MEDIA INFORMATION and DIRECTORY

PRESS ROOM: Room 162 in the eastern wing of the gymnasium serves as the press room for Titan basketball. Five telephone lines are available -- two at all times and three after the conclusion of radio post-game shows.

PRESS TABLES: Primary beat reporters, scouts and broadcasters will be located on the north side of the playing floor opposite the scorer's table.

GAME SUMMARY PACKETS: Booklets consisting of computer generated halftime and final boxes and manually-typed play-by-play summaries will be collated and distributed in Room 162.

PRESS/PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. Photo credentials must be worn in plain sight at all times. Photographers may shoot only from the designated areas behind both baselines.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

- a) Using Lot A at State College and Yorba Linda Blvd. or Lot B off State College Blvd. and paying \$1.50 (Monday thru Thursday only; free on Friday nights and weekends) upon entry for a daily permit, or:
- b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

BROADCAST SPACE: One" table" is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each position handles three persons comfortably. Two complimentary lines are available in most cases.

TELEPHONES: There is one telephone at the press table -- (714) 278-3970 -- which must be kept free for messages, out-of-town scores, etc. Additional telephones CANNOT be installed at the press table due to the physical limitations of the building. Please call if you have special telephone needs.

LOCKER ROOMS: Are located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. Bob Hawking will conduct his post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office just outside the Fullerton players' locker room, which is CLOSED to the media. Players will be brought to the office area upon request after a reasonable cooling-off period.

Cal State Fullerton: Where Learning Is Preeminent

California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 38th year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 115,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and a branch in Mission Viejo - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 22,000 students currently enrolled and more than 2,200 faculty and staff employees, Cal State Fullerton im-



pacts the community by approximately \$600 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven schools: The Arts; Business Administration and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Develo

opment and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Science and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and theater. In all there are 94 degree programs - with 44 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities, and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 16th nationally in the total overall number of minorities who graduate, with a ranking of 12th for both Asians and Hispanics (No. 3 for both in Communications and No. 4 for Asians in both Education and Business). In California, the university is No. 1 for awarding undergraduate degrees in business and management to Hispanic and Native Americans, and communications degrees to Hispanic, Asian and Native Americans. A No. 2 ranking is held in California for

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as a mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the Big West Conference representative to and vice-chaiman of the NCAA Presidents Commission, California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of New Orleans, Louisiana.



undergraduate education degrees to Hispanic Americans.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as 31 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on-and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program is aimed chiefly at students, but is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, for which it spearheaded the fundraising campaign. The center serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In less than four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.

John Easterbrook, Athletic Director



John Easterbrook is in his fourth year in charge of the athletic department riding the momentum of a noteworthy first three years. Under his leadership, the Titans have come out in the black budgetarily and had three teams gain the national quarterfinals led by the 1995 NCAA championship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1,

1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Div. I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 58, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and CEO of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1961) in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children and three granddaughters. John and his two sons are avid golfers.

If only one word could be used to best describe athletics at Cal State Fullerton over nearly four decades it would probably be overachievement. Dedicated student-athletes and resourceful coaches have ridden "Titan Pride" to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

The results of the Sears Directors' Cup standings for each of the past four years, which rank institutions on the basis of national championship places for men's and women's sports, are typical. The Titans have parlayed big seasons by baseball, fencing, men's

Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league baseball draft.

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of Coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four." Coach Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the PCAA post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico (led by Michael Cooper) and USF (led by Bill Cartwright) to gain the finals of the Western Regional, where they lost in the final seconds to the Sidney Moncrief-led Arkansas Razorbacks, 61-58.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and Coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings

and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. His teams earned a pair of NIT berths while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and the NCAA fields. Genia Miller was a 1991 Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked shots and No. 7 in rebounding.

Seven Titans from the last 15 seasons have played in the NBA including current Phoenix Sun Cedric Ceballos and the Boston Celtics' Bruce Bowen.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three NCAA College Division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level in the 1980s while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation behind former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans usually have finished in the nation's Top 20 and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards and later became Miss Virginia for the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of Coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, an all-star fixture with the Montreal Expos who recently completed an 18-year career with the Angels and Dodgers. Garrido won the College World Series again in 1984 but probably most impressive was his 1995 team, which was ranked No. 1 in the nation most of the year and proved it by winning the final 18 games of the season to go 57-9 and capture the school's third NCAA title. The star was outfielder-pitcher Mark Kotsay, who won the Titans' third Golden Spikes Award as the nation's top amateur player as well as Fullerton's fourth CWS MVP Award.

A total of 25 Titan products have played in the major leagues with Kotsay and Dante Powell joining the ranks in 1997 with the Florida Marlins and the San Francisco Giants, respectively.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a perennial powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series and 17 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home the NCAA Championship in 1986 and have carried the nation's No. 1 ranking on several occasions.

There have been national titles in men's cross-country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runners Mark Covert and Heather Killeen. Wrestler Laszlo Molnar placed second at 167 pounds in the 1994 NCAA championships.

Football had its moments, too, at Cal State Fullerton before being suspended after the 1992 season due to the state's financial problems. The program came of age under the guidance of Coach Gene Murphy in the 1980s with a pair of conference championships and four runnerup finishes in a seven-year span between 1983 and 1989. Murphy's products include Super Bowlers Mark Collins (New York Giants) and Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati) and current Canadian Football League stars Mike Pringle (MVP) and Allen Pitts (receiving record holder).

Meanwhile, Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in the stadium. The women's team was launched in 1993, the same year the men made their first Final Four appearance. The Titan men have advanced to at least the second round of the NCAA playoffs in three of the past four years.

ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE



The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletes.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide academic and effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Cal State Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advise-

ment, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available.

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Counselor Pam Vasquez and Administrative Assistant Barbara Kempton and two half-time graduate assistants in Tish Van Bibber and Tammi Bories, who serve as academic counselors and peer mentors. Kempton has been at CSUF for 30 years, and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable to student-athletes who may need help with administrative paperwork and problems.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system -- periodic grade checks -- in place which encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student

is having problems with coursework and may require academic support.

Student-athletes at CSUF take an average of 4 1/2 to 5 years to graduate, and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist with selecting and registering for classes, referring students to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

"Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments,"

says McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former studentathletes who wish to complete their studies, offering them the same services which were available to them when they competed for us."

The office of Athletic Academic Services helps student-athletes feel comfortable in the CSUF environment and McCarthy's experience before coming to the department in July, 1992, helps the orientation process.

McCarthy received her masters degree in social science from Cal State Fullerton in 1987 and has been working in education since 1984. Previous to her appointment in athletics, McCarthy worked for three years as the Assistant Director of the Learning Assistance Resource Center at CSUF before budget cuts eliminated the department.

