### Airport At Point Mugu Threatens Peace Of L.V.

Construction of a joint Jet Commercial/Cargo and Military Airport at Point Mugu would bring increased noise, air pollution, and air traffic over Leisure Village and the greater Camarillo area. Due to wind and visibility conditions, the majority of this heavy air traffic (the runway at Pt. Mugu can accommodate the largest aircraft in use today) would be flying directly over the Village.

Be sure to attend the forum in the AR on June 17 at 7:15 p.m. Camarillo City Council member Charlotte Craver, and Ventura County Supervisor Maggie Erickson Kildee, and others, including people who support the airport, will be there.

Council member Craven has said "Camarillo has the most to lose and the least to gain from joint commercial/military use of Point Mugu."

Other meetings will be held at Camarillo Springs, Camarillo Airport, Camar-

illo City Council, and at Las Colinas School.

Be sure to sign the petitions that are circulating throughout the Village and can also be found in the lobby of the Recreation Center. We have until June 30 to sign petitions, write letters, and ask questions about this development. Sometime after that, the County Board of Supervisors will make their final decision.

Inundate members of the Ventura County Board of Supervisors with letters and phone calls. Emphasize air pollution. The supervisor who represents L.V. is Maggie Erickson Kildee, District No. 3, Government Center Office, 800 So. Victoria Ave., Ventura. Her phone number is 654-2276.

We must let our anger, outrage, and indignation be known.

Let us all get together to fight this threat to our beautiful way of life in Leisure Village.

### L. V. Elections Coming

The LVA Board of Directors announced at the May open Board meeting that there will be two separate Village elections held this summer. The first is choosing two new Directors at the June 23 annual homeowners meeting.

Then about July 1 homeowners will receive by mail an additional ballot with two items on it. First, the Board is sponsoring an amendment to

the CC&Rs, and second the initiative petition to delete the cumulative voting provision from the By-laws.

The Board seeks to collect homeowners fees directly from renters in cases where owners are delinquent in paying monthly assessments. Little opposition is expected, but a CC&R change needs a 75% voter approval. The cumulative voting change in the By-laws needs only a simple majority to pass.

It is with dismay that the editors of ILV have printed some of the more recent letters. We have been forced to do so by our pledge not to select or edit letters.

We are NOT, we repeat NOT, adverse to controversy. In fact, we believe that reasoned disagreements and discussions are healthy. Free speech is the very core of the democracy that makes the United States the envy of thinking citizens of most of the world today. But the screaming tirades and name calling in recent Board meetings, and in a few of the letters we have felt obligated to print, are such that the only result can be loss, both loss of respect for the writers, for ILV and for homeowners. In the end, such tirades become so distasteful to others that it can turn them against the very causes which they were meant to support.

It is not the disagreements that are alarming but the anger, name-calling and animosity that are so unpleasant.

Isn't it time that we seniors have learned the good manners that speak of experience and good taste and stop this raucous squabbling?

#### Capitalized Assets Inventory

Under the leadership of members of the Finance Committee, an inventory of personal property belonging to the Association was completed Saturday morning April 16. The job consisted of locating and identifying items on a list of assets, having a total value of a little under \$980,000, and shown on the Association's balance sheet in accounts 3000 (Furniture and Fixtures), 3020 (Equipment) and 3030 (Autos & Trucks). A separate list (known as 'Schedule A') of items, supplied by Leisure Technology in the early days, and still in use, were also identified. They are, for the most part, located in the kitchen and the craft rooms. These have a total estimated first cost of approximately \$97,000. The task was carried out by three teams of Homeowner residents composed of the following:

## Earthquake Repairs

The Leisure Village Board of Directors has appointed an ad-hoc committee headed by Ed Evans and assisted by Joe Wallace to arrange for repairs of damage to dwellings resulting from the January 17 earthquake.

The Association is assuming responsibility for having repairs performed and has identified contractors qualified to do the work. Resident Services will do work not being done by the outside contractors.

Approximately 450 claims for damage repair have been submitted by homeowners. Generally the repairs will be accomplished in an order determined by the degree of hazard presented to the resident. Thus damage to floors will be fixed first because of the potential for tripping or stumbling.

