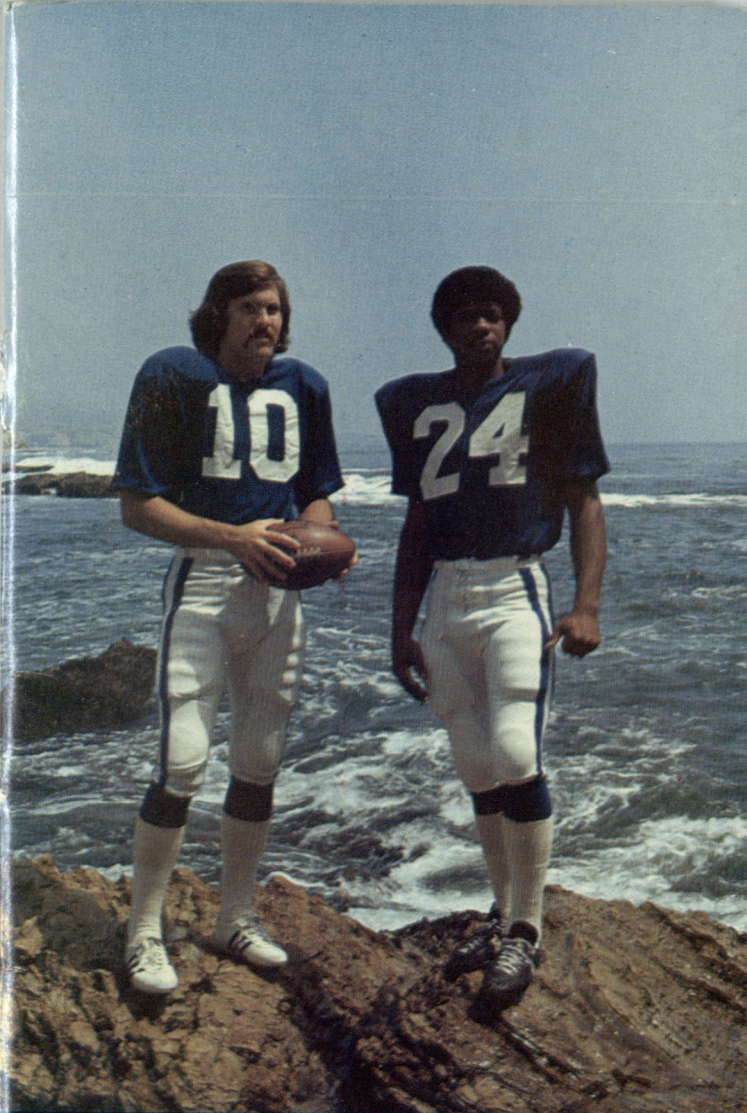

The press parking gate is located on 6th Street just off of Flower in Santa Ana. The gate is plainly marked and attended by a special press ID officer. He will direct you to a specified parking stall adjacent to the stadium where a press entrance will offer you the quickest access to the press box facilities.

You will be furnished with a complete press packet before each game. Included will be a program, lineups, depth chart, player notes and other information pertinent to the game of the day. A running play-by-play account of the game will be distributed immediately following the quarter and halftime breaks while quotes from both coaches will be issued on ditto sheets as soon as possible after the game.

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On The Cover

Wide receiver Stan Chapman and promising quarterback candidate Rod Graves are the passing combination which is being heavily counted upon at Cal State Fullerton this fall.

Chapman, the CCAA scoring champion in 1971 with 68 points including 11 touchdowns, returns for his senior season in Titan Blue and White while Graves, a newcomer this season after transferring to CSUF from Long Beach State and sitting out a year, is the most promising quarterback on the Titan roster.

Highly regarded by the coaching staff, Graves led the nation's JC stars in two offensive categories in 1969 and brings the tools of his trade to Fullerton for what many football observers feel should be his most productive season.

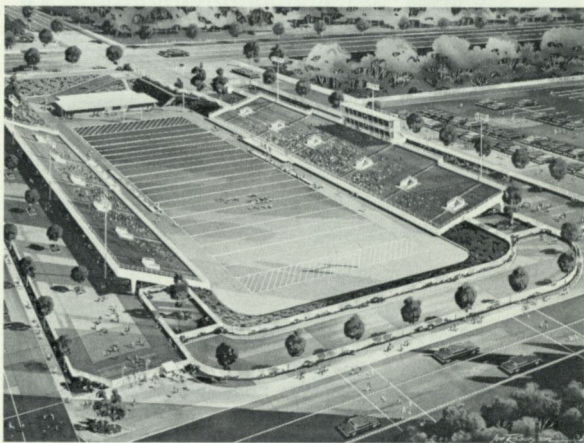
The working arrangements are part of a continuing effort by the Stovall family and the management of the Saddleback Corp., both long time friends of the university and athletic department.

The 10,088-seat Santa Ana Bowl is the 1972 home stadium for the Cal State Fullerton Titans. Built in 1961, the all-concrete structure is settled in a man-made bowl and offers spectator and athlete alike a unique football setting.

With a minimum of wind interference and no track facility, the stadium affords players a significant shelter from some adverse weather elements while giving the spectator a seat on top of the game action.

Few facilities in southern California offer this combination of game-day benefits and the spacious parking facilities just adjacent to the stadium in downtown Santa Ana are on a par with those of any athletic facility in the area.

The lush playing service is both attractive and durable as a number of area high schools and junior colleges will also use the facility during the 1972 season. Cal State Fullerton, meanwhile, participates as Orange County's only NCAA football team.

ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

California State University, Fullerton, a four-year, co-educational institution 26 miles southwest of Los Angeles, has made great strides in both academic and athletic circles since the school's opening 12 years ago. From its earliest beginnings which saw classes held in the classroom facilities of Sunny Hills High School in 1959, Cal State Fullerton has exploded from 452 undergraduates to the 23,000 students registered in the university's graduate and undergraduate programs for the 1972 school year.

What many journalists feel is the finest undergraduate School of Communications in California and the first state college to offer postgraduate degrees in communications, Cal State Fullerton is accepted as a state university unsurpassed in the eight colleges which make up the university's curriculum.

Today Cal State University is in the midst of a projected growth rate which will see the University attain an enrollment of 30,000 students by the 1980's. First in the state college system with master curricula programming, CSUF is now striving to maintain an academic excellence which has seen some \$50 million implemented in the university facility.

President L. Donald Shields, in his third year at the helm of the CSUF academic ship, begins the 1972 academic year by blending an above average academic program with an ever-improving athletic department.

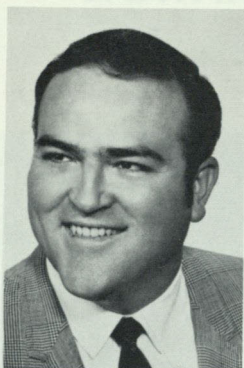

University President



Dr. L. Donald Shields

The youngest state college president in the California system, Dr. L. Donald Shields, noted scientist and educator in the allied fields of chemistry, has directed California State University, Fullerton with a vitality and confidence that has seen CSUF reflect the character of the man who leads it.

A graduate of UC Riverside, Shields went on to earn his Ph. D. in Chemistry from UCLA in 1964. While at Riverside Shields was a three year starter on the Highlanders' football team and has since been enshrined in the school's hall of fame as a guard.

An assistant professor of chemistry from 1963-67, Shields was elevated to Vice President of Administration in the latter year and served the university in that capacity until replacing Dr. William Langsdorf as CSUF's second president in the fall of 1970. Since then Shields has been instrumental in a movement which has seen Cal State Fullerton achieve academic excellence in a world filled with traditionally competitive academic institutions.

An acknowledged expert in the institutional, educational and research areas of the uses of sulphur, Shields has authored half a dozen technical texts on the subject and has been widely sought as a periodical contributor to both academic and commercial publications.

While serving as full professor Shields also achieved administrative notoriety on campus when he was elected Chairman of the Faculty Council by his contemporaries at the ripe old age of 26.

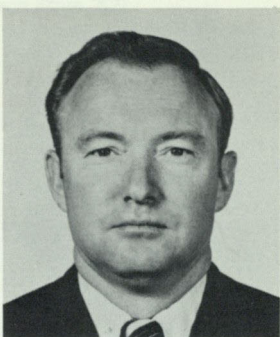
A living testament to the human dynamo theory, Shields is of the rare quality mold which distinguishes leaders and organizers from the followers.

