LOCKER ROOMS: Located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. George McQuarn will conduct post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office.

CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, Press Will Call is located at the western entrance to the gymnasium.

SCOUTS: Requests should be made at least one week in advance.

PARKING: Except on Monday thru Thursday evenings, ample free parking is available in the lot immediately west of the Gymnasium. On Monday thru Thursday evenings, parking is available only in Lot A at the northwest corner of campus. Requests made at least three days in advance will be granted complimentary passes. Otherwise three quarters are required upon entry for a daily permit.

Cal State Fullerton Campus



California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement-for

five students-took place in 1960.

The university's 23,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes: many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued,

typically with students involved.

The university enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, education, engineering, communications, music, nursing, speech and hearing, and theater. All told there are 85 degree programs—41 of them at the graduate level.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their

regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the university.

Still another strong point is the university's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theater Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which has spearheaded the fund-

raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields.

To reinforce the university's commitment to high academic standards and community services. Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

History of Titan Athletics

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich-board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in six different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, a rookie in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team—men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the final four as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, continued into the George McQuarn era. The Titans were the nation's most improved team in 1981-82 and the following season received their first NIT bid. Guard Leon Wood helped the U.S. men to a gold medal in the 1984 Olympics before he and center Ozell Jones made the successful jump into the National Basketball Association.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division national titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent Titan teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished fifth or better in the nation every year including the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and the star of the Disney film "Lefty."

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. And he won the College World Series again in 1984 with players soon to be seen in the majors.

Women have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making five trips to the College World Series in six tries with a pair of second-place finishes to their credit.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert.

Football was the last major sport to arrive on the Fullerton campus. Dick Coury was the inaugural coach and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Division I were endured.

But the program came of age under the guidance of coach Gene Murphy as the Titans won back-to-back PCAA championships in 1983 and 1984 and appeared in the California Bowl behind record-shattering quarterback Damon Allen, now of the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League.

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public

university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 14 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.

Titan Athletic Foundation

The Titan Athletic Foundation is a non-profit organization that exists solely to aid the athletic program at Cal State Fullerton. It is a group of individuals with a genuine interest in athletics, the University and the community and it responds by providing funds for scholarships to attract the best student-athletes available.

Ed Carroll, Athletic Director

Ed Carroll completed a rapid climb through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department when he became director of athletics on July 1.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the appointment on May 28 after a nationwide search and Carroll, 34, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my top priorities will be to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972 he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from Long Beach State.

After serving in various capacities for the Fullerton recreation program, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980 as an assistant athletic director. From October, 1981 to April, 1982 he was acting athletic director and also acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served as an associate athletic director for business affairs under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985 for a similar post at San Jose State.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with their infant son Brandon.

Coach George McQuarn

George McQuarn made his mark on Cal State Fullerton basketball by returning the Titans to a competitive posture in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in the 1981-1982 season and he has embellished that accomplishment by maintaining the winning tradition. The Titans have strung four consecutive winning seasons, averaging better than 18 victories.

During his five-year tenure, McQuarn twice has taken Fullerton into the PCAA Championship Game; earned the Titans their first-ever National Invitation Tournament bid and has gained national Top 20 rankings while more than doubling attendance in the Titan Gym.

"Each year brings new challenges and it doesn't get any easier, but I think we have sustained the program at a high level," said McQuarn, 44. "If you look at

the PCAA standings over the past four years, I think you will see that we have been one of the top three programs in the conference.

"We have built a solid base and have the potential to continue at the same level. We have had four players drafted by the National Basketball Association and have brought in more players with that potential.

"We had to play as close to our potential last year as any team I have ever coached to remain competitive in the league. It will take that kind of effort again this season. We are very inexperienced with new starters and young players who have not been tested at the Division I college level."

Team and individual honors have been plentiful during the McQuarn era. The 1981-82 team was the nation's most improved squad and the 1982-83 team set a school record with 21 regular-season victories while gaining the school's initial NIT bid and also ruining the unbeaten season of the nation's number one-ranked team.

McQuarn was selected District 15 Coach of the Year in 1982-83 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1984, he coached the West squad to the championship of the annual Aloha Classic in Honolulu, Hawaii.

While coaching and recruiting abilities are the most visible of McQuarn's attributes, equally critical to his success at Fullerton have been his attention to discipline and academic progress.

"We are a goal-oriented program and the graduation of our players is an important goal to me," said McQuarn. "While I believe an athlete is responsible for his academic progress, I also believe it is the responsibility of a coach to create an atmosphere and environment conducive to academic success."

The theme of Titan basketball under McQuarn has been "We Play Hard!" Mental toughness and total concentration are the cornerstones as he wants his players to play at the level of intensity that overcomes outside elements over which they have no control. He seeks players who are willing to accept that concept.