Before coming to Cal State, McCarthy was the director of student services at Western State University, College of Law, and before that was the director of student services at the University of Phoenix.

The City of Fullerton was born of the railroads, grew because of oil and citrus, reached adulthood after World War II and is now maturing as an educational center of urbanized Orange County. It is located about 30 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and about 20 miles inland from the beaches of the Pacific Ocean.

The first settlers were an Indian tribe known as the Gabrielenos, who were on hand when the first Spanish explorers arrived in 1769.



The former Union Pacific train depot, built in 1923, has been converted into a restaurant. It is listed on the National Registry of Historical Places.

By the 1830s, the expanses of mustard fields and cactus became part of a vast 35,000-acre grant of Juan Pacific Ontiveras, who sold off the land to newcomers from the eastern United States.

The Amerige brothers, George and Edward, entered the picure in 1887 when they heard rumors of the coming of the California Central Railroad. They bought up land and offered a free right of way to George H. Fullerton, president of the Pacific Land and Improvement Co., a Santa Fe Railway subsidiary. They laid out the town from a stake at what is now downtown, Commonwealth and Harbor Blvd., and named it in honor of its benefactor.

Charles Chapman, a descendant of legendary "Johnny Appleseed," revolutionized the exploding citrus industry by intro-

ducing the Valencia orange. Under the same rich agriculture ground, oil was discovered and by 1912, wells extended for 12 miles along the Fullerton hills into what is now Brea.


The city was incorporated in 1904 and Chapman was the first mayor. An airfield was established in 1927 and

the Fullerton Municipal Airport remains a busy general aviation facility.

Another boom began as veterans returned from World War II and demanded homes for their young families. As that growth cycle slowed, the city was able to concentrate on providing the necessary amenities and educational opportunities blossomed. Cal State Fullerton joined Fullerton College, which was established in 1913, and it was followed by Western States College of Law, Southern California College of Optometry and Pacific Christian College, which is now known as Hope University. All are within a 2-mile radius in the east part of town.

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was



Mark Monninger brought Tuffy to life in the early 1980s.


thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence.'

Nothing official was done about a

mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as

he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed as evidenced by the adjacent photographs. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was initiated in 1992 with a deemphasis of the orange, originally favored by former Director of Athletics Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State *College* Boulevard. To its alumni of more than 110,000, it's simply Cal State Fullerton.

The "break-through" season Bob Hawking hoped to enjoy in 1996-97 was derailed in late January when leading scorer and rebounder John Williams broke his wrist. Still, Hawking has the program on track as he begins his fourth season and has a veteran squad ready to return the Titans to the prominence they enjoyed during the 1980s.


"We thought last year would be the break-through because we had some players with Div. I experience returning and we think we accomplished that at 13-14, although the injury to Williams kind of clouded the picture," said Hawking of his third season as head coach. "We think we would have won at least a couple of the games we lost without him down the stretch and only one more would have given us a winning record.


"The first two seasons were the initial steps in the rebuilding of this program. The foundation for future success has been established and the dividends will be forthcoming.

"Our staff and student-athletes are working very hard to make our program respectable," said Hawking, 47, who served as interim head coach in 1994-95 and earned a three-year contract on Apr. 19, 1995. "We are committed to making it work. Our intention is to build from the ground up. With that as the focus, we will not assume anything. We intend to establish goals, work ethic and the intangible qualities needed for any organization to be successful.

"On the court we want to play up tempo. We have recruited to that style and will continue to do so. Secondly, but just as importantly, we will put a priority on playing and practicing hard on a daily basis."

The Titans began Hawking's first season well, splitting their first six games and jumping off to a 2-0 start in the Big West Conference with wins at UNLV and UC Irvine. But several injuries down the stretch drained the limited depth and the Titans settled for a 7-20 overall mark and a 5-13 Big West log while going with basically a 3-guard lineup. His second year was almost a carbon copy. Included in marks of 6-20 and 5-13 were a buzzer-beating win at San Diego State, another win over UC Irvine and the first sweep of New Mexico State since 1986-87 despite short seasons from injured guards Chris St. Clair and Brian Thomas and a total of 41 missed games by players.

Last year's team had a 7-3 non-conference record including rare victories at BYU and Montana and a close home loss to Utah. It was 10-6 before Williams missed 11 games.

Hawking was the top assistant under Brad Holland for two years (1992-93 and 1993-94) at Fullerton after two-year stints under Bob Williams at UC Davis and Tom Asbury at Pepperdine. Hawking's high



school coaching career began at Pater Noster High in Los Angeles and he later served as head coach at Simi Valley High School for 14 years and developed a championship program. His teams went to the CIF playoffs nine times and won five Marmonte League


championships. His 1987 team was ranked No. 4 in the state and his 1988 team won the CIF title behind the play of Don MacLean, who went on to become the all-time leading scorer in the Pac-10 for UCLA. Hawking was selected the CIF Southern Section 4A Coach of the Year.



The playing career of Hawking began at Alemany High School in Mission Hills and continued at Pierce

College, where he played for current Louisville Coach Denny Crum. He completed his playing career at Cal State Northridge, where he earned a degree in 1971.

Hawking was born on Nov. 7, 1949, in Chicago. He and his wife, Jeannie, have three children. Son Butch, a graduate of the Air Force Academy, is an assistant basketball coach at Cal State Northridge. Daughter Kristin, 19, is a sophomore competing in cross country and track and field at Arizona State. Son Quinn, 15, is playing basketball at Sonora High School in La Habra.





1997-98 COACHING STAFF - From front: Bob Hawking, George Fuller, Ronnie Dean and Todd Johnson.



The Dean of Metropolitan L.A. Coaches

Although beginning only his fourth season as the head coach at Cal State Fullerton, Bob Hawking can be called the "dean" of the eight Div. I men's basketball coaches in the metropolitan Los Angeles area based on continuous service to his campus.

First-year coaches are on the job at UC Irvine (Pat Douglass) and Loyola Marymount (Charles Bradley). Second-year men have the title at UCLA (Steve Lavin), Long Beach State (Wayne Morgan), Cal State Northridge (Bobby Braswell), USC (Henry Bibby) and Pepperdine (Lorenzo Romar). None of the above, including Hawking, were previously head coaches at the Div. I level.





George Fuller (Grand Valley State '78)

George Fuller is in his fourth year as the top assistant for Head Coach Bob Hawking. An assistant the previous 10 seasons at Grand Valley State in Allendale, Michigan, Fuller was hired as an assistant at Fullerton on Aug. 22, 1994, and stepped up a notch on Sept. 22 when Hawking replaced former head coach Brad Holland.

