Handel Evan, President of the University, will be on the podium, while representing the city of Camarillo will be Mayor-elect for the year 2000, William Liebmann.


Villagers will hear first hand, how much impact the thousands of students will have on the city and the surrounding area. Certainly traffic and hous-

ing will be high on the minds of all.
While students and faculty from the CSU Northridge have been at the new campus since August 30, in the fall of 2002 the first entering freshman class will be admitted. At that time it is estimated that some 3,600 students will be enrolled and that eventually there will be about 15,000 students both full and part-time.

President Evans, heading the 23rd campus of California State University, stated, "Access to higher education should be available to all who qualify and it is the duty of society to ensure that opportunity exists. Right now, Ventura County is the largest county in California without a four-year public university. The opening of California State University, Channel Islands as a full, four year university by 2004 will make certain that thousands of qualified students wishing to attend a public university have access to one.

Some Boards work together well, but others vie to win the majority vote, to "get their way" on Board matters. Do we need to have all this scrapping? Them against us? Why do so many topics disintegrate into pitched political stands? Under a democracy some win, some lose. Then the majority vote rules and any opposing views should graciously accede. But that is not how the LV Board functions. With disagreement comes anger and hard feelings, not cooperation.

How sad!

Why choose up sides? The residents in this Village are intelligent, educated people. Do all of them want to be Chiefs, not just Indians? If such strongminded candidates run for office, are they able to share the "power" without collapsing into nit picking? Flexibility should be a prime quality in Board candi-

A strong case can be made for a different approach. Policy can be established through open discussion among the Board members. Think of the results as a consensus, not winners versus losers.

Why can't "Peace on Earth" come to Leisure Village? Let's have flexibility, not manipulation.

Why Mannie ESIGNED

from (Excerpt Mannie's letter to the Board of Directors.)

When I came to live here I planned to relax and enjoy life. I did not want to be involved in politics or in controversies. I accepted the appointment as Chairman of the Architectural committee because I believed I could use my experience to assist the Village to change its archaic appearance and bring it up to the standards of this growing community.

In the past three years the Architectural Committee has accomplished many of the goals we sought to achieve. We were able to do this without interference from the Board and without having to respond to subjective inquires from residents who disagreed with our actions.

Since this new Board has taken office I see a change toward the bureaucracy that led me to retire. When I practiced my profession for pay I had a staff of people to do most of the paper pushing that I now do myself. I didn't have to respond to secondguessing by people who were not knowledgeable about the matters in is-

Now you send demands that direct me to "research" my records and "advise the Board" as to matters that this Committee has previously instituted based on its unanimous decisions after full study and discussion.

I do not want to get back into the situation that moved me to retire. I will arrange to give you the records I have in my possession. The original copies of all completed permits are already in the Administration office. The originals of work in progress are with the designated Inspectors. The information you have directed us to "research" and submit to you is practically impossible to develop. There is no item-ized record of "how many" things we authorized. Your orders to "cease any such practices" conflict with the authority that this Committee has been given by the CC&Rs.

I have devoted an average of fifteen to twenty hours a week to the Village during the past three years without complaint. That means over 2500 hours without pay or reimbursement for mileage driving around the Village, in the performance of my duties. I do not want to engage in a power a struggle with the Board. I have decided to go back into retirement. It is time for me to find other interests in other areas.

Please accept this as my resignation, effective immediately.

Under the leadership of Ernie Ohmstedt, the Education and Recreation Committee (E&R) has developed an effective method of monitoring its many physical resources and activities. At its first organizational meeting of the year, members discussed their roles and settled on specific monitoring and reporting tasks. Additionally, subcommittees work in areas of special interests, i.e. golf course, swimming pool, tennis, among the major resources.

Of special note is the great number of club and group activities in the Village. To become an authorized club, group, or activity, application for such status begins with the E&R Committee which makes a necessary recommendation to the Recreation Director for submission to the Board of Directors. When approved by the Board as an authorized unit, the club, group, or activity comes under the umbrella of LVA and is eligible for a number of benefits such as facility and room scheduling on regular basis or for special events.

Some office assistance, such as preparing multiple copies of material, may also be available. Group travel is also simplified when arranged through the Travel Committee.

An example of the advantages of receiving authorized accreditation lies in the education area. Special education courses and activities when approved may also receive the benefits of the LVA umbrella.

Volunteer As A Helper

Caring Neighbors, a program of Lutheran Social Services, recently received a grant from the Camarillo Health Care District to assist frail elderly in the city of Camarillo with minor home repairs, light housekeeping, yard cleanups, and transportation for errands and medical appointments. All requests are handled by a dedicated group of volunteers and are free to those who are in need of these services.

Transportation to medical appointments and errands are from door to door and the volunteer remains with the individual until the task is completed. All transportation assistance requires a three-day advance notice within the local area and a minimum of one week's notice for requests outside the local area and is based on availability. Seniors are asked to pay for parts or materials needed for minor home repair needs.

The goal of the Caring Neighbors program is to assist seniors of all ethnic groups and socioeconomic backgrounds that desire to remain in their homes or are fearful of losing their independence and dignity if they have to live in a nursing home.

Volunteers are needed and must attend an orientation. They will learn how to help seniors during transportation needs and what to look for as they interact with each individual in order to determine if they need further assistance or referrals. All Caring Neighbor volunteers are asked to complete an application, are interviewed, references checked and are required to have a copy of their insurance and drivers license on file.