Repairs to floors, such as tiles, parquet and linoleum will be performed by outside contractors as well as damage to plumbing (the next priority), and cracks or broken plaster in walls. Repairs to cement areas and stucco surfaces will be made by Resident Services.

Those homeowners who have submitted claims to the Association office will be contacted by an Earthquake Repair Coordinator who will make an appointment with the resident to inspect the damage. Approximately 20 residents have volunteered to serve as Earthquake Repair Coordinators.

This project is a "first" for the Village and its satisfactory execution will require great cooperation from the residents. The overall objective is to have the repairs made in a quality manner at costs low enough to avoid imposition of a Special Assessment to pay for them.

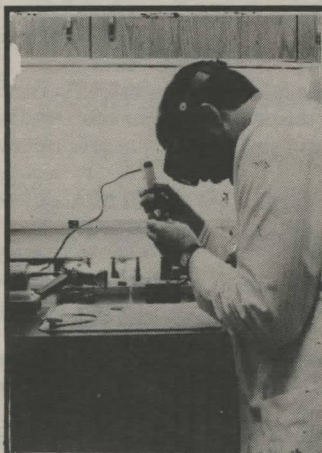

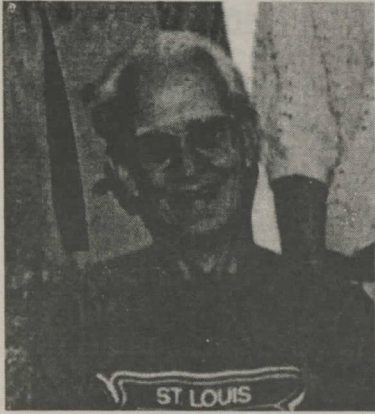

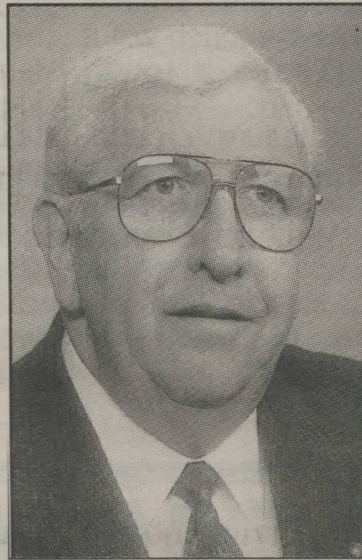

The Board of Directors' meeting will be broadcast live on June 6 with a repeat on the following Saturday.

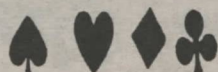

## WHAT DO YOU FEEL IS THE MOST IMPORTANT PROBLEM FACING LEISURE VILLAGE?

The maturity of LVA means  
that committees, the Board and  
paid staff will be encountering  
new problems; i.e. aging equip-  
ment such as rolling stock, de-  
teriorating streets, failed sewers  
and underground electrical and  
cable installations, new State  
and Federal regulations requir-  
ing much stricter pollution con-  
trols, etc., and the possible in-  
creased cost of the maintenance  
of existing structures. The prob-  
lem, as I see it, is to keep up with  
these demands and at the same  
time increase our cost efficiency  
in order to absorb these possible  
new capital investments and still  
keep our homeowners' as-  
sessment to a minimum.

Priorities:  
1. Security  
2. Preservation of the value of  
our property  
3. Cost-effectiveness of  
operations  
4. Rapport or two-way  
communication with the  
Board  
5. Cost of LVA operations,  
and LVA dues

1. Create mutual respect and  
harmony in the Village.  
2. Work with committees to  
get a quick, honest answer to  
their requests, give them  
guidelines.  
3. Make sure CC&R's are  
followed.  
4. Tight control of  
expenditures.  
5. Help Security maintain  
safety for all villagers.  
6. Keep an updated list of  
Village handicapped  
people.

Cost Control through busi-  
ness-like management, perhaps  
by appointing a Purchasing  
Agent. I visualize that one ca-  
pable member of the Board may  
do this job on a volunteer basis.