Fuller spearheads the Titans' recruiting efforts and plays a large part in game preparation both in practice and in opponent scouting. In addition, he assists Coach Hawking with the summer basketball camp. His focus with the players primarily is with the post players and on team defense.

Fuller, 41, had spent his entire basketball career at Grand Valley. A two-time all-conference selection, he was the starting point guard on three conference championship teams for Head Coach Tom Villemure and earned his degree in 1978 in public administration. He stayed on campus as first a part-time and then a fulltime aide to Villemure.

During his tenure, Fuller also coordinated the athletic study table for all sports except football and he worked four years in the school's financial aid department. He also taught physical education classes and earlier worked in the university's admissions office. He obtained a masters degree in public administration in 1993 at Grand Valley State.

George and his wife, Rochelle, live in Chino Hills and have a son, Jonathan, 8. George's brother, Tony, was the head basketball coach at Pepperdine.

Newcomer Ronnie Dean joined the Titans' staff just as the Fall semester was beginning and he immediately was assigned to hit the recruiting trail.


A highly successful coach and recruiter in the Midwest, Dean will spend most of his time recruiting for Cal State Fullerton. He most recently was employed by Ballplayers Scouting Services in Missouri but has coached at several junior colleges.

"Ronnie has uncovered some outstanding players on a national scale," said Head Coach Bob Hawking. "His assignment at Fullerton will be to recruit, to recruit and to recruit."

Dean, 35, was head coach in 1993-94 at Lamar CC in Lamar, Colorado. His team went 14-17 and defeated Hutchinson, Kansas, the nation's No. 1-ranked squad. He has been an assistant coach for winning programs at Barton County JC in Great Bend, Kansas; Howard CC in Big Spring, Texas; and Allen County CC in Iola, Kansas.

Barton County's 1994-95 team went 21-10 and was ranked as high as No. 3 in the nation. The two-year record at Howard during his tenure (1991-92 thru 1992-93) was 48-15 including a No. 2 national ranking and the Allen County mark in 1990-91 was 17-13 for a combined record of 100-55 at the JC level.

Dean graduated in 1990 from Harris-Stowe State College in St. Louis. He is a native of Charleston, Missouri, and is single. He has a son, Lezcano, 15.



Todd Johnson (Oklahoma '91)

Todd Johnson returned to California to launch his collegiate coaching career when he answered Bob Hawking's call to join the Titan staff this past summer. Among his assignments are academics, daily practice planning, game-film breakdown and camps.

Johnson, 29, played for Hawking at Simi Valley High School and was the point guard on Simi Valley's CIF runnerup team in 1986.

He began his college career at Moorpark Junior College and was a twoyear starter at guard. He transferred to the University of Oklahoma, where he got his bachelor's degree in 1991 in physical education.

His coaching career began back at Simi Valley as an assistant varsity coach in 1991-92. He returned to the southwest and began a teaching and coaching career in the state of Texas but often returned to southern California to work summer camps in the Simi Valley and Thousand Oaks areas.

Johnson eventually became the head basketball coach at St. Mark's School of Texas in Dallas. His 1994-95 team won a Div. I title and his next two teams won Div. II championships in the 1995-96 and 1996-97 seasons, compiling a 55-34 record along the way.

Johnson's wife, Jan, is a resident physician at Children's Hospital in Dallas on her way to a career as a pediatrician.



Some of the adversity the Cal State Fullerton basketball program has endured the past few seasons will work in the Titans' favor for the 1997-98 season. Past injuries and the necessity to force-feed youngsters in key roles have combined to produce the most experienced Titan squad in memory as three fifth-year players are among a group of seven seniors and at least five players could be called returning starters.

"It's certainly as experienced a roster as I've seen here," said Bob Hawking, the fourth-year head coach who also was an

assistant for two seasons. "We return quite a few lettermen (9) and the equivalent of five starters. And the best thing is that we have a lot of multiple-position players. It was born out of necessity in the past but now we have great flexibility.

"We won't try to get too complicated even with the experience because that's not our philosophy. Where the experience really shows is in the mental part of the game -- having the ability to react and make adjustments. We would like to take the tempo up another notch in 1997-98."

Fullerton is coming off a 13-14 season that appeared headed for the positive side of the balance sheet until senior forward John Williams broke his wrist with the team at 9-6 on the year. His loss created an opportunity for De Vaughn Wright to join fellow fourth-year juniors Chris Dade (16.4 ppg, 2.1 apg) and Chris St. Clair (10.3 ppg, 3.5 apg) as team statistical leaders. Wright shot 79 per cent from the floor and averaged 7.1 points and 5.8 rebounds after Williams was hurt.

"DeVaughn finished the season in strong fashion and gives every indication that 1997-98 will be a stellar season," said Hawking.

"Rebounding is our main concern. It's been a weakness in this program and, if we are going to continue to move forward, we must shore up our board work. We need to pursue the ball and hold our opponent to one shot while getting multiple shots on our offensive glass."

The Titans' strength lies in the wing positions. Off guards Dade and St. Clair both are on the Titans' top five list of career 3-point field goal artists and sophomore Dane Plock seems destined to surpass everyone. At the small forward spot, Hawking is confident he could be at least four deep with lettermen Craig Whitehead and Josh Leighton and newcomers Ike Harmon and Jason Cunningham. And that doesn't count Dade, who has started many a game in his Titan career on the front line.

"We have the wings to be a fast-break team," said Hawking.
"It goes back to defending and rebounding and our point guard play."

St. Clair split time with graduated Ali Nayab at the point position last year and Plock played a few minutes. The key will be the return to form of redshirt sophomore Kenroy Jarrett, who sat out last season with a knee injury after starting half of his freshman season.

"Everyone is healthy, it will just be a matter of how things go in Fall practices," said Hawking.

Dade earned honorable mention All-Big West Conference honors in 1996-97 and hasn't missed a game since sitting out the 1993-94 season with a wrist injury. He is one of only 15 Titans to score 1,000 points (1,036) at the Div. I level and has been the team's top perimeter defender throughout his career.

St. Clair has battled back from two knee surgeries that cut short his 1994-95 season and then forced him to take a hardship year in 1995-96 after playing in only five games. He shot 38 per cent from 3-point range and 80 per cent at the foul line last season.

Wright missed the 1993-94 campaign with a knee injury. He started no games as a freshman, eight as a sophomore and the final 22 of his junior season, where he averaged 4.1 points and 4.8 rebounds and blocked 22 shots.

The other seniors are lettermen Whitehead, who started the first 14 games last year and averaged 7.0 points, and Wyki Tyson, a post player who appeared in 20 games last season and redshirts Cunningham from UNLV and 6-foot-11 center Jerome Archie from Cal State Los Angeles. Cunningham averaged 18.6 points and 6.3 rebounds in 1994-95 at Fullerton College.