"Our offensive philosophy starts at the defensive end and each year we have become more and more aggressive on defense," McQuarn said. "To play an 'up-tempo' game you have to get the ball away from the opposition. If they score you can't run."

McQuarn graduated from Long Beach State in 1966 with a degree in physical education. An All-CIF performer in high school in basketball and baseball, he earlier





attended UCLA on a baseball scholarship and earned All-West Coast honors as the Bruins' catcher.

McQuarn's coaching career began with a phenomenal tenure at Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles. Between 1969 and 1973 he guided the varsity to four consecutive CIF championships and had an overall record of 123-8 (.939).

His collegiate career began at Nevada-Las Vegas where he spent four years as an assistant to Jerry Tarkanian. The Rebels were 93-28 (.769) during his four-year tenure including trips to the NCAA "Final Four" and NIT semifinals.

At both Verbum Dei and UNLV, McQuarn coached numerous players who went on to play in the NBA. His Fullerton program has produced four NBA draft picks in Ricky Mixon (Los Angeles–1983), Ozell Jones (San Antonio–1984), Tony Neal (Los Angeles–1985) and Leon Wood (Philadelphia–1984). Wood also won gold medals with the United States' teams in the 1983 Pan-American Games and the 1984 Olympic Games.

Ed Goorjian

JOHN SNEED—assumes the responsibility for recruiting high school and junior college prospects this season as well as coordinating the academics program and tutorial services for members of the basketball team including the monitoring of classes. He also has made a major contribution toward the promotion and marketing of Titan basketball, which has more than doubled home attendance during his five previous seasons at Fullerton.

Sneed brought experience with winning Division I programs and remarkably successful high school teams to Fullerton when he became a member of head coach George McQuarn's original staff in 1980.

Sneed was an assistant for one year at the University of Arizona, a 21-6 season (1976-77) which took the Wildcats to the NCAA playoffs. During 1977-78 he was an assistant at San Diego State and the 19-8 Aztecs won the PCAA title before being eliminated in the post-season tournament by Cal State Fullerton. He also was at San Diego in 1978-79.

Sneed succeeded McQuarn at Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles in 1974 and won the CIF 4A title and CIF Coach of the Year honors with a 30-2 record. His Eagles won two more Camino Real League titles with 28-1 and 23-5 seasons and three times he was league coach of the year. His career prep mark was 81-8 (.910) and the 1974 team was recognized as national champion by the National Sport News Service.

A Long Beach State graduate, Sneed served two years as an assistant to McQuarn at Verbum Dei. He is a native of Gastonia, North Carolina.

ED GOORJIAN—joins the staff this year and will be in charge of scouting the opposition and coordinating game scheduling for head coach George McQuarn. He will also coordinate promotions for the basketball program.

Goorjian brings a remarkably broad range of experience in Southern California basketball to the Fullerton program. He most recently served as head coach for five seasons at Loyola-Marymount University after a one-year term there as assistant. He also has been a head coach at the junior college level, winning 19 games in his only year at Glendale College, and prior to that had a tremendous 19-year career at Crescenta Valley High School.

Goorjian's overall record was 427-103 and included seven league championships and a 29-game winning streak in 1971. In 1977 he was selected California High School Coach of the Year. He coached five high school All-Americans included his youngest of three sons, Greg, who also played for him for one season at Loyola.

A 1951 graduate of Cal State Los Angeles, Goorjian and his wife, Joyce, reside in La Crescenta.

Season Preview

A young and relatively inexperienced squad will try to stretch Cal State Fullerton's current string of winning basketball seasons to five in 1985-86.

With only two returning starters, Coach George McQuarn will attempt to blend a potentially explosive perimeter attack with a thin but physically promising inside game.

Team leadership must come from the two seniors and returning starters—point guard **Kevin Henderson** and wing player **Kerry Boagni**. Henderson burst upon the Pacific Coast Athletic Association scene last January with a mid-season switch from a wing position to point. The 6-foot-4 southpaw developed into the team's leading scorer with a 17.3 average (fifth best in school history) and earned first-team All-PCAA honors. The 6-foot-8 Boagni joined the team in mid-December because of his transfer from the University of Kansas and he became the team's number three scorer with an 11.7 average.

Four sophomores who earned varsity letters as freshmen will be joined by three junior college transfers, two incoming freshmen and one four-year college transfer to comprise the balance of the Titans' 12-man roster.

Wing player **Richard Morton** and center **Vincent Blow** are the sophomores gaining the majority of the spotlight. The 6-foot-3 Morton developed into a dependable "sixth man" last season as he averaged 7.1 points in PCAA play and 5.7 on the entire season. He is a probable starter at a wing position.