And it is probably that characteristic, his drive, more than any other, which has distinguished him among many others in his field.

Director of Athletics

Neale Stoner returned to his Alma Mater last summer to become the University's fourth athletic director, furthering his illustrious career in athletics' administration.

Stoner, 36, is part of a youth trend in the department of athletics which has seen a turnover in virtually all of CSUF's athletic administration the last year. A native of Fullerton, the new AD brings with him the impressive credentials of a former assistant athletic director as well as that of coach, university instructor and athlete.

Neale, who succeeds Dr. John Caine, has for the last three years served as head basketball coach and assistant AD at Cal Poly (SLO) and previously held the same two positions at UC, San Diego.

Stoner's San Luis Obispo career included three winning seasons and an overall record of 48-32 (a .600 winning percentage) including a share of the 1970-71 CCAA title and a subsequent berth in the NCAA regional playoffs.

As assistant athletic director Neale stockpiled the knowledge/experience he would need to deal with the complexities of a 13-sport program at the university level. Budget and fund raising are but a few of the areas in which Stoner has become proficient. All are vital, integral parts of the athletic program he will administrate for some 700 athletes, coaches and allied personnel at Cal State Fullerton.

In 1966 Stoner became UC San Diego's first basketball coach and in three short years upgraded the Tritons to the NAIA district playoffs. His above-.500 winning average came while Neale also coached the UCSD tennis team, gaining valuable experience in that area.

Neale this past summer completed his requirements in the Master's program, fulfilling yet another prerequisite in the academic preparation for his new position.

Stoner received his BA from Cal State Fullerton in 1962 and played on the Titans' NAIA quarterfinals basketball team as an undergraduate. Prior to CSUF, he attended Fullerton JC preceeded by his high school days at Montebello.

Stoner has begun his duties at Cal State Fullerton with all the vitality which prompted his hiring last June. Always the promoter, Stoner has returned to the university with a vigor that has seen him implant himself as a worker-organizer in Orange County's most promising NCAA school.

Stoner and his wife Lynda have recently moved from San Luis Obispo to their new home in Yorba Linda. The parents of five children, the couple have been happily reunited with Lynda's parents, longtime Fullerton residents.

Assistant Director of Athletics

Versatile Ed Musolff is the new assistant director of athletics at Cal State Fullerton. A 26 year-old former basketball star at Fullerton JC and Fresno State, Ed is Athletic Director Neale Stoner's right hand man in administering CSUF's total athletic program.

A graduate of California High, Whittier, Ed spent two years at FJC and moved on to Fresno State from where he was graduated in 1968. Ed has nearly

completed his MA requirements in sports psychology at San Diego State this past summer and the former Morro Bay HS teacher now assumes his new duties as the No. 2 man in the department of athletics.

Ed coached both track and cross country at Morro Bay HS, while prior to that he assisted Stoner as a basketball coach at UC San Diego.

Single, Ed now makes his home in Huntington Beach.

EQUIPMENT MAN

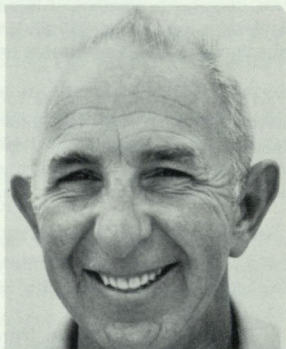
Warren Smith, Cal State Fullerton's long-time equipment manager, is one of the integral parts of the CSUF athletic department. While coaches, administrators and athletes alike prepare for the Titans' athletic events, "Smitty" attends to their equipment needs and insures that all teams are fielded with the best possible equipment.

"Smitty", 51, is in his ninth year as CSUF's head trainer and his duties include issuing, maintaining, and purchasing the equipment used in CSUF's 13 varsity sports.

A veteran of 21 years in the United States Marine Corps, "Smitty" is a veteran of World War II and spent three years in Japanese prison camps following the capture of his unit at Corrigidor in the Phillipines.

A resident of Anaheim, "Smitty" owns a sizeable ranch in Northern California, where he raises beef steers and chickens.

An avid sports enthusiast, "Smitty's" attention to the needs of Cal State Fullerton's hundreds of athletes is a very necessary part of the Titan athletic structure.

PETE YODER

Head Football Coach
(Long Beach State '62)

The new head man on Cal State Fullerton's youthful football staff is 31 year-old Pete Yoder, the ex-USC assistant who is widely recognized in football circles as one of the game's prominent offensive strategists.

A graduate of Downey High School and quarterback on that school's CIF championship team, and Long Beach State University, Yoder had served as an assistant coach at LB City College and LB Poly High School before being named

head coach at Blair High School (Pasadena) in 1965. As a head coach Yoder fielded teams whose offensive imagination and winning consistency (Blair won the CIF large school title in '69, setting a team scoring record of 44.6 ppg in 13 contests; while Yoder's overall record was 37-4-1) ultimately led to his promotion to the prestigious position at Southern Cal.

In succeeding Dick Coury as the new head coach at Fullerton, Yoder will direct the Titans in this their third season of intercollegiate competition with what is generally considered an inexperienced though talented team. Then, too, Coury's act will be difficult to follow as the Titans' initial coach compiled 6-4-1 and 7-4 records in CSUF's first two football seasons. Still, Yoder's impressive record would indicate that he is capable of meeting the challenge of maintaining a winning tradition in the face of Fullerton's most rigorous schedule to date.

Yoder received his Master's Degree from Cal State Long Beach in 1964 while assisting Jim Stangeland at nearby LBCC and later moving to Poly.

As an offensive backfield assistant, it was Yoder who developed such illustrious prep athletes as Earl McCullough (presently with Detroit of the NFL); Gene Washington (star wide receiver of the 49'ers); and most recently James McAlister (the world class runningback now at UCLA).

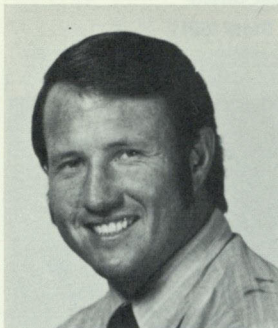
But while Yoder has obviously developed some of the country's truly exceptional athletes (in addition to Washington and McCullough, Yoder also sent Gary Garrison, LBCC, Clarence Davis and Charlie Evans, USC, to the NFL while Lou Harris and Bill Holland of last year's Trojan squad will receive NFL tryouts this fall) the innovative young coach has proven immensely successful in dealing with the rank and file of football's supporting cast.

To be sure, it was the brilliant individual efforts of McAlister which was instrumental in Blair's football domination of the late 60's. Yet Yoder's attention to detail and dedication to coaching fundamentals was the key to the efforts which produced the 37-4-1 overall record.

An avid reader (Yoder has compiled an extensive home library) and gardening buff, the new coach and his wife Charlotte are the parents of three children, Catherine, 9, Tommy, 4, and Laura, 2. All have recently moved into the Yoder's new home in Anaheim.

JOHN GODDEN

Defensive Coordinator



John Godden

John Godden, defensive coordinator the last three years at Santa Ana JC, joins Pete Yoder this season as the Titans' defensive coordinator and brings with him a wealth of player-coaching knowledge accumulated over the last 14 years.

A high school all-star performer at Buena Park, Godden went on to star both at Fullerton JC ('61 and '62) and San Diego State ('62 and '64). While at San Diego State Godden earned all-CCAA first team honors on both offense and

defense as a guard and linebacker in his junior year. Then, successfully recovering from an injury, Godden returned in 1964 and again made all-CCAA first team as a linebacker as well as second team All-Coast on the Football Sports-writers Team.

At 29, John has distinguished himself as one of southern California's promising defensive minds as his Santa Ana teams won two conference defensive team championships while finishing second in a third year. Santa Ana set a school record for fewest total yards-allowed in 1969, surrendering just 1,040 yards rushing and passing in nine games. The 1971 team again won the league defensive statistics title.