The other lettermen are seasoned youngsters. Mark Richardson has started 31 times in a 2-year, 46-game Titan career and averaged 4.6 points and 3.9 rebounds. Jarrett averaged 4.7 points and 1.7 assists as a true freshman and started 13 of 26 games in 1995-96. Plock averaged 6.3 points last season while hitting 44 of 119 (.370) 3-point field

goals and playing in 25 games, one as a starter. Leighton appeared in 24 games last year and averaged 3.4 points and 1.1 boards.

And then there are the untested Titans including two players who have been on campus and the Titans' tallest recruit in years. The latter is 6-foot-11 Corey Sanders, who averaged 10 points, 8 rebounds and 3 blocked shots for Everett High School in Lansing, Michigan, the alma mater of Magic Johnson. Matt Caldwell, a 6-8 post player from Centennial High in Peoria, Arizona, practiced with the team last year while taking a redshirt season. That leaves the heralded Harmon, a 6-7 forward, who was idled by Prop. 48. He was an All-CIF and All-Orange County selection from Santa Ana Valley High School. He led the county in rebounding (11.2 rpg) and dominated the 1996 county all-star game.


"Harmon is very talented but will have to adjust to having had a year off," said Hawking. "We have high expectations but everyone must be patient."

Behind defending Big West champion Pacific, Hawking sees a wide-open race for the Western Division title.

"UoP is head and shoulders ahead of our division based on experience and what they have achieved," he said. "But after that you will get a wide variety of opinion."

Hawking's non-conference schedule is menacing, even for a veteran roster.

"We have five extremely challenging road games at UCLA, Utah, Pepperdine, Loyola and Wisconsin-Green Bay." he said. "It definitely will prepare us for Big West conference play."

The Big West Conference continues to undergo change as it approaches three decades of existence. Created in 1969 as the Pacific Coast Athletic Association with seven charter members, all in California, the Big West evolved into a 12-school organization for the 1996-97 academic year with half the member institutions being located outside of California.

A change in name to the Big West was made in 1988 and it has proven prophetic. The conference for the second year includes schools in Nevada (Nevada), Utah (Utah State), Idaho (Idaho and Boise State), New Mexico (New Mexico State) and Texas (North Texas) along with California (Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, Pacific, UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo). The latter comprise a western division and the non-California schools make up the eastern division.

Two divisions create an unbalanced scheduling format. Teams play home-and-home series against intra-divisional rivals for a total of 10 games. Each school plays inter-divisional foes only once, alternating sites annually, for six more games for a total of 16. Thus, each school now play as many as 10 non-conference games.

The realignment culminated a very eventful four-year span. Dennis Farrell, who has worked in the conference office in a variety of roles since 1980, was named commissioner in August of 1992. Fresno State, a charter member in 1969, moved to the Western Athletic Conference and was replaced by the University of Nevada for the 1992-93 seasons. A football consortium was created for three seasons that brought Arkansas State, Louisiana Tech, Northern Illinois and Southwestern Louisiana into a sched-

uling combine to create a much broader Big West on the gridiron. UNLV and San Jose State have moved to the Western Athletic Conference along with Hawai'i's women's teams.

Big West Conference members are nationally competitive and have won 13 NCAA Division I men's championships and 11 NCAA Division I women's championships.

Basketball success among Big West institutions has grown over the years and reached its apex in 1989-90 when UNLV won the NCAA championship in convincing fashion over Duke yet couldn't even claim sole possession of the Big West championship. New Mexico State tied the Rebels for the regular season title and actually was the No. 1 seed in the post-season tournament in Long Beach. The league's third-place team, UC Santa Barbara, went on to beat Houston in the first round of the NCAA tourney and help the Big West top all other conferences in tournament play with a .778 winning percentage (7-2).

In 1990-91, UNLV was ranked No. 1 in the nation all season until losing to Duke in the semifinals of the Final Four. New Mexico State again was ranked nationally, but Cal State Fullerton was the only other team to avoid a losing overall season. In 1992, New Mexico State captured the nation's fancy by advancing to the Sweet 16.

The Big West post-season tournament returns for a third year to Reno and the Lawlor Center at the University of Nevada. The tournament previously has been held in Stockton, Anaheim, Los Angeles, Long Beach and Las Vegas. The format for the second year includes the top four finishers in each division competing for the automatic berth into the NCAA Tournament.

The NCAA western regional finals come to Orange County in 1998 at the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim. The dates are March 19 & 21 and they mark the 20th anniversary of Fullerton's memorable trip to within a basket of the Final Four.

Coach Bobby Dye's Titans captured the nation's fancy as they parlayed a third-place finish in the Pacific Coast Athletic Assocation regular season into the kind of run that has made "March Madness" a household malady across the country.

The Titans won the 1978 PCAA postseason tournament at the Anaheim Convention Center by beating San Jose State, San Diego State and Long Beach State. In the NCAA's first round, they came from behind in Tempe, Arizona, to beat a Michael Cooper-led New Mexico team, 90-85, on Mar. II. That sent the Titans instead of the Lobos to Albuquerque for the second round and CSF came from behind again to beat a Bill Cartwright-led USF team, 75-72, on Mar. 16.

On Mar. 18, the nation saw "Cal State Who" rally again against Sidney Moncrief-led Arkansas. The Titans were still down, 59-58, in the final seconds but had the ball. Keith Anderson penetrated the key but had the ball stripped and Arkansas got a layup for a 61-58 win and a Final Four berth.

Cal State Fullerton unfortunately came up with a new definition of a two-part basketball season. Instead of non-conference and conference, the Titans' year must be broken into "with John Williams" and "without John Williams."

The Titans lost their leading scorer and rebounder 15 games into what was shaping up as the "breakthrough" season third-year Head Coach Bob Hawking had been forecasting. The Titans had enjoyed their best non-conference record in six years at 7-3 and at 9-6 were well on their way to their best overall record in four years.

And Williams was developing into a possible conference player of the year candidate. He had scored 20 or more points in nine of the 10 games preceding his regular season-ending injury, a fractured navicular bone in his right wrist suffered late in the Jan. 23 loss to Utah State. Opponents were double and even tripleteaming him, which was creating perimeter openings for a quartet of accomplished marksmen in guards Chris Dade, Chris St. Clair, Dane Plock and Ali Nayab. But that all changed.



Cal State Fullerton was 9-6 when senior forward John Williams suffered a broken bone in his wrist. The Titans went to 10-6 without him after a victory at UC Irvine but fell to 13-13 for the regular season and finished 13-14 despite his dramatic return in Reno.

