#### **Holiday Passes**

Residents are urged to call the main gate ahead of time to request the gate passes necessary for holiday visitors. The number of passes needed for guests rises dramatically during this season, so requests made a week ahead will expedite the work of the gatehouse staff and entrance of your visitors.

If a resident is expecting more than four guests at one event, the Security Dept requests that a written list be delivered in advance to the main gatehouse, so that passes may be ready for your guests.

As an example, in a recent burglary report, LV Security officers noted that the owner insisted that all doors were locked--yet they showed her that her patio door was not locked; she was shocked and amazed.

#### Letters

On the subject of the new piano now in the MPR, the result of much hard work on the part of, I understand, the Keyboard Club: It is an excellent instrument but in the wrong place. It is not the right instrument for the use it will get in that location.

The groups that use the piano in these rooms use them with an accompanist. Being an accompanist is an art and skill in itself; the accompanist must "follow the leader," literally.

The accompanist must keep her (I will use the term "her" because the majority of available pianists in the Village are hers) eyes not only on the music, but also on the conductor, ready for any change in the time, tempo or expression.

The old "upright" piano was so high that this was impossible. The pianist had to turn her head in order to see the conductor, taking her eyes from the music.

This did two things. It meant that the player was not watching the conductor most of the time, and it meant that the pianist went home with a "crick" in her neck.

The new piano, as fine as an instrument as it is, is no improvement. It is a "console" model and stands about 50 inches high. This is too high for the pianist to see over. She still cannot see her conductor and she still goes home with a "crick" in her neck.

I sincerely hope that when and if another piano is selected for the westend rooms, consideration

will be given to the use to which it will be put, and that one will be selected that is low enough for the accompanist to see over, as was the former "spinet" model we had, so she can see the conductor and not go home with a bad neck.

A piano never should be moved. Pianos appear to be rugged, but actually their insides are rather delicate as far as staying in tune is concerned. But. unless we can afford to have a piano at every location where it might be used, occasional moving cannot be avoided, so I suggest that the next piano to be selected have, as one consideration, the capability of being moved with as little damage as possible to the instrument.

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#### **Recycling Program Coming To Village**

The Board of Directors has approved a plan to start a curbside recycling program in Leisure Village similar to the plan which will be started in the City of Camarillo in February.

The service will be provided by Harrison Rubbish, who also provides the current trash removal service. It is estimated that the program will also commence in February, but the exact date has not vet been established.

Under the program,

Harrison will make two pick-ups per month at times other than the normal trash removal schedule. Materials to be recycled can be left adjacent to the trash container in either plastic or paper bags or cardboard boxes.

The only separation of materials which will be necessary will be that newspapers be kept together in one bag. All other mixed recyclables (i.e., plastic and glass bottles, aluminum cans) can be mixed together in one bag or box.

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#### Village 11 To Be Re-landscaped

As a part of the ongoing program to reduce water consumption in Leisure Village and to control costs, the LVA Board of Directors has decided to re-landscape Village 11. This village was chosen because it is the oldest one, having been built in 1974 and it still has the planting provided by the developer, Leisure Technology.

At the time the plants were installed little thought was given to water conservation or to the sizes these plants eventually would attain. As the plants matured they have reached the point where they are too large for the space available or are unsatisfactory in appearance. In most cases they are not economical in water consumption.

A landscaping architect was engaged to study the needs, specifically for plant choices that would not grow too big and would be sparing in their need for water.

A design was prepared which, on recommendation of the Landscape Dept, was accepted by the Board. Upon completion the final result will be studied with a view to implementing the ideas learned to other older villages. A part of the project will be to incorporate a drip watering system, a technique presently used in the newer villages.

It is expected this program will help reduce water consumption for planting beds and cut down the amount of pruning required, with the resulting reduction in costs for labor and trash removal.

# **New Automatic Doors**Installed At Rec Center



Installation of an automated door for the south entrance to the Recreation Center was completed late last month.

This door, the culmination of an extensive study by the Purchase Research Committee, replaced the originally-installed wooden door which had deterioriated badly over the past 16 years. Direct exposure to sunshine and rain (remember?) had caused the wooden door to warp to the point that it would barely close.

When entering the Rec Center from outside, walkers should stay to the usual right side of the door in order to trigger the opening sensor. The double doors will open outward, toward walkers, and stay open about 12 seconds to allow time for entry.

To exit 1) the right hand door should be pushed by hand at the center bar. After pushing the door open

Since the door has glass panes, the Rec Center lobby is now lighter; the glass is treated to prevent the carpet from fading.



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
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#### VISION LIMITED







On Dec 25 and Jan 1 the east and west gates will be closed for the holiday. All traffic must channel through the main gate, which will remain open 24 hours, as usual.



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

This list is from "What Can We Expect?" by Lt. Dan Blackston of the Chula Vista Police Department. He said this list is NOT offered as a prediction of doom. Although most of the items are negative, this is a realistic list of problem areas that we can expect to face in a

Recognizing that problems will appear and giving some thought to them prior to a disaster are steps towards overcoming them. Some of the areas require specific actions; some will diminish with time; some are inherent in disaster operations and must simply be accepted.


Although not every one of the 70 items will occur in every emergency, the majority will appear in most situations. You are encouraged to scan the list, determine which items are or may become your responsibility and determine how those items could best be handled or the problem reduced.

I. In an earthquake there may be violent ground shaking; it will seem to last much longer than it actually does.

2. Fires will occur, caused by electrical shorts, natural gas (just 3 places in L.V.), fireplaces,

3. Fires in collapsed buildings will be very difficult to control.

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
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
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#### Interfaith Service **Marks Thanksgiving**




#### **High Twelve Club**

So, come one, come all. Bring your friends and neighbors and enjoy a pleasant morning with the members of the High Twelve Club. Everyone is invited.



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

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

Would you agree that the LV library is the single most visited room in the Recreation Center? Most would agree that from the early morning Wall Street Journal viewers to the late evening readers, on the average somewhere between 100 and 200 villagers find their way to the room where there are books and magazines galore.

Let's look behind the scenes to see what keeps this popular room going. Amazingly, there are five ladies who still do volunteer work, ladies who were doing work since that opening day in 1974, some 16 years ago.

Nita Parentice and Betty Tytler are two star volunteers who, almost without exception, have spent part of one day a week in our library.