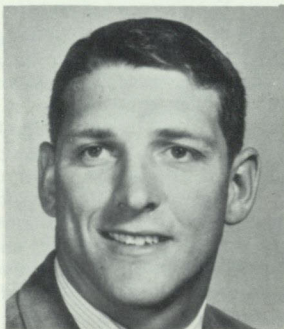
A resident of Huntington Beach, Godden and his wife Lynda are the parents of four sons, J.D. (9), Brian (7), Damon (4) and Travis (1) and also foster parents to two girls, seven and four.

DAVE GIBBS

Offensive Line

Another new assistant on the 1972 Titan staff, 29 year-old Dave Gibbs will handle Cal State Fullerton's offensive line chores this season after a two year stint at Sonoma State College in northern California.

Prior to Sonoma, Gibbs, a graduate of UCLA, spent four years at Fullerton's Troy High School in the 1966, '67, '68 and '69 seasons while before that duty he was an assistant at Los Angeles' Loyola High in 1965 and a graduate assistant at UCLA in '64.

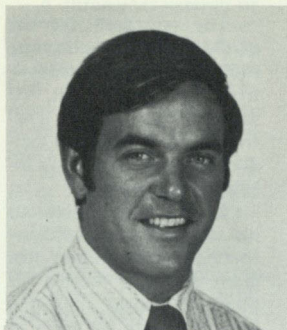
The holder of a Master's Degree in Physical Education from UCLA, Gibbs starred as a prep at Buena Park High School where he teamed with Titan defensive coordinator John Godden in the Orange County All-Star Game in 1960. Dave was named the game's MVP that year, playing tight end.

A student of the "bent-knee" drive block, Gibbs will also drill the Fullerton men in the pit on pass-protection blocking which will be so fundamental to this season's air attack.

He and his wife Nona live in Yorba Linda with their two daughters, Jennifer and Stacy, ages, five and two.

BILL GRIFFIN

Offensive Backs

Bill Griffin brings his coaching talents to Fullerton from the Midwest where he excelled as both coach and player in Missouri. Bill was a two-sport letterman at the University of Missouri, playing three years of both varsity football and baseball and being named Honorable Mention All-American in the latter in his senior year.

After graduation from Mizzou in 1968 Bill began his coaching career at Missouri's Christian Brothers College and spent three seasons coaching punters and

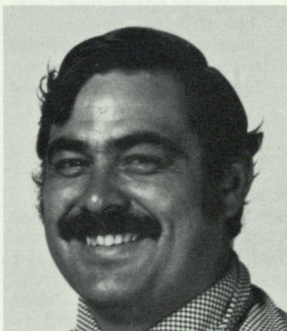
offensive backs at that school. In 1971 Bill moved on to St. Louis' DeSmet High School and coached the offensive backs and punters again as DeSmet won a share of the conference championship. The DeSmet offense averaged just over 425 yards per game a year ago as Griffin's backs amassed over 3,000 yards rushing and 1,000 additional yards through the air on the way to a 7-2-1 season.

A native of St. Louis, Griffin moved to southern California recently after being selected to head coach Pete Yoder's staff. An avid sports fan and reader, Bill participated in the graduate studies program at Missouri and will continue his education towards his Master's Degree at nearby Chapman College.

Griffin, 26, and his wife of four years, Necia, are new residents of Newport Beach.

GIL MENDOZA

Defensive Line

Gil Mendoza, the newest addition to the Titan coaching staff, will work the defensive linemen this fall. A 31 year-old native Californian, Mendoza is a long time associate of head coach Pete Yoder, dating back to their playing days at Long Beach City College.

Mendoza matriculated to Fullerton from Garden Grove's Los Amigos High School where he was defensive coach the last three seasons. In 1968 Gil spent a year on the Baldwin Park High School staff where he coached the McNeill brothers,

Rod and Fred, while in 1967 Mendoza served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Fresno State College.

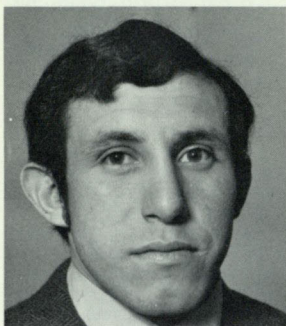
Mendoza's playing career began at Long Beach City College in 1959 followed by three years of military duty and service ball. In 1964 Gil returned to LBCC where he earned All-Metro honors as a tight end, ultimately transferring to Fresno State for his final two intercollegiate seasons.

"We're very pleased that we could get a man of Gil's caliber at this late date," says head coach Yoder. "He's a very enthusiastic and hard worker and will be an inspiration to the players."

Mendoza, just hired in mid-July, lives in Santa Ana with his wife and two children.

RAUL CASTILLO

Receivers

The youngest member of the 1972 Titan coaching staff and the only holdover from last year's unit, 22 year-old Raul Castillo, a native of Santa Ana, will handle Cal State Fullerton's receivers this season.

Castillo recently started his requirements in Fullerton's graduate studies program and will receive his Master's degree, enabling him to devote full time to his coaching duties.

The only bachelor on the staff, Castillo received

his Associate of Arts Degree from Santa Ana College in 1969 and his bachelor's degree from Cal State Fullerton last year. While at Santa Ana College Castillo performed a dual role as he played student by day and varsity football coach at Santa Ana High School by night, a feat he continued from 1967 through 1969.

Raul's playing career was limited to one outstanding year at Santa Ana High where the 5-5, 145-pound coach was named "Most Inspirational" and "Most Improved" in his single year of varsity competition.

Still a resident of Santa Ana, Raul enters his sixth year of coaching and will teach activity classes this year at CSUF.

Jerry Lloyd

Head Trainer

A three-year veteran of the CSUF athletic scene, Jerry Lloyd begins his fourth campaign as head trainer with a wealth of athletic-medical knowledge acquired over the last 10 years.

Jerry's duties, which include the immediate needs of athletic injuries and rehabilitation treatment, began when Jerry became a Navy Corpsman attached to the Marine Corps in 1962. For four years Jerry toiled as a medical aid in the field both in the United States and overseas in Okinawa and Viet Nam.

Following his discharge in 1966, Jerry enrolled at Long Beach City College and in three years graduated from Long Beach State with his B.A. in physical education. Those three years (66-69) Jerry served as team trainer for both LBCC and LB State athletic teams.

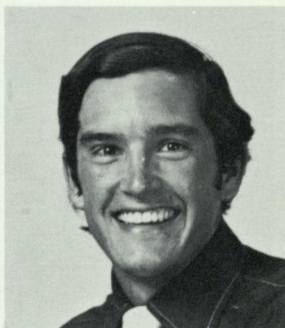
Following his graduation, Jerry moved on to Cal State Fullerton and has been here ever since, serving the needs of Fullerton's athletic teams.

Endless lines of correspondence, last minute mailing lists, advice to staff and athletes alike, and free coffee are the trademarks of these native California girls.

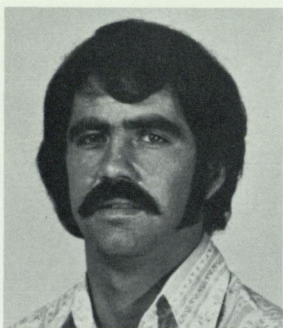

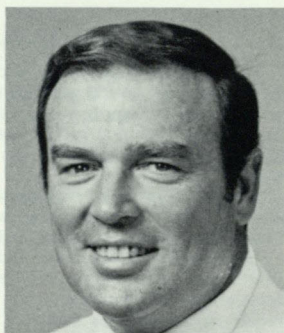
Support Organizations

SEASON OUTLOOK

The 1972 football Titans anticipate their most difficult schedule through 1974 as they embark on an 11-game campaign with an untested, though potentially, strong team.

Gone are many of the name football players who contributed to CSUF's impressive season records the last two years; still, Titan head coach Pete Yoder is realistically pleased at the prospects of a successful 1972 campaign. A total of 52 new names will be on this year's roster as Yoder and his staff have enjoyed a remarkably successful recruiting year, despite a late start which saw the staff formed in February of '72.

A leading candidate in the newly formed program is quarterback Rod Graves, the Long Beach State transfer who sat out last season and will complete his college career on the CSUF campus after leading the nation's JC performers in two offensive categories in 1969. The 6-0, 185-pounder is on a par with most skill position offensive performers on the coast and the staff is anxious to turn him loose against conference competition.