Fullerton began the season with what appeared to be an impressive victory at Brigham Young. Some of the luster was lost when the Cougars' losing ways continued almost without interruption into March, but a road win is a road win. And the Titans won in another difficult venue when they bounced back from a close home loss to nationally ranked Utah to win for the first time at Montana's Dahlberg Arena as Dade again made the key late plays against what became an NCAA tourney team.

A third road win in succession at Loyola Marymount behind the excellent shooting of Nayab raised expectations to new levels, but they were quickly deflated when the Titans turned in what would be their worst performance of the season at U. of San Diego.

A four-game homestand got the Titans back on track. Their

3-point shooting prowess enabled them to coast past a previously unbeaten Loyola-Chicago team and they overcame poor shooting to defeat Pepperdine and Brown in defensive struggles. A rout of Columbia got close in the final minute but left the Titans with a sparkling 7-2 record that dropped a notch to 7-3 in the final nonconference contest, which the Titans lost in a close battle at Gonzaga, another school with a notorious home-court reputaton.

The first five Big West Conference games all went down to the final minute. The Titans got a break in the opener when 7-foot Pacific center Michael Olowokandi injured his knee two minutes into the contest. But Rayne Mahaffey stepped up for the Tigers and they got a decisive 3-point field goal from Tim Bowman to beat the shot clock in the final minute for a 6-point lead.

The Titans snapped a 7-game losing streak to Long Beach State when they survived a couple of last-minute turnovers and a desperation 3-pointer at the buzzer. The UCSB game was particularly frustrating. Williams picked up four first-half fouls only to come back in the second half with a vengeance and put the Titans into a position to win. But a key non-call on a possible basket interference by the Gauchos spoiled the rally.

Williams was at his best in leading the Titans to a win over the upstart Mustangs of Cal Poly, who had jumped out to a 3-0 start in their Big West debut. Nayab and company handled the fullcourt press and freshman Plock nailed a critical 3-pointer down the stretch.

Utah State played a near-flawless game in Titan Gym and held Williams to one first-half shot. The Titan senior showed surprising range to get some points in the second half only to slip on a wet spot and be unable to help in the closing minutes of a tight game.

The Titans managed well without Williams in their first post-injury outing. They got stellar inside play from Dirk Rassloff, Mark Richardson and Josh Leighton and won at UC Irvine.

But reality set in on a two-game trip to Idaho. Defenses extended, and when the Titans weren't hitting from the perimeter, they were in trouble. They eventually lost four games in a row and and seven of eight around another win over UC Irvine. Included in the losing streak were two narrow home losses to New Mexico State and North Texas (in overtime), when one key bucket would have guaranteed a winning season.

The continued emergence of DeVaughn Wright in the final couple of weeks combined with torrid perimeter shooting in the friendly confines of Titan Gym led to home wins over Cal Poly and UCSB. The Titans ended the regular season at the .500 mark but fell back to 13-14 when even the dramatic return of Williams for the Big West Tournament opener at Nevada couldn't offset frigid shooting.

The disabling of Williams wasn't the only major development of the 1996-97 season. Chris Dade emerged as a consistent offensive threat as well as a tough defender, leading the team in scoring 15 times. Ali Nayab had to win an appeal for his final year of eligibility and he elevated his game at point guard to help offset the season-long loss of letterman Kenroy Jarrett, who went down in November to a knee injury.

True freshman Dane Plock and Josh Leighton were regulars off the bench and St. Clair showed he was healthy after two knee operations.

The season opener for the Titans and BYU validated their coaches' feelings about experience. Fullerton's relatively veteran lineup made the necessary plays down the stretch while the Cougars showed the inconsistency of youth in losing their first home nonconference game in four seasons.

Fullerton used a 23-8 run over the final 7:17 of the first half to build a 41-26 lead at intermission. John Williams had 10 points and 7 rebounds and Craig Whitehead had 9 points to lead the way. But the Cougars came back upon the urging of the actual crowd of about 8,000. They scored the first six points of the second half and caught the Titans at 48-48 on Scott Sonnenberg's basket with 11:17 to go.

Three-pointers by Chris St. Clair and Dane Plock enabled Fullerton to keep pace and Dirk Rassloff's lone bucket of the night put the Titans ahead to stay at 56-54 with 7:47 to go. The Titans hit 11 of their final 13 free throws to thwart BYU. The Cougars were still only a point behind at 68-67 with 1:47 to play before Chris Dade and Whitehead each hit two free throws to stretch the margin to 72-67. Grant Berges missed a pair for BYU at the 31-second mark and the Titans iced the win to even the series at 3-3.

The Titans got their fourth and hopefully final look at Utah's Keith Van Horn as the Diamond Bar product led the No. 4-ranked Utes to their fourth win in four years over the Titans. (The win moved them to No. 3.)

The 6-foot-10 senior forward teamed with 6-foot-11 center Michael Doleac to control the Titans' John Williams and the backboards at both ends of the floor and they combined for 38 points. To make matters worse for Fullerton, the Utes hit all 5 of their first-half 3-point tries to jump out to a 38-24 lead after the Titans had stayed even through the first 8 minutes.

The lanky Utes double teamed Williams every time he got the ball and it took the Titans awhile to adjust. They got their only breaks in the second half when Utah hit only one of seven 3-pointers and atypically missed 10 of 25 free-throws.

Utah opend up its biggest lead at 59-41 with 7:57 to play before the Titans went on an 11-0 run capped by Ali Nayab's 3-pointer at 4:59 that made it 59-52. But Doleac scored inside and Van Horn hit a 3-pointer to make it 64-52 in favor of Utah with 3:29 to play. 

Missoula is at the confluence of five river valleys and it's a pit to most visiting basketball teams. Over the past 25 years, the Montana Grizzlies have won 85 per cent of their home games. Three times the victims have been the Titans, who also were 0-3 vs. Montana in Southern California.

But using a carbon copy of their game plan against BYU, the Titans revised history. The Titans built a double-digit lead, saw the home team charge back and then got the ball into the hands of Chris Dade in the final three minutes to stretch a 1-basket lead into a comfortable winning margin.

After falling behind 6-0 and drawing a quick timeout and tongue-lashing from Coach Bob Hawking, the Titans went on a 9-0 run and eventually took the lead for good at 17-16 on a DeVaughn Wright dunk. Dirk Rassloff hit all 6 second-half free throws and Craig Whitehead hit all 5 of his second-half shots, two of them treys, in a 19-5 run that gave the Titans their biggest lead at 67-50.

Montana held Fullerton without a basket for 8 minutes and got to 72-70 at 3:21. But Dade made two clutch jumpers and 2 of 4 free throws before Whitehead's layup at 0:23 clinched it.

