Communication What Happened?

Every potential BOARD Candidate has always emphasized the need for continuous communication with resident owners. How soon one forgets campaign promises.

The Board is currently considering a proposition for the June ballot. What will the proposition address? Does it have a viable format for adoption?

Apparently there will be a proposal to consider moving money from the "one month's deposit fund" into a capital assets fund so as to provide funding for essential projects. The one month's deposit fund is currently over \$200,000 and represents monies not needed for the purpose for which it was originally designated. Leaving some money, approximately \$30,000, in this fund is more than adequate to cover any and all possible default payments of assessment fees. This is based on our experience for over 15 vears.

The excess money in this fund can only be transferred by a vote of the residents. Furthermore, we can all ensure that our assessment will not be increased next year to cover many of these necessary improvements by having the funds transferred now. This will affect approximately a 4% savings in each and every owner's monthly assessment next year.

Hopefully the board will address what their thinking is regarding utilization of these funds so that residents may intelligently review the issues.

Trust For Security Personnel

At the last Board of Directors meeting on Apr 4 the Board gave a first reading of a proposed wholly new rule that would levy a fine of \$7.50 when Security is called upon to open a door for a resident who unintentionally has been locked out of his or her home. The reasoning behind this, as explained by the Board, is that Security people no longer have a pass key that would allow entry to homes in the Village and would have to spend time going to our main guard house to pick up a key, go to the home and open the door, then return the key to the guard house. The restriction on Security people to no longer have a key came about as a result of one of our former Security men gaining access to homes by use of this pass key when residents were not at home in order to steal whatever valuables he could find. He was caught through the diligent work of our Security Chief and the local Police. Some of the stolen articles were recovered and the culprit is now serving time in jail.

The question at this point is...do we stigmatize all of our Security people with a blanket distrust because one went over the line? Does this one out of hundreds who has worked as Security people during the many years of the existence of LV justify an about face in our trust of this most important employee group? Do we have so little faith in our management people

What Has Happened To Us?

Thirteen years ago an organization was formed in LV called YNCG — short for YOUR NEIGHBORS CARE GROUP. This name was chosen because neighbors really did care for their neighbors and volunteered to help them in need. The "Group" was setup just to facilitate and help solve the need. The neighbors-volunteers do the actual work.

As we grew, a Blood Pressure Clinic was started, a monthly lecture on health needs and information and a yearly Flu Clinic and Health Fair was added. A supply of hospital items was donated or purchased - wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, etc. to lend to all villagers as needed — free of charge. We had volunteers who would, in emergencies, drive neighbors to doctors or hospital, run errands, shop, cook a meal and even visit the lonely.

We at YNCG still perform all the above, but the last items with difficulty. WHAT HAS HAPPENED? It's hard to get neighbors to drive neighbors in an emergency. It's hard to get volunteers to visit or even watch your neighbors for unusual happenings or things that don't usually happen. Did you know that one of your neighbors sat dead in a chair for five days before he was found? Another laid on his floor for three days after having a stroke before he got help. There are more of these stories that can be told.

In the last month's "Voice," there were three different articles stressing the fact that residents are defiantly violating the rules and regulations of the Village. WHAT HAS HAPPENED?

We live in a very fragile environment. Today you

they need to reach us at a moment of helplessness, when all that we may have left is the need of a helping hand and a pray-

Regarding The Woodshop Problem

In the discussions about the woodshop problem, people seem to have forgotten that several years ago I chaired a committee which investigated the recreation facilities, their uses and their needs. The members of trust them to be on call this committee spent many hours, measuring rooms and interviewing the people who used them. We concluded that a new shop building should be built and even drafted rough plans. This new shop building included woodshop, ceramic, and lapidary shops, thus freeing those present shop spaces for other uses. It also included a photographic dark room, a sewing room and appropriate plumbing. The present sewing room was earmarked to become dressing/storage rooms for stage productions, and the wood shop was to become Ch 12 studios. Our estimated cost for this, including converting the sewing room and wood shop, \$250,000. Someone, without consulting the committee, added another \$250,000 for converting all the existing vacated rooms. We thought this was excessive, and we thought that we knew more about the problem than anyone else, but the damage was done and our plans were effectively killed. This is a good time for someone to review our new shop building plans.