Graves, who attended nearby Saddleback JC, is joined by former Cal starter Larry Brumsey, the 6-3, 225-pound tight end who started for the Pac-8 Bears a year ago, while a host of JC and college transfers combine to compliment the returners from '71's 7-4 club.

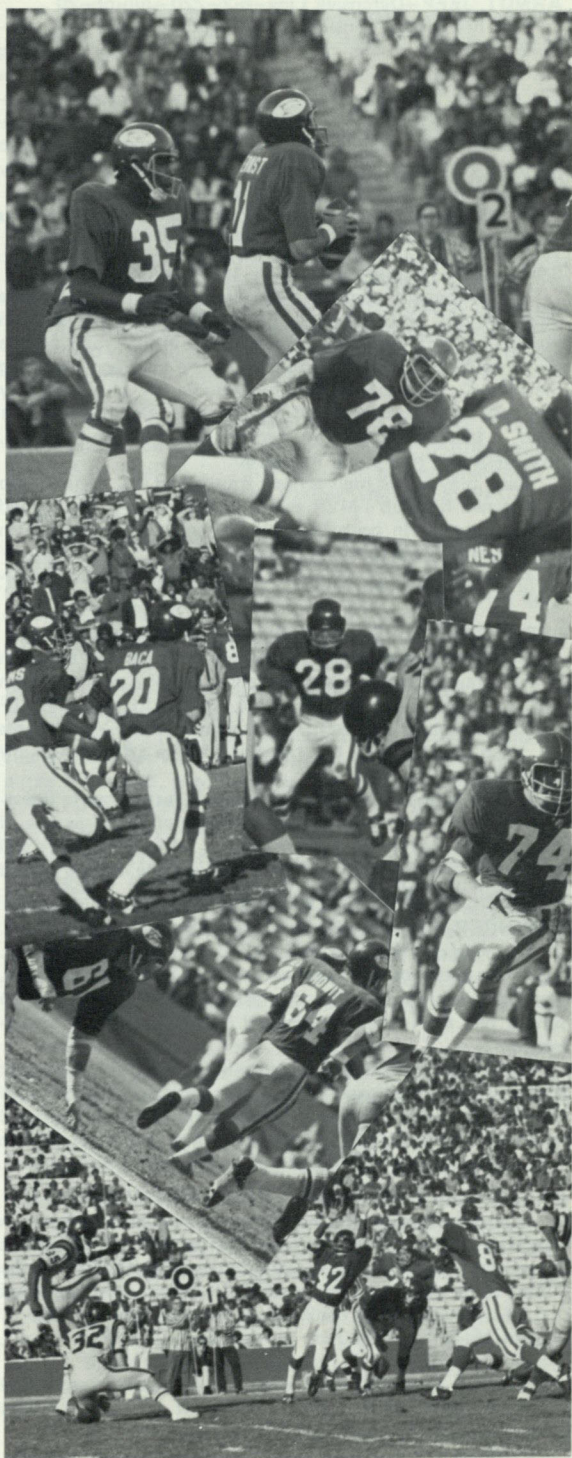
From the team that was shocked by a tragic plane crash towards season's end in 1971, several key performers return as the Titans make another bid to capture a conference football championship which has eluded them these past two years. The banner-line performer has to be wide receiver Stan Chapman, the CCAA's individual scoring champion a year ago, who returns to Fullerton for his senior season.

Chapman's 68 points scored in '71 included 11 touchdowns and his presence will be dearly felt in CSUF's pass-oriented offensive philosophy. Then, too, there's returning tight end Marc Hardy, a 225-pounder who transferred to CSUF from Kansas; and wide receiver Terry Lindsey, a walk-on whose skills and desire have caused considerable stirring among the coaching staff. Lindsey, a transfer from San Diego's Mesa JC, was a two-year starter at that school and is going to push Chapman to his level best.

Brian Wofford, a fire-plug defensive tackle (at 245 pounds he is 6-0), probably earns the reputation as CSUF's most able returning defensive veteran. The bullish pit performer is expected to be a middle-round draft choice at season's end should he perform in '72 as he has in the past.

To be sure, Yoder would rather have 52 days to prepare 19 new faces for the September 16 opener. He is, however, faced with the task of juggling 52 new players into a new team in just 19 days, a monumental task by any measuring device. Still, the wealth of raw talent, and a remarkably resourceful coaching staff would seem to indicate that '72 will again find Cal State Fullerton on the above-500 winning level and in the midst of the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship race.

Jeff has grown considerably in both physical and emotional maturity in his first two collegiate seasons, coming out of LB Jordan High School as a 6-0, 190-pounder. . . his JC career at Long Beach City College saw him start at defensive tackle both years . . . consequently CSUF defensive coordinator John Godden says, "Jeff is just now coming into his own. He'll play a prominent role in our defensive strategy if he continues to improve as he has in the past."

A 20 year-old pre-major, Jeff is single . . . still makes Long Beach his home.

BACA, JOE—Running Back—5-8—168—Senior—21

An extremely elusive offensive performer, Joe Baca might be one of the most exciting kick-return specialists in the CCAA this season. . . Baca, the shortest man on the squad at 5-8, scored three touchdowns a year ago including the season's longest kickoff return (85 yards). . . played only sparingly as a running back as will likely be the case this year. . . talents are explosive broken field running ability. . . two steps and he's going full speed. . .

Baca played his high school football at St. John Bosco and earned his club's MVP award as a senior . . . performed for Cerritos JC in both '69 and '70 and led conference in return yardage his sophomore season. . .

A senior physical education major, Joe, 22, makes Norwalk his home.

BERG, DARRYL—Defensive Back—6-2—205—Junior—21

Has to be a great one . . . potential is unlimited although he will play defense . . . transferred to CSUF a year ago from USC . . . out of Westminster High, Berg led Lions into CIF playoffs as senior and won AAAA Player of the Year honors . . . tried Southern Cal but transferred here after two injury riddled years. . .

A high school sensation on one of Westminster's finest-ever clubs, Berg finishes collegiate career at CSUF as one of the cornerstones in Titan secondary . . . extremely quick and rangy, the Orange County product is versatile, having played basketball, golf and participated in track.

BERINGER, DENNIS—Center—6-4—215—Junior—21

Beringer is a fine student as well as all around athlete. . . maintains close to a B average entering his junior year . . . starting center at Cypress JC last fall, Dennis played high school ball at Anaheim, perennial Southern Section powerhouse . . .

Says Yoder, "Dennis has unlimited ability." . . . Probably Beringer's foremost asset is size at his position . . . good range makes him formidable pass protection blocker, lean and mean as the catalog says. . . offensive line coach Dave Gibbs rates Beringer with the class offensive linemen he has coached.

BRASFIELD, JOHN—Running Back—6-1—205—Senior—21

A burly, power performer, Brasfield saw limited action a year ago and is one of the few experienced offensive backs returning. . . cast in the mold of a bruiser, Brasfield offers the Titans some seasoned rushing ability where it is most needed . . . All-League running back at Los Angeles High in 1969 as well as Most Valuable Back on that club. . . at East LA JC, made All-Conference as running back in '70. . .

Brasfield shared rushing duties in '71 and averaged 2.9 yards per carry on 21 carries, fifth best on the team of a year ago. . .

A native of Los Angeles, John still makes his home there.

BRIGHT, RANDY—Defensive Line—6-0—205—Junior—20

Another Anaheim High School product where he played on Colonists' championship teams, Bright possesses a wealth of instinctive tools . . .

Not a giant as defensive linemen go, Yoder is very impressed with the former Fullerton JC starter. "Randy is a player's player. He is as tough as they come; contact is his sport."

Yoder went on, saying he expects Bright to see plenty of action if not earn a starter's roll in the fall . . .

BRUMSEY, LARRY—Tight End—6-3—225—Junior—21

A definite plus at Fullerton is addition of former Santa Ana star tight end. . . started two years at Cal, on frosh team and as sophomore in 1971. . . left Berkeley in wake of 1.6 ruling which concerned him and teammate Isaac Curtis. . .

In two years on the rigorous Berkeley campus Brumsey proved himself a student, earning 90 units—all A's and B's except two classes. . .

Should be finest tight end in CSUF's history, but with stiff competition from veteran Marc Hardy, position will be manned by hustler . . . Brumsey is in professional mold at 6-3, 225 and found little trouble starting in PAC-8 for Golden Bears . . .