There was no airport involved and no snow on the ground, but the Titans found the road just as friendly in L.A. Again, the Titans built a double-digit lead, saw it shrink to a 1-basket margin and then let Chris Dade take over. The win snapped a 7-game losing streak to WCC foes and gave CSF its first 3-game road win streak since 1990-91

Just as Dirk Rassloff had a career game at Montana, Ali Nayab stepped up big. He hit 7 of 9 shots on his way to a career high of 18 points despite a pre-game bout with influenza.

Lions' guard Jim Williamson, a major thorn to Fullerton the previous two years, tried to be a hero again. He scored 12 points in the second half and made two last-minute steals but LMU couldn't get a 3-pointer on its last two possessions and Dade sealed the win with two free throws at the 0:01 mark.

Fullerton tooks its biggest lead at 62-51 with 6:34 to go after two John Williams buckets and a Craig Whitehead 3-pointer. But Williamson ignited an 11-2 LMU run that made it 64-62 at 3:48. A Whitehead jumper and a 3-pointer by Dade helped build the lead to 70-64 but Kenny Hotopp scored twice and it was still a 2-point game at 72-70 at 0:46. Dade rebounded his own missed free throw and fed Whitehead, who was fouled and made one charity at 0:31.

The Titans tried to accomplish something at the University of San Diego that the program hadn't been able to do since the memorable 1977-78 season and that was to win four road games in a row in the same season. The effort proved to be a "complete and total disaster" in the words of Coach Bob Hawking, who lost his first meeting with his former boss at Fullerton, Coach Brad Holland.

The Titans bounced back from the USD loss and opened a 4-game homestand with the largest win to date in Coach Bob Hawking's Fullerton tenure and the program's biggest since a 27-point win over Nevada in 1994.

The visiting Ramblers of Loyola-Chicago, national champions back in 1963 and off to a 5-0 start, tried to guard John Williams with only one man and he made them pay for the absence of the double teams he had been seeing from previous foes. Williams hit 10 of 15 field goal tries and his presence inside helped open up the perimeter. Chris Dade led a 10-for-20 team effort from the 3-point line.

Fullerton scored the first eight points of the game and the Ramblers never caught up. They got as close as 12-10, but the Titans stretched the lead to as many as 13 before intermission.

A week of final exams apparently sapped the Titans' ability to run their offense and they struggled mightily for 30 minutes against a 1-7 Pepperdine team sporting a 6-game losing streak.

The Titans managed only 7 baskets in 27 shots in the first half while committing 13 turnovers. Fortunately, Pepperdine hit only 9 of 22 shots and committed 14 turnovers and settled for a 25-21 lead at intermission.

After Chris St. Clair's 3-point basket to open the scoring, the Titans didn't lead again until Dane Plock's 3-pointer on a fast break made it 46-45 with 7:46 to play. The Waves had led by as many as 10 points at 37-27 with 16:16 to go. They still led by 8 at 43-35 when John Williams missed a dunk and DeVaughn Wright missed the 2-foot follow on the same ominous trip down the floor. But Williams scored the game's next six points and two Ali Nayab free throws tied it at 43.

Nayab put Fullerton ahead for good at 51-48 with a 3-point play at the 5:09 mark. After a Marc McDowell deuce for the Waves, the Titans got another 3-point play from Williams to trigger a 10-0 run for a 61-50 lead with 1:04 remaining. From 10 points down to 11 up, the Titans had outscored Pepperdine by a 34-13 margin over 15 minutes.

Fullerton used a second-half burst to run the Titans' winning streak to three games over stubborn Brown.

After a frigid first half by both teams — Brown shot 35 per cent and Fullerton hit 32 per cent — resulted in a narrow 22-20 Titan lead, Fullerton burst out of the locker room at half time and outscored the Bears 14-1 in the first five minutes to build a 36-21 lead. A pair of 3-point field goals by Chris St. Clair and a breakaway dunk by Chris Dade highlighted the spurt.

The lead was still 15 points at 48-33 with 11:39 to play after a Dane Plock 3-pointer. Then Brown came alive. The Bears posted a 9-0 run to make it 48-42 with 8:27 to play. Fullerton stretched the lead back to as many as 10 points at 54-44 at the 6:08 mark but Brown would eventually get within a point at 56-55 on Aaron Butler's driving layup and subsequent free throw with 35 seconds to go.

The Bears quickly fouled Dade but the junior guard, who made the clutch plays in wins at BYU, Montana and LMU, came through with two free throws for a 58-55 edge. Brown missed a tying 3-pointer and fouled Ali Nayab, who would end up hitting 3 of 4 free throws in the final 10 seconds to secure the victory over the Ivy League visitors from Providence, Rhode Island.

A second consecutive win over an Ivy League foe capped a perfect 4-0 homestand for the Titans and gave them their longest winning streak since 1990-91. Fullerton appeared to be enjoying a "laugher," but a furious Columbia rally behind a full-court press and a 3-point barrage forced Coach Bob Hawking to call a timeout in the final minute and reinsert some of his regulars after the Lions cut what had been a 27-point lead to 85-76 at 0:35.

Columbia attempted more treys — 35 — than any previous Titan opponent, easily surpassing the previous high of 30 by Pacific last season. The Lions hit only 10 as top scorer C. J. Thompkins suffered through 33 cool minutes before exploding for 16 points in the game's final seven minutes.

Fullerton's 60.4 per cent effort from the floor was its best since a 60.5 performance against UCSB in 1991.

As they did against Brown, the Titans came roaring out for the second half. They used a 21-6 explosion over the first eight minutes to forge a 58-32 lead. The gap was still 20 points at 81-61 with 3:06 to play.

For the fourth game in a row, John Williams led the Titan scoring column. He missed only one shot from the floor. Andy Hinkle and David Ng got their first points of the year.

The final non-conference game of the season took the Titans into the third most difficult place in the nation to win over the past five seasons — the Kennel at Gonzaga. The Bulldogs were 63-5 at home, trailing only Kentucky and Indiana in winning percentage.

The Titans did have some things going for them. Gonzaga had lost 7-foot center Paul Rogers for the season and, at 6-5 overall, was coming off its first home non-conference loss in 45 games, an overtime decision to previous Fullerton victim Montana.

Things looked good in the first half as the Titans used a 10-0 run to turn an early 9-5 deficit into a 15-9 lead. Despite getting no points from Chris Dade, only 4 from John Williams and 1-for-9 shooting from Craig Whitehead, the Titans led at the half, 32-26, behind Chris St. Clair's 8 points and 5 each from Ali Nayab and Dirk Rassloff off the bench.