When it was certain that the new shop building was a lost cause, I drew the plans from which were See HOLMESPage 4

at the east end of the RC in back of the stage. There is room for a 20 x 24 foot building and a 6foot passage, without losing anything more than some landscaping. It might be possible to incorporate rear stage doors so that large stage pieces can be carried in and out more easily than can be done now. These should have plumbing if possible; if not, then the roof at the east door should be extended to the AR door, so that players can go from the stage to the rest rooms without going out in the rain.





Profile:

Walt & Nancy Whitaker

The Walt Whitakers were the 65th buyers of a home in Leisure Village — and that was a long time ago, July 2, 1974 to be exact.

And what were things like back in those early days?

"Why," says Nancy, "we played golf on our 9hole course, square danced, played bingo, saw movies in the AR on Friday nights, went to the Saturday night dances, gleaned tomatoes and peppers in the area where now stand Villages 14, 16, 17, 19 and 23, attended picnics and luaus, took classes in converstional Spanish, lapidary and sewing, played bridge and served on several committees.'

Can there be more? Yes, there is, as we meet Walt and Nancy Whitaker whose Village 6 home is on the south side of our 9th hole fairway.

Walt, a California native, was born in the general L.A. area and when he was 24 moved a few blocks behind Manual Arts High School.

Well before that, though, at age 12 he recalls during summer vacation occasionally getting behind the wheel and driving his dad's City of Los Angeles truck.

"Anything to be a bigshot," he recalls with a smile.

"I even tried a big cigar a few times. After all, these were the 'roaring 20's."

in Bradford, Pa., traveled to California via a 10-year stay in Texas. Her 14-year-old daughter, Kathy, accompanied her and Nancy found employment with a cash register company, also retiring in 1973. She met Walt at a church bowling league and they were married in August 1963.

The Whitakers played a major role in welcoming new residents to LV in the early days, served on the Election Board almost every year, used to ride the run-down LV bus to church on Sundays and occasionally walked over to the nearby shuffleboard courts for a game.

Walt is well remembered not only for his role in running regulation golf tournaments outside the Village, but also for his serving of hamburgers and tri-tips during picnics. Along with Nick DeSimone, this duo has worked the barbecue charcoal fires as long as there has been a Leisure Village.

YNCG is strictly a volunteer organization started 13 years ago so neighbor could help neighbor. Our Board's function is to find a neighbor willing to help another neighbor in an emergency. We also collect or buy hospital supplies to loan to villagers, have educational lectures, blood pressure clinics, flu shots and a health fair each year.

YNCG is not an officially chartered club with the LV Assn as other clubs are. Therefore, the Association has no responsibility to us in any way and is not obligated. The hospital items do not belong to the Association; they belong to YNCG. Because of our charitable and neighborly helpful ways, the Board has been gracious enough to allow us to store our supplies conveniently and to help in dispensing them.

When in need of a hospital item; cane, crutch, wheelchair, walker, etc., the procedure to obtain them is as follows:

- 1. During the hours our Recreation office is open, simply ask the office attendant to open the door to our storage room. Get your item, sign the log which is on a shelf on the right as you enter . watch your head - low ceiling. Enter name, address, date. When you return item, enter date returned.
- 2. Whenever the Recreation office is closed, do as follows:




There is a stiff tax liability if a frozen Keogh is not rolled over to an IRA or other qualified retirement plan by May 31, 1989.

The following rules apply to the issuance of decals:

- 1. Only two decals will be issued for each residence.
- 2. Owners who do not live in the Village will not be issued a decal.
- 3. Children and grandchildren living with residents will not be issued a decal.

Residents may remove their old decal before arriving at the decal installation station. If you have a plastic coated windshield, be sure to inform the Security Officer before he attempts to remove the old decal or to install a new one

For those who cannot get decals during this period it will be necessary for them to report to the East Gate between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. during the period of May 17 through May 19. Chief Max Moses requests that the numer of latecomers for decals be kept to a minimum as the special handling required diverts

Security personnel from their regular duties and ultimately increases security expenses for the entire Village.

Based on historical experience, residents can reduce their time in line for decals by avoiding the mornings on the first three days of the decal application period. Decals were applied to approximately 2200 vehicles last year.

Removing **Cable Traps**

By Ed Salzer

It is possible that some homes may still have traps in the TV cable entering the residences. Traps were installed in 1982-83, and all but a few were removed in 1985. During the last few years many of the remaining traps were taken out.

Here is how you tell if you still have a trap in your system: If you have a cable-ready set, and most sets sold during the past 6 or 7 years have been cable-ready. Check your manual and be sure the switch in your set is set on cable, if you have a cable ready set.