Enjoys game and approaches it from adult angle. . . mother, brothers and sisters live in family home in Santa Ana . . . Married, Larry and his wife make their home in the campus community.

CARIAGA, DAN—Quarterback—6-2—180—Sophomore—19

Felt pressure of being one of few freshmen on '71 squad but still has promise of all-star high school career. . . just 19 and a sophomore, Danny played in San Gabriel Valley All-Star Game in '71. . . was starting QB two years at La Puente HS where team went to playoffs in '69. . . senior year led all to 7-2 record, two losses by total of three points . . . has three TD passes over 80 yards in career. . . led Sierra League in total offense as a senior.

CHAPMAN, STAN—Wide Receiver—5-11—175—Senior—21

League's leading scorer in 1971 as he won individual scoring title with 68 points on 11 TD's and PAT reception. . . overall caught 30 passes for 475 yards in '71, second highest on team. . . holds school records for highest average yards per catch in single season (19.4 in 1970). . . needs just 50 yards in receptions to become school's all-time receiving yardage leader.

Born in Oklahoma, the 21 year-old physical education major appears destined for pro career if he can get by on size. . . a 175-pounder, Chapman starred at Centennial High before coming to Cal State Fullerton.

Only two-year letterman on the team.

Single, Stan still makes his home in Compton.

CHENEY, BOB—Offensive Line—6-1—250—Junior—20

One of the beefiest Titans, the 250-pounder will be counted upon heavily to protect CSUF's passer this season . . . offensive line coach Dave Gibbs sees Cheney as one of the stronger points in this year's line.

Started two years at Santa Ana JC where he made All-League as a sophomore tackle. . . will play offensive guard for Cal State Fullerton. Yoder is pleased with his speed, "He's deceptively quick for a man of his size," says the coach.

Coaching staff sees him as one of best prospects to come to team this year.

CRUCIL, JEFF—Offensive Line—6-3—230—Junior—20

Just blossoming as an effective lineman, Jeff, at 230 lbs., is still growing. . . started for Cerritos JC both ways, draws oohs and ahhs from staff when they speak of his potential.

Played high school football at Bellflower where he was named Buccaneers' outstanding senior lineman. . . Yoder predicts Crucil will probably see action as a tackle for Titans.

deAVILA, DAN—Wide Receiver—6-2—180—Junior—24

Rangy as wide receivers go, the 6-2 speedster was one of the state's leading receivers two years ago at Glendale . . . like many on this year's roster, Dan is an ex-serviceman.

Coaching staff describes him as a dedicated athlete who has made transition from service life to athletics. Married, he and his wife make their home in Fullerton.

DENTON, ROBIN—Linebacker—6-2—210—Senior—21

One of few seniors on this year's club. . . linebacker with good size, Robin played high school ball at Lynwood before transferring to Compton JC.

Was Lynwood's Most Valuable Back in 1968. . . played fullback for Compton JC in 1970, starting as a sophomore and made First Team All-Western State as running back. . . additional honors included Second Team All-State.

Played for Joe Wade in JC, makes valuable contribution to this year's Titan squad after gaining valuable experience in 1971 role.

Single, Robin makes home in Costa Mesa and enjoys golf in off-season.

DeROSA, RANDY—Linebacker—6-1—205—Junior—19

A student of the game, DeRosa is one of those rare young players who has molded a life around the game rather than vice-versa. . . born and raised in Long Beach, Randy attended Long Beach Poly High and Long Beach City College, starring on the football teams of both schools. . .

Highly aggressive, the eager linebacker studies football and films for hours. . . unusually gifted for a man his size, he possesses excellent speed to compliment his physical disposition.

DOLKAS, STEVE—Linebacker—5-11—200—Junior—23

Attended Whittier College, also Pasadena CC before transferring to CSUF . . . prepped at San Gabriel High and was standout on Matadors' 1967 team. . . made All-Metro League First Team as linebacker at Pasadena City College.

An ex-serviceman, Steve "grew up" following a shaky academic start and has matured into a substantial football player. Rated "extra tough" by Yoder, the coach also classifies Dolkas high in diagnosing offenses.

Married, Steve and his wife make their home in Garden Grove.

ELIAS, JOHN—Defensive Line—6-3—240—Senior—21

Calls himself the "Stud Killer", the ex-Santa Ana star played high school ball with new teammate Larry Brumsey.

Born in Cherry Point, N.C., John's father is a deputy sheriff, his mother an R.N.

A psychology major with a 3.0 g.p.a., John is married and makes his home in nearby Santa Ana. One of the sizeable figures on the '72 roster, he checked into camp at 245 pounds.

ELROD, BRAD—Wide Receiver—5-10—170—Senior—22

A part time starter last fall, Brad earned Offensive Player of the Game honors against Grambling in 1971. . . caught four passes for 58 yards and two touchdowns last season. . . begins third season at CSUF after playing only one year of junior college ball at Cerritos.

A pre-dentistry student, Brad maintains a B-average, including a 3.0 in his major. . . receiver coach Raul Castillo has high opinion of Elrod, labeling him an able, coachable athlete whose small size does not hamper his performance.

EPATI, LETASI—Defensive Line—6-2—250—Junior—20

May become one of CSUF's big stars as a defensive lineman. . . called a real mixer by coaching staff, the Samoan-born athlete starred at San Diego's Mesa JC for two years.

Epati was a standout starter at Mesa as a freshman but was injured much of last year while playing linebacker. . . defensive coordinator John Godden has switched him to defensive line to take advantage of "Junior's" great strength.

Yoder appears pleased at prospect of having Epati at Fullerton, saying "He's just a savage, he loves this game."

Just 20 years old, he is one of more than 50 new candidates for Yoder's '72 club . . . still makes San Diego his home . . . spent summer in Samoa.

FALLS, DENNIS—Defensive Back—6-0—180—Junior—20

Grew up in Pasadena area and played high school ball at John Muir, then transferred from rugged H.S. competition to Pasadena CC and the highly competitive Metro League. . . still ranks as one of league's class defensive backs.

Yoder scouted him extensively, labeling Falls an extremely aggressive defensive back with good speed. . . back-peddling ability makes coaching staff think Falls can handle job in secondary . . . only question remaining appears to be high caliber competition Falls will face in trying to earn a starting role.

FRANKLIN, JOHN—Linebacker—6-0—215—Junior—20

Played at St. Paul H.S. for coach Marion Ancich, then went on to UCLA following graduation. . . left UCLA, transferred to Fullerton JC and started there as linebacker.

Married, coaching staff rated him one of steadiest performers to be recruited this past winter. . . John has natural instinct for hitting and although not overly tall, makes best use of his size with hard-nose attitude and "rough-'em-up" philosophy.

GENTILE, JACK—Tight End—5-9—185—Junior—20

The smallest receiver on the club, this tight end candidate started at Golden West JC and made a name for himself with his tough, durable reputation. . . made all-opponent team on five JC adversaries, and brings bullish disposition to Fullerton this fall.

Yoder is pleased with Jack's presence, having recruited no other players on the Golden West squad of a year ago.

MEET THE TITANS

GRAVES, ROD—Quarterback—6-0—185—Senior—22

Possibly the single most contributing individual to the success of CSUF football this fall. . . an experienced, heady athlete, Graves has both the innate ability and the confidence to quarterback a championship team.

Led nation's JC performers in 1969 as he won the individual total offense championship (900 yards rushing, 2200 yards passing) as well as the yards gained per play title (14.7 yards gained on passing attempts). . . reflects the perfect combination of run-pass ability which makes for a bonafide scoring threat. . . scoring statistics were equally as impressive as he led Saddleback two years ago, 32 touchdowns his final season including 20 passing while completing 146 of 273 attempts (54%).

Played H.S. ball at Tustin, earning the team's MVP award as well as All-League and All-Orange County honors. . . was Saddleback's MVP as freshman and sophomore, making All-State in sophomore year. . . transferred to Long Beach State in '70, then to CSUF, sitting out last season to gain eligibility this fall.

GRZECKA, TOM—Linebacker—5-10—180—Junior—20

Smallest linebacker on team at 5-10, 180 pounds. . . played high school football at Mater Dei, earning All-Orange County in both junior and senior years. . .

Was high school team's MVP in senior year, unanimous choice all-league selection. . . married, Tom and his wife make their home in Buena Park.

