Free Cancer **Screening Unit** Coming To LV

All residents of Leisure Village are encouraged to attend a free cancer education and screening program presented by the City of Hope's Mobile Screening Unit, co-sponsored by the American Cancer Society and Your Neighbor's Care Group.

Women who attend the education program may obtain a 15-minute appointment for a free breast, skin, lymphatic, thyroid, and rectal examination done in the privacy of the City of Hope's Mobile Screening Unit. Women are eligible for a pelvic examination, and those who have not had a Pap smear within the last one to three years may request one.

Men who attend the education program may obtain a five-minute appointment for a free thyroid, skin, lymphatic, testicular, prostate, and rectal examination done in the privacy of the Mobile Unit.

All records will be handled in confidence by the City of Hope.

The purpose of this program is to instruct individuals in ways they can protect themselves against major cancers through early detection, and to provide those attending this education program with opportunity for free cancer screening. EARLY DETECTION SAVES LIVES!

The education program will be held on Monday and Tuesday, July 30 and 31, in the LV Rec Center. The time each day for the

TV Tower

Camrosa Water District plans to construct a 5 million gallon water tank. This construction must include the site where the Leisure Village Association television antenna tower is presently in perpetuity, an agreement which will be terminated.

Camrosa has proposed that the tower be razed and that Camrosa furnish a more suitable site in the Las Posas hills where it also has a tank. Camrosa will install thereon a new self-supporting triangular tower. This site will be held by L.V.A. by a new easement in perpetuity.

Camrosa will also construct a tower at the Recreation Center to receive signals from the hills tower. The signal will be transmitted by a new microwave system. Under the proposal all costs of the project will be paid by Camrosa.

Negotiations between Camrosa and L.V.A. have been taking place for nearly a year. Negotiators for L.V.A. have been the General manager and the L.V.A. Board of Directors.

Jack Rogers, a homeowner and resident of L.V.A., is one of the publicly elected directors and is also president of Camrosa. As president he has been involved in the negotiations on behalf of Camrosa.

I have known Jack for over four years and have found him to be a man of integrity. I am sure that during the negotiations he has considered the positions of both parties and aims to see an agreement that is fair to each of them.

Jack is completing his second year as chairman of the L.V.A. Finance Committee. The question was raised during homeowners' comments at the L.V.A. Board of Directors meeting on June 4, 1990 as to whether Jack, as president of Camrosa, being involved in the negotiations betweeen Camrosa and L.V.A., while serving as chairman of the L.V.A. Finance Committee, constituted a conflict of interest.

I have served on the Finance committee five of the nearly seven years we have lived in L.V. These years include the two years Jack Rogers has been chairman. I have served as secretary of the committee during this period.

The matter of an agreement with Camrosa has never been before the Finance committee. It has never been mentioned at committee meetings. Since L.V.A. funds will not be invlolved, the proposed agreement will never be presented to the Finance


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
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


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Recycle Or Not To Recycle

If Hamlet were to come on stage today, he might well emote, "To recycle or not to recycle, that is the question." And his next line is the answer, "I pray thee, recycle all that you can and do your part to protect and save the environment"

To assist you in a recycling program, here is a list of recyclable items. ALUMINUM: Includes aluminum cans as well as other aluminum items such as pie plates, foil, etc. Separate aluminum

PLASTIC: Plastic bottles with California redemption sticker. Other plastic bottles and items are not re- copper, steel, jar lids, etc. cyclable at this time.

CARDBOARD: Cardboard and corrugated boxes as well as other types of boxes and packages (e.g. all kinds of food and cereal boxes; shoe boxes; cores from paper

towel and toilet tissue CAMARILLO rolls, etc.)

PAPER: Computer paper, white office-type paper, colored paper and newspaper. Separate paper by type.

NEWSPAPER: Camarillo Recycling will accept newspaper but will not pay for it.

TIN CANS: All types of metal cans (coffee, fruit, vegetable, meat, fish, etc.) Remove paper la-

GLASS: All glass items such as bottles, jars, window panes, etc. Remove lids from bottles and jars and include with scrap metal.

SCRAP METAL: Brass,

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




March the Unit held a practice deployment of a medical station and nutrition unit.

Also in February we participated in the City hazardous material (HAZ-MAT) drill and introduced the concept of a "safe room" as one form of response to a toxic spill.

Progress has recently been made in defining the protection of volunteers with respect to liability and "worker's compensation" protection.

Eleven stations were selected and marked for communications centers throughout the Village to facilitate operation of our Communications network using Village Coordinators, CB radio units and Amateur radio. The LV board of directors has considered our request for a centrally located fixed antenna to improve communications under emergency conditions.

Our LV Survivors Guide is being incorporated into the coming edition of the LV Phone Directory to help insure its availability.

Identification in the form of arm bands has been provided our Communicators and coordinators by the Women's Club, who provided the materials, and several of their members who designed and fabricated them.

We take this opportunity to thank Inside Leisure Village and Channel 12 for the full cooperation they have given us; the Board of Directors for its liaison and consideration of our needs; and last, but far from least, the some 300 residents who contribute their time, effort and professional skills to the functioning of ESO.

The General Meeting is held in August and bowling starts in early September.



We are now collecting \$1.00 per person for dues June 1990 to June 1991 since we are presently in the process of becoming a bona fide village club. We welcome all new members.



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Camarillo Hospice: Death Out Of The Closet

If you read this article, chances are you have overcome the ostrich syndrome: I commend you on your bravery! I rest easily when I know Camarillo Hospice offers emotional, physical and spiritual support to individuals and their families who are living with a life-threatening illness. This support is given during the period of illness and later to the surviving family and friends during the time of bereavement.

There are no synonyms for the word "hospice". It is not a place. Given the choice almost all of us prefer to die at home. Professionally trained volunteers will call on you with a greater variety of assists than I can include in this short article. Villagers who volunteer and love their work find Hospice's

emphasis is on the quality of life regardless of how short the time.

There is absolutely nothing to be achieved by suffering alone or being anxious, feeling forlorn, abandoned; whether you are terminal or wanting to assist someone else who has been so diagnosed. We learn that death is a portal to someplace else. When one is not afraid to die, he's not afraid to live.

Pleasant Valley Hospital provides office space and classrooms for Hospice to help terminal clients and their families or for groups that offer sustainment in bereavement and the inspiration to carry on when a loved one has gone. Grief counsellors are available on a one to one basis if one is reluctant to join a group.

A large number of Hospice volunteers become

interested in training and assisting because they were attended themselves during the loss of a family member. Trainees might explore such concerns as the unlived life, unfinished business, keeping current with the special people in our lives.

As to the training-...when you've given your best, when you accept that so called dying is an inevitable aspect of living, there is a joy, a feeling of elation to have served. You uncover insights about yourself and you find strengths you didn't know you possessed. Our bodies are no more than a garment that we wear like a coat. Our real essence is knowable and is eternal. We don't propound this, we sense it and terminally find comfort in the

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
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
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
