Smith informed the Gater that tickets for this Saturday's performance are already gone, as are most seats for the following weekend's performance. "But good seats are still available for the Wednesday and Thursday performances," Smith said, "but I don't promise for how long."

The Creative Arts Box Office is doing an average daily business of \$600, according to Smith. Larry Sturges, Kapers' publicity head, said that this is an increase of 300 per cent over last year's advance ticket buying.

Kampus Kapers '63 will present six performances, starting tonight, Saturday night, and from Wednesday, February 20 through Saturday, February 23. The performances begin at 8:30 p.m. and tickets

are available at \$2 for center row seats, and \$1.50 for aisle seats.

Peaceful integration

Student bill praises Clemson

SF State's Associated Student Legislature conducted its first session of the spring semester Tuesday.

A resolution was passed commending the students of Clemson College for their "peaceful" conduct during the recent integration of the South Carolina school.

During the hour-long debate concerning the wording of the document, the legisla-

tors argued over alleged defacto segregation at SF State and the general racial climate in San Francisco proper.

A question was raised concerning the second part of the resolution which encouraged correspondence between the students of SF State and Clemson on possible solutions to racial discrimination in the states of California and South Carolina.

AS treasurer Tom Ramsey explained that there was a

valid reason to admit that there were areas of segregation on campus. He cited the seating patterns in the cafeteria and the racial make-up of the fraternities as proof of his point.

When passed, the resolution contained an invitation for correspondence on racial problems and expressed praise for the actions of the Clemson students and commended them for their mature approach to integration.

Mexican tour on bus planned by College 'Y'

Students and faculty members interested in the College Y sponsored tour of Mexico must file applications before Feb. 21.

The six week tour, from July 13 to August 24, is priced at approximately \$400.

The group will travel by chartered bus down the coast into Mexico City and back into the United States by the eastern route.

Applications are in the College Y, Hut T-2. A \$100 deposit is due before February 21. The deposit may be made at the cashier's office, Hut T-1.

A fifty mile hike

WHAT THIS SCHOOL needs is a 50 mile hike. What better way to prove leadership, authority, and executive ability than to engage in a marathon expedition?

The hike could be used to solve all the school's problems: faculty office space, closed classes, and other details which are now settled according to who has the most power.

WITH ADMINISTRATION, faculty, and students participating, a single race would settle the entire affair. AS president Jay Folberg could race President Paul Dodd for the title to the Tubs. What faculty office space is available could be allotted on a basis of where faculty members finished in the race.

Early finishing students could be given precedent in selecting classes. Collections to pay their tuition could be taken up as well.

THE BEAUTY OF THIS plan is that the many different ways of deciding this sort of thing which exist now would be all consolidated and taken care of in one weekend. And it would be just as fair because it is just as arbitrary.

More money could be raised this way. Besides charging an entry fee equivalent to the present registration fee, a lottery could be held. The money raised this way could help finance a college union.

ALL THIS IS QUITE silly, but it's the sort of thing with which the Kennedy Administration has been occupying the country this week.

In the meantime, a report by a special committee of the Organization of American States which contradicts Defense Secretary Robert McNamara's estimate of Soviet weapons in Cuba is kept secret.

WE DO NOT BELIEVE this country is in any danger from Cuba, but we do believe in a free flow of information. Kennedy abuses his responsibility to the nation by simply denying reports which contradict his official pronouncements and then turning the spotlight on something as silly as a 50 mile hike.

Despite White House claims that the President doesn't really like this sort of publicity, Kennedy himself has done nothing to discourage it.

Frosh instruction offered

The office of Freshman Personnel and Training, under the direction of Guy Wright, has initiated a program designed to give the freshman a "complete perspective of student government on the SF State campus."

The program, open to all interested incoming freshmen, will be separated into a survey of student government theory as it operates in the AS and practical work experience in the various departments.

The theory survey will include a series of lectures inspecting the SF State AS Constitution and a complete breakdown of the AS as it operates on this campus.

A second group of lectures and discussion groups in the various areas of student government on campus will follow the first series.

In addition to the theory

program, the freshman will be given his choice of working in the activities of any of the AS offices or departments.

The program will involve approximately five hours per week.

Applications are being taken for interested students in annex D, the Personnel and Training office.

The first lectures will be scheduled when all class programs are filed.



Tennis team 'best in last five years'



SF State finished second to Sacramento State in league play last year and Coach Far-


mer expects the rough competition to come from the Hornets again this season.
