Initiative Process at Work in Leisure Village

The initiative process to get measures on the State ballot is dear to the hearts of Californians, who use it frequently. Well-known propositions passed included Prop. 13, which lowered property taxes, and Prop. 103, most revered group in the which lowered insurance rates.

The initiative process is at work in Leisure Village during this month. A petition for a ballot measure has been circulated on the subject of cumulative voting.

The Board of Directors required the petition be turned in on April 14, so that they might consider it. The petition was submitted to the LVA office with more than 230 signatures of homeowners — more than enough needed to qualify -- in order to place the measure on the June 23 LVA ballot. . At that time all homeowners may vote yes or no on cumulative voting.

Residents who have been carrying the petition to delete cumulative voting from our By-laws are amazed at the lack of knowledge about the issues. They hear "I don't understand this," or "I don't want to get involved."

Inside Leisure Village has run letters and material about cumulative voting for the last three months, yet residents still express puzzlement over the process. It is much less important whether individuals are for or against an issue than it is to understand the terms of the system under which we are living. If owners do not understand cumulative voting, why do they continue to permit this system to govern our elections? Shouldn't they remove the unknown system in favor of the simpler and more democratic "one vote for each vacancy" system?

Cumulative voting was advocated by the State of California to protect the developer of a community during the construction phase. Once the community is established and the homeowners take over full governing of the development, they often vote to cancel out the cumulative voting provision in favor of the more democratic one vote for each office set-up. Leisure Technology is long gone, but the Village is still saddled with the cumulative provision. The movement to delete cumulative voting is long overdue for Leisure Village.

One vote for each vacancy is a more democratic manner of voting. Cumulative voting or "stacking" of votes is outmoded and can be manipulative.

Guidelines For Contributors To ILV

Reporters and publicity people submitting material to be used in Inside Leisure Village will help out the staff (and may enhance the reception of their material) if they will follow basic guidelines. These include:

- we must take time to type it, a delay. If handwritten copy is absolutely necessary, submit it early.
- 2. Use full size 8" x 11" sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.
- 3. DO NOT TYPE IN ALL CAPS: stories in all caps must be retyped.
- 4. Put writer's name and phone number in upper left corner.
- 5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our notations.
- 6. Type group's name and writer's byline.
- 7. Double space each line and indent each paragraph.

(If we sound like English teachers, you're right!)

- 8. Put the name of your group into the FIRST sentence of your story. This makes it easier to match up with the right logo .
- 9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter ribbon? Do the keys need cleaning? No red ribbons, script type or Xerox copies, please. clean copy prevents misunderstandings.

10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is Monday at 5 p.m., usually the first Monday of the month.

Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue. Please check the exact deadline and meet it. All material should he placed in the ILV mailbox in the east hall of the Rec Center.


11. If your story must be 1. Type all material, or late, call the coordinator and tell her when you can get it in and why it must be late. Coordinator has the OPTION to accept or refuse the copy.

> 12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Do not call the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator only. Planning for each issue, including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

13. A news story is not minutes of your meeting. Reading about events two months old is dull. What is coming up for your group? Feature future events.

14. If ILV must cut your article because of space, the cutting generally starts at the end, so put your important information at the top, and then give the de-