Blow, a 6-foot-8, 215-pounder, blossomed late last season and could give the team a tremendous boost in 1985-86 if he continues to develop into a solid PCAA center. He started slowly last year but was at his best in the pressure-packed PCAA post-season tournament. He is the active, mobile interior defender McQuarn seeks.

Henry Turner and Eugene Jackson are the other young Titan veterans. Turner, like Blow, came on strong at season's end and he is expected to compete with Boagni for the other wing position where his 6-foot-7 frame and outstanding leaping ability could help the Titans' inside game. Jackson gained valuable experience as the starting point guard before McQuarn moved Henderson to the position because of his superior acceleration in advancing the ball up the floor. With added maturity and experience, Jackson should be ready to handle a most demanding position and make a major contribution all season.

The most prominent newcomers are interior player **Carl Pitts** and swingman **Alexander Hamilton**. Pitts, a 6-foot-7, 225-pounder, is a transfer from Los Angeles Trade Tech where he averaged 24 points and 15 rebounds. Hamilton will be a swing player, challenging Morton and Boagni and giving the Titans an excellent rebounder from the perimeter. The 6-foot-3½ southpaw led his Saddleback College team in rebounding at 6.9 per game last year while averaging 14 points.

Redshirt **Tee Williamson** is eligible this season after sitting out a year after his transfer from Arizona State. The 6-foot-7, 190-pounder product of Palm Springs High School figures to become a regular part of the interior rotation but his progress has been slowed by an off-court foot injury.

The other candidates for duty inside are San Diego Mesa College transfer Herman Webster and incoming freshman David Moody from Central High in Omaha, Nebraska. Webster is a 6-foot-6, 220-pounder who sat out last season to concentrate on attaining his associate arts degree. Moody is a 6-foot-8, 215-pounder who averaged 12.5 points and six rebounds for one of the Top Ten teams in Nebraska. Also challenging for playing time on the wing is incoming freshman Chris Ceballos, a 6-

foot-5, 190-pounder who averaged 13 points and six rebounds for Dominguez High School in Compton.

"Our goal is to reach the NCAA Tournament," McQuarn said. "We've been one win away on a couple of occasions and will continue to strive for that opportunity.

"We've been very competitive the past few seasons and should be so again this year. It's hard to get to that level and even harder to sustain it. But we want to shoot even higher with our goals."

Key losses from last year's squad are All-PCAA forward Tony Neal and four-year letterman Gary Davis. Neal was the nation's number nine rebounder last year and he completed his Titan career as the PCAA's all-time leading rebounder and the school's number three all-time scorer. Davis finished up as the number five scorer and the number four assist man. Also lost was the center tandem of DeWayne Shepard and Gary Moeller and back-up point guard George Yezbak.

"You don't replace a Tony Neal," McQuarn said. "However, we feel we have the potential to receive comparable play inside if you combine Neal's spot with the other

inside players we had last year.

"Depth could be a problem inside. I'm happy with the quantity of players if we can avoid major injuries but the quality is untested—there are no proven Division I players. You never know how players will react to the switch from high school or junior college to major college basketball.

"Traditionally, we have been a strong perimeter team and that should continue this season. We have good competition for the spots and should get good point production and defense."

Fullerton staged its own "Seniors Day" in Titan Gym as it closed out the home portion of the 1984-85 season with rival UC Irvine.

While all the Fullerton seniors played, it was junior Kevin Henderson stealing the show with a career high of 31 points in the come-frombehind victory over the Anteaters.

UCI led by as many as eight points in the first half at 23-15 but it lost the lead at 31-31 and had to settle for a 36-33 lead at intermission. The Anteaters led most of the second half, twice by as many as seven points, but Fullerton took the lead for good at the 5:40 mark on a Henderson breakaway dunk for a 67-66 advantage. A 7-0 spurt by the Titans turned a narrow 69-68 lead into a comfortable 76-68 margin with 1:50 to play as Henderson, Neal and Henry Turner knocked down clutch free throws.

The victory gave Fullerton undisputed possession of third place in the PCAA standings and gave the Titans the No. 3 seed in the Tournament—against UCI again.

The emotional victory over Fresno State earned Fullerton a shot at the NCAA tournament but it also robbed them of the physical and mental stamina necessary to challenge the talented UNLV Runnin' Rebels.

It would take another nearly flawless game by the Titans to rekindle the memories of the 1977-78 Cinderella season and there just wasn't anything left on a Saturday afternoon after the late Friday night victory.

The game was over almost as soon as it began. The Rebels scored the game's first six points and with Richie Adams and Armand Gilliam dominating the offensive backboards, it was soon a 16-4 UNLV lead. Fullerton could get only as close as nine points and it became a rout later in the period when UNLV went up by as many as 23 points.

The teams merely went through the motions in the second half, with the lead fluctuating between 15 and 23 points.


