich and he went towards the alley munching it. I stood at the door a moment watching him, wondering what I could do to stop the flow. But he had reached the first garage and I saw him pause slightly, turn a little to the right, and give a big smile. With a barely perceptible bow toward the place where the picture was, he went on his way.

Memory clicked in! I knew! That was it! Somewhere, a long time ago I had read that hobos of the late 19th and early 20th century, who called themselves "Knights of the Road," had used such a drawing as a code to point out hospitable homes. These were not desperate victims of the depression but were men who had deliberately chosen that way of life for the fun of it!

When I had waited long enough to be sure that the man was beyond

the alley, I went out to look again. Now I had no more doubts; as I looked at the crude drawing of a broadly smiling woman pointing directly at my back door. Even the exact quote of the code came back to me—"Good woman lives here."

I returned to my house for a bucket of soapy



water and a brush to scrub my neighbor's garage door clean of any trace. Under the circumstances the compliment was unappreciated.

Sure enough, the parade of supplicants vanished, too.

I have known a few people who have heard of such a drawing but I have never met another who has ever been the target of one and had to deal with it.
