




The candidates running for two seats on the Leisure Village Board of Directors are Don Marquardt, John Mayer, and Patrick Price. They were introduced at the Open Board Meeting on May 2 by Ted Lansing, Chairman of the Nominating Committee. All three have experience on the Board. Their biographies and personal statements are posted in the display case in the Rec Center Atrium.

On **Thursday, May 19**, Candidates Night will provide the opportunity for residents to hear the candidates and to ask questions of them. The event will be held in the AR beginning at 7 p.m. and will be televised live on LVTB and replayed during the month. Dick Guttman will be

Leisure Village's Annual Meeting will be held on Thursday, June 23 in the AR beginning at 10 a.m. The votes will be counted and the results will be announced.



Later this month, nearly ten thousand proud family members and friends will cheer the graduates of California Lutheran University's Class of 2016. It will be an awesome experience for Commencement Speaker Pia Jacoby, one of two students chosen from more than 800 graduates to speak at this happy event. Awesome because – unlike her classmates – Pia is 68 years old, is completing a personal journey that began 51 years ago, and is likely the only current resident of Leisure Village to be honored as a college commencement speaker ever.

"It has been an amazing experience for me," she says. She has been enrolled in CLU's Bachelors' Degrees for Professionals Program, an intense curriculum aimed at working, older students with night classes that meet

year-round. "It's a deeper experience for us; we all want to be here," Pia explains. The average age of students in the group is 38; that makes her laugh. "I've always been the oldest, but that's very motivating." Dr. Lisa Buono, who directs the CLU Program, calls Pia special, "Right from the beginning, she stood out; she is astute and charismatic."

Pia first enrolled in college as a teenager in 1965 at what is now Cal State University, Northridge. "It was the wild '60's, I was a terrible student, I played more than I studied and transferred several times before I walked away from college," she recalls. She got married and had a son, all the while working in the advertising field.

Life changed for Pia when her son – then a teenager – had problems with drug use. "We went to family groups. At first I just listened. But

then I began to contribute and could see that I could help people," she says. That led to work in a treatment center as a volunteer. Pia knew she was effective, but she was also working without credentials. So she went back to school to become certified as

IN MY OPINION

As a homeowner, I am pleased to see the Village move forward into the 21st Century, particularly in the area of water management.

There is an abundance of grass growing throughout the Village perimeters. This form of landscape was fine 30 years ago, but drought and other environmental changes challenge the wisdom of continuing to maintain large grass areas.

The perimeter areas of the Village are primarily landscaped with grass and pine trees. ...Some diseased or dying trees could be removed. These areas can be replanted with drought

tolerant plants and trees which use much less water and require little maintenance.

Use of decomposed granite and mulch combined with a walking trail would make these areas a "destination" place for walkers and Village neighbors. Concrete benches could be installed for people to stop and enjoy the surroundings.

Research in urban tree recycling could help with the removal of trees. A company in Glendora takes urban trees and mills them for use by builders. They do not cut the trees down, but work with the tree trimmer to ensure the cuts are appropriate for their use. This saves the cost to grind and remove the tree trimmings.

A DOG'S LIFE

This is a prime example that the rules currently in place are not followed by permitted users who seem to do as they wish. If expanded to holes 1,






Lincoln Assassination is the Focus of June 6 Civil War Presentation

Currier & Ives lithograph depicting the assassination of Abraham Lincoln by John Wilkes Booth at Ford's Theater. Because of the rush to produce a print to show Americans what happened, there were factual mistakes.

The deadly bullet was fired 151 years ago. Yet the crime seems as familiar as if it happened yesterday. On April 14, 1865, Abraham Lincoln was shot, just a month after he began serving his second term as President. "Everybody thinks they know what happened," says Villager and Civil War student Don Marquardt. "So did I, until I began to study the story behind the headlines. The details are fascinating."

Don Marquardt will share those details in a dramatic retelling on Monday, June 6 at 6:30 p.m. in the AR. It will be his fifth Civil War presentation for Villagers and, as always, the story will be told by Don

who portrays a Civil War character.