HAKES, ALAN—Defensive Back—6-2—190—Senior—22

A multi-sport athlete out of Fullerton High, Hakes is an accounting major with an eye on a business career following graduation. . . lettered in three sports at FHS, including wrestling and track. . . ideal size for cornerback, the 6-2 senior has plenty of experience to lend to the Titan secondary this fall.

HARDY, MARC—Tight End—6-5—225—Senior—22

A stellar high school performer with Rod Graves at Tustin, Hardy went on to the University of Kansas, transferring back to CSUF and his native California. . . the largest offensive lineman at 6-5, 225 pounds, Hardy has sure hands in the bumpy traffic of the middle of the field and lends his size to out-jumping defensive backs.

Staff forsee a substantial battle for starting tight end spot between Hardy and Cal transfer Larry Brumsey. . . will likely be strongest position on squad, offense or defense. . .

HICKERSON, KEN—Offensive Line—6-1—225—Junior—20

Another of the big offensive linemen recruited in the off-season, Hickerson might be the most promising of the new blockers. . . played in the Orange County All-Star game three years ago for coach Dave Gibbs, then went on to star for two seasons at Fullerton Junior College as one of the state's outstanding interior linemen. . .

Hickerson might likely be the starting center, based on the staff's analysis of spring drills. . . could play guard, though, as he is one of the more versatile athletes to be brought in this fall.

HOWIT, GREG—Offensive Line—6-0—210—Senior—22

Starting offensive guard last fall. . .excelled in both phases of pass protection and drive blocking techniques. . .

Was ironman, two-way performer for San Pedro High. . .starred at center in HS, earning team captain's award as voted by his fellow players. . .went on to Harbor JC in rugged SCC. . .at 6-0, 210 pounds Howitt will offer much needed experience in interior line.

Physical education major, the senior plans on going into coaching after graduation. . .plays guitar and works as camp counselor in summer.

HUDSON, BARRY—Defensive Line—6-3—275—Senior—22

Largest man on squad, the 275-pound defensive tackle starred in the competitive midwest as an all-league lineman at Aledo H.S. (Illinois) and later at Black Hawk JC.

Wrestles for Titan matmen in off-season as heavyweight . . . wrestled for JC team which finished 4th in National JC championship in 1969. . .placed 4th in CCAA class in 1971.

Music fan, minors in it with communications major. . .performed in civic and college musical productions in Illinois.

JACKSON, JEFF—Receiver—6-2—180—Senior—22

Jeff started at wide receiver both of his seasons at Riverside Junior College. . .the 22 year-old junior will lend added depth to the receiving corps with both his experience and above-average speed. . .a 4.7 second 40 man, Jackson was all-league in high school at Riverside's Norte Vista High. . .in two years at Riverside JC he caught 66 passes for 980 yards and had scholarship offers from Kansas, Idaho and Redlands among other schools.

JOHNSTON, PAIGE—Offensive Line—6-3—225—Senior—21

Transferred to CSUF from Sonoma State last year with coach Gibbs. . .an ideal offensive lineman with better than average size, he started at both guard and tackle at Sonoma State, will probably play at tackle for Titans. . .gained invaluable experience at Sonoma, and as Gibbs says, "Paige will fit in very well in our plans this fall. He is an agile, aggressive blocker and plays exceptionally well despite the obscurity of his job."

Johnston will likely play tackle at CSUF, adding veteran experience to the interior line. . .of voting age, he is single and plans a career in coaching.

JONES, ART—Wide Receiver—5-9—160—Senior—22

The multi-faceted Jones starred for the Titan basketball team the last two years and finishes his collegiate football eligibility this fall. . .played high school ball at Compton's Centennial making All-League in basketball as a play-maker . . .in 1970 he won Most Inspirational award at Compton JC while starting on basketball team. . .last year was CSUF's Most Inspirational basketball player as well as team captain . . .coaching staff is anxious to get him into football uniform.

Has both speed, maturity and intelligence to play in secondary or as receiver. . .interests are cooking and music . . .a physical education major, Art will go into teaching after graduation.

MEET THE TITANS

KLUGE, HOWARD—Defensive Line—6-0—240—Junior—20

Part of the beef movement by the recruiting program last winter, Kluge played JC ball at Santa Maria's Hancock JC and the 240-pounder started both years there as a defensive lineman. . . Yoder sees him as a starter this year and the credentials Howard brings with him would indicate the faith Yoder displays is warranted.

At Hancock he led defensive lineman in individual tackles for two years while making All-League First Team as a sophomore. . . very aggressive and enthusiastic both during practice and in game situations, Kluge appears headed for a continuing success story as he puts on a Titan uniform.

Married, Howard and his wife live in Anaheim.

LARA, DANNY—Running Back—5-9—180—Junior—20

Danny Lara is a name synonymous with the success story which hit Rio Hondo JC the last two years. . . the Road-runners employed him as one of two running backs as the club swept to a pair of conference championships while advancing to the state playoff semifinals in 1971. . . smallish at 5-9, 180, Lara remains, nonetheless, one of the most elusive rushers to come out of Rio Hondo. . . winning ways are a plus.

Danny prepped at El Rancho, making All-Moore League as a running back before moving on to Rio Hondo. . . staff has great expectations.

LINDSEY, TERRY—Wide Receiver—6-0—180—Senior—20

Described by Yoder as a diamond in the rough, Lindsey contacted the staff this winter after graduating from San Diego Mesa. . . "Terry has unlimited potential," says Yoder. "He was easily one of the top JC receivers we scouted on film this past year."

Lindsey's assets include great speed, sure hands, and an attitude which might make him at least a part time starter. With Lindsey vying for veteran Stan Chapman's position, the battle for a starting berth ought to produce some of the finest individual performances from receivers this season.

MADIGAN, TOM—Quarterback—6-1—205—Junior—20

Tom Madigan, like Lindsey, offers the Titan staff a quality of depth which ought to make first string candidate Rod Graves work hard to maintain his position. . . starring for two years at San Diego's Grossmont JC, Tom was All-League First Team in 1971 in a conference laden with talented passers. . . coaches are greatly impressed with his arm and feel he is just coming into his own as a thrower. . . just a junior, he should offer a great contribution to the '72 program.

McFARLAND, JERRY—Running Back—5-10—190—Junior—20

Another Fullerton JC star, Jerry will be counted upon to bolster the offensive ground attack lending both depth and talent to the Titans corps of runners. . . played tailback at Fullerton JC, also played for coach Dave Gibbs at Troy High School.

A tough inside runner with better than adequate speed, Jerry's durability is probably his most prominent asset. . . likened to Terry McLean, the Titans' leading rusher a year ago and the school's career yardage leader. . .

MEET THE TITANS

McCLENDON, CRIT—Running Back—6-0-180—Freshman—18

One of the few freshmen on this year's squad, he could be a nugget according to Yoder. . . a 9.8 sprinter in high school, Crit starred in three sports for Venice's Gondaliers.

Still a growing boy, at 18 he's got plenty of time to grow . . . staff sees him as extremely tough for his age, could be outstanding with a year or two of experience.

MEDEIROS, BERNIE—Defensive Back—6-1-195—Junior—20

A starter at Cypress Junior College both ways, at flanker and defensive back. . . made All-Orange County in high school as a running back. . . Yoder plans to install him in the secondary to take advantage of his extensive defensive experience.

A 20 year-old junior, Bernie plans to go into coaching after graduation from Cal State Fullerton.

MILLENDER, ALLEN—Offensive Line—6-4-250—Junior—21

Another of the huge new offensive linemen brought in this season, Allen will be counted upon heavily to offer pass protection to CSUF's throwers . . . a standout at Compton Junior College where he was the club's fastest lineman, Millender never played high school football. . . the coaching staff feels he is just maturing as a player, what with only two years experience behind him.

"He has unlimited ability and comes to play the game," says Yoder. Millender spent one year in Job Corps following high school.

MONICO, JIM—Center—6-1-215—Junior—20

Attended Warren High School where he was a two year starter. . . JC career blossomed at Cerritos where he was a part time starter as a freshman and full time a year ago. . . a steady performer, Jim has developed into one of the better centers to be recruited this year. . . staff pleased with signing him, Yoder considers Monico a hard worker at his relatively obscure position.