But Gonzaga shot 53 per cent from the floor after intermission and overtook the Titans for good at 45-43 at the 12:53 mark. The Bulldogs led by as many as 9 on several occasions before CSF rallied to within a point at 65-64 at 3:35. The Titans opened conference play and put their four-game home court winning streak on the line against the team with the best record in the Big West in the Pacific Tigers, winners of their past 10 games.

Fullerton appeared to get an early break when Pacific's leading scorer, 7-foot center Michael Olowokandi, had to leave the game for good two minutes into the contest with a left knee injury. But 6-foot-10 Rayne Mahaffey came off the bench to lead the Tigers with 16 points.

The Titans altered their starting lineup, bringing top scorers John Williams and Chris Dade off the bench. Williams had another big game but Dade's shooting slump continued and the game ultimately was decided from behind the 3-point arc.

Pacific overcame a 4-0 Titan start to lead virtually the entire first half and by as much as 14 points at 38-24 with 1:12 to go. The second-half lead was as large as 10 at 40-30 before the Titans rallied. They got close, 49-48 at 9:13, but could never get the lead.


Long Beach State was the pre-season co-favorite with Pacific to win the Western Division of the Big West but the 49ers came into Titan Gym distracted. Four players had earlier been suspended. Two more quit during a week that saw Coach Wayne Morgan's 49ers lose at home to Boise State and Southwest Missouri before winning at UC Irvine for a 5-7 and 1-1 records.

What mattered to the Titans was Long Beach's recent mastery of Cal State Fullerton — seven consecutive wins and 13 in the last 15 meetings.

The Titans got off to great start, building a quick 21-9 lead. But the 49ers used a late 15-1 run to take their first lead at 35-33. Only a last-second 3-point basket by Chris St. Clair enabled Fullerton to lead at intermission.

The second half was a war typical of this rivalry. Fullerton briefly led by 6 and Long Beach was up by 4 for a few seconds, but it was anyone's game down the stretch. The Titans took the lead for good at 65-63 at 6:36 on a John Williams bucket and they got a big 3-pointer from Chris Dade to make it 68-63. It grew to 78-70 but then CSF missed three free throws.

Brandon Titus made it 78-72 and then 78-73. His miss on a second free throw was tipped in by D'Cean Bryant to make it 78-75 with four seconds left. The Titans threw the ball away on the inbounds pass but Marcus Johnson missed a 3-pointer at the buzzer.

Fullerton's first road game of the Big West schedule produced a frustrating defeat. The Gauchos didn't look like a team that had lost five of their past six games. They hit 54 per cent from the floor in the first half including 6 of 8 treys. Raymond Tutt scored 17 points and Les Bean added 11.

Fullerton suffered a huge loss when John Williams was cited for his third personal foul at the 7:33 mark and then drew a technical for a fourth, which sat him down for the half.

Despite cooling off slightly in the second half, the Gauchos stretched their lead to as many as 18 points at 67-49 with 8:05 to go before the Titans began a methodical rally. Dane Plock hit a 3-pointer and four free throws and a Chris Dade 3-pointer made it 69-59 at 5:58. Williams scored 11 of Fullerton's next 17 points that made it a 78-76 game at 0:36 and set the stage for a controversial non-call. Paul Chavez made one free throw but missed a second try. Kealon Wallace tipped the ball in for what the Titan bench thought was offensive goal tending but the basket counted and gave the Gauchos an insurmountable 81-76 lead with 0:28 remaining.

Williams amassed 21 points in only 20 minutes of play but his extended absence helped UCSB win the rebound battle, 45-24.

A rivalry that had languished since 1974 was renewed when the Titans made their first visit to new Big West member Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. The press-and-gun Mustangs were atop the Western Division standings with Pacific and sold out Mott Gym in advance for the first time ever.

Into the picture stepped the determined Titans, anxious to cleanse themselves of the UCSB loss. Early returns were frightening as the Mustangs hit their first four 3-point field goal attempts of the night to build an early 16-7 lead, which would be the biggest of the game for either team.

With John Williams outrunning the Mustang defense in the full-court and dominating in the paint in the halfcourt attack, the Titans gradually came back and even took a 2-point lead at the half behind Williams' 16 points.

Fullerton was ahead 53-48 when the Mustangs went on a 12-0 run for a 60-53 lead with 10:23 to play. The lead was as large as 8 points on a couple of occasions and was 68-61 when the Titans countered with their own 12-0 run capped by two Chris Dade free throws at the 3:22 mark.

With Dane Plock hitting a critical 3-pointer and Ali Nayab making 5 of 8 free throws, CSF held on to go to 9-5 and surpass the season win totals of each of the previous three years.

Utah State rolled into Titan Gym as the Eastern Division leader of the Big West with a 5-0 record and nine wins in 10 games. But the Aggies were also the only team to lose to Fullerton's opening day victim BYU, so that fact and the home-court advantage gave the Titans hope.

However, the absence of Craig Whitehead to a pulled groin muscle and phenomenal shooting from all distances by the Aggies conspired to saddle the Titans with their eighth consecutive loss to Utah State.

Fullerton led only twice in the game, at 2-0 and 49-47, the latter score the result of a 9-0 Titan run capped by Chris St. Clair's 3-point field goal with 13:15 remaining. But the Aggies bounced right back, tying the score on Antwan Smith's basket and taking the lead on a Duane Rogers bucket. John Williams hit a jumper to tie the game at 51-51 but Utah State regained the lead for good when Kevin Rice scored.

It was still only a 3-point deficit for Fullerton at 71-68 at 4:40 before the Aggies' Maurice Spillers scored the game's next five points and forced the Titans to foul to try to catch up. Rogers foiled the strategy by scoring the maximum six points on three successive bonus opportunities.

Williams was allowed only one first-half shot but showed extended range after intermission with several jump shots from beyond the foul line.

With forward John Williams joining Craig Whitehead on the Titan bench with what would later be diagnosed as a fractured navicular bone in his right wrist, the Titans looked vulnerable when they visited a UC Irvine team coming off its first win of the year, an OT decision over Nevada.

The game started poorly as it took more than four minutes for Fullerton to score — on two Chris St. Clair free throws at 15:39 — and almost six minutes (14:02) to get a field goal, a rare 2-pointer from Dane Plock. The freshman's bucket cut UCI's lead to 7-4 and triggered a 12-0 Titan run that featured treys by Plock and St. Clair and put CSF ahead for good at 14-7.

The Anteaters got back within two points at 18-16 but the Titans pulled away with a 14-0 run for a 32-16 lead with 3:38 to go in the half.

UC Irvine never seriously threatened after intermission as the Titans quickly stretched the lead to 47-28. Coach Bob Hawking substituted liberally in the final five minutes but the Titans still ran up the most lopsided victory in the history of the series and their biggest since a 104-67 decision over Lamar in the 1989-90 opener.