"I was always interested in the Civil War," Marquardt explains. "Then three years ago I visited Gettysburg and was grabbed by the history that I didn't know. After that I went to 25 battlefields, read a lot, and became immersed in what this conflict did to the country." He adds that the story of Lincoln's assassin, John Wilkes Booth, is full of details most people never learned. "For example, Lincoln was not the only target," Marquardt says. "Booth had an incredible – and chilling – master plan," which the LV audience can hear and see on June 6.



Complete Makeover for the Farmers Garden

First came the brand new Fitness Center and the remodeled swimming pool and spa followed closely by totally rebuilt shower rooms and bathrooms. Now add to that the completely refurbished Farmer's Garden, the latest upgrade among Village activity centers. For the first time in twenty years, the Garden – protected from critters and intruders by a six-foot fence – is all new except for its location and most of its farmers.

The transformation took one month; the work was done by LV's workers led by Landscape Supervisor Mike Undem. "We removed everything: 200 cubic yards of soil, all

the old sheds, and the rotting wood that framed the patches," he reports. It's suspected that the soil and wood were there from the beginning. The new soil is Veggie Mix, the walkways are decomposed granite, the frames are made of a Douglas Fir product with a wood preservative treatment," he says. "Our choices should mean fewer disease problems (because the old soil held onto the pathogens year after year) and fewer weeds in the walkways." Also the water system was re-piped, and more hose connections were added. The only disappointment of the project: no buried treasure was found when the decades-old garden

was dug up. The estimated cost of the project is \$11,000.

"We are ready to go forward," says Farmers Club President Al Pinto, whose crops this year will include tomatoes, zucchini, dill and beets. There are 103 tended patches in the Farm, and many are beginning to show tiny green shoots as the spring planting begins.

It's a popular activity; all patches currently are assigned. There is a waiting list for prospective LV farmers. Recreation Director Shelly Runge is the farmer-in-chief who can answer questions about the Garden and keeps that list of hopeful planters.

an addiction treatment counselor. Still it wasn't enough. "I knew I was good at dealing with patients and families, but I always felt like I was faking it because I had no degree," she explains. In an example of great timing, Pia and her husband Allen had just moved to Leisure Village, and she applied to CLU's Program in 2013.

"It was real school, and I was so terrified I overstudied," Pia says. But the program is small and personal, about 300 students in small classes who form a tight bond. Her major is psychology. She's always been at the top of her class and will go on to graduate school – that license is now in sight.

In a twist on usual family tradition, it will be her grandchildren who will be cheering their Cum Laude Grandma as she receives her diploma. Pia smiles as she reviews her commencement speech. "Mine is a simple message: It's never too late."

Do You Have Your O.K. Sign Ready?

On May 19, Village residents and the Emergency Preparedness Committee will test how we all might react to an earthquake or flood or other disaster. A Disaster Preparedness Drill will begin at 8:45 a.m. on that day coordinated by the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC). And residents must play a role in the drill by placing the large yellow "OK" sign in their front windows (facing the street) by that time.

In the event of a real emergency,

that OK sign will communicate a resident's well-being. By placing it in the window, the message is that everyone in the house is safe. If there's no sign, emergency responders will be notified.

Checking the signs visually and reporting them to the Drill headquarters is the job of each Village EPC coordinator. The sign can be removed by 1 p.m. Contact your Village Coordinator – they are listed in the Village Voice – if you don't have an OK sign.



The Home Insurance Dilemma

Homeowners insurance helps to avoid dealing with out-of-pocket expenses in the case of a major (or minor) catastrophe. When one occurs, homeowners are always faced with the same dilemma: to claim or not to claim. Do you make a claim and risk raising your premium rates or do you pay for the damages yourself?

It is typically wise to utilize your policy for losses that you cannot financially absorb on your own and require the specialized assistance of a claims professional. Plumbing problems can cause damage to your personal property in addition to the required correction of the broken pipe and should usually be an insurance claim. Injury on your property such as a dog bite which can be a significant liability claim should be handled by a professional claims adjuster. If a house fire takes place, it all

comes down to whom or what may be its cause. If you think the fire may have been your fault, you may want to think more than once before filing a claim.