With a cable-ready set you should be able to receive our cable stations 18, 19, 20, 21, 22 and 23. If you receive only cable stations 22 and/or 23, a trap may still be located in the cable entering your home. A trap looks like a moved at no cost to you.





A/C Problems

As the owner of a home with a heat pump, one that has performed very well for over 8 years, I recently learned that a simple fuse was the culprit that caused a problem that I should not have ignored.

To start at the beginning: during our long period of cold weather during January, it seemed the only time we were getting really warm air was when the emergency light was on. This, I realized, was costing extra money but I reasoned that the rather intense cold outside dictated this condition.


However, early this month, during 95-100° temperatures here, I found that our heat pump was not supplying cold air. Air from the fan was coming into the house but the temperature was not lowering.

Learning that a refrigeration and air conditioning company from Oak View (near Ojai) makes frequent visits to LV and that people are well pleased with the service, I called and was told that the owner was in the Village at that moment. I made contact and Mr. Duncan was at my home soon after.

A simple test told him that one of my two 30-amp fuses had broken meaning that the heat pump was not performing at all. The only heat supplied was on emergency when the element in the attic was actuated. Further, no cool air could come out of the heat pump — only moving air from the fan.

He determined that our freon level was a little low; two pounds (\$5.00) were added, and the new fuse was but \$1.85 and the service charge was only \$28.00.

You may be certain that I quickly purchased a spare fuse and should now be well prepared for any "unusual" weather.

Traffic Rules Will Be Strictly Enforced

At the April open meeting of the Leisure Village Association Board of Directors, several measures were discussed which affect all drivers in the Vilresidents. tradespeople, visitors.

There was the first reading of an addition to Article IV, 4.07a which reads "LVA has adopted the California Vehicle Code as the rules of the road for LV...'' This addition is meant to clarify traffic regulations within the Village. After its adoption at the May 1 Board meeting, there can be no doubt about the rules governing Village traffic.

Some drivers challenge our Security patrolmen who stop them for observed violations. A few offenders protest that LV Security has no jurisdiction over their driving. This addition to our rules should clarify that Security people DO have the right to stop drivers and charge them with road violations.

The verbal abuse our partolmen get from Village drivers is astounding. If drivers berate Camarillo police or CHP officers in this manner outside the Village, they make themselves liable for additional charges. Some errant drivers refuse to show ID or licenses when stopped in the Village. Such a belligerent attitude soon causes the situation to escalate and the Camarillo police are called in.

One recent incident in the Village will serve to illustrate. Guest speaker Gloria Valenzuela coordinator for Arthritis Foundation in Ventury County gave a most informative and wealth-of-material lecture at the April meeting. She stressed the importance of education concerning "arthritis" and its treatment: exercise, rest, relaxation, learning to cope and medication. There are 100 different types of arthritis (inflamation of the joints). Thirty-seven million suffer from arthritis in the U.S.A.

Gloria discussed rheumatoid arthritis and osteo arthritis. Osteo affects old-age cartilage, hands, fingers, spine, knees, hip. Rheumatoid can affect the whole body. Predisposition to arthritis can be inherited. Medication is used in the treatment. All of the new medications used are anti-inflamatory and are prescribed by an M.D. for each person. Surgery is the last resort. Osteo can be diagnosed by X-ray; rheumatoid by blood test. Nutrition is not responsible for arthritis.







"55 Alive" can be presented in the Village more often if volunteer coordinators can be found to act as registrars. Volunteers should call Sandy Okum, YNCG, or Sy Fisher, Ed & Rec Committee.

Bus service comes through the Village to provide transportaion for those who can no longer drive. LVA pays a hefty subsidy to provide this bus service free to Villag-

State vehicle rules are for our mutual safety and apply to everyone; all drivers are required to have a working knowledge of these laws. The cooperation of all residents is needed and expected. LV Security patrolmen DO have jurisdiction over Village traffic, with the full backing of the California Vehicle Code. There is no question about that now.