Cal State Fullerton and new Big West member Idaho met for the first time in men's basketball in the cavemous Kibbie Dome in Moscow.

The Titans were trying to adjust to the extended loss of John Williams while the Vandals were trying to keep things going after stopping a 5-game losing streak with a win at North Texas. Idaho accomplished its goal thanks to the one-two punch of Jason Jackman and Eddie Turner and a 3-minute explosion by sub Jon Harris.

Chris Dade carried the Titans in the first half, scoring 16 of their first 22 points. DeVaughn Wright (3) and Chris St. Clair (1) were the only other Titans to make field goals in the half, which ended with Idaho ahead by 8.

Turner opened the second-half scoring before the Titans erupted with three consecutive three-pointers—two by St. Clair and one by Dane Plock—on their way to an 18-5 run that turned a 10-point deficit into a 42-39 lead four minutes into the half.

But Harris, who had hit his second 3-pointer of the year for a 39-35 Idaho lead at 17:12, hit his third of the season at 15:33 to tie the game and a deuce at 14:25 that put the Vandals ahead for good at 44-42. The Titans' first competition with Boise State in 18 years began fabulously. Chris Dade hit his first three shots for seven quick points and Fullerton built an 11-0 lead.

But the Broncos, who spotted UC Irvine an 11-2 start two nights earlier before coming back to win by 21 points, repeated the formula. They used a 19-0 run over seven minutes to turn a 30-20 deficit into a 39-30 lead. The Titans finally stopped the camage when Ali Nayab hit a pair of free throws 28 seconds before the half for the first Titan points since Mark Richardson's dunk shot at 7:48.

Not coincidentally, the final 17 points of Boise State's surge came with Dade on the bench for the final 7:10 of the half with three personal fouls. The loss of his perimenter threat and penetrating abilities compounded the continued loss of John Williams' inside scoring.

Any thoughts UC Irvine had that Fullerton might be complacent for its rematch after a January 32-point Titan win at the Bren Center were erased by a furious barrage of 3-pointers from the opening buzzer.

With Chris Dade hitting four of five attempts in the first seven minutes plus, the Titans jumped to a 33-13 lead barely 10 minutes into the first half. Fullerton would go on to hit 9 of 17 tries for three while posting their most productive first half of the season for a 50-31 lead.

The margin got as big as 22 points in the second half before the Anteaters staged a rally that kept the Titan substitutes on the bench until the final two minutes. UCI used a 22-10 run over seven minutes to cut the gap to 74-64, Titans, with 3:56 remaining after Wendell Robinson's 3-point play.

The Titans were down to their final chance to defeat an Eastern Division team in the realigned Big West and they picked a difficult spot. First-place Nevada was in a battle with Utah State and was fresh from a week off between games. Toss in the fact that the Wolf Pack had lost only one home game all year and that the Titans would have their worst shooting night of the year and the only mystery was how Fullerton kept it as close as it was.

Nevada concentrated on stopping Chris Dade and the Titans could find offense only in the perimeter efforts of Chris St. Clair and Dane Plock. That duo combined to hit 4 of 10 3point tries in the first half and keep Fullerton within a basket of the lead.

Six players in double figures, 10 team season highs, two individual career scoring highs and the most points ever by Cal State Fullerton in a regulation Big West Conference game were some of the highlights of a race-horse game against the Mustangs of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, who were making their first appearance in Titan Gym in 23 seasons.

Fullerton used a 15-2 run over the final five minutes of the first half to take a 49-36 lead and the Titans didn't let up after intermission. They scored 25 of the first 34 points of the second half to open a 74-45 lead with 14:31 to play. The lead got as big as 31 points at 83-52 at the 11:30 mark before the press-and-gun Mustangs made a flurry of late 3-point baskets to close the scoring gap.

De Vaughn Wright posted his career scoring high for the third time in five games and Mark Richardson chipped in with a personal best of 16 as the Titan guards consistently broke the SLO press and found their big men all alone under the hoop.

Craig Whitehead came alive with 16 points, his first double-figure effort since the Big West opener on Jan. 11. Chris St. Clair tied his personal best with six 3-pointers and the Titans amassed 30 assists, their most since Dec. 11, 1985, vs. U.S.I.U. and only three shy of the school record.

Chris St. Clair took a knockdown blow but came back off the wooden floor to spark the Titans to a home finale victory over UC Santa Barbara on "senior night" in Titan Gym.

The Titans saved their worst for last and were quickly eliminated in the first round of the 1997 Big West Conference Tournament despite the surprise presence of forward John Williams, who got his cast off on Mar. 5.

Facing the No. 1 seed from the East on its home court provided a formidable challenge and Coach Bob Hawking tried a psychological ploy by keeping Williams out of public sight until pre-game warmups. But the Titans aided their own demise with a frigid shooting performance from the floor and the line and Williams' first action since Jan. 23 was not a factor.

The Titans missed their first three shots and the Wolf Pack made each of their first three, so it was a 7-0 game before anyone broke a sweat. Chris St. Clair got loose for a reverse layup to make it 7-2 with 16:17 to go in the half but the Titans didn't score again until Williams scored at the 10:53 mark to make it 19-4. Fullerton didn't make a perimeter shot until Ali Nayab's jumper with 3:16 remaining in the Titans' lowest half of the year.

CSF got within 13 points early in the final half, but Jim Carroll hit a 3pointer and Nevada was able to coast.



Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program. Seven Titans have been drafted in the past 15 years and several more players have signed as free agents with the National

Basketball Association.

The most prominent Titan of late has been for-Cedric ward Ceballos. He became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Star team for 1994-95 but was unable to play due to an injury. Last year he was traded back to the Phoenix Suns, where his career had begun.

During four


years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA slam-dunk contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when Charles Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung the tide toward the Chicago Bulls in the 1994 playoffs.

A Fullerton teammate of Ceballos' -- forward Bruce Bowen -- was expected to open the 1997-98 season with Coach Rick Pitino and the Boston Celtics. He played briefly last season with the Miami Heat for Coach Pat Riley after two productive and profitable seasons in France. In Evreux, France, he averaged more than 29 points per game.

The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -- guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Each was subsequently traded more than once. Wood completed a 6-year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He recently launched a career as a referee. Wood began his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' gold-medal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during the past few years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana and later played with Golden State. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA the past few seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, has done well in the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout are playing in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) has become a star in Australia.

Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky Mixon (Lakers),

Tony Neal (Lakers) and B o a g n i (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams has gained fame first as an actor (Blue Chips) and recently as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters. for whom he gained the Guinness Book of World Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet, 8 inches off the floor.