Always assess the situation. Is there a responsible party, such as a manufacturer of a defective appliance that the carrier can go after, or was the fire caused by a candle that you forgot to blow out before leaving home? Consider filing a claim if you feel that someone or something else is at fault.

It is typically advised to save insurance for a big disaster. Keeping your deductible high and not filing small claims will give you a lower premium (cost of insurance) and prevent increased cost or cancellation of your policy.

Lincoln's Sparrow

The grayish color, the broad gray "eyebrow", the buffy breast with fine dark streaks, the dark spot on the breast—it couldn't be anything but the Lincoln's Sparrow in my birdbath.

I had a very busy patio December 2015 to January 2016 with all sorts of birds migrating in from everywhere and visitors I had never seen before. I spent quite a bit of time at my laundry room window that overlooks the birdbaths with my telephoto lens.

Sparrows are notoriously hard to pinpoint, there are many different kinds with all sorts of different markings that to the untrained eye look exactly the same. In the birder's world, they are known as "brown, streaky birds". But to the trained eye of the Conejo Valley Audubon birders, there are unique species within the Sparrow family that are identifiable by their markings and their songs.

This bird was new to me. I had never seen one like him before. Like the Ruby Crowned Kinglet of the last column, he seemed to be traveling alone.

I couldn't figure out what kind of sparrow he was from illustrations online. I asked one of the Conejo Valley Audubon members by emailing him a photo.

He said, "You've got a Lincoln's Sparrow. That is nice yard bird." Once I had the name of my brown, streaky friend, I used the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's online page and here is what I found out about my sparrow.

"Breeds in bogs, wet meadows, and riparian thickets, mostly in northern and montane areas. Winters in brushy areas, thickets, hedgerows, understory of open woodlands, forest edges, clearings, and scrubby areas."

Doesn't sound like a description of my patio, nevertheless he came every day for his bath and drink of water.

The Lincoln's Sparrows spend their summers breeding as far north as Alaska and their winters as far south as Southern California and Baja California.

I was delighted to find out my "brown streaky bird" was a great yard bird and that he had a name-Lincoln's.

Next column's visiting migrator will be the rarely seen Pine Siskin. One day I counted 15 of them in my birdbath.

You may not have to call a repair company


It's not always necessary to call a contractor to deal with many of the minor home repair "emergencies" that come up from time to time. In this column, I hope to help you deal with many of them by yourself.

Problem: a clogged garbage disposal. No, don't try the old broom handle approach. It seldom works, and if it ever does, that hunk of wood could fly out and hurt someone.

Before assuming that it is not functioning because of a clog, hold a mirror beneath the disposal and check for a $\frac{1}{4}$ " square button that may be protruding from the

flat underside. This is a built-in circuit breaker. If it is flush with the bottom of the disposal, it has not been tripped. If it protrudes, it has been tripped and may be reset by pushing it up so it is flush with the bottom. (If you prefer, you can push it back up using a wooden spoon or

stick.) Some brands have a small slide switch on the bottom. This is an on/off switch that functions much the same way as the circuit breaker. Try moving it to the

alternate position. You should feel a slight click. If the problem continues, continue below.

First determine that the power to the disposal is on (the disposal hums when you throw the switch, but does nothing else). Then, before you spend good dollars calling a plumber or handyman, get out the little (5 1/2") tool that came with the disposal.

Make sure that the disposal switch is off. Insert one end of the tool up into the hole in the bottom of the disposal and crank – alternately clockwise and counterclockwise – until the disposal moves a few inches each way. Now try the switch again with the tool removed. Repeat until the disposal not only hums when you turn it on, but also actually disposes of its contents.

Tip: If your disposal crank has been lost over the years, a replacement can be found at any hardware store for a few dollars. To prevent this tool from being lost again, tape it to one of the drainpipes under your sink.



Covering the World with Food

I thought I would begin this by explaining why the Persians that I have met in Southern California identify themselves as Persian and not Iranian, but it's far beyond the scope of this column, which as you may recall, is all about food, food and more food.

Many nutritionists consider the Middle Eastern diet as one of the healthiest in the world, along with the Mediterranean diet, and by using the word diet I simply mean the foods people eat. I continually search for healthy, great tasting dishes and I sure hit the jackpot over in Village 44 when I had the good fortune to meet Shala Afsari.