MORALES, FRANK—Running Back—5-10-200—Soph—20

Frank enjoyed an outstanding high school career at Lakewood, but has not played organized football since. . . attended Long Beach City College the last two years and will now resume his playing career in the Titans' offensive backfield. . . offensive backfield coach Bill Griffin rates Morales with fine ability, rustiness may be only drawback but the former prep star appears to have the tools to quickly overcome that.

MEET THE TITANS

MORRISON, MITCH—Offensive Line—6-1—225—Junior—20

A standout defensive tackle at Orange Coast College last fall, Mitch will be switched to offensive guard for Cal State Fullerton. . . the former San Marino High School lineman comes from a football family as Mitch's father, Curly, played professionally with the NFL Cleveland Browns in the 1950's . . . makes home in Los Angeles and at 225 pounds offers the Titan interior line a promising candidate.

NESMITH, GARY—Offensive Line—6-2—230—Senior—21

Gary was a full-time starter on last year's line. . . an able veteran, Nesmith is being switched to offense this fall to take full advantage of his superior strength and football savvy. . . starred for Mt. San Antonio College two years ago and was on West Covina's championship football teams during high school days. . .

At 230 pounds, Nesmith is of the size to successfully protect quarterbacks in CSUF's all-important passing attack . . . A senior, Gary plans on either a professional career or a teaching career following graduation.

PENCE, STEVE—Offensive Line—6-3—240—Senior—22

Another of the sizeable new recruits brought in to bolster the offense at Cal State Fullerton this fall. . . Steve will make a strong bid for a regular playing position while offering talented depth to an area in much need of it. . .

An all-league (Marmonte) performer at Newbury Park High School near Thousand Oaks, Steve begins his junior season after transferring from Loma Linda University in the San Diego area. . .

PERAMBLE, MARK—Offensive Line—6-3—240—Freshman—18

One of three freshmen on this year's squad, Preamble hails from nearby Mater Dei High School, having played on two outstanding teams the last two seasons when the Monarchs were ranked as high as second in their CIF division. . . good size, strength and speed have led the coaching staff to believe this young lineman will make it at CSUF. . . the 240-pounder needs only maturity, in Yoder's opinion, to develop into one of the league's class blockers.

PILATO, MIKE—Linebacker—5-11—200—Junior—21

WOLFPACK

Nevada, Reno fields a veteran defensive unit this fall (eight starters from a year ago return) with the hope that a rebuilt offensive line can mature in time to make the Wolfpack an independent football power in 1972.

That rebuilding task, however, and the search for a new quarterback may prove more formidable than any of Nevada's opponents this fall as the Pack seeks to improve on 1971's 5-5

record.

A lone returning interior line starter, guard John Parola, will team with returning running backs Mark Granucci, Earnie O'Leary, and Rick Carter and receiver Charlie Nunnally as coach Jerry Scattini's rebuilding nucleus.

The defense ought to be as effective as the one which allowed only 153 points last season, including a shutout against San Francisco and one-touchdown performances against both Oregon Tech and Portland State. Defense, as ever, will determine most of 1972's winners from the losers. Still, the monumental offensive face-lifting may prove even too much for the Pack's seasoned defenders.

The linebacking corps is intact with the return of Sonny Allen, Jeff Macomber and Ed Plank while in the secondary two-time Little All-Coast safety Bill Marioni and Greg Henry are coming back.

In this first meeting of the two schools, Nevada hopes to take advantage of the early-season to develop its new blocking/pass-protecting unit. On the other hand, Cal State Fullerton will employ the same time element to probe the flaws in it.

Cal State Hayward had one of 1971's finest Pacific Coast College Division teams as the Pioneers rolled to a 7-2-1 record with both losses coming by one point margins.

Gone, however, are the majority of the athletes who contributed most to Hayward's strong showing of a year ago. The current season finds the Pioneers in search of an offensive line to protect returning quarterback Mike Jacinto, a

starter last year as a freshman. Jacinto's two leading receivers from '71, Wes Jackson and DeWayne Johnson also return; there, however, the offensive experience tapers off drastically, leaving head coach Bob Rodrigo with a massive rebuilding job this fall.

Hayward amassed a remarkably well-balanced offensive attack last year, passing for 1,869 yards and rushing for 1,915. Jacinto accounted for 1,647 of the passing yards, completing 98 of 207 attempts for 20 touchdowns including a 95-yarder. He suffered 17 interceptions.

Jackson caught 40 of Jacinto's 1971 offerings, gaining 892 yards en route to nine scores; Johnson, on the other side, pulled down 22 passes for 341 yards including two TD's, one of which was the 95-yarder.

Rodrigo, then, faces the prospect of locating some protection for his explosive offensive performers and in the event the coach succeeds, Hayward may well be on its way to another banner season.

Billed as the finest team in the school's history, the 1972 Cal State Long Beach 49'ers are defending the PCAA football title they have captured the last two years under head coach Jim Stangeland.

Embarking on his fourth season at Long Beach, Stangeland has compiled a remarkable 25-9 record while winning a pair of championships and finishing second in the conference standings in '69.

Foremost among the returnees this season is Terry Metcalf, the nonpareil running back from Seattle who last season set an NCAA record with his 29 touchdowns while gaining 1,673 yards to break the school standard formerly held by Leon Burns.

Metcalf is joined by veteran fullbacks Tom Fitzpatrick and Lynn Hughes, both starters a year ago as was quarterback Randy Drake. Drake, injured half of last season with knee trouble, nevertheless complete 47 of 83 pass attempts for 618 yards and 5 TD's before being sidelined.

Drake's leading receiver last season also returns, split end Ken Matthews who has caught 54 passes the last two seasons.

Up front the 49'ers are equally impressive with the likes of nine veteran interior linemen including Jon Voget, Gary Ridgeway and center Steve Hammitt, a 6-5, 240 pounder.

Stangeland entertains more depth than at any other time in his career at Long Beach as 23 letterwinners are scheduled to be on the '72 roster. Should Metcalf realize the potential he fulfilled last season, and barring injuries, the 49'ers appear a certainty to enjoy another banner season to compliment their 8-4 showing last fall.

MATADORS

The Matadors finished last in both scoring offense and defense in the CCAA standings of a year ago while compiling a 4-7 won-lost record. Their last winning season came in 1968 and as head coach Rod Humenuik enters his second season at the Northridge helm he will rely considerably on the talents of All-CCAA quarterback Jerry Powell, and running backs Tom Bonnell and E. D. Rucker.

There remains, however, an offensive question which must be solved if the Matadors are to improve on, even approach the record of 1971. Seven times last season Northridge was blanked (twice) or held to a touchdown or less, and likewise, all seven decisions were losses.

A consistent offensive attack must be generated if Northridge is to be anything more than a breather for its opponents. Powell is a proven performer, as are the ball carriers who compliment him in the backfield. Yet, the departure of four of the seven offensive linemen of a year ago leaves an experience gap which must be filled, and quickly.

Defensively, well, Northridge remains another question mark. One might assume that the departure of nine starters who surrendered better than four touchdowns per game leaves only room for improvement. Still, experience, or the lack of it, may indicate that more of the same could be in store for the club which won a single conference encounter in 1972.

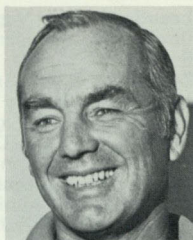

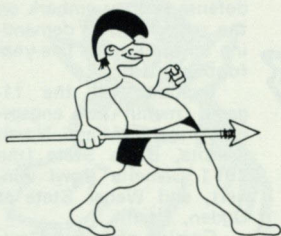

RAINBOWS

Hawaii is faced with a major rebuilding program in 1972 after finishing 7-4 a year ago. But despite dropping defending national champion Nebraska from the '72 schedule, the Rainbows definitely face a more rigorous schedule this fall with the addition of Rose Bowl and Pacific-8 Conference champion Stanford, Liberty Bowl winner Tennessee, the PCAA's San Jose State and NAIA champion Cal Lutheran.

The ominous 11-game schedule must be faced with nine new faces on offense and five on defense after graduation decimated a team which scored 255 points a year ago (a 25.2 average in 10 games not counting the finale against Nebraska).

Employing a basic pro offense, Hawaii greets three veteran running backs in Dennis Wyckoff, Abe Brown and Rich Thompson although none started a year ago.

