Airport At Point Mugu Threatons Peace Of L.V.

Jet Commercial/Cargo and Military Airport at Point Mugu would bring increased noise, air pollution, and air traffic over Leisure Village and the greater Camarillo area. Due to wind and visibility conditions, the majority of this heavy air traffic (the runway at Pt. Mugu can accommodate the largest aircraft in use today) would be flying directly over the Village.

Be sure to attend the forum in the AR on June 17 at 7:15 p.m. Camarillo City Council member Charlotte Craver. and Ventura County Supervisor Maggie Erickson Kildee, and others, including people who support the airport, will be there.

Council member Craven has said "Camarillo has the most to lose and the least to gain from joint commercial/military use of Point Mugu."

Free speech is the very core of the democracy that makes the United States the envy of thinking citizens of most of the world today. Capitalized Assets Inventory

Under the leadership of members of the Finance Committee, an inventory of personal property belonging to the Association was completed Saturday morning April 16. The job consisted of locating and identifying items on a list of assets, having a total value of a little under \$980,000, and shown on the Association's balance sheet in accounts 3000 (Furniture and Fixtures), 3020 (Equipment) and 3030 (Autos & Trucks). A separate list (known as 'Schedule A') of items, supplied by Leisure Technology in the early days, and still in use, were also identified. They are, for the most part, located in the kitchen and the craft rooms. These have a total estimated first cost of approximately \$97,000. The task was carried out by three teams of Homeowner residents composed of the following:

Earthquake Repairs

Board of Directors has appointed an ad-hoc committee headed by Ed Evans and assisted by Joe Wallace to arrange for re-pairs of damage to dwellings resulting from the who have submitted January 17 earthquake.

The Association is assuming responsibility for having repairs performed and has identified contractors qualified to do the work. Resident Services will do work not being done by the outside contractors.

Approximately 450 claims for damage repair have been submitted by homeowners. Generally the repairs will be accomplished in an order determined by the degree of hazard presented to the resident. Thus damage to floors will be fixed first betripping or stumbling.

TV Microwave System Stopped

After 3 years of negotiating with the Camrosa Water District the project to connect Leisure Village's television antenna to a microwave transmission system was terminated last month.

The present antenna which is mounted atop the tower next to the 101 Freeway will be reconditioned and kept in service. The impetus for retaining the existing antenna was the fact that this tower stands on a land easement granted in perpetuity to Leisure Village. The inability of Camrosa Water District to provide an alternate site for the antenna in perpetuity was given as the reason for stopping the project.

Television reception in the Village has deterio-



rated over the past few years because maintenance on the antenna has been deferred to the possibility that the proposed microwave antenna would replace the existing system.

The status of the 40 foot tower at the Recreation Center is not clear at this time. This structure was installed by Camrosa over 2 years ago and it supports the receiving antenna that was to be part of the planned microwave system.