One common thread so far in these interviews is the fact that in Brazil and Italy and now Iran and most European nations, people makes a meal a social and cultural event sometime going on for hours. According to Shala, "food is the connection between human beings".

My exposure to Persian food began when I lived in Woodland Hills when I started eating at a nearby Persian restaurant. There were so many unusual and tasty foods I tried there; I was very excited to meet Shala. She invited me in to her comfortable home, offered me a cup of Persian tea and we started right in discussing the foods of Persia, which started with the tea, a lovely blend of 2 kinds of black tea, Earl Grey tea and the spice Cardamom.

Geographically, Iran has many regions. Just to mention a few - Western Iran is the Coldest, Northern Iran is where most of the garlic comes from and Iran near the Caspian Sea is known for its wonderful seafood dishes.

Shala was a very independent 10 year-old who was born in Shiraz... hmmmm what's the connection to the Australian wine???

Wine 101 Lesson 1

In modern Iran, no Shiraz wine is officially produced today. The

vineyards of Iran are instead used for the production of table grapes and raisins. As a whole, Iran is not a wine producing country, but rumor has it that villagers that live nearby Shiraz produce small quantities in secret. The modern-day red grape variety "Shiraz" is a homonym used in Australia and some other countries for the grape variety Syrah, which apparently originates from northern Rhône valley in France.

Anyway, Shala learned how to cook native dishes by watching the people in her household cook. Rice, the Basmati variety (a much less starchy product than other most rices), is a main element in almost every Persian dish. It is served along with stews, grilled and roasted meats and a special dish called Tahdig, which is the crispy rice left at the bottom of the pot. You gotta try it.

Other important elements of Persian cooking are yogurt, eggplant, fava and wonderful herbs and spices, including the most expensive spice in the world, saffron. One of the dishes I loved at that Woodland Hills restaurant was Persian Eggplant Dip

made with roasted Italian eggplants, yogurt or whey, with fried dried mint and onion mixed in. OMG (that's computer speak for Oh My God), what a flavor.

It seemed like with every question I asked, Shala would disappear into the kitchen and return with some jar or tin. So I thought, I wonder if that will work with anything. Was this my Aladdin moment? So I tried and I asked "Shala, now what is Koubideh?" I know what it is, but this was just my bait question. Just a minute she said, heading into the kitchen. Could it be? She returned a few minutes later with a plate for me (see photo). It contained chicken koubideh, a beautiful dark roasted tomato, and a piece of sangak bread and sprigs of cilantro. OMG...it didn't take long for it to disappear into my mouth.

I was going to include a Koubideh recipe here, but since you may only use some of the ingredients once a year, I decided to omit it. So treat yourself and go have it at a Middle Eastern Restaurant. As Mikee says, "try it, you'll like it." Guaranteed.

Monthly Costs: Renting vs. Assisted Living

As we consider the options for our parents or ourselves, the price of renting in Thousand Oaks would likely be as follows: Rent amount: \$1600-\$2200; utilities (gas/electric): \$200; Cable TV/Internet/phone: \$125; auto maintenance (with no payment): \$50/month; Gas for car: \$150; Insurance and DMV fees for car: \$100; Food: \$500. Total: Average \$3,200/month without entertainment (movies, travel, dining out, etc.).

The Reserve at Thousand Oaks has studio apartments at \$3450/month and One Bedroom Garden apartments with full kitchens at \$4,200/month. This price includes: 3 meals/day in the restaurant, weekly housekeeping/linen service, fitness program, transportation, utilities/cable TV, medical supervision, and all activities.

The nutritional benefits of having balanced meals prepared is a great comfort to family members who worry that singles living alone do not put proper effort into cooking. The socialization, exercise classes and intellectually stimulating programs are also healthy and necessary to living a long, healthy, and happy life.

In Assisted Living, there is someone not far from your front door who will be there in less than 3 minutes if you push a button; or one can call the Front Desk to ask a question to hear a friendly voice.

One last factor: Rentals require a lease agreement that is usually for one year. If the tenant vacates for health reasons (including death), the senior or their estate must pay the rent for the duration of the lease until the landlord can find replacement tenants.