We Americans have always boasted with justifiable pride that we would rather live in the United States than anywhere else on earth. Yet how many of us have ever paused to reflect on the fact that our home is not just in Camarillo, not just in Calif., not just in the United States. Our home in a very real

Since the dawn of the Industrial Revolution. smokestacks have belched forth noxious gases into the atmosphere, factories have dumped toxic wastes into rivers and streams, automobiles have guzzled irreplaceable fossil fuels and fouled the air with their contamination. World attention has been increasingly focused on a series of events in the past few years that project an ominous shadow over our planet's future. The American grain belt has been scorched by a record drought. There is disturbing new evidence

that man-made chemicals have inflicted even greater damage than first thought to the ozone shield that protects life on earth from harmful ultraviolet solar rays. Beaches on both U.S. coasts and across the Atlantic have been fouled by medical wastes.

Even more threatening, average global temperature appears to be rising - a phenomenon consistent with predictions based on a speeding up of the "greenhouse ef-

LETTER

We, the members of the LV Racquet Club, were trully amazed, if not somewhat disgusted with a letter appearing in last month's issue of ILV. It is unbelievable that anyone could write an article containing a web of irrelevancies, half truths, untruths, ignorance of facts and a supreme impudence in suggesting that if tennis players do not like the condition of the courts, they should perhaps consider another sport.

Where was the author of that letter when they cleared those large areas of land to create the lovely fairways and unshadowed greens of our beautiful golf course? But wait don't tell me that the author plays golf? If she does, she must go around the course in tears realizing what this must have done to California's environment and what it has done to the Greenhouse Agenda she so glibly talks about. And what has all this to do with the problem of playing conditions on our courts? These are emotional irrelevancies that appeal to everyone including tennis players but have nothing to do with the issue at hand.

Does she worry about the truth? Oh no, that would help destroy her rhetoric as she writes about the shadows not lasting beyon 10 a.m. (try 11:30 if you're interested in the truth). And what about those ludicrous remarks that you don't hear Golfers, Bocce Players, Horse Shoe Tossers, etc. complain about shadows. If she knew anything about sports, she would admit that any shadows they might have are not critical to their enjoyment as it is to Tennis players, who have to contend with a fast moving ball coming toward them as it flits from shadow to light, not once but several times. before the ball reaches them.

But wait - the author has a solution to that

problem too. She says 'why not go over to Court 2 in the morning and wait your turn and play there. 'Or", she goes on in her queer logic "go up to the hill where the good players go." That's the kind of logic that is based on pure ignorance of the facts or a studied refusal to face the facts. Players go up the hill not because they are the better players, but because the two courts we have are inadequate for the number of players we have. If they stayed in the Village and waited to play 3 sets, as most of them want, they would be on the courts until mid-afternoon even if they were able to start at 8:00 a.m. because players have to give up the courts after one set and then wait their turn all over again. Up on the Hill they can play 3 sets in a row. The Hill is actually getting crowded, so that some players come back down to the Village in the hope of getting a game. But the

author has still another solution - she suggests that if the tennis players don't like the conditions - give up tennis and take up another sport. That is uncalled for impertinence.

Another fact. Public courts around the world and many of our players have played around the world - DO NOT HAVE TREES AROUND THEM BECAUSE SHADOWS DO ADVERSELY AF-FECT PLAYING CONDI-TIONS. The shadows in stadiums that the author talks about are there because promoters build the stadiums high in order to accomodate paying customers and the pros do not object because it affects the money they would get. However, the stadium shadows are solid shadows and not as bad as the flickering shadows that are screened through trees that make conditions impossible even if you have good eves-which most of us do not have.

The author's tennis bashing continues with her remarks about the groans when a shot is missed and the shouts of glee when a great shot is make. The Racquet Club suggested building up the sound barrier where none exists presently because we are considerate of the two condos close to the courts.

Does the Racquet Club suggest removing trees from anyone's yard - or eliminate shade from any home. No - there are only two trees in this category perhaps, but the suggestion to eliminate them was in order to plant a real sound barrier in their place, since the foliage on these trees is above the tennis screens and the two tree trunks 12 or 14 feet apart do not represent any kind of barrier. The Racquet Club has amended its request limiting it only to 6 trees on the east side of Court 1, which will not effect any condo. These trees can

be trimmed back or removed - it makes no difference provided the shadows are gone. It puzzles us why people who do not play tennis need to intrude their unrealistic solutions to problems they do not understand or do not want to understand. The Racquet Club members came to live in Leisure Village for the same reasons everyone else did. We love the trees, the green belts, the many recreational facilities which, incidentally, we believe should be the best they can be, whether we participate in them or not. We all deserve the very best we can get, especialy at this stage of our lives. Doesn't the author believe in that?