Defensively Hawaii anticipates a less ominous rebuilding job and may, in fact, be expected to improve on the record of a 20.5 points per game yield in '71. Defensive end Jim Stone earned Little All-America third team honors last fall, while tackles Gene Bickford, Paul Lee and Levi Stanley are also among the returning starters from a year ago.

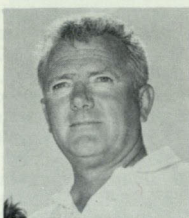

REBELS

The Rebels welcome 26 returning lettermen in 1972, including four starters on both offense and defense as they embark on the school's most demanding schedule in its five-year football history.

Included on the 11-game menu are engagements against Miami, North Dakota, Boise State (the 1971 Camelia Bowl winner), and Weber State at Ogden, Utah.

Coming off a 5-4-1 sea-

son, Nevada Las Vegas has recruited some 30-odd JC transfers over the off-season, offering encouragement to coach Bill Ireland and his staff. Defensively, Las Vegas hopes to draw from the talents of a secondary which returns intact and a defensive end/linebacking corps that offers both depth and talent; while offensively, the Rebels have signed northern California notable Sonny Brasile the 6-4, 210-pound quarterback out of West Valley JC.

Brasile, the San Francisco Bay area's junior college Player of the Year in '71, amassed over 2,100 passing yards in two years including 38 scoring throws while running for 12 additional TD's.

Nevada has also signed several starters off of Sequoias JC '71 team which retained the state's No. 1 ranking throughout much of last year. Most notably they are linebacker Ivan Weiss, a two-time All-America choice. At 225 pounds, the 6-footer is expected to move into a starting role this fall. He will likely be joined by Mike Lee, a regular all of last season as was defensive back Patt Medchill.

Vince Hart, Las Vegas' two-year veteran kicker, also returns for his junior season. The native of Yorkshire, England, booted five of 12 field goal attempts and 31 of 33 PAT attempts last year. Jim DiFiore, who averaged 40.9 yards per kick on 62 punts last season, is also back.

BRONCOS

The Broncos registered their first winning season in 10 years last fall, finishing 6-5 behind the passing wizardry of quarterback Jack Surina who returns for his senior campaign.

Surina, a native of Chino, completed 144 of 305 pass attempts for 1,893 yards and 16 touchdowns en route to earning All-CCAA First Team honors. His 107 rushing yards gave him an even 2,000 yards total offense and earned

him additional recognition on the second team All-Little Coast as well as College Division All-America honorable mention.

The Poly ground attack is equally as impressive with the return of veterans Pat Ward and Greg Cruz. Ward finished 1971 as the league's No. 2 rusher with 560 yards on 103 runs while Cruz, a part time starter, collected 320 yards on 70 carries.

Still, Cal Poly's possibilities of repeated success in '72 should be determined by the strength of an unproven offensive line and coach Roy Anderson's ability to shore up one of the league's more porous defenses (the Broncos surrendered 260 points in 1971 while enduring 48-7 and 63-12 losses at the hands of Santa Clara and conference defending champion Cal Poly SLO).

The offensive abilities of the Broncos are proven as the statistics of a year ago indicate. All that remains, then, is for Cal Poly's defense to play respectably enough to make the team's offensive efforts stand up.

HIGHLANDERS

A new head coach, a new offense, and a new outlook are the keynotes of UC Riverside's 1972 football campaign. The Highlanders, 5th place finishers in the 5-team CCAA a year ago, compiled a 2-7-1 mark a year ago but have 33 returning lettermen, including 15 starters.

New coach Wayne Howard brings a successful JC record to the Riverside campus in the hope of rebuilding a football pro-

gram which has fallen on lean times of late. Howard, the former head man at Gavilan JC in Gilroy (north-central California) compiled a 37-18 mark in the small JC wars including a Coast Conference championship in 1971 with a 9-1 record. Howard's 1971 team finished fifth in the final California JC rankings as his offense averaged over 380 yards per game.

His offensive prowess is exactly what Riverside needs as the Highlanders managed to average but 12 points per game a year ago, being shut out three times and held in single figures twice additionally.

Returning to vie for the quarterbacking chores are lettermen Bill Krizman (over 1,000 yards passing in his first two seasons at UCR) and sophomore Bill Gadd, who rewrote several freshman passing records a year ago including 10 TD passes in five games. JC transfer Gary Mitchell, from Nevada City, is the other newcomer contender.

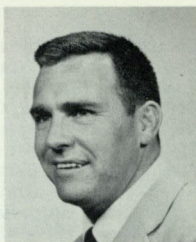

MUSTANGS

Three-time defending conference football champions, the Cal Poly (SLO) Mustangs are faced with a considerable rebuilding job in a number of key positions as they embark on what they hope will be their fifth straight winning season.

The quest for a new quarterback and several defensive backs will be the primary concern of coach Joe Harper if his club is to successfully defend its

CCAA title. The graduation of the majority of the offensive starters which saw the Mustangs rank among the Nation's top 10 teams leaves Cal Poly with a considerable rebuilding job in the rushing and passing areas.

Returning, however, are a number of the athletes who contributed to Poly's third place national ranking in 1970, and fifth place ranking in '69. Foremost among them is wide receiver Amos Otis, of whom Harper says, "...he is the master of the circus catch. . .faster and catches as well as Billy Parks (Chargers). . ." Amos has averaged better than 19 yards per catch over the past two seasons, hauling in 76 receptions for 1,490 yards and 11 touchdowns.

Defensively the Mustangs have three returning All-CCAA linemen including Tom Chantler, Wayne Robinson and Tom Duggan.

Coming off last year's injury-plagued campaign, the Mustangs are aiming at improving on that won-lost mark; still, without the proper tools at some critical positions, Cal Poly may have to settle for a near-.500 season again.

The Hornets finished 4-5-1 in 1971, due in large part to an extremely ineffective defense which gave up an average of better than three touchdowns per game. Overall, Sacramento State was outscored 238-228 last fall, and therein lies the sub-.500 finish.

Head coach Ray Clemons opens his 12th season at Sacramento State with more depth than his staff has seen in several years; 23 lettermen return on of-

fense and two less on defense as the Hornets try to improve on their season and 2-3-1 Far West Conference records.

Cal State Fullerton, Nevada, Reno, and Fresno State have been added to a 1972 schedule which dropped two of 1971's victories (St. Mary's and USF). And with that, it appears SSC had better take advantage of whatever opportunities the returning veterans offer State.

Clemons has his top two QB's of '71 returning, yet newcomer Jim Tornell, a 6-2 sophomore transfer from Baylor may be the most effective on the roster.

Further offensive firepower will be furnished by running backs Rich Combs (650 yards in '71) and Don Lewis (476 yards a year ago) as the Hornets established a school record for team rushing last fall with 2,174 yards gained.

A handful of transfers from UC Santa Barbara's now-defunct team and the return of a commendable linebacking corps may brighten the picture at Sacramento even further.

DIABLOS

A highly successful spring program and the return of some of 1971's key performers offer optimism for Cal State Los Angeles' current football fortunes.

A wealth of experienced performers including quarterback Jimmy Sander and veteran receivers Bill Berokoff and Vince Negrete gives head coach Foster Andersen a bright outlook in this his second season as the Diablos head coach.

Sander was a 54% passer before being injured midway through the '71 campaign. His return and that of the 6-4, former All-State performer from Rio Hondo, Berokoff, lends credence to the coach's optimism.

Defensively Cal State looks to the return of Jack Loos, a linebacker who earned Little All-Coast honors in 1970 but was injured all of last season. Bonnie Ray Smith, a 6-4, 240-pound tackle and Clarence Malone, a transfer from LA City College, give the Diablos good range and size in their pass rush.

Winners of just three games the last two seasons, CSLA must contend with a losing attitude as well as one of the school's most rigorous schedules in recent years.

Some respectable transfers are also getting considerable attention on the Cal State campus as Andersen has recruited some high caliber JC and four-year college transfers over the off season. Foremost among them appear to be running backs Jack Fogerty (LACC) and Nate Tyler, a redshirt at the University of Utah last year.

Veteran kick return specialist Rodney Hunter, the 5-4 dynamo who was nationally ranked in total return yardage in 1971, is also back this fall.