## WHAT MEASURES DO YOU SUGGEST TO IMPROVE THE SITUATION?

In order to meet the chal-  
lenges presented by the prob-  
lems as described above, I sug-  
gest the formation of a "Futures"  
Committee. This Futures Com-  
mittee would consist of one  
member from each of the  
present standing committees  
and could meet quarterly or  
semi-annually. As a "study" com-  
mittee, it would issue reports to  
the Bd. of Directors concerning  
possible maintenance or re-  
placement problems and what  
actions, if any, need to be taken.  
By anticipating these concerns,  
this Committee would be able to  
keep the Board and the Finance  
Committee abreast of future  
costs that need to be woven into  
the annual budgets. This would  
afford the Association the oppor-  
tunity to spread these costs  
evenly over a longer period of  
time, thereby avoiding large  
monthly dues increases to the  
homeowners.

L.V. is now marking its 20th  
year as an active Retirement  
Community. Through many in-  
novations over the years, the Vil-  
lage has improved in many  
ways, i.e. appearance, security,  
maintenance of structures and  
efficiency of operation at the ad-  
ministrative level. Now, I believe  
that we are moving into a new  
era.

In recognition of the need for  
improved communications be-  
tween villagers and Board Mem-  
bers, we might consider desig-  
nating certain times each month  
for the Board to be available to  
villagers on an individual basis,  
by appointment.

I am not a "one issue" can-  
didate and these important prob-  
lems deserve more than brief,  
superficial answers. My main  
reasons for running for the Board  
are my qualifications and my  
objectives.

My ability and training as a  
University professor and aero-  
space engineer and scientist  
qualify me to recognize prob-  
lems, to analyze viable ap-  
proaches, and to exercise in-  
formed judgment in selecting op-  
timal solutions. My extensive ex-  
perience in managing major  
space programs has served me  
well to apply these solutions into  
practice.

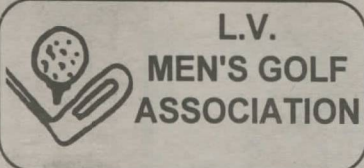
Work with the committees;  
they are the backbone of L.V. If  
there is a problem, talk to that  
working committee, then listen,  
for the people who volunteer are

is their forte.

Writing this resume has  
brought back so many wonder-

lenge. Running for the Board is  
another challenge. I found out  
many years ago, you can't push

ward to working with the Staff

Their friends were Russian, Spanish, Mexican, Japanese, German, and other ethnic groups. When World War II broke out their Japanese friends were sent to the internment camps. Shirley attended her fiftieth reunion recently and at that reunion the school system presented to all the Japanese students they could locate, their 1943 high school diploma. It made the reunion especially meaningful for everyone.

Shirley and Bill knew each other in school but it was not until Bill came home on survivor's leave that the romance and subsequent happy marriage of forty nine years began. Bill's ship was sunk during

"You always answer a letter from a serviceman." She did write back and accepted the date. They had dinner at her home and then went dancing at the Palladium.

They began their married life in Norfolk, Va. When Bill left the service he returned to L.A. and the job he held before the war.

He likes to say: "I was a distributor of good spirits." In fact he was a wholesaler of liquor in a business his brother operated. He worked there for 46 years.

Shirley held many different jobs including working for the IRS, St. James Episcopal Church, Party Smarty in Westwood, Sees Candy, the LA Unified Schools, and finally a reservationist for TWA.

Bill and Shirley have three children. Their daughter Leslie lives in Gardena, and does Shiatsu massage, also known as acupuncture. Son Richard lives in L.A. and is a chiropractor specializing in pain management and sports medicine. He and their daughter Marnie are active with the Special Olympics. 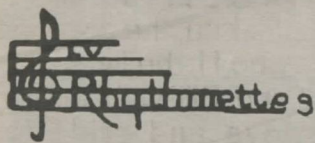
## Father

After 3 years of negotiating with the Camrosa Water District the project to connect Leisure Village's television antenna to a microwave transmission system was terminated last month.

The present antenna which is mounted atop the tower next to the 101 Freeway will be reconditioned and kept in service. The impetus for retaining the existing antenna was the fact that this tower stands on a land easement granted in perpetuity to Leisure Village. The inability of Camrosa Water District to provide an alternate site for the antenna in perpetuity was given as the reason for stopping the project.

Television reception in the Village has deteriorated over the past few years because maintenance on the antenna has been deferred to the possibility that the proposed microwave antenna would replace the existing system.

The status of the 40 foot tower at the Recreation Center is not clear at this time. This structure was installed by Camrosa over 2 years ago and it supports the receiving antenna that was to be part of the planned microwave system.
