PROGRESS ON BAR-B-QUE PIT

There has been a considerable amount of progress made on the projected picnic area and social center. A Midshipmen's planning committee was set up consisting of M/S Pyles, Creek, Lucas, and Brownson. In discussing this matter with the Superintendent a number of tentative decisions were arrived at. The area in the lee of the handball court has been selected as the site for the dance floor-picnic area. As it now stands it calls for a roughly triangular area some 40 feet on a side, paved in brick and roofed over with a redwood frame of slate to provide shade. The bar-b-que pit itself would be at the northeast corner of the area. Redwood tables and benches would be provided as would water, light, and refrigeration facilities and possibly a record player.
